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



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

TWO MEN BURGLARIZES ELLIS'S STORE-CAUGHT IN THE ACT AND HELD UP AT POINT OF RE-VOLVER BY POLICE DETECTIVE

One of the most daring and mysteri

der the notice of the police has just been brought to light. The perpetra-tors are two well known citizens, a 42 year old cooper and a 58 year old watchman. Both are charged with entering and looting W. A. Ellis's grocery and wine store on Water St. and are now behind the bars, having been arrested under most peculiar circumstances. The sensation was the principal topic discussed on all sides this foreroon. It was your difficult this forenoon. It was very difficult to get an accurate statement of what really occurred. The police authori ties would not talk on the matter neither would Mr. Ellis, whose store was robbed, as he did not wish to press the case. As far as could be gleaned the facts are: For some time past Mr. Ellis had been missing liq-uors, especially whiskey, in small quantities from his shop, supposed to be stolen by the two men in question, who were working at Baine Johnston's premises, which is next to the Ellis building and situated at the rear of it. The police were notified of what was going on and Detective Byrne was sent to unravel what look ed like a mystery, as all of Ellis & Co's. doors were barred up at 6 o'clock every evening. During the midnigh hours of Thursday the two men gained access to the place and got away with four bottles of whiskey and two bottles of Budweiser beer. These goods was missed by the owner yesterday morning, and Detective Byrne was ac quainted. The latter, with typical alertness and vigilance, secreted himself in the rear of the shop last even-ing when all the hands left and the place was locked. Shortly after mic night, or early this morning, the burg-lars again appeared to obtain more loot. They entered the building through a door at the rear and for which they had a false key. They were groping about the store in the dark, being afraid of being captured if they lit a match, and taking everything presumably they could lay hands on, when suddenly Byrne, who occupied a crouching position in the corner of the store, turned on the electric lights and quickly covered his men with a revolver. Without further delay they were placed under arrest and brought to the police station by the detective. To-day they were brought up before Judge Knight. They were not asked to plead and were remanded for eight days. We hear that the prisoners are charged

with complicity in other robberies and will likely be committed to the Supreme Court.





Death of a **Prominent** Countryman.

ALDERMAN JOHN FORRISTAL LONDON, ONTARIO.

The Rev. Mother of the Presenta tion Convent, Harbor Grace, received a cable on Thursday last, from Miss Forristal, announcing the death of her father, Alderman John Forristal, on Wednesday night, after a short ill-

John Forristal was born in Gus sett's Cove, Bay de Verde, seventy years ago, and in his youth followed up the fishery with his father in that thriving little settlement. When about sixteen years of age, he went to Harbor Grace, and served his apprenticeship with the well-known cooper and philanthropist, Mr. Thomas Higgins, in whose employ he also worked for several years as a journeyman. In the year 1868, the emigration fever began to strike Harbor Grace, and Mr. Forristal decided to seek his fortune in the Great Dominion. On the 24th of May, 1868, Mr. Forristal was one of the large contingent of emigrants who left our shores in the schooner 'Marie Vigilante,' which brought a load of flour to Ridley & Sons, Harbor Grace There were sixteen of our people who took passage on that memorable occasion, viz, John Forristal, Philip Brown (at present storekeeper at Alar Goodridge & Sons), Thomas Hogar (uncle of Dr. Hogan, St. Mary's) Jeremiah Scanlon (brother of the late T. D. Scanlon), John McKinnon, Phil Aylward, at Capt. Dan Green's, the Colford family of Carbonear, George Grant, of Trinity and old Mrs. Thom

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

A the appointed time, the lines were let go, and the schooner sailed down the harbor under short sail, whilst scores of boats followed in the wake, crowded with citizens, to see the last of their fellow-citizens and wish them every success. As the ship sailed away past the Point of Birchy, Custom House, Cathedral, out to Salvage the Band discoursed lively airs, amongst them being the Banks of Newfoundland, and as she reached Salvage Rock, the crowds who accompanied them on board ship entered their prepared to row ashore, the Band on board the largest boat playing Auld Lang Syne. Mr. Forristal played the ment, and as they were entering the boat, he handed his instrument to Isaac Marin, who played the same instrument in the British Band, and who took Mr. Forristal's place until the great concourse of people disbanded opposite the Cathedral. It was a day never to be forgotten in Harbor Grace, and the particulars are spoken of to this day and handed down to succeeding generations. Upon his arrival in Canada, Mr.

Forristal worked at his trade as cooper, and by sobriety, industry and sterling worth forged himself to the front rank until he became master and owner of the most extensive and successful coopering business in the Dominion. He was twice elected Alderman of the city of London, and every inducement was held out to him by the business men and citizens generally of that city, to permit himself to be placed in nomination for Mayor, and that his success was assured. But the great and extensive business interests in which he was engaged, prevented him from accepting nomination and certain election. He was director of several banks, and was largely interested in many great industries outside his own. Every laudable and charitable work had his hearty support, and he was a most liberal patron of the Roman Catholic Church of which he was such an exemplary and consistent a member His wife who survives him was a daughter of the late Capt. Michael Pumphrey, one of the most successful sealing masters and planters in the country, and uncle of Capt. William Pumphrey, of H.M.C., St. John's. Prosperity made no change in Mr. Forristal, and during his visit here last summer his chief delight was to tell the story of his early days, when he prosecuted the fishery with his father out of Gussett's Cove. He never denied what he was-the son of a Newfoundland fisherman. He always remembered the good ladies of the Convent, Harbor Grace, and only a few days ago, he was interesting himself in getting them a new Altar for their little Chapel. He leaves a widow, four sons and three daughters to mourn their loss, and the Evening Telegram extends its deep sympathy to them in their bereavement .- (Re-

Yesterday, Billy Rendell, who has been living in the Poor Asylum for several months, was sent to St. George's Hospital, for treatment. This oor boy who is in a bad state with consumption, has been allowed to run the city in all weathers, and it is a wonder that he was not left till the last moment before his case was attended to. The boy had been for months wandering around the streets wet, cold, hungry and miserable and fainting from the ravages of the White Plague, until eventually he was taken into the Poor Asylum at the solicitation of some friends. Had he pull and power he would not be left as he has been. The treatment accorded this boy is a commentary on the inhumanity of the so-called "People's Party." While Morris and his minions are receiving thousands of the people's taxes for no useful returns to the country, poor diseased waifs are allowed almost to die on the highways before being cared for and aged fishermen are being given when they cannot enjoy it, a dole called by courtesy an Old Age Pension. 


