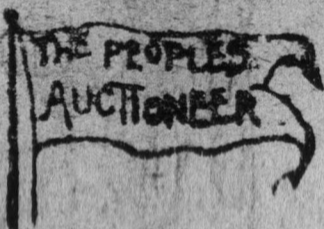

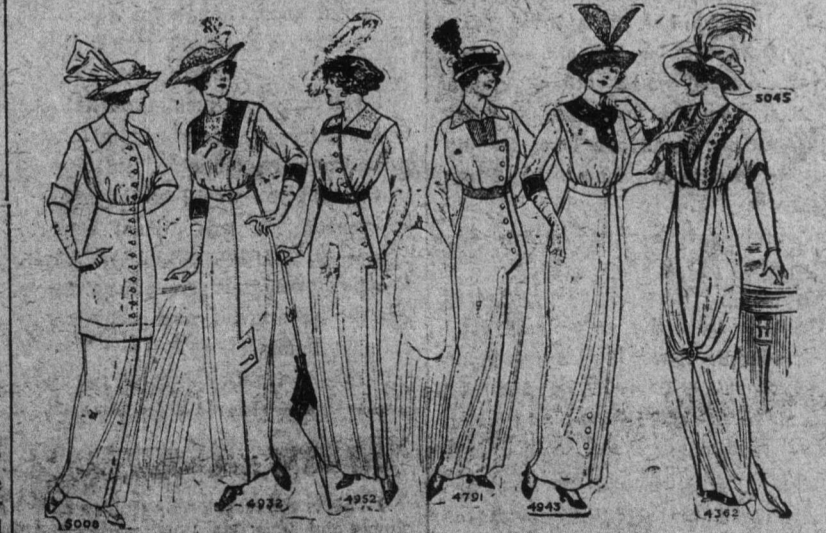

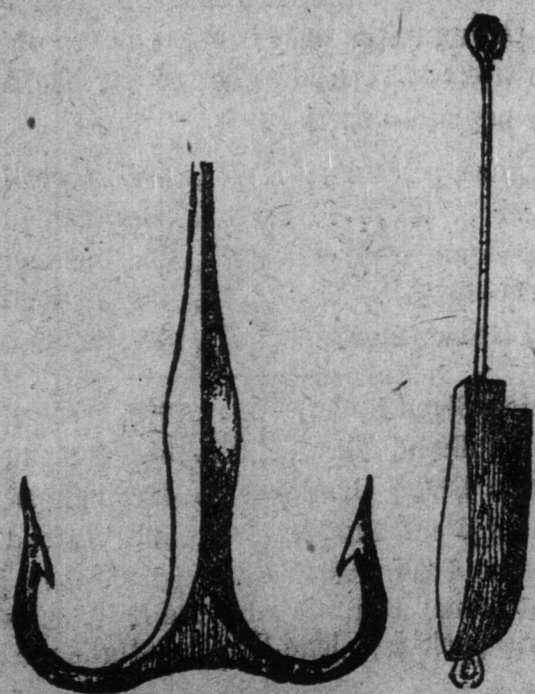

## MOTIVES.

BY RUTH CAMERON.



Did you ever come to charity frankly confessed to me that he did it because he was afraid his prosperity would cease if he didn't. I call this the superstitious motive, and I think it is a little better than the Pharisaical one, but not much.

Still others give because they hope to be rewarded for going so. Some expect an immediate earthly reward in the shape of prosperity and earthly desires fulfilled. Others hope to buy a ticket to heaven with their alms. Does that seem like a satisfactory motive to you? I must say it, doesn't quite content me. It is too much like investing money with the expectation of getting very high interest. We deny ourselves pleasures and gratifications in the fleeting to-day because we believe we shall thereby win for ourselves greater pleasures and gratifications in the eternal to-morrow. And yet, since much of religion is built on just that motive, I don't quite dare cavil at it.

To be generous toward your fellow-men because you cannot approve of yourself unless you are, seems to me a really satisfactory motive. There is only one higher, if it is higher, and that is to do things for your fellow-men because you love them and want to help them.

I can't quite decide which of these two motives is the higher. The first involves effort, the second implies a naturally beautiful character. "White souls without stain or blot who do the will of God and know it not." Perhaps the best way to rank these two is to say that the first is a nobler motive, and the second more beautiful.

From what motive do your kind acts come?

For in mental landscapes as well as material ones.

We are apt to think of an act of charity as a fixed quantity representing a certain amount of merit. It seems to me in reality that the act itself is only one of the factors. There are other factors which must be considered in reckoning the final product. And the motive behind the deed is one of the most important.

The lowest motive for charity is that of the Pharisees who did their alms "to be seen of men." If you multiply any sum, no matter how large, by zero, you still get zero. So it seems to me that the merit of Pharisaical alms, no matter how lavish, is always zero, because the value of one of the factors, the motive, is cipher.

A dominant idea of the old religion was that we should be good, because if we weren't we'd be everlastingly punished for it. Can you see much merit in being good because you are afraid you'll suffer if you aren't? And yet that is the spirit in which many people give alms; because they fear punishment here or hereafter if they withhold them. A man who religiously gave away a tenth of his in-

## Fashions and Fads.

A pretty Russian hair ornament is made of narrow black velvet, lightly set with tiny brilliants, with a paste cabochon at one side, which holds a black mercury wing in position.

Black patent leather shoes, with white tops, are worn with the tailored suits. There are also little short-toed slippers, in antelope, ribbed silk, doeskin and thick satin.

Black stockings are often worn with black pumps, but some very smartly gowned women wear stockings to match their gowns.

VIENNA, April 18.  
The Balkan Allies will to-day or to-morrow notify the European Powers of their acceptance of the Peace proposals. Bulgaria, Greece and Serbia will at the same time telegraph King Nicholas of Montenegro, urging upon him the advisability of following their example.

LONDON, April 18.  
Steffansson, the Arctic explorer, sails to-morrow from Southampton for New York, where he will spend three weeks before starting under the auspices of the Canadian Government, on his four years' expedition to the Arctic to search for a new continent.

LONDON, April 18.  
The women suspected of burning the residence of the widowed Lady white, are Phyllis Brady and Millicent Dean. They were sentenced on April 12th to six weeks' imprisonment, being found in possession of a large quantity of inflammable materials with which the house was burnt.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., April 18.  
Dr. Friedmann leaves here to-night for New York, thence to Montreal, and later to Germany. It is claimed that he will carry home with him \$1,500,000 which he will receive in the next few days for the secret of his vaccine. Physicians say that the vaccine will be on the market, ready for use by all physicians in the country within two weeks.

BRUSSELS, April 18.  
Cessation of work by the printers to-morrow, will bring home to residents of Belgium the capital the effects of the national strike for equal suffrage, more forcibly than the crippling of industry in other parts of the country has done. The majority of the fifteen dailies issued here will be unable to publish, while others will appear in reduced form. To-day's estimate of the number of strikers total between 250,000 and 375,000.

LONDON, April 18.  
Suffragettes this morning took possession of the Monument, near the northern approach to London Bridge. From the topmost balcony they displayed two immense flags and an immense banner with the words, "Victory or Death." They locked themselves in, preventing the police from ascending the winding staircase of 345 steps, remaining in the iron cage erected to prevent suicides, from which they showered literature among the thousands of people who assembled. For a long time the traffic was suspended in the vicinity, which is one of London's busiest districts. The police had to obtain the services of a locksmith before the door at the bottom of the shaft could be opened. When they caught the women and appeared with them on the street, the people became so threatening that the constables were compelled to take their prisoners back into the chamber until reinforcements arrived and cleared the way for their passage to the police station. A force of a hundred police was required to protect the women from the rushes of an angry mob. They were released a short time after reaching the police station.

**Morris's Finance.**

We have commented often on the financial bungling of the Morris Government, particularly in connection with the raising of the railway loans, the miscalculations in the cost of the railways and the general recklessness with which the money extracted from the people in the way of taxation is expended.

Although during the last ten years the increase of population has been only some 10 per cent., the people pay twice as much to the Revenue Departments as they did ten years ago; and now we find that during the past four years the sum of seven million two hundred thousand dollars has been added to the Public Debt, and it is more and more evident as time goes on that a third loan will have to be raised to clear off obligations arising from Branch Railway Contracts entered into by the Government with the Reid Nfld. Co.

Under these circumstances it is particularly interesting to note what the Auditor General has to say on expenditures for which no authority had been given to the Government by the Legislatures.

Of course it may happen that an accident to a public work or some unforeseen contingency may arise which urgently calls for an immediate expenditure, which the Legislature is not in session to provide for. Under these circumstances of urgency and

necessity, the Audit Act provides a means of making the expenditure in a regular way.

In May 1912 a special warrant for \$16,000 was issued. The necessity in this case was really due to the fault of those in authority. The Auditor General says of this expenditure: "The necessity for the issue of this warrant was caused by a miscalculation by the Department of Charities of its actual requirements at the time when Supplementary Supply was being sought." Of this amount \$7,711.84 was spent; the balance being dropped.

The Auditor General next takes up the short votes taken by the Legislature at the instance of the Government, and the annual supplementing of it, without the authority of the Legislature, by the Governor in Council. On this matter he comments thus:—

"In February, 1913, an Order in Council directed the issue of a Special Warrant for \$15,000.00 to relieve the vote of \$10,000.00 for General Contingencies 1912-13, of certain charges borne by the said vote which should not properly have been charged thereto. These charges had practically swamped the vote (always, as I have frequently reported, utterly inadequate to meet the calls upon it), their payment had exhausted the credit of the Accountant of Contingencies as I had declined to issue any further letters of credit on the Bank of Montreal in favor of that official.

"In order to relieve the situation, the Government ordered the issue of the Warrant to cover these expenditures and others of a cognate nature until Supplementary Supply should be voted by the Legislature.

"Of the sum of \$15,000 appropriated under this Warrant, \$6,576.47 has been spent and further charges for pensions not provided for by vote of the Legislature will be made against it."

He next turns his attention to over-expenditures made by Order-in-Council. I will be seen that these expenditures amount to \$77,364.37. Some \$40,364.37 was made on accounts which were not of a permanent nature, but \$37,000 will become an annual charge.

The Auditor General gives the details and comments as follows:—

"Entailing as they do, increases in salaries, new salaries, pensions, and other expenditures which have not been authorized by the Legislature, all payments made on account of them are in contravention of the provisions of the Audit Act and have therefore not been allowed by me. As I have refused to re-imburse all such payments from the Exchequer Account, the several Departments which have made them are indebted to the Bank of Montreal pro tanto until such time as the Legislature make provision for their payment."

"It will be seen that there has been incurred during the period covered

by this Report, an annual obligation of \$37,000.00, for increases to salaries, salaries for new positions and pensions, without any authorization by the Legislature. I include in this the \$10,000.00 paid over to the Game and Inland Fisheries Board Protection Society. My objection to passing this amount of \$77,364.37 is taken under Sections 13 and 18 of the Audit Act; and in each and every case I have notified the Chairman of the Treasury Board (the Minister of Finance and Customs), of my inability to pass the payments."

"Repayment of all expenditure in excess of the regular appropriation votes as notes hereunder has been refused by me, and, as in the case of expenditures under head 'B', the several Departments which have over-drawn the votes under their control, are indebted to the Bank of Montreal for such over-draws."

"In addition the foregoing there are a large number of votes which, by the end of the month, will be exhausted; especially is this the case with the votes under the control of the Accountant of Contingencies, and the Public Charities, Postal and Telegraphs, and Public Works Departments. This foresees the usual heavy demand for Supplementary Supply from the Legislature at its next session.

"I have to report that the sum of \$20,363.88 has been expended out of the Temporary Loan of \$100,000.00, obtained from the Bank of Montreal for Lighthouse erection. This Loan was raised under the Loan Act of 1912 which authorized the raising, by the sale of Debenture Bonds of the Colony of the sum of \$250,000.00, \$100,000.00 of which is to be applied to the erection of Lighthouses. The summer and autumn being the only time available for the erection of Lighthouses, the Government decided that it would not be advisable to await the raising of the Loan, and the work was therefore commenced. Hence the necessity for the Temporary Loan.

"The sum of \$59,856.00 has been expended on account of road and marine works out of the Surplus of 1912-13. Pending ratification by the Legislature of the allocation of this Surplus made by the Government, I have not passed this Expenditure."

The Auditor General next takes up Overdrafts on Appropriation votes for 1912-13. He shows the following overdrafts:—

**Sensational Arrest.**

TWO MEN BURGLARIZES ELLIS'S STORE—CAUGHT IN THE ACT AND HELD UP AT POINT OF REVOLVER BY POLICE DETECTIVE BYRNE.

One of the most daring and mysterious burglaries that has yet come under the notice of the police has just been brought to light. The perpetrators are two well known citizens, a 42 year old cooper and a 58 year old watchman. Both are charged with entering and looting W. A. Ellis's grocery and wine store on Water St. and are now behind the bars, having been arrested under most peculiar circumstances. The sensation was the principal topic discussed on all sides this forenoon. It was very difficult to get an accurate statement of what really occurred. The police authorities would not talk on the matter, neither would Mr. Ellis, whose store was robbed, as he did not wish to press the case. As far as could be gleaned the facts are: For some time past Mr. Ellis had been missing liquors, especially whiskey, in small quantities from his shop, supposed to be stolen by the two men in question, who were working at Baine Johnston's premises, which is next to the Ellis building and situated at the rear of it. The police were notified of what was going on and Detective Byrne was sent to unravel what looked like a mystery, as all of Ellis & Co.'s doors were barred up at 6 o'clock every evening. During the midnight hours of Thursday the two men gained access to the place and got away with four bottles of whiskey and two bottles of Budweiser beer. These goods were missed by the owner yesterday morning, and Detective Byrne was acquainted. The latter, with typical alertness and vigilance, secreted himself in the rear of the shop last evening when all the hands left and the place was locked. Shortly after midnight, or early this morning, the burglars again appeared to obtain more loot. They entered the building through a door at the rear and for which they had a false key. They were groping about the store in the dark, being afraid of being captured if they lit a match, and taking everything presumably they could lay hands on, when suddenly Byrne, who occupied a crouching position in the corner of the store, turned on the electric lights and quickly covered his men with a revolver. Without further delay they were placed under arrest, and were taken to the police station by the detective. To-day they were brought up before Judge Knight. They were not asked to plead and were remanded for eight days. We hear that the prisoners are charged with complicity in other robberies and will likely be committed to the Supreme Court.

Detective Byrne, no doubt, is an unusually busy man these days. Only yesterday he arrested a labourer for stealing twenty packages of tea, the property of Meehan & Co. He was tried to-day in the Magistrate's Court, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to three months' hard labor.

## The James Bay Country.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—At the hour when we in Newfoundland are building branch railroads, it may be a matter of especial interest to readers of the Evening Telegram to hear what the North Railway Company are doing in Canada, and to learn some particulars about the country through which they are about to construct a road. The proposition before the North Railway Company is to construct a road through northern Quebec to connect James Bay with Montreal. The James Bay terminus will be about the mouth of the Nottaway River, a stream about the size of the Ex-plots. From the Bell River, where the National Transcontinental Railroad crosses it, to James Bay the proposed road will traverse an almost unexplored region.

The country is for the most part well wooded. The principal trees comprise black and white spruce, balsam poplar (spruce or jackpine), tamarack (known as juniper in this country), aspen and balsam poplar, white birch, fir, and white cedar, as well as white maple, and rowan or mountain ash in certain localities. The black spruce predominates, affording about seventy-five or eighty per cent. of the arboreal flora. The finest timber grows along the water courses, diminishing in size as they recede inland to meet the small growth of juniper and black spruce of the wet swampy land. As in this country there are wide tracts of open marshes or muskog. These wet places occupy about ten per cent. of the land surface. Rising out of the plain here and there are low ridges of dry sandy soil. These elevations are covered with a growth of fine Jack pine and scattered poplar. The soil is a heavy clay, but along the rivers is generally a lighter, and drier soil. Many of the marshes are capable of being easily drained, and their beds converted into useful farming land.

The Nottaway River possesses great water powers. One of the Falls, that of the Iroquois, about fifty miles inland, is over 70 feet in height. The river at that point rushes through a

rocky channel only 75 feet wide; it presents a most magnificent sight as it leaps and boils and chafes as if indignant of the restraint put upon it. It comes down in three great chutes, the centre one being most imposing; there the river takes a sharp bend, the waters fall in three channels as if into a mighty cauldron where they leap in creamy jets, high into the surrounding air. Above the awful tumult of waters a cloud of spray and mist is drifted higher and thicker by the wind. The aqueous veil as it floats on the air catches the rays of the sun and flings it back in ever changing play of beautiful rainbow tints. Some day not far distant men will harness that wild steed and make it do their bidding.

In the neighbourhood of the Iroquois Falls are extensive forests of fine pulp wood and larger timber, that must ere long attract the attention of paper makers, and utilitarianism will lay ruthless hands on the magnificent falls, making the wild, free waters the slaves of men.

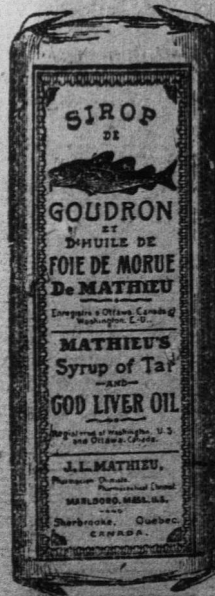
The Abitibi and Chibougamau regions through which the James Bay road will be laid are regions that possess undoubted mineral wealth. The geologist and prospector have only touched the fringes of it, as it were. Even that small acquaintance has brought great reward, for mining is actively engaged in in several places. Among the minerals are asbestos, galena, copper ores, gold, magnetite, etc. The rocks which underlie the glacial drift are Lower Huronian and the more ancient rocks. These rocks consist of slates and schists together with dolomites and black shales. The massive rocks are granite and gneiss of the acid and basic types. Besides all the above mentioned latent wealth the region possesses a wealth of fur bearing animals and fresh water fishes in great abundance and variety. Among the fur bearing animals are the fox, lynx, fisher, marten, mink, otter, beaver and muskrat; bears, wolves, moose and caribou also inhabit the country. The lakes and rivers teem with fishes, among which are trout, pickard (or dore), whitefish and

great pike or maskinonge. These latter attain to a great size. Their flesh is white and firm and in flavor very much like that of the cod, inclining to that of the salmon. There are no salmon found in the rivers there. The reason being, I presume, the murky condition of the water. The river flows through a clay country and therefore carries along in suspension great quantities of fine mud or silt, which gives its waters a more or less muddy appearance. Except in places where the waters are very rapid, the stones of the bottom are covered with an almost impalpable mud or slime, which makes wading very difficult. The climate resembles ours very much, but I think it is a bit colder in winter; the amount of snowfall is also much more than here I believe. A glance at the map will show that the country has much the position of ours in point of latitude. The mouth of the Nottaway River being about 51 degrees 30 minutes N. or about the same as the Groix Islands, or Flower's Cove.

### Cable News.

NEW YORK, April 18.—The population of this city to-day is 5,392,000, according to latest figures compiled by the New York City Health Department.

LONDON, April 18.—The Times announces that after May 5th, its price will be four cents, instead of six cents, the rate at which it has been sold since 1861.

EDMONTON, April 18.—The result of the Provincial Elections in Alberta, yesterday, is 32 Liberals, 19 Conservatives and 1 Independent Liberal. Two seats, Pembina and Clear Water, are unheard from, and elections in Peace River and Athabasca are deferred.

NEW YORK, April 18.—The list of patients in the Bellevue Hospital to-day includes 65 physicians and the entire staff of internes. One after another the doctors became ill last night after indulging in a chicken salad luncheon. The physicians believe the salad was made of bob veal, and have diagnosed their cases as ptomaine poisoning.

LONDON, April 18.—The Standard has discovered a carefully engineered suffragette plot to fire its offices. Lithographed letters, bearing the private address of a prominent supporter, were sent on Monday to a number of militants inviting them to attend a private and confidential gathering, the object of which was to consider what steps might be taken to bring about reprisals on the Standard, for its persistently hostile attitude. These were to set fire to the plant. The crime was to be committed in a fortnight. Rags soaked in petroleum were to be used as fireballs. The Standard points out that there are no fewer than 150 people in the building, whose lives would be placed in imminent peril by such an outrage. Like all printing offices, it has enormous quantities of inflammable material, and a spark might lead to a disastrous conflagration.

DULUTH, Minn., April 18.—Navigation, so far as the head of the Lakes is concerned, opened yesterday, when the steamer William H. Wolf, cleared for her first trip down the lakes. She carries 335,000 bushels of flour, bound for Buffalo. Three other boats cleared later in the afternoon, carrying grain cargoes.

### Fish.

Fish is a bony article of food which is highly recommended for people whose brains need bolstering. In case there is nothing to work on, it will keep the patient so busy dodging s t y a r e m a n a t s of backbone that he won't have time to commit a grammatical error by mixing in the conversation. There are two kinds of fish—fresh and salted. Fresh fish are caught by patient citizens who are well equipped with spare time and angle worms, and attired in a cob pipe and hip boots. Some men who never have time to go out to dinner with their wives will spend all day fishing below the dam, and if they return home at night with a wide-mouthed sucker and an infant rock bass they will feel more pleased than if they had sold a forty-acre lot by the front foot. The whale has become famous in history through having provided board and lodging for a refugee named Jonah, who caught the whale in a yawn and dived with highly satisfactory results. The shark is a fish which has to turn over on its side in order to remove a leg from anybody, and is a very unpleasant object while engaged in getting dinner. The plankton whitefish is a dining car specialty which is forever associated in the mind of the patron with the remains of a \$5 bill which is planked down beside it.

### Herring Packing.

Minutes of Meeting Held at Sandy Point, April 16th, Rev. E. A. Butler, Chairman.

WHEREAS the fishermen of Bay St. George have to trust to a very great extent to the Herring Fishery, for their living, the fishermen of Sandy Point almost entirely; and

WHEREAS for years past the prices received for their herrings have been too low to make the fishery a profitable business for the fishers;

AND WHEREAS the price is regulated to a great degree by the way in which the herring have been packed, and that some fishermen do not use sufficient care in preparing their herrings for market.

BE IT RESOLVED that this meeting representing the fishermen of Sandy Point, ask the Government to issue a License to any fisherman in Bay St. George who puts up herring for sale, who will be given a number to be placed on each and every barrel sold by him, so as to make it possible to trace any bad herring to the person who packed the same.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Government be asked to consider this matter as quickly as possible, to issue Licenses before May 1st, as the herring fishery opens on or about that date, and as early as convenient afterwards to provide each fisherman with a stencilled plate containing some official mark (say a crown), a number and the words "Bay St. George, Nfld."

BE IT RESOLVED that the Government be asked to issue instructions to masters of schooners not to receive any barrel on which the number of the shipper can not be distinguished; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that these resolutions be signed by eleven persons present and a copy be sent to the Governor in Council, the member for the District, the principal St. John's papers, the "Western Star" and also the chief settlements around the Bay.

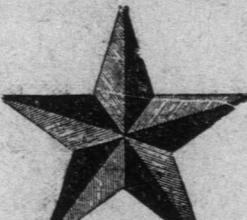
### Ferocious Dogs.

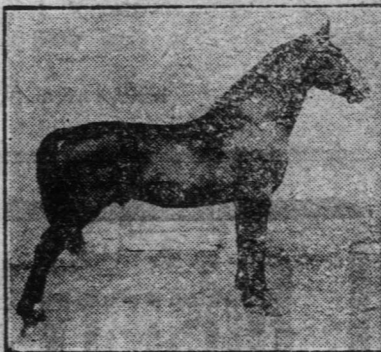

BERLIN, To-day. The newspapers here print a statement that the Kaiser has invited Winston Churchill to be his personal guest at Kiel during the yachting week.

LONDON, To-day. The Lord Advocate of Scotland, in a speech at Bromley said the Budget to be introduced next week would show that Chancellor Lloyd George intended to devote a million dollars to social reform in the coming financial year.

VANCOUVER, To-day. The Egeria is for sale. After years of effort the Navy League has been compelled to give up the scheme of establishing a training ship in Vancouver, and the famous old vessel, now anchored off Deadman's Island, is to be disposed of.

ROME, To-day. Consoling news emanated from the Vatican last night. Pope Pius for the past three days is without fever. His general condition is progressing favorably and that if these conditions continued for two days more, His Holiness would be considered convalescent. The bulletins of physicians have been discontinued.

NEW YORK, To-day. According to the N. Y. Journal, J. P. Morgan in his will, bequeathed three millions to his wife, three millions to each of his three daughters, \$15,000 each to Miss Green and Mrs. Ada Thurston, and a thousand to his valet, a thousand each to the servants in his family for five years, the balance including his library to his son, J. P. Morgan. The disposition of the Art treasures has not been made known so far.

The S. S. City of Sydney, which was engaged by the Red Cross Line running the St. John's-New York via Halifax route while the Floréal and Stephano were at the icefields, has completed her charter. On Tuesday next when her present cargo is unloaded she will be dry docked for an overhauling preparatory to her resuming the Black Diamond service on Saturday of next week when the ship will reside at Sydney for the next two years and continue thereafter in the passenger and freight service for the rest of the season in conjunction with the S. S. Morwenna.
