THE TIMES BLAMES GERMANY.

LONDON, To-day. The Times Editorial this morning says: "Recent events mean Europe is to be the scene of the most terrible war she has witnessed since the fall of the Roman Empire." The Times proceeds to throw the blame upon Germany, saying "Germany could have stayed the plague had she chosen to speak to Vienna, as she speaks when she is in earnest. But she preferred to make a demand in Petersburg and at Paris which no Government could entertain. She has lived up to her worst principles -a Frederican tradition which disregards all obligations, right or wrong, bidding for immediate self interest. She has resolved to crush France, trample upon the rights of those who stand in her way. Yesterday it was Luxemburg. To-morow it may be England she will assail without declaring war.





"I, John Jones, do solemnly and truly swear that I am the importer of the goods mentioned in the invoice now produced by me and hereunto annexed and signed by me, and that the voice received by me or which I expect to receive of all the goods improperly described in the said invoice and in this entry thereof, and that nothing has been on my part, or to other person done, concealed or suppressed, whereby His Majesty, the King, may be defrauded of any part of the duty lawfully due on the said goods; and I do further solemnly and truly swear that the prices of the goods as shown in said invoice and as aggregated in this Bill of Entry now presented by me, exhibit the fair market value of the said goods at the time and place of their exportation to this Colony, and without any deduction or discount for cash or because of the exportation thereof, or for any other that to the best of my knowledge and belief the prices so exhibited were the prices of said goods for consumption at such time and place. So help me God."

On the completion of this Bill of Entry and the payment of the amount

of duties shown thereon I receive from the Collector a permit directed to his Tidewaiter authorizing him to deliver to me the goods on which I have paid duties.

Now, Mr. Editor, I want to make it clear that I am not raising any objections to this method of procedure. I know it is the right and legal way of doing Customs business the world over and no one but an ignoramus or a crank or a chronic disturber of the peace would resist or incite resistance to the law, but I think that in this respect every one should be treated alike. The law is no respecter of persons, neither is the man who pays \$5,000 duties in a given period justified in expecting any favour or exemption from the law any more than the man who pays only \$5.00 in the same time. "Let justice be done

Where the taking of an oath is contrary to a person's religious belief, he is permitted in the Courts of Law to make a solemn affirmation or declaration, which is of the same force and effect as if the oath had been taken in the usual form by such person. The same I presume applies in subscribing to the form of Certificate on the back of a Bill of Entry.

The Call of the Marseillaise.

The call of the Marseillaise rechoes on the ears of every Frenchman throughout the world to-day, as a general mobilization of the French Army and Navy commenced yesterday. Though the number of French residents and fishermen in Newfoundland is very small every available man is required in the service of the Republic. Instructions concerning the summoning of the French Reserves have been sent to St. Pierre, and from there orders will be issued to the French fishing fleet now on the Grand Banks. The fishery will have to be abandoned and the fishermen, who according to this year's statistics number over ten thousand, will hasten o headquarters and report themselves for service. Practically every man in the fleet belongs to the naval reserve of the Republic, and carries with him all necessary instructions which come into effect the moment he is called upon.

French Consul Suzer wishes us to nform French residents or fishermen in Newfoundland that general mobilisation of the French Army and Navy has been decreed for to-day, 2nd August, and that every available man must report himself to his home quarters according to the instructions of his military papers. 


