

OFFICIAL.

FRANCE—Mining and artillery fighting.—Russians have advanced in the Gulf of Riga region.

Italy—Austrian positions carried on Isonzo.

BONAR LAW.

WINSTON CHURCHILL FOR FRONT

LONDON, Nov. 14. Winston Spencer Churchill will leave next Wednesday to join his regiment in France, according to the Weekly Despatch.

PRINCE ALBERT III.

LONDON, Nov. 14. Prince Albert, second son of King George, is suffering from obstinate gastric disorder. He will have to stay in London for a few weeks to undergo special treatment.

GENERAL SMUTTS IN COMMAND.

PRETORIA, Nov. 14. General Christian Smuts, Minister of Defence, has been given supreme command of a military expedition against German East Africa. The Union of South Africa Government has decided to send against the German Colony as many as 25,000 men, if a force that size should be deemed necessary. A great recruiting campaign is being planned to raise volunteers for over-seas armies as well as for operations in Africa.

RECRUITING.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 14. The Government recruiting committee has called for another 10,000 men for service in German East Africa. It is said the call was made at the request of the British Government whose available troops are now so fully occupied. It could not be expected to provide men for campaigns the world over.

ARRIVED IN QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, Nov. 14. The remains of the late Chas. Tupper arrived here this morning on the steamer Metagama, and were transferred on the Government steamer Lady Evelyn from Quebec to Lewis, whence they were shipped to Halifax on a special train.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, Nov. 14. Repulse of a German attempt to gain ground by the explosion of a mine chamber in the region of Frise, west of Peronne, and the bombardment of the railroad station of Chaulnes, comprises the activities of the French forces on the Western front.

MONTHLY WAR CONTRIBUTION.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 14. Governor General Von Bissing has imposed upon Belgium a monthly war contribution of \$8,000,000 towards covering the needs of the army and cost of administering the occupied territories. These contributions are based upon Article 25 of the Hague Convention on Land Warfare. Nine provinces in Belgium are held jointly responsible for the payments, which will begin on Dec. 10.

HEAVY FIGHTING.

VIENNA, Nov. 14. (Official.) Heavy fighting in region of Gorizia.

GERMAN INTRIGUE IN PERSIA.

LONDON, Nov. 14. A despatch from Petrograd, yesterday, says that the Novoe Vremya and the Reich to-day call attention to what they term German intrigue in Persia. They insist that there is a similarity between these intrigues and those fomented by Germany in Turkey and Bulgaria, suggesting that Germany desires to drag Persia into the war as preliminary to grandiose adventures in the Far East.

OUTLOOK IN PERSIA REASSURING.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 14. Persia's Shah having resolved to remain at Teheran in the hope of a favorable issue to the pour-parlers between Persia and Russia, the population of Persia has been reassured, says a despatch from Teheran received to-day. The Russian Minister to Persia has made a reassuring statement to the Russian Colony, outlining the measures to be taken for the protection of the life and property of individuals in the event of complications at Teheran. Persians report that Suliman Mirzar, democratic leader in parliament, and Suleiman San, assistant minister of the interior, are retiring from public life, as are other officials who are opposed to Russia.

EMPEROR WILLIAM WILL VISIT KING FERDINAND.

LONDON, Nov. 14. Emperor William, on Thursday, passed through Orsova, Hungary, on the way to Sofia, where he will visit King Ferdinand for two days, according to a despatch from Copenhagen to the Daily Mail. Afterwards the Emperor plans to inspect Field Marshal Von Mackensen's armies which are now invading Serbia and later he will pay a visit to Constantinople.

AUSTRIANS BOMB VERNOL.

ROME, Nov. 14. Three Austrian aeroplanes to-day dropped fifteen bombs on the city of Verona. Twenty-eight persons were killed and thirty other inhabitants seriously wounded. Nineteen people were slightly injured.

RUSSIAN OFFICIAL.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 14. On the Western Russian front our troops in the Shlok region, pursuing the enemy, inflicted severe losses on him. We advanced west to Kemmer. Almost everywhere on the rest of the front there were merely exchanges of shots, and encounters between outposts. There is no change in the Caucasus.

ANGLO-FRENCH SUCCESSES.

SALONIKA, Nov. 14. Anglo-French forces have occupied Hill No. 350, between Radovo and Strumitza, and dominating the left side of the pass through which runs the Dorjan-Strumitza railway. They have also taken Hill No. 345 on the opposite side of the same pass, putting the pass completely in the power of the Anglo-French troops. In the Ceria River sector the French already hold Dibrista, Kamental and Momen. Yesterday they captured Sirkovo and Glasovka, south of Cicevo, inflicting heavy losses on the Bulgarians, and doubling the territory occupied in this sector. By this action the French extended their lines within a few miles of the Serbian positions commanding Babuna defile, and cut off an important Bulgarian force in the neighborhood of Phares.

AUSTRO-GERMAN MISSION ARRIVE AT ATHENS.

LONDON, Nov. 14. Although London refuses to share the consternation which the dissolution of the Greek Chamber has caused in France, no attempt is made to minimize the seriousness of the situation, nor to ignore the fact that King Constantine's action has put a definite quietus on all hopes of Greek co-operation in the near future. An Austro-German mission has already arrived at Athens to formulate a definite understanding between Greece and the Central Powers.

DEMAND THAT GREECE DEFINE HER ATTITUDE.

LONDON, Nov. 14. An Athens despatch, dated November 12, says: British, French and Russian Ministers to-day demanded that Greece define the attitude she would observe in the event of the Allied forces seeking refuge in Greek territory, in case of reverse in Serbia and Macedonia. They insisted that no distinction be made between the Anglo-French and their Serbian Allies. The Greek reply is not known, but in view of the good relations on both sides, the conviction prevails that a satisfactory solution will be reached.

ITALIANS BOMBARD DEDEAGATCH.

SALONIKA, Nov. 14. The Italian cruiser Piedmonte bombarded and destroyed a few gunboats and quantities of stores. They are now fighting continuously and are inflicting considerable losses on the Bulgarians. The Austro-Germans appear to be holding their own against the Bulgarians making a stand on the western bank of the Morava river. So stubborn is their resistance that the Bulgarians have had to call for assistance from Austro-German artillery in their effort to drive the defenders out of Katchanik Pass. Thus far they have been unsuccessful.

FRENCH IN SERBIA.

PARIS, Nov. 14. An official communication from the French Army in the East was received under date of Nov. 13th, and has been given out by the French War Office: The Bulgars attacked on the 11th the villages of Kruevevica and Sirkovo, which he had taken on the 10th. We repulsed their attacks; then we ourselves attacked, and took the village of Cicevo, north of Valandovo. We have taken the Bulgar for height on which it is situated.

GERMAN SUBMARINE SANK THE ANCONA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14. A cable this evening to the Sun from Rome, says that an Italian cabinet minister has informed the Evening Sun correspondent that it was a German, not an Austrian submarine, that sank the Italian liner Ancona, and that the Italian government regards the Ancona sinking as the opening of hostilities by Germany against Italy, without any declaration of war having been made. He asserted that one of these ships sunk, not previously announced, is said to be the liner Firenze, bound for Port Said from Genoa which was sunk on Nov. 9th, fifteen of the crew and six passengers being missing.

NINE AMERICANS MURDERED.

ROME, Nov. 14. Of ten Americans who were on board the steamer Ancona when sunk by a submarine off the Tunisian coast only one was saved according to a statement issued to-day by the Italian emigration office. The statement says that out of 507 passengers and crew of the Ancona, only 299 were saved.

NO AMERICAN SURVIVORS.

LONDON, Nov. 14. A despatch from the Island of Malta, to Reuters' telegram company, says: There are no American survivors of the Ancona here. It is learned from a reliable source, however, that one American either was drowned or missing.

TORPEDOING OF THE ANCONA.

PARIS, Nov. 14. Connected with the torpedoing of the Ancona the following was received by the Havas News Agency from Ferryville: The Ancona left Messina at 8 a.m. November 6th. About 10 o'clock in the morning of November 7th she picked up wireless distress signals from the steamship France which read, "S.O.S. we are being shelled." The message ended abruptly without the position of the France being given so that it was impossible for the Ancona to go to her aid. The Ancona continued on her route for an hour after which the sea being calm, and weather misty. Without any sort of warning the report of a gun was heard, and shells simultaneously struck the Ancona forward causing considerable damage. The wireless operator, without an instant of delay sent out a distress signal with the name of the ship and her position. The submarine approached near the Ancona keeping up continuous fire. First the wireless telegraphy apparatus was destroyed, then the lifeboats were shot to pieces, a number of the passengers being killed and wounded. Fifty shots at least were fired until the Ancona stopped. The submarine then hoisted Austrian colors, and her commander announced that he would allow ten minutes for all to quit the ship. The unassisted boats at once were lowered. After the wounded had been placed in them the passengers and crew followed. This was going on for half an hour when the submarine fired a torpedo which struck the Ancona on the bow. The ship sank gradually and disappeared beneath the waves at 2.30. The submarine steamed away. Towards 6 o'clock in the evening the mine layer Pluton which had picked up the Ancona's distress message, arrived at the scene. Most of the survivors were then rescued close to the place where the steamer sank.

BRITISH AND FRENCH TROOPS WHICH ARE RECEIVING REINFORCEMENTS ARE ALSO REPULSING THE BULGARIAN ATTACKS WHICH HAVE UNDERTAKEN A SMALL OFFENSIVE MOVEMENT WITH GOOD RESULTS.

The Austro-Germans and Bulgarians have made such progress from the beginning of the campaign that it will take serious work now to check their movement with good results. The Central Powers have again protested to Greece against the landing of Allied troops at Salonika. King Constantine it is reported replied that as Salonika is an open port there has been no infringement of Greek rights in landing, and that Greece will remain neutral until one of the belligerents has transgressed against these rights.

France and Italy, the latter having now joined her allies, by sending a warship to Salonika, are particularly anxious as to the attitude of Greece.

HINDENBURG'S FAILURE.

LONDON, To-day. The Russians have repelled Von Hindenburg's drive toward Riga and Dvinsk and along the Dvina River. They have taken offensive, but owing to the state of the ground have been able to make only slow progress in the marshy region west of Riga. Along the Stry River south, the Austro-Germans by counter stroke have pierced the Russian line and captured 1500 prisoners, according to a Berlin official statement. On the West front there have been no events of importance.

NO MILITARY REASON FOR SINKING THE ANCONA.

ROME, To-day. The Italian Government has sent an official communication to neutral Governments, dealing with the sinking of the Italian liner Ancona. The note denies the Ancona carried any arms or any contraband or persons in belittling military service, or that there were any circumstances justifying such an attack as a necessity of war.

THE FIGHT FOR TETEVO.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch to Reuters from Saloniki says the fighting yesterday between Serbians and Bulgarians in the region of Tetevo resulted in success for Serbians, who occupied the town and captured several trenches. A quantity of stores. Tetevo is a point of some importance, which may have bearing on further developments in that quarter. The Bulgarians attack on the left bank of the Ornaca River, was repulsed with heavy losses. Towards the south of Valandovo, the French captured several trenches. A Saloniki despatch to Reuters under date Sunday evening says Bulgarians have recaptured town of Tetevo. French and British troops continue to advance along whole line.

APPROACHING VELES.

PARIS, To-day. An Athens correspondent of the Hapsburg Agency in a despatch dated

Saturday, says news from private sources report the French within 12 kilometres of Veles, Serbia, which was held by Bulgarians.

RETIRING IN GOOD ORDER.

ROME, To-day. The Serbian Legation received the following official statement from Athens under Saturday's date: According to information, it is untrue that Valandovo has been occupied or even threatened by Bulgarians. It is reported this morning that the Serbian Government is installed at Mitrovitz. The Serbian troops carrying out their retreat in perfect order, are in no way discouraged. They have had to abandon no material and the Bulgarian allegations to the contrary are false.

FALL OF VELES IMMINENT.

PARIS, To-day. The Serbian Legation here to-day made public the following official statement: although Veles is not yet in the hands of the French and British troops, the Bulgarians are hard pressed and the fall of the town is imminent. The Bulgarians in the region of Veles suffered enormous losses and have requested the armistice to bury dead.

NO APPROACH TO VATICAN.

ROME, To-day. The assertion made in various quarters recently that Emperor William had written to Pope Benedict asking to obtain a truce from the Alps, is denied at the Vatican to-day. The officials of the Vatican declare that neither side has made any representation to the Pontiff, looking for peace.

ITALIAN CRUISER AT SALONIKI.

LONDON, To-day. The Italian cruiser Piedmonte arrived at Saloniki, according to a despatch from that place to the Daily Telegraph.

REASON FOR ASQUITH'S THREAT.

LONDON, To-day. James O'Grady, member of parliament and member of the Labor Recruiting Committee, is quoted by the Weekly Despatch as saying in an interview that the reason Asquith made the pledge that compulsory enlistment would be put into effect after Nov. 30th, if young men did not come forward voluntarily to enlist, was because when the recruiting scheme of Earl Derby was put into operation, the main response was by married men. Thousands of young unmarried men, O'Grady says, meantime flocked into munition factories.

CHURCHILL'S RESIGNATION.

LONDON, To-day. An editorial appears in some London morning papers justifying Churchill's resignation of the Cabinet under the circumstances already indicated. The Daily Mail asks whether Churchill is really responsible for the Dardanelles miscarriage, and says he leaves office with the good wishes of everyone in the country. Other papers not friendly towards Churchill are asking whether Churchill's plans of the Dardanelles and other undertakings, for which he was supposed to be responsible, failed in their object through delays or mismanagement in their execution, on account of other personages in the Government or Administration. Lord Rosebery writes to the Times advocating the Government should take advantage of Churchill's regrettable resignation to take into the Cabinet some non-political man of business, if only for the purpose of retrenchment and to supply sorely needed new blood. The Morning Post strongly advocated formation of official opposition parliament force upon the Government improvement of the conduct of affairs.

FRENCH MINISTER WILL INVESTIGATE AT ATHENS.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch to the Times from Athens says Denys Cochin, Minister without portfolio in the new French Cabinet is expected to arrive there to-day. A despatch from Paris on Saturday, said Cochin left the French capital for Greece in endeavour to obtain the truth about the situation.

Boy Reported Shot in the West End.

Last night and this morning a sensational report was current in the city that a boy named Murphy had been accidentally shot in the head in the West End of the city yesterday. Only meagre details are to hand, as up to noon to-day when our representative last enquired, the police had no knowledge of the matter, but as far as we could glean the shooting was the work of another boy belonging to the same section of the town, who discharged a rifle and the bullet entered Murphy's forehead. The wounded lad was brought to the General Hospital to-day by his father where an X-ray operation will be performed to find out the nature of the victim's injuries.

Adventure From Far North.

The s.s. Adventure, Capt. Wilson, arrived back to-day from the Far North. The ship was absent four months and a half, during which she was engaged by the Canadian Government, going as far north as Port Nelson. Capt. Wilson reports that when leaving there very severe weather was setting in, the frost being intense. Besides the ice was forming to a thickness of several inches and the Adventure had to butt her way along through the foe. She brought back 200 workmen, laborers and stevedores, from the Hudson Bay port. The ship then went to Spilly where she was examined by the Russian authorities with a view to being purchased. She brought here a cargo of coal.

Supreme Court.



The Episcopal Party

His Grace The Most Rev. E. P. Roche, D. D., Officially Visits Flatrock and Pouch Cove to Confer the Sacrament of Confirmation.

On Sunday, the 7th inst., His Grace accompanied by the Rt. Rev. Monsignor St. John and the Rev. J. J. McDermott visited that section of the Torbay parish known as Flatrock and Pouch Cove. The Episcopal party arrived at 11 o'clock a.m., and were heartily welcomed by priest and people.

The address read at Flatrock by Joseph Maher conveyed to His Grace the submission and love of his children. In reply His Grace who was deeply impressed by the devotion of the community to the Church and to his humble person commended them for their deep seated Catholic faith which found expression in the decorations and in their enthusiastic welcome given in his honour. "It was usual," he said in times of official visitation for the Bishop to inquire into the moral tone of his people. On this as on all other occasions in which he visited various parts of the Archdiocese he was glad to have had a satisfactory account of their morals from their pastor. His Grace warned his people especially against the evils of intemperance. The intemperate man was a useless member of Society and a menace to the State. The drunkard ruined his home, his children and upset those laws that were framed for the well being of the people. The striking and eloquent discourse went home to the hearts of the inhabitants. With a short resume on the Sacraments in general and an instruction especially on the Sacrament of Confirmation, which he was about to confer, His Grace confirmed 50 children, imparted his blessing and proceeded to Pouch Cove.

Along the road lying between the settlements there were erected several neatly decorated arches which bore mottoes of welcome and love. Many men with firearms were posted along the stretch of six miles and greeted the Episcopal Party with repeated volleys of musketry.

At Pouch Cove His Grace admired the long lines of decorated spruce trees which were fastened on each side of the road between the arches. His Grace having assumed his Episcopal robes in the Sanctuary at Pouch Cove Church took his place in the Sanctuary. The address delivered by James Bolger, read:—

Your Grace,—
Hail, illustrious one! welcome Prince of God,
Exalted and by merit, raised to such a dignity
Thy children salute you on this auspicious day
And on bended knee they respects they pay.

The tidings on winged feet they came and happily did we
Look forward on bended knee to kiss thy ring;
Of your selection, the happy news scarce old
Was borne to this small fraction of your foid.

Prince of the Church! what mortal to acquire
That blends such dignity with virtue,
Thy people's love so oft expressed surely will spread
A thornless path for its Prince to tread.

Thy Newfoundland Bride of pride feels aglow,
And her brow is so chaste and fair,
Her glorious record your reign display
And life for you be bright as day.

O Father of us your children ever true,
Blessed are we, yea, doubly blessed are they
With oil confirmed, soldiers of Christ,
to do and dare for Him
Who died upon the Cross to conquer sin.

Hail! beloved Archbishop may thy years
By Heaven protected and preserved be,
And may thy fervency, beginning one and kind,
Shine for aye with glory in the unfathomable mind.


Obituary.


