'VIKING' LEAVES FOR THE GULF. The s.s. Viking is leaving port this afternoon and the Telegram, in common with the whole country, wishes Capt. William Bartlett and his hardy Capt. William Bartlett and his hardy crew of 160 sealers a safe return with a bumper trip of seals. From here the ship will proceed to Channel whence she will clear for Gulf waters on March 10th. The fact that the Viking is the only ship to go to the Gulf sealing grounds emphasizes the hope for her abundant success. It is noteworthy that the Viking's crew, consists principally of sealing "vikconsists principally of sealing "vik-ings." In addition to her commander, the oldest and most experienced seal killer, there are on board Capt. Wm Bartlett, jr., as second hand; Capt. W. M. Taylor, navigating officer and Capt. Sam Wilcox, as barrelman. The five master watches and the majority of the rank and file of the crew hail from Brigus and belong to a couple of generations of old, successful and historic seal killers. All the other ships of the sealing fleet will prosecute on the northern
