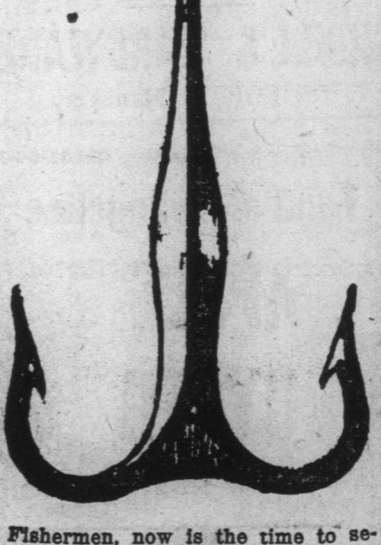

German Brought

French Exact 5000 Hun Prisoning. Task Se

WAR REVIEW. The Germans in the centre of their new attack on the front between Mont Didier and Noyon have gained additional ground against the French, but on both the right and left wings they are being held in violent successive attacks of Monday they captured the villages of Mondy, Belloy and St. Maur and also pressed forward and gained a footing in the village of Marquise, the last named place representing the deepest point of penetration since the offensive began, between five and six miles. The French still are exacting a heavy toll in lives from the Germans as they deliver their attacks in waves, and are giving ground only when forced to under superiority of numbers. Nowhere has the enemy been able to pierce the front, which has been bent back in perfect order whenever the necessity arises. The battle is described by correspondents as one of the most furious that has been fought since the war began with the enemy usually reckless in wasting life to obtain his objectives. The latest official communication from the German war office says additional ground has been gained by the Germans southwest of Noyon against newly brought up French reinforcements, and that the Germans have taken about 8,000 prisoners and some guns.

The enemy's principal progress yesterday was along the course of the Matz. His first objective was probably to reach the Oise and therefore to take in the flank of the Oise, which might result in our withdrawal to the south bank. Supporting the enemy's objective to be Paris, he would naturally thrust a tentacle down the Oise valley and another westward from the Orocq line, thereby encircling the vast mass of the Aigue, Compeigne, Villers, Cotterets forests, which being impregnable to frontal attack, the enemy probably intends to pass north and south thereof, bringing the tentacles together. This enemy plan is over-ambitious and impossible of accomplishment. As soon as its impossibility is realized the enemy's efforts will probably be directed at Amiens or toward Calais.

MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1918.

Every man in Class 1, that is all men between the ages of 25 inclusive, must report to the War at the Militia Building, St. John's, on forms provided, before the 1st of May, 1918, or send an application for exemption.

Application and forms may be sent to the Post Office or may be personally at the Militia Building, St. John's.

It is expedient in the national interest that the applicant should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged otherwise.

That he has one or two brothers and one of them is serving in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces during the present war.

That he has three or more brothers and two of them are serving in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces during the present war.

That he has persons mainly dependent upon him for support, such as parents, brothers or sisters and

Health or infirmity. EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS made to the Tribunal in St. John's direct to the Commission (magistrates) appointed by the Tribunal. Commissioners have to grant exemptions subject to the provisions of the Act.

AN SEEKING EXEMPTION his behalf by his employer, or partner or near relative. Application forms will be found at the Post Offices as soon as they can be had and hurried there by mail.

REPORTS also be found at all Post Offices. Report is filed out hand to the Master or Clerk and get a receipt. Man in the class called up falling short is subject to a penalty of years.

IMPRISONMENT. who have received REJECTION BADGES will report for Service form sent same through Post Office or at Militia Building to Registrar make application to Tribunal St. John's or to Commissioners (magistrates) in outposts for exemption.

German Smash Has Not Brought Results Expected.

French Exacting Heavy Toll, and Report 5000 Hun Prisoners. Hand to Hand Fighting. Task Set by Enemy is Impossible.

WAR REVIEW. The Germans in the centre of their new attack on the front between Mont Didier and Noyon have gained additional ground against the French, but on both the right and left wings they are being held. In violent successive attacks on Monday they captured the villages of Mery, Belloy and St. Maur and also pressed forward and gained a footing in the village of Marquellie, the last named place representing the deepest point of penetration since the offensive began, between five and six miles.

IN DEATH GRIPS. WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN FRANCE, June 10.—Fighting in this war probably never has been more severe than that going on to-day in the great battle of the French and German armies between Mont Didier and Noyon. The Germans attacking on a ground where the Entente Allies were ready to receive the shock have found themselves thrown into a slaughter house whence most of them will never make an exit.

BATTLE RAGES. FRENCH ARMY HEADQUARTERS June 10. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Throughout the night and the morning the battle raged along the new front of attack, with unabated fury. On the wings the enemy is still held on the same line despite his persistent and reckless attempts to push on.

IMPOSSIBLE TASK. FRENCH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, June 10. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—The scene of the latest offensive is a wooded, hilly country, bisected by the River Matz, which, flowing south, joins the Oise at Mont Matz. The enemy's principal progress yesterday was along the course of the Matz. His first objective was probably to reach the Oise and therefore to take in the flank of the whole French salient north of the Oise, which might result in our withdrawal to the south bank.

Meanwhile the German battalions are being depleted in the constant fighting from Noyon to Chateau Thierry and from Vernoil to Rheims. His reserves of manhood are declining. Out of two hundred prisoners taken in the first few days of June, over one-fourth belong to the 1918 class, and the class of 1920 made its appearance on the battlefield among the prisoners captured at Bligny by the British, a considerable proportion being lads of this class.

THE OBJECTIVE PARIS. LONDON, June 10th. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—There is no element of surprise on the renewal of the German offensive. The sector chosen, between Noyon and Mont Didier, was anticipated in the reviews of expert opinion recently cabled. **THE WAR.**

The Germans have now launched the second phase of their newest offensive, their objective again being Paris. This latest attack extends over a front of 20 miles, the wings being at Mont Didier and Nogent. The effort of the enemy is apparently devoted to the bending back of the Allied line on the front toward St. Just and the railway junction of Compelgne, and if possible getting astride the River Oise and from there driving toward the French metropolis. Notwithstanding the heroic fight being put up by the French troops, which might be expected to affect the stability of the defence on the River Oise to the River Marne and thus compel a falling back of the Allies on this sector, westward, in order to straighten out the deep salient northwest of Chateau Thierry, which would in this case project towards the East, with the sector of Soissons as its apex. It has been suggested that the Allied Commanders were not taken by surprise with the present direction of the offensive, and that accordingly the necessary dispositions were made to meet it. That this is so is proven by the nature of the fighting which is described as being of a most sanguinary nature, the main object of the defenders being to confine it, if possible, to the area at present affected. The French are bearing the brunt of the advance with the greatest heroism and the enemy is paying dearly for every foot of ground which he has occupied. On the sector held by the British in the region of the Marne and on the Flanders line, and at Cantigny, held by the Americans, comparative quiet prevails, and the Field Marshal, Commanding, reports that nothing of interest has occurred. In the Italian theatre, there have been intense artillery fighting but no important infantry engagements. The British forces in Italy, on the Asa River line, south, and the Italians east of the Brenta, are carrying out successful surprise attacks, and have inflicted considerable losses on the enemy, besides taking prisoners and machine guns. Enemy counter attacks in other

regions particularly the Astico Valley have been repulsed with heavy losses to the attackers. Later reports announce the good news that on the Western front in his recent advance the German will be only in a position to develop his initial advantages at heavy cost. If at all. The French military critic Henri Bidon, says in commenting on the new attack: "Let us be wary at the beginning of an important offensive of forming judgments, but without prejudging the future, it is difficult not to be satisfied with the first day." That the enemy will strive hard to enlarge the point which he has driven into the French centre at Ressons-sdr-Matz is apparent, and upon his success or failure his further actions will depend. The military strategists are of opinion that the French will hold firm, as should they give way on the left the Germans would attempt a diversion northward with the triple object of capturing Amiens, rolling up the British flank to the sea, and separating the British and French armies, but all this is problematical, the latest news from the front justifying the expressed confidence that the enemy will be afforded no chance of winning in either of the directions named.

**Crew of Raiding Submarine**

Ordered to Sink Every U. S. Ship They Could Find.

Boston, June 4.—The crew of the German submarine which sank the schooner Jacob M. Haskell were under orders to sink every American ship they could find, but to spare all lives possible, according to members of the Haskell's crew. The men arrived to-night from an Atlantic port, where they were landed to-day by the coastwise steamship Greelan, which rescued them at sea.

Gustav Nelson, seaman on the Haskell, said the submarine commander spoke perfect English and was so polite that he got on "our nerves."

After he had posted his men about the schooner they stood there grinning while he asked for the ship's papers, then he ordered the American to be hauled down and wrapped it up in his papers. When the cook remarked, "you'd better take the food we have aboard before you sink the boat," the lieutenant snapped back, "we don't want your food. We want your lives, either. We want your ships. Now get away from here. You have three minutes before the ship goes down."

**Another Milk Case.**

In the magistrate's court this morning, Gordon Lester, milk vendor of Mount Pearl, took action against C. W. Johnstone, baker, to recover an amount due for milk delivered from May 1st to 17th inclusive. Several witnesses including Mr. Davies, Government Analyst, and Mr. O'Mara, Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, who testified to the quality and quantity, respectively, of the milk in question were examined. The defendant Johnstone, stating the object of his defence was to prove that he had reason to complain of the quality of milk delivered by Lester, but did not press the matter as he feared he would be boycotted by other milk vendors, which would be detrimental to his business. This however being irrelevant to the case on which the court was asked to decide was not taken as evidence in the case. The defendant claimed that on May 12th he proved by Standard measures that the complainant was short one quart on a three gallon delivery, also a little over one quart for milk delivered on the day previous (Sunday) which he measured at the same time. On the following morning, May 14th, the milk was measured by Inspector O'Mara and out of a three gallon measurement there was found to be one pint short. On the next day the court adjourned till tomorrow morning when both Counsels will address the court in the interest of their clients.

**\$3,000 to a Man.**

Halifax, June 7.—Perhaps no Gloucester skipper is so well known in the Halifax waterfront than Captain Ernest Parsons, himself a native of Newfoundland, who, in his younger days, came here in vessels from the Ancient Colony. **REVIEW OF OPERATIONS.** Near Bussieres, north of Chateau Thierry, the Americans and French delivered strong attacks against the Germans and have taken more ground. They also captured a number of pris- ers and thirty machine guns. On the remainder of the front, in France and Belgium, the operations have been of a minor nature, although south of the Somme, the British near Bouzen- val have carried out an operation which straightened out a nasty salient that sagged in their line. As the Austrians continue to bring up large forces of men behind their lines in the Italian theatre, the artillery activ- ity and raiding operations are daily increasing and throughout the moun- tain region from Tonale to the Brenna River, and along the lower reaches of the Piave River, the guns of both sides are engaged in violent duels. Numerous surprise attacks have been attempted by the Austrians on various sectors, but all of them were success- fully repulsed. Aerial operations on a large scale also are in progress and facts in the air are of daily occur- ence. Large quantities of explosives have been dropped on enemy positions by Italian airmen, and a number of enemy airplanes have been shot down. In the Macedonian theatre there also has been an increase in the artillery activity, the enemy bombard- ing the Allied lines on both sides of the Vardar River. On the part of the front held by the Serbians, the artill- ery fire has been unusually severe. Of- ficial announcements have been made to the House at London, that 248 officers and men, nurses and women of the auxiliary corps and civilians were killed between May 15th and June 1st by German air raiders bombing hos- pitals, and that 643 persons were wounded in these attacks.

**AMERICANS CAPTURE MINEN- WERFER WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN**

**FRANCE.**—The United States mar- ines attacked the Germans after day- break this morning, and penetrated the German lines for about two-thirds of a mile, on a six hundred yard front, in the Belleau Wood, northwest of Chateau Thierry. The Germans now hold only the northern fringe of the Wood. The Americans captured two Minenwerfer, which are the largest pieces yet taken by them.

**Latest.**

**USING MEN LAVISHLY.**

Through the lavish use of men and material, the Germans fought all day in the center of the Mont Didier, Noyon sector. The total result was a slight advance on the left centre, which nowhere exceeded a mile in depth. The primary object of the present German operations is to re- duce the salient left standing be- tween the gains made in the March and May offensives but until that is effected he cannot proceed with his plan for a march on Paris. Both the strenuous, and on the whole effective resistance of the French, and the furious efforts of the Germans, are explained by the fact that an enemy success would involve the retire- ment of the French forces defending the line between the Aisne and the Marne, threaten both flanks with- out, and open to the Germans the main road to Paris from Com- pigne Villers-Cotterets and Chateau Thierry.

**ENEMY LOSSES HORRIBLE.** WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, June 10. (By the Associated Press).—Undiminished severity marks the fighting between Mont Didier and Noyon. The situation to- night is rather satisfactory for the Allies, whose obstinate resistance and frequent counter attacks have caused great consternation to the Germans. Enemy losses under the direct fire of the French artillery have been hor- rible. Every time the Allies counter attacked, they found the ground cov- ered with German dead. Through- out the day the enemy threw his greatest pressure towards the centre of the Allied line, in an effort to gain as much ground as possible, south- ward in the direction of Compeigne and under the powerful push of the continually reinforced enemy col- umns, the Allies were forced to give way a little, but they fought tena- ciously for every inch of ground. An epic struggle occurred in the vicinity of Piemont, where the small garrison of dismounted cavalry men possibly may still hold out. French soldiers who managed to get through the Ger- man lines late yesterday, declared that before they left the Germans had delivered terrific assaults, all of which have been repulsed with heavy losses for the enemy. Several small vil- lages including Marie Belleau and St. Maurice changed ownership a number of times, but this evening were in the German hands. At the moment it is impossible to say positively that this or that place is occupied by the en-emy or the Allies, such is the terrific nature of the conflict. Ebbs and flows occur everywhere. On the Billy Plateau fighting went on continuously for hours, men tackling men in single combats. The artillery is engaged more actively than in any battle in a long while. The Germans have been able to bring forward field guns in considerable numbers, but the French artillery fire is most violent and very distracting, especially when turned against attacking enemy troops.

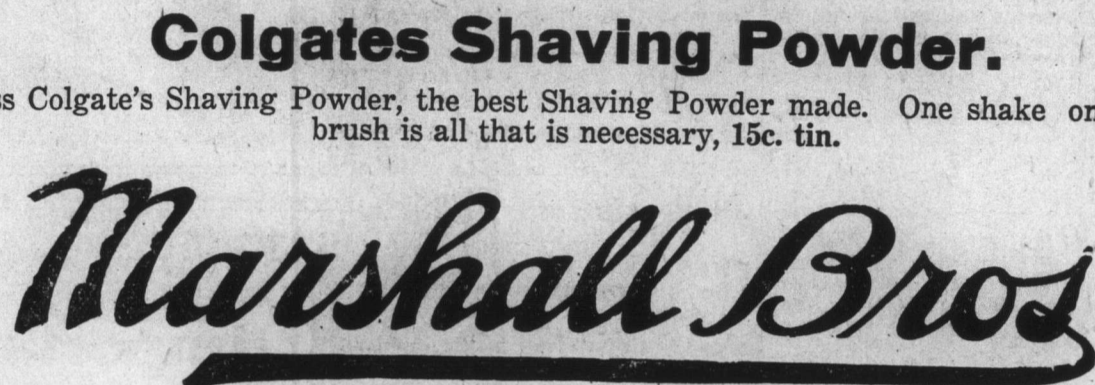

## The Account Book Habit.

"Whatever you do, don't get the account book habit." "That", a young married woman told me the other day, "was my mother's advice when we were married." It sounded incredible. But it sounded quite the contrary, when, having enjoyed my astonishment, she went on to explain her statement. It seems that her mother did not mean that most desirable habit of keeping an account of what one spends one's money for. She meant rather the habit of keeping, as many a wife or husband does, a little mental account book for the faults and mistakes and failures and offenses of his or her mate. From day to day the account keeper jots down items in his little mental book against the unconscious creditor, and then some time in a crisis of temper or resentment he flings open the account book and reads over the items or points out the staggering total. Every Six Months She Opens Her Account Book. A husband once told me that his wife would have these days of reckoning just once in six months. Then she would open that mental account book and call him to account for little things he had said or done months ago and which he had not the slightest idea at the time had annoyed her. "I would far rather she would speak about a thing at the time and get it over with than to get it in her mind for months until it seems like something big to her," he said. (One cannot help wondering if he would really like to have her speak out every time. It is always so much easier to bear the alternative evil.) She Forgets They Were Gifts. Another trick of the account keeping is to keep a mental reckoning of all the small gifts of service and sacrifice he or she has made for the other, and then to forget they were made as gifts, and to present a bill for them. (True there are people who engrave one into this unworthy state of mind.

by their way of accepting all such gifts as a matter of course. If a thing is a gift one expects gratitude. If one never gets gratitude can one be blamed for forgetting it is a gift?) I started out to blame the account keeper and here I am justifying her (I admit it is more apt to be her). **Not The Way To Happiness.** No, not justifying. Merely explaining. I do not want to encourage her by justification because I do not think that is the sign post to happiness in married life, or any kind of life for that matter. Accounts like that are too petty. And the road to happiness and the road to peace is found by taking the turning that leads away from pettiness. When you stop to think of it, what good do those account books do you? None whatever. They only clutter up your mind and heart. Then why not have a spring cleaning and just burn them up?

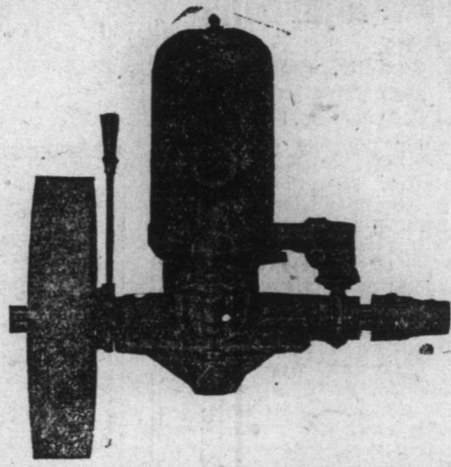

### Military Service Act, 1918.

The following ruling made by the Military Service Board has been ordered to be published:

#### NOTICE TO REJECTED VOLUNTEERS.

That men who have volunteered and have been rejected for military service on or before May 11th, 1918, and who have reported for service as required by the Act on forms prescribed, will not be called for medical re-examination before the 31st of October, 1918. Number of Rejection Certificate should be given on the printed Report sent in to the Registrar.

Any person wishing to claim exemption in respect of a Rejected Volunteer coming within Class 1 must do so within the time appointed by the Proclamation of the 11th of May, 1918, or such further time as may be allowed by the Exemption Tribunal.

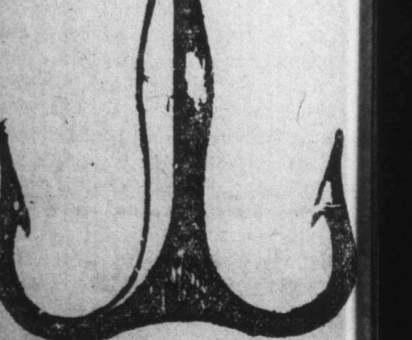
