



(Trade Review.) Codfish-The usual dullness pecul-

far to this time of the year prevails in foreign markets, but a revival of activity is looked for in the latter days of January. The exports for the week totalled 19,822 qtls., as follows:-By S.S. Rosalind, to Halifax and New York, 3,684 qtls., from various shippers, mainly for transhipment to the West Indies: by S.S. Digby to Liverpool, for transhipment to Mediterranean markets, 5.296 qtls. cask fish, from different exporters; by schr. Haabet, from the Burgeo & LaPoile Export Co., Burgeo, 1,952 qtls. cod-3:h and 159 qtls. halibut, to Oporto; Jy schr. Benevolence, 5,462 qtls., from the Monroe Export Co., St. John's, to Pernambuco; by schr. Enid E. Legge, 3,428 qtls., from the Burgeo & La-Poile Export Co., Burgeo, to Pernambuco. Brazil markets are coming up in fine shape, but the misfortune is that we have not much fish to send them Very attractive offers and enquiries are now coming in from Maceio, Bahia and Pernambuco for supplies to cover the Lenten season. The Oporto market has been somewhat dull the past two weeks, but this usually occurs towards the end of the year. The Newfoundland stocks there are now Prices, except in the case of bad fish. both Portugal and Spain, and the markets more favorable to their wishprices. The West Indian markets, too. are asking for fish, and Porto Rico is now offering \$50 for cask fish, 448 lbs., the best price ruling there for a long time. Barbados and the other islands are getting cleaned up of their big stocks, and are looking to Newfoundland for their Lenten supplies, as there is now practically no Nova Scotian supply available.

Common Cod Ofl-Local trade is all over for this season. Stocks in this country are concentrated in two or three strong hands and held firm at top values. Enquiries are for small lots at present and depend to a great extent on the requirements of farmers in the New England States. The British markets show signs of improvement, and a few orders from that direction would quickly clean up this market of all supplies available during the next six months.

Cod Liver Oil-The market is quiet without any alteration in price. The principal question now is the outlook for the Norwegian fishery, and a great deal will depend on the result of the ca ch and the yield of oil from the livers as to prices during the coming cear. There has been no definite statistics published showing the total exports from Norway during the past section, but indications point to a very small "carry over" into the new year. The use of this oil has been so largely increased during recent years that, should there be any scare of a short supply in view for next season, we may quickly see an advance of 50 per cent, in its value. Scientific reperts are continually coming to hand, and show the very deep interest that ail are taking. Sales for February and March delivery have been per 1b. This means 61/4 cents, duty paid, in St. John's. During December the raw sugar market declined to \$3.00 per 100 lbs. in the United States. The total Cuban crop is estimated at 4.015.875 tons, as against 3,529,029 tons in 1923.

Molasses-The St. John's quotations this week are 88 cents a gallon for Fancy and 85 cents for Choice. This, it will be noticed, is a decline of 2 cents per gallon from the price fall, and is indicative of cheaper mospring. The consumption of molasses is falling off in this country. 


