Liability of Express Companies.

A case was recently tried in Brooklyn, N. Y. in which an express company contested a claim of about two thousand dollars for the loss of a trunk and its contents. The defence set up was that on the back of the receipt given to the owner of the trunk it was stipulated that the company would not hold itself liable for any jewlery nor for any value over one hundred dollars. Such printed notice, it was contended, was a contract which, when accepted, bound the owner of property entrusted to their care. The judge held that in the hurry of railroad travel it would be impossible for every person to read the printed matter of such receipts before accepting them, and he therefore instructed the jury to bring in the verdict, which they did, for the full amount claimed. This will be looked upon by the travelling public as a very just decision. If it were otherwise it would be a profitable business for the employees of express companies to lose the trunks of travellers, very few of which contain as little as one hundred dolars' worth of wearing appeal and other necessaries. Garibaldi's Son.

Menotti Garibaldi, who has been figuring as the spirited Commander in Chief of the Italian revolutionary forces during his father's imprisonment in Caprera, is but twenty-seven years of age. Weam across the other day, in a book published in 1859, a series of autobiographical sketches of the elder Garibald's life, translated by his friend and admirer Theodore Dwight. After his proscription in Italy in 1834, he went to Brazil, and before long was ardently engaged in assisting the struggling Republic of the Rio Grande. He married while there, amid the perils and hardships of war, the heroic Annita, who in September, 1840, became the mother of Monotti. The boy was cradled in danger. When but twelves days old he was burried with his mother to go with the little army over mountains and plains and almost into battic. The one insurmountable disqualification in the eyes of the Freeman is that they are protestants, attached to their church, anxious for its mainten ance, and decidedly opposed to its spoliation. Now as the commission was appointed, not for the purpose of making out a case to damage the church like the mock "commission" of our contemporary, but to enquire and report on the existing condition of the establishment, we do not see how the sincere protestantism and toryism of four of its members can be regarded as a valid objection.
