DECLINE IN JAPANESE STOCKS

London, Aug. 7.—Japanese stocks relapsed on reports of repulses at Port Arthur. Russian securities, being well supported from the continent, remained fairly steady notwithstanding unfavorable reports regarding the yield of wheat temporarily depressed prices.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 7.—A telegram from Chetoo, dated August 7, says that a fierce battle was fought on the land side of Port Arthur August 5. The Japanese are reported to have been repulsed with great loss, estimated at 10,000, while the Russians lost about one thousand.
