Attorney General of the inter-pretation to be put on the statute in respect to my duty to strike from the list the names of persons not assessed, etc., and I will be obliged if you will publish the correspondence between us of which I annex a copy in order that all may know why so many names are left off the list to be used at the election.

Dear Sir, I want your opinion on the following questions arising under the Towns' Incorporation Act. Sec. 78 (1) says the town clerk shall furnish (a) a list of the persons qualified to vote in the town. Sec. 130 says the town clerk shall prepare a copy of the list of voters for each presiding officer, etc. It is apparent from Sec. 71 that there may be names on the list handed in by the revisors who are not qualified to vote by reason of unpaid taxes.

Question 1—Does the town clerk prepare a list omitting therefrom the names of those who have not paid their taxes or does he furnish a copy of the list of voters handed in by the revisors?

Question 2—If he furnishes a copy of the list how is objection effectually made to a person named on the list who has not paid his taxes?

Referring to Sec. 71 (b). A person earns \$500.00 and his name is registered on the list of voters, but such a person is not entered on the assessment roll except for a poll tax for the reason that income to \$500 is exempt from taxation.

Question 3—Has such a person a right to vote as being a person "by law exempt from taxation"?

Referring to the same section. A person whose name is registered on the voters' list has not paid his taxes for 1905 and 1906.

Question 4—Can he vote by paying 1906 tax, the 1905 tax remaining unpaid?

Dear Sir,—Replying to yours under date of January 11th, I have to advise you as follows: Question 1—The town clerk in preparing a copy of the list of voters for the presiding officer, should omit therefrom those who have not paid their taxes, in accordance with the Statute.

Question 2—The answer to the first part of this question is covered by the answer to question 1. As to the 2nd branch of this question, I may say that in my opinion the words "Unless by law exempt from taxation," mean and refer to a person wholly exempt from taxation. The in-

stance put by you in this question would not qualify for a vote.

Question 4—In replying to this, I may say that the Act simply requires payment of taxes for the previous year and not for previous years. This clearly means only one year and that the previous year.

A dance was held in Ruggles hall on Monday night, Mitchell furnishing the music.

Reports from all over the Maritime Provinces and New England state that the cold snap of last Wednesday and Thursday was the stiffest known for years. It has assured the safety of the ice crop, which it was feared would be lacking this season.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Ralph S. Eaton, President and manager of the "Hickreef Orchards," Denbigh, we are able to present on our first page an article which will be of special interest to our fruit growers.

Owing to the pressure of town and county council minutes upon our columns this week and last, considerable matter including some country correspondence has been crowded out. We were obliged also to omit the serial watch which will be continued next week.

The water committee of the town council turned the water into the town service from the Crosskill Lake last Saturday to test the merits of the new system in cold weather, and they pronounce it a complete success. The water was turned on within an hour from the time the committee left town.

Nominations for Mayor and Councilors were held yesterday. W. J. Boyd and D. G. Harlow were nominated for mayor and Karl Freeman, Jas. R. DeWitt, Arthur Charlton, W. A. Warren, M. O. Otterson are nominees for councilors, in place of the retiring councilors, Freeman, DeWitt and Harlow.

Dr. Armstrong accompanied Vernon the little son of Fletcher Parker, of Granville to Halifax last week to undergo an operation at the Victoria General Hospital for appendicitis. Through a very severe and well developed case, the operation was entirely successful and the little fellow is reported as doing well.

A short literary program formed the chief feature of entertainment in Olive Branch Division on last Monday evening. New members are coming in almost every week. On next Monday evening Rev. W. H. Warren will deliver a public lecture on a Tour through Scotland. A large number of splendid views will be shown by means of a powerful stereopticon. The excursion will be one of special interest to the general public.

LOCAL AND SPECIAL

It is reported that two slight shocks of earthquake were felt at Halifax on the morning of the 13th. The two combined lasted about a minute.

Valley Chapter, No. 16, Royal Arch Masons, was formed at Middleton on Tuesday by Eureka lodge of Annapolis Royal with 25 members.

E. A. Craig, who has occupied Nelly's blacksmith shop next to Union Bank, a number of years, has bought from J. O. Elliott a building which he has had removed to his lot on Middle street, adjoining his house, where he will conduct his business. The shop on Granville street will probably be torn down.

A persistent rumor, now stated to be on good authority, is that the steamer Senlac has been sold to Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann, and will be withdrawn from the South Shore route. She will, it is said, ply on the routes from St. John to Port Wade (Victoria Beach), and from St. John to Yarmouth, and vice versa, in connection with their railways. The Yarmouth Herald says the agent at Yarmouth is not aware of any change in the management of the Senlac, however.

R. S. Gates, one of Middleton's promising young men, who is yet under 25 years, has been carrying on research work at Chicago university and has made an important discovery proving the DeVries theory of the origin of new species of plants as opposed to the Darwin theory. The American Association for the Advancement of Science, in session at New York a fortnight ago, after several hours' discussion of Mr. Gates' paper, pronounced his discovery the most important in the scientific world during 1906.

A determined and definite movement is being made by the Annapolis Board of Trade to obtain better inter-communication between that town and Granville Ferry. If there is a fair and immediate prospect of a bridge being built then they will not be unduly harassed about the ferry service. On the other hand if a bridge still seems to be remote the Company will be required to give such a service as never before and to carry freight according to a known and reasonable schedule. The Spectator ventures to predict that something must be coming to pass, as some of the members of the board even went so far as to take the risk of threatening to change their politics if their claims were disregarded.

The militia department at Ottawa has forwarded to Lenest Ruggles, principal of Oakdene Academy, two Mauser rifles as souvenirs. No information accompanied them, but as they show the mark of service it is supposed they are relics of the Boer war. Mr. Ruggles has been trying for some time to start a cadet corps in connection with the school, but so far has received very little encouragement. We believe the training the boys would receive from such an institution would be of material advantage to them, not only at the present time but in the future and we hope the trustees and parents will take the matter up with the principal and that in the near future we may have a cadet corps.

BEAR RIVER S. S. CO.
The annual meeting of the Bear River Steamship Co., Ltd., was held on the 15th inst., at the office of Clarke Bros.
The report of the managing director giving a detailed statement of the business for the year was received and adopted. With the close of 1906, the steamer has completed fifteen months of service, and made during that period sixty trips between Bear River, way ports and St. John, besides doing the towing on the river and Basin in connection with tonnage loading at this port. The result of the business showed a substantial balance to the credit of the company and a dividend of ten per cent was declared covering the operations of the company to date.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS.
Williamsport, Pa., Jan. 10.—A series of shocks, evidently earthquakes, were felt in this section from 5:45 to 4:50 o'clock this morning. Buildings shook so that families were awakened, and rumbling sounds were heard over an area of twenty miles.

SHOCKS AT BALTIMORE.
Baltimore, Md., Jan. 10.—Earthquake shocks were felt at several points in Baltimore County, north of here, at about 5:45 o'clock this morning. The shocks, which were slight, were distant and lasted about fifteen seconds.

SWEDEN IS AFFECTED.
Stockholm, Jan. 10.—Two distinct and sharp earthquake shocks were felt at several points in Sweden at 1:30 this morning. Despatches received from Arvika, Melared and Stromstad report that the rocking of houses at those places caused a hasty exodus of the alarmed inhabitants.

RUMBLINGS LIKE THUNDER.
Christiania, Jan. 10.—Two severe shocks of earthquake were felt at 1:30 o'clock this morning accompanied by rumblings like thunder. Telegrams received here indicate that the shocks were felt at three towns in Norway. The disturbances caused considerable alarm but no damage has been reported.


GASPEREAUX ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT.
A press report says: Sixty-five men are engaged at work on the electric light plant which is being put in at White Rock. Many Cornwains people were sceptical in regard to their having an electric light system this year. Those people will be interested to learn that sixty thousand dollars' worth of machinery has been ordered for the completion of this plant by the company. The wheel which is now on its way to White Rock, weighs forty tons. The engineer of the company reports the prospect for a good electric light system excellent. If no rain occurred for months the plant would not be effected, as the supply of water from the Gasperaux River, by which it is to be run, is so beautiful. The putting in of the plant is being rushed along and the system is expected to be in running order by the first of April.


