THE CHURCH AND HER OPINIONS.—(From the Montreal Courier.) We read with great interest an article which appeared in the Montreal Gazette a few days since, relating to Church matters and to the management of the Clergy.

It has been noticed for some time past that several of the Upper Canada Clergy have been making covert attacks upon the Church of England, and have been endeavouring to prejudice the public mind against this Church, by misrepresentations of every kind.

The writer in that Journal commences by saying that although he does not share in the alarm of our contemporary (the British Colonist) at the unprovoked power granted to the Clergy Societies of Quebec and Toronto, yet he objects and is "objected at the time when we believe no one else did, to the incorporation of these Societies by the distinctive appellation of the Church Societies."
