

REVIEW OF THE WHOLESALE GROCERY MARKET.

Contrary to expectations, buisiness has been quiet. This is chiefly owing to the auction sales advertized for the coming week, buyers in the West being so accustomed to hold off In their orders at this season, in expectation of how the auctions will result. From the scarcity of stocks in the Dominion generally, we can reasonably expect that a full range of prices will obtain, especially as the barvest has been fully up to expectations, and so far farmers are obtaining very fair prices for their produce; this will enable them to pay up alt indebtedness to the storekeepers, and thus relieve the latter of their liabilities to the city merchants.

COAL-We have little change to note in our coal market. American anthracite is very un-settled, and few transactions have taken place. In other coals little has been done, and no change in our quotations.

COFFEE-Business has been very quiet; our quotations are fully maintained; say Laguayra 16j to 17c; Maracaibo, 17 to 18c; Jamaica, 16 to 18c; Java, 25 to 28c; Rio, 14j to 18c. CORKS-Fair demand at Wine, \$1 to 1.59; Beer, 35 to 40c; Soda, 40 to 50c; Phial, 12j to

15c per gross.

The per gross. 'FRUIT—The market here has ruled very steady, though sales have been light; prices are fully maintained. By last reports from the London market, prices there are held very firm in concequence of the known short crops in the fruit-producing countries. In view of these reports and the approaching fall sales, neither scliers nor buyers are inclined to operate, the latter only purchasing for immediate wants.

DRUGS, DYES AND CHEMICALS .-- The market for last week more active for Caustic market for last week more active for Caustic Soda and Soda Ash; about 200 grunns of the former vere sold at 31c for Wbite, and-wisng this week 150 drums have been sold at the same price. Soda Ash: A sale was made of about 60 tons at \$1 80 per 100 lbs. There has been some sales of Bi-Carb, say 500 kegs, at 31c; but since those have been made the market is effected much better, \$3.20 to 3.25 being asked. That ordered now from bome would cost \$35.0. FISH.-We have no change to report in the Fish Market, which remain unaltered at-last week's quotations: GLASS-There is rather more demand, and onr quotations are fully maintained.

GLASS — There is rather more demand, and onr quotations are fully maintained." MOLASSES. — Stock nearly exhausted; prices have advanced 2c per gallon. We quote Cen-trifugal; 32 to 34c; Olayed, 38 to 42c; Trini-dad, Barbadoes and Cienfuegos, 46 to 50c per gallon. Syrups are in good demand at our extreme rates.

treme rates." NAVAL STORES.—There is no change in Spirits Turpentine. The demand still continues good, with stocks sufficient for present wants; 47;c is the ruling figure. Rosins move prety freely at \$2.75 tor Strained, 3.25 for No. 2, 3.75 for No. 1, and 4.50 to 6.50 for Pale and Extra. Pine Tar and Pitch unchanged. Coal Tar and Pitch are in propagt at \$3

Pitch are in request at \$3. OILS-The market is bare of cod oil, which is in demand at 57 to 58c. No change in other fish oils. Olive oil remains the same as in our last report:

PETROLEUM -- Demand very quiet at 30c ln jobbing lots.

PAINTS--Ihero is a good enquiry at Dry White Lead, per 100 lbs, \$7.50; Dry Red Lead, \$6.75 to 7.00; White Lead, No. 1, per keg, \$2.40 to 2.50; do No. 2, \$2.20 to 2.25.

RICE-We have no change to make in our last week's quotations, at which there is a fair demand.

SALT-The market for Liverpool coarso has been heavy and drooping since our last report. We note sales of 2,000 bags at 60c and 1,000 at 61c, both with several lots of 200 to 500 bags at 62c to 63c, and retail lots at 65c, all afloat.

Prices have advanced is per lo, with a strong upward tendency, it being es-timated that the deficiency in the crop this year will amount to 30,000 tons, and the troubles continuing in Cuba are likely to decrease the error part ware one helf. Our constribution are continuing in Cubic are inkely to decrease the crop next year one-half. Our quotations are 83 to 93 c for fair to good Cuba; 94 to 92 c for Porto Rico and Barbadoes; little to be had at inside figures. Refined bave advanced 4c per Indice ngures. Renned Dave advanced 4 o per Ib during the week. Loaves are selling at 12₃c; Dry Orusned 12₄c; Extra Ground 13₄c; Crushed A 11₃c; Yellow refined 0₄ to 10c. At these prices there is an active demand.

TEAS—A steady consumptive demand con-tinnes, and a fair job bing trade has been done for the past week in all descriptions. MONTREAL WHOLESALE PRODUCE MARKET.

Business during the weok has been more than usually quiet. There has been no excitement in the English markets, and the consequence is that trade here has felt the prevailing dullness.

FLOUR-The market is very quiet, and prices during the week bave steadily declined. For Strong Bakers' there has been an average demand at comparatively full prices; this is ow-ing to the scarcity of such brands, spring wheat being very low in stock, and other qualities of wheat which have been used to use up with it not suiting the purpose, a low grade of flour has been produced, which only commands low prices. The supply of ordinary grades Supers has been in excess of the demand, and conse-quently prices have ruled low. There is no en-quiry for shipment, and stocks are accumulat-ing. The general impression is that a further considerable decline must be submitted to be-fore the bottom is touched, and holders, would willingly place, their stocks at present rates; but buyers are caulous; seles, therefore, are mand at comparatively full prices; this is owbut buyers are cautious; seles, therefore, are confined to local wants, and consequently, un-less cable reports are more favorable from Europe, great dulness or a decline must be ex-pected. WIIEAT-The receipts have been very large, WHEAT-The receipts have been very large, abont 102,000 bushels having arrived '.o-day. The bulk is of Red Winter, which is at present difficult to sell, owing to the condition in which it comes forward. U. O. Spring is very scarce, and would sell at full prices. The market is very quiet; the advance in the price of gold and difficulty in selling exchange has nearly put a stop to operations (We note the sale yesterday of a cargo of Chicago No. 2 at \$1.05, and to have a cargo of Miwakee No. 2 at yesterally of a cargo of Contenge No. 2 at \$1.00, and to 3ay a cargo of Milwakee No. 2 at \$1.02; 34,000 bush of Illinois No. 3 Red Winter at \$1.05. These sales, however, could not be repeated, as it can be laid down from the West at 4 sents under the inside price. U. O. Spring remeind nominal.

CORN-There is nothing doing ; price ', con-sequently, are pure y nominal.

PEAS-The small lots that have come for-PARS-Ine small lots that have come for-ward have not been up to the average; they are worm-caten and light, consequently no price has been fixed. The general opinion is that the crop will not be over an average, and the price will therefore depend on any delicieney in Great Britain.

BARLEY - Only small lots arriving, but no prices fixed; 68c to 70c is paid, but the proba-bility of the crop being large, although the quality is not up to the usual mark, it is impos-sible to predict what will be the rates. This is a question that entirely depends on the demand from the States.

OATS-At present the prices fluctuate according to the quality brought to market. The stock of old being entirely exhausted, that of new coming in from the country is very uncer-tain. There is no doubt that the crop is very heavy, and receipts likely to be large, so that unless there is a good demand from England proces must rale low.
