## REVIEW DF THME WVIOLISAXAE GROCEGEX MAR ETET

Uontrary to expectations, buisiness has been quiet. This is chlefly owing to tie auction sales advertized for the coming week, buyers in the West being so accustomed to hold off in their ordere at this season, in expectation of how the auctions will result. From the scarcity of stocks in the Dominion generally, we can reasonably expect that a full range of prices will ubtaln, especially as the barvest has been fully up to expectations, and so far farmers are obtaining very falr prices for their produce; this will enabie them to pay up alt indebtedness to the storekeepurs, and thus relleve the latter of their liabilities to the city merchants.

COAL-We have little change to note in our conl market. American anthracite is very unconl market. American anthracite is very un-
settled, and few transactions have taken place. settled, and few transactions have taken place.
In otber coals little bas been done, aud no In otber coals little bas
eliange in our quotations.

- COFFEE-Business hus been very quiet; our quotations are fully maintained; say Laguavra $16 \frac{1}{2}$ to 17 c ; Maracaibo, 17 to 18 c ; Jamaica, 16 to 18 e ; Java, 25 to 28 c ; $\mathrm{Rio}, 14 \frac{1}{2}$ to 15 c .
CORKS-Fair demand at Wine, $\$ 1$ to 1.60 ; Beer, 35 to 40 c ; Soda, 40 to 50 c ; Yhial, $1 \mathrm{l}_{\mathrm{j}}$ to líc per gross.
FRUIT-The market here has ruled very steady though sales have been light; prices are filly maintained. By last reports from the London market, prixes there are held very firm in consequence of tbe known sbort crops in the frult-producing countries. In view of these reports and the approaching fall salea, nelther selfers nor buyers are lnclined to operate, the fatter ouly purchusing for inmediate wants.
HKOOS, DYBS AND CHEMICALS.-The inarket tor iast woek more active for Caustle foda und soda Ash; abolt 201 crmis of the former were sold at 3 c for Wbile, suntwhand

Tbere has been some sales of Bl-Carb., say 500 kegs, at 3 zc ; but since those have been made the market is effected much better, $\$ 3.20$ to 3.25 belng asked. That ordered now from bome would cost $\$ 350$ :
FISH.-We hare no change to report in the Fish Market, wbich remain unaltered at-last week's quotatlons.
GLASS - There is rather more demand, and onr quotations are fully maintalned.
MOLASSES.--Stock nearly exhausted ; prices have advanced 2 c per gallon. We quote Centrifugal; 32 to 34 c ; Olayed; 38 to 42 c ; Trinidad, Barbadoes and Cienfucgos, 46 to 50 c per gallon. Syrups are la good demand at our exreme rates.
NAVAL STORES.-There is no change in Spirits Turpentine. Tbe demand still continues good, with stocks sufficlent for present wants ; 47 c c is the rilling figure. Rosins move pretiv freely at $\$ 2.75$ tor Strained, 3.25 for No. $2,3.75$ for No. 1 , and 4.50 to 6.50 for Pale and Extra. Pine Tar and Pitch unchanged. Coal Tar and Pitch are in reqnest at $\$ 3$.

UILS-T'be market is bare of cod oll, which is ln demand at 57 to 58c. No change in other fisb olls. Olive oil remains the same as in our last report:
PETROLEUM-Demandjvers quiet at $30 \mathrm{c} \ln$ jobbing lots.
PAINTS-T liero ls a good enqury at Dry White Lead, per $100 \mathrm{lbs}, \$ 7.50$; Dry Red Lead, 86.75 to 7.00 ; White Lead, No. 1 , per keg, $\Psi^{2} 240$ to 2.50 ; do No. $2, \$ 2.20$ to 2.25 .
RICE-We have no change to make in our last week's quotations, at which there is a fair demand.

SALT-The market for Liverpool coarso has been heavy and drooping slnce our last report. We note sales of 2,000 bags at 60 c and 1,000 at 61c, both with several lots of 200 to 500 bags at $62 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ to 63 L c , and retail lots at 65 c , all afloat.

We noto several cargoes going into storo and withdrawn from the market for the present. Fine remains, as in our last, 77! to 80c, according to size of lots.
SPIOES-We have to record a fair demand for the leadiug spices, and our quotations are fully maintained.
SUGAR-We havo had an animated demand this week, with large sales to tho refiners on private terms. Prices have alvinneed ic per lb, with a strong upward tendeney, it being estimated tiat the deficiency in the crop ihis year will amount to $3,0,000$ tons, and the troubles continulng in Ouba are likely to decrease the crop next year one-half. Our quotations are
 Porto Rico and Barbadoes; little to be liad at inside figures. Refined bave advanced ic per lb during the week. Loaves are seliing at $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ Dry Oruened 12lc; Extra Ground 131 c ; Crushed A ilac Yellow refined 01 to 10 c . At these prices there is an active demand.

TEAS-A steaciy consumptive ciemanc contlnues, and a fair jolbing trade lias been done for the past week in all descriptlons. Prices continues firm for desirable grades of green, twankays tend upwards, japan withont cliango: Sales in wholesale parcels are restrlcted, and the market wi:i probably remain quiet until publlc sale advertised for Wednesday next.
TOBACCU-The market is very firm for all grades, and extreme priees are demanded; transactions however, during the weeic have been ligbt, buyers not being willing to fully give into the views of sellers. We do not alter our quotations.

WINES \& LIQUORS-The market is exceedingly dull, and we have notining to add to our remaiks of last week.
