



RULES AND REGULATIONS :

1. All persons upon payment of One Dollar, may become members, which entitles them to enter any number of articles for exhibition and to two tickets of admission.

2. Entries to be made not later than Tucsday, 2nd Oct., except stock, for which entries will be taken up to 9 o'clock of Wednesday the 3rd Oct., which time all stock for exhibition must be on the ground.

2. Judges to commence their duties at 9 o'clock A. M. on Wednesday, and for stock at 1 o'clock of same day.

4. No animal or article to take more than one prize, unless specified.

5. Animals can only compete for prizes in the classes for which they are entered, nor shall any animal be entered for more than one class. Judges not to allow animals to be shown in a class different from that in which they are entered, and any prize awarded to any animal shown in violation of this rule shall be forfeited. Animals exhibited in any class, except as fat animals, may enter for Herd.

6. All animals, produce, etc., to be the property of the exhibitor, and all produce to be the growth of the exhibitor. No barren animal will be allowed to compete for a premium in the breeding classes; in all classes satisfactory evidence must be furnished that the animal is a breeder.

7. No interference with the Judges will be allowed. Any person violating this condition will forfeit their prizes. Discretionary premiums may be recommended by the Judges. A Director will be in attendance with Judges to see that this rule is carried out.

8. All horses and horned cattle to be tied up on the ground in the order set down by the committee.

9. No articles to be removed from the exhibition building till after the close of the exhibition on the fourth day. Stock not to be removed till after the Procession, which will take place at 11 o'clock of 4th day.

10. All produce and other articles to be on the ground by 3 o'clock of the first day. Stock not later than 1 r. m. of the second day. Cut flowers and plants must be arranged in position before 9 A. m. on Wednesday All horses and cattle taking prizes to be on exhibition on the 4th day at 11 o'clock, at which time a procession will be formed of all prize winners. All Stock taking prizes not taking part in procession will forfeit the prizes.

11. Exhibitors to give the necessary personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibition. No articles lost will be paid for, but all due diligence 12. Two tickets of admission will be given to each member. Members will be required to pay for admission to the Exhibition held in the evenings.

13. No person shall enter for exhibition more than one exhibit in any one section of a class, unless the additional article be a distinct named variety or pattern from the first. This rule not to apply to animals, but to all kinds of grain, vegetable products, fruits, manufactured articles, etc., in which each additional exhibit would necessarily be precisely similar to the first. hibitor in the arts and manufacturers' department will be awarded more than 14. Intending exhibitors will save themselves a great deal of trouble and the Secretary a vast amount of annoyance by making their entries the week previous to the exhibition. Entries may be made by mail. See that every article entered is made under some one of headings in regular list. Any member found violating any of these rules will forfeit any prizes which they may

15 Any exhibitor lodging a protest, must make it IN WRITING and it must be delivered to the President or Secretary WITHIN TWO DAYS AFTER THE CLOSE OF THE FAIR; it must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$3, which sum shall be forfeited to the Association if the said protest is not sustained. This rule not to apply to trials of speed, the rules regulating which shall be governed by the National Association. The Board of Directors, however, earnestly hope that the exhibitors will not enter protests without the strongest grounds for so doing, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature. ADMISSION TO GROUNDS. The admission for adults will be 25 cents each time of entering. Children under 12 years of age, 10 cents. Carriages, single, 25 cents; double, 50 cents. Necessary attendants upon stock and machinery will be furnished with special passes on applying at the Secretary's office on the grounds. 


