4. No animal or article to take more than one prize, unless specified.
5. Animals can only compete for prizes in the classes for which they are entered, nor shall any animal be entered for more than one class. Judges not to allow animals to be shown in a class different from that in which they are entered, and any prize nwarded to any animal shown in violation of this rule shall be forfeited. Animals exhibitod in any class, except as fat animals, may enter for Herd.
6. All animals, produce, etc., to be the property of the exhibitor, and all produce to be the growth of the cxhibior. No barren animal will be allowed to compete for a premium in the brcerling classes; in all classes satisfactory evidence nust be furnished that the animal is a breeder.
