FASTING DAYS.

All the week days of Lent; all
Wednesdays and Fridays in Advent:
Ember-days, Wednesday, Friday, and
Saturday; 1st, in the first week of
Lent; 2d, in Whitsun week; 3d, after
September 14; 4th, after December 13.
If Monday is a holiday, Saturday is
fast.

DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

All Fridays and Saturdays; all Sun-
days in Lent; Rogation-days, being
Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday
before the Ascension; St. Mark's day
out of Easter-week, and the Diocese of
Canterbury.

The solemnization of marriage is
forbidden from the first Sunday of Ad-
vent till after Epiphany, and from
Ash Wednesday till Low Sunday.

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The eight Beatitudes. Matt. v. 3.

1. **BLESSED** are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

2. Blessed are the meek: for they shall possess the land.

3. Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted.

4. Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after justice: for they shall be filled.

5. Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy.

6. Blessed are the clean of heart: for they shall see God.

7. Blessed are the peace-makers: for they shall be called the children of God.

8. Blessed are they that suffer persecution for justice sake; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are ye when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and speak all that is evil against you, untruly, for my sake: rejoice and be glad, for your reward is very great in heaven.

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Impediments to Matrimony.

The Impediments to Matrimony are
of two kinds.

THE *first* kind is what renders it null and void in the sight of God and his Church; and those are, 1. Vows of chastity, such as religious persons take when they consecrate themselves to the service of Almighty God, and those who are entered into Holy Orders.

2. *Consanguinity*; or a contract within the four prohibited degrees of kindred; of which the first are brothers and sisters. 3. Their children, or cousin-germans. 4. The children of cousin-germans. 5. And lastly, the children of those which are of the fourth degree or remove of kindred; likewise where such affinity is contracted by lawful marriage. Also in cases of adultery and fornication, which create an affinity to the second degree, and in the sacrament of baptism and confirmation, whereby the godfather and godmother are prohibited marriage with either the parents or the child.

3. When married persons commit

adultery, and make promises of future marriage at the death of the innocent party, in which case they are not only null and void, but highly censured by the Church as productive of many evils.

The *second* kind is what doth not annul or hinder the sacrament from being true and valid, yet makes it a very great crime to transgress in it. 1. Such as where mutual promises have been made by either of the parties to any other person. 2. When the simple vow of chastity has been made by either contracting party. 3. When the marriage is solemnized within the forbidden times; viz. from the first Sunday of Advent to Twelfth-day; and from Ash-Wednesday to Low-Sunday, including these mentioned days.

The Manner of Lay Persons baptizing an Infant in Danger of Death.

TAKE common water, pour it on the head or face of the child, and whilst pouring it, say the following words:

“I baptize thee in the Name of the

Gloria in excelsis, and the Creed, are not said in Masses for the Dead; and at other times you may pass either of them over, when you find them omitted by the Priest.

Say the Confiteor after the Priest as follows.

I CONFESS to Almighty God, to the blessed Virgin Mary, to the blessed Michael the Archangel, to the blessed John Baptist, to the holy apostles Peter and Paul, to all the saints, and to you, O Father, that I have exceedingly sinned in thought, word, and deed, through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault. Therefore I beseech the blessed Virgin Mary, blessed Michael the archangel, blessed John Baptist, the holy apostles Peter and Paul, all the saints, and you,

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give ear to the prayers of thy servant, which he now offers thee in the name of thy Church, and in behalf of us thy people: accept them to the honour of thy name, and the good of our souls; and grant us all those blessings which may any ways contribute to our salvation. Thro', &c. Amen.

At the Epistle, say,

MAJEST thou, O Lord, be eternally praised for having communicated thy divine Spirit to the holy prophets and apostles, disclosing to them admirable secrets, redounding to thy glory, and our salvation. We firmly believe their doctrine, because it is thine. Grant us, we beseech thee, the happiness to understand from the Church, through their instructions, what is profitable for us, and the grace to practice the same to the end of our lives.

At the Gradual, say,

HOW wonderful, O Lord, is thy name throughout the whole earth! I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall be ever in my mouth. Be thou my God and my

protector: in thee alone will I put my trust, O let me not be confounded for ever.

At the Gospel, rise up and say,

BE thou for ever adored and praised, O Lord, who, not content to instruct us by the prophets and apostles, hast even vouchsafed to speak to us by thy only Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, commanding us by a voice from heaven to *hear him*: Grant us, merciful God, the grace to profit by his divine and heavenly doctrine. All that is written concerning thee, dread Jesus, in thy gospel, is truth itself; nothing but wisdom in thy actions, power and goodness in thy miracles, light and instruction in thy word. With thee, sacred Redeemer, are the words of eternal life: to whom shall we come but to thee, O eternal fountain of truth: Grant me, O God, the grace to practice what thou commandest, and command what thou pleasest.

At the Credo, or Nicene Creed, say,

I BELIEVE, O Lord, all thou hast taught me by thy Holy Church.

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In this faith, through the assistance of thy grace, I desire to live and die. I am convinced of the sincerity and wisdom of those who have delivered these sacred truths to us. Their miraculous success in the propagation of thy doctrine, is to me a sufficient proof of its veracity. Whither, O Lord! shall I go. Thou hast the words of eternal life. Of thy truth thus delivered, my reason and will shall never doubt, though my senses and vain imagination should. I believe, O Lord, help my belief.

At the Offertory, say,

ACCCEPT, O holy Father, Almighty and eternal God, this unspotted host, which I thy unworthy servant offer thee, the living and true God, for my innumerable sins, offences and negligences, and for all present, and for all faithful Christians, living and dead, that it may avail both me and them to life everlasting. *Amen.*

At the Offering of the Chalice, say,

WHEN I offer thee, O Lord, the chalice of salvation, beseeching thy clemency, that it may ascend by

fore thy divine Majesty, as a sweet perfume, as well for our salvation as for that of the whole world.

Accept us, O Lord, who approach thee in the spirit of humility, and with contrite hearts: and may the sacrifice we offer this day in thy sight be pleasing to thee, O Lord God.

*When the Priest washes his Fingers,
say,*

THOU, O Lord, who once vouchsafedst to wash thy disciples feet, before their invitation to thy holy table; wash us also, we beseech thee, O Lord, and wash us again; not only our feet and hands, but also our hearts, our desires, and our souls, that we may become altogether pure and innocent.

Proceed and say,

RECEIVE, O holy Trinity, this oblation we now make to thee, in memory of the passion, resurrection and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ: and in honour of the ever blessed V. Mary, of blessed John Baptist, of the holy apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, that it

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may avail their honour and our salvation. And may they vouchsafe to intercede for us in heaven, whose memory we celebrate on earth. Thro' Amen.

At the Orate Fratres, say,

MAY our Lord receive this sacrifice from thy hands, to the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the benefit of his whole Church.

At the Secret Prayer, say,

MERCIFULLY hear our prayers, O Lord, and graciously accept this oblation, which we thy servants now offer to the honour of thy name, that it may obtain thy grace for us in this life, and everlasting happiness in the next. Amen.

At the Preface, say,

IT is truly meet and just, right and available to salvation, that we should always, and in all places, give thanks to thee, O holy Lord, Father Almighty, eternal God, thro' Christ, our Lord: by whom the angels praise thy Majesty, the dominions adore it, the powers tremble before it, the hear

vens and the heavenly virtues, and blessed seraphims with common jubilee glorify it; together with whom we beseech thee, that we may be admitted to join our voices, saying in an humble manner,

HOLY, HOLY, HOLY, Lord God of Sabbaoth, the heavens and earth are full of thy glory. HOSANNA in the highest. Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord, HOSANNA in the highest.

At the Beginning of the Canon, say,

MOST merciful Father, who hast given thy only Son to become our daily sacrifice, favourably incline thy ear to our prayers, and grant our requests. Protect, unite, and govern thy holy Church throughout the whole world. Pour fourth thy blessing on his present Holiness; on the Prelate who has a particular charge over us; on our king, and on all true professors of the catholic faith.

At the Memento for the Living, say,

I OFFER thee, O eternal Father, with thy minister at the altar, this oblation of the body and blood of thy

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only Son, to thy honour and glory, in remembrance of my Saviour's passion, in thanksgiving for all thy benefits, in satisfaction for all my sins, and for the obtaining thy grace, whereby I may be enabled to live virtuously and die happily. I desire thee likewise to accept it, O God, for my parents, (*if alive*) friends and benefactors: grant them all blessings corporal and spiritual. I offer it up also (*Here name the particular intention you would offer it up for, as for the obtaining this virtue, overcoming that vice, for the blessings of health, &c.*) likewise for all that are in misery; for those I have any ways injured in word or deed; for all my enemies; for the conversion of sinners, and enlightning all that sit in darkness. Pour forth thy blessings on all, according to their respective necessities, through the merits of thy only Son Christ Jesus our Lord.

Proceed and say,

GIVE ear, we beseech thee, to the prayers of thy servants whom thou hast appointed to make this oblation in our behalf, and grant it may

be effectual for obtaining all those blessings he asks for us. Behold, O Lord, all here, present to thee in this bread and wine, the symbols of our perfect union. Grant that they may be converted into the real body and blood of thy dear Son, that being consecrated to thee by the holy victim, we may live in thy service, and depart this life in thy grace.

At the Elevation of the Host, say,
MOST adorable body, I adore thee with all the powers of my soul. O Lord, since thou hast given thyself wholly to us, grant we may become entirely thine. I believe, O Lord, help my unbelief. Most merciful Saviour, be thou my protector; strengthen and defend me, I beseech thee, by thy heavenly grace, now, and especially at the hour of my death, sweet Jesus. Amen.

At the Elevation of the Chalice, say,
MOST adorable blood, that washes away all our sins, I adore thee; happy we, if we can return our life and blood for thine. Cleanse, O Jesus, sanctify, and preserve our souls

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those to eternal life. Live Jesus in us, and
old, Give in thee.

After the Elevation, say,

WE now, O Lord, with grateful
hearts call to mind the sacred
mysteries of thy passion and death ;
thy resurrection and ascension. Here
is thy body that was broken ; here is
thy blood that was shed for us, of
which these exterior signs are but the
figure, and yet in reality contain the
substance. It is now we truly offer
thee, O Lord, that pure and holy Vic-
tim which thou hast been pleased to
grant us, of which all the ancient sa-
crifices were but so many types and
figures.

At the Memento for the Dead, say,
OFFER thee again, O Lord, this holy
sacrifice of the body and blood of
thine only Son, in behalf of the faith-
ful departed, and in particular for the
souls of *(here name those for whom you
chiefly purpose to pray)* my parents,
I adore *(if dead)* relations, benefactors, neigh-
bours, &c. likewise of such as I have
in any ways injured, or been the occasion
of their sin ; of such as have injured

me, or been my enemies : of such
die in war, or have none to pray for
them, &c. To these, O Lord, and to
all that rest in Christ, grant, we beseech
thee, a place of refreshment,
light and peace.

At the Nobis quoque peccatoribus, sancti
VOUCHSAFE to grant the same to
us, poor miserable sinners. Judge
us not according to our demerits ; but
through the infinite multitude of thy
mercies, liberally extend to us thy
grace and pardon.

We ask it of thee in the name of
thy dear Son, who liveth and reigneth
eternally with thee, and in that form
of prayer which he himself hath taught
us.

Say the Pater noster, and then proceed

BELIEVE us from those evils, which
we labour under at present ; from
past evils, which can be nothing but
our manifold sins : and from the evils
to come, which will be the just chastise-
ments of our offences, if our prayer, and
those more powerful ones of thy saints
who intercede for us, intercept not thy
justice, or excite not thy bounty.

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At the Breaking of the Host, say,

THY body was broken, O Lord;
and thy blood was shed for us :
grant that the commemoration of this
holy mystery may procure for us peace :
and that those who receive it may ob-
tain everlasting rest.

At Agnus Dei, say with the Priest,

LAMB of God, who takest away
the sins of the world, have mer-
cy upon us.

Lamb of God, who takest away the
sins of the world, have mercy upon us.

Lamb of God, who takest away the
sins of the world, grant us peace.

Before Communion, say,

IN saying to thy apostles, *my peace*
I leave you, my peace I give you :
thou hast promised, O Lord, to thy
whole Church, that peace which the
world cannot give : peace with thee,
and peace with ourselves.

Let nothing, O Lord, ever interrupt
this holy peace ; let nothing be able
to separate us from thee, to whom we
heartily desire to be united, through

reconciliation. Let this food of angels

strengthen us in every Christian duty, so as never more to yield unto temptation, or fall into our common weaknesses.

At the Domine non sum dignus, before

Communion, say three Times

LORD, I am not worthy that thou shouldst enter under my roof, say only the word, and my soul shall be healed.

A Spiritual Communion.

MOST loving Jesus, who art present in this sacrament, by virtue of thy infinite power, wisdom and goodness, I adore thee with the most lively faith: but conscious of my infirmities and sins, I dare not at present receive thee sacramentally. My hope is entirely placed in thee. I love thee, O Lord, with my whole heart who hast so excessively loved me; and therefore I now desire to receive thee come therefore, O Lord, spiritually into my sinful soul, and heal it from all its infirmities. Feed me, that am hungry; comfort me, that am weak; enliven and sanctify me with thy sacred body and blood; deliver me

At the Wiping of the Chalice, say,

GRANT, O Lord, we may partake of the fruit of thy death and passion, the sacred memory of which we have commemorated in this sacrifice. Happy, thrice happy those, who sit at thy table to partake of the bread of life. My soul sighs after thee. I desire with the apostle, to be dissolved, and to be with thee, O Jesus. My heart and soul, with transports of joy, seek thee, the living God.

My soul languishes with an ardent desire of entering into the house of our Lord. I love thee, O my God, with my whole heart. O that I could always enjoy the presence of thy adorable body, the pledge of our eternal happiness! I adore thy goodness, and return thee infinite thanks, O gracious Lord, for thy inestimable favour and

mercy, in permitting me to be present
this day at the august sacrifice, where
thou thyself art both Priest and Victim.
Make me always sensible, O Lord,
of so great a favour, and suffer not my
unworthiness to put a stop to the
effects of thy infinite mercy and good-
ness.

When the Priest reads the Communion

LET it now be, O Lord, the effect
of thy mercy, that we who
have been present at this holy mystery,
may find the benefit of it in our souls.

At the Post-Communion, say,

WE give thee thanks, O God, for
thy mercy in admitting us to
have a part in offering this sacrifice
to thy holy name; accept it now to
thy glory, and be ever mindful of our
weakness.

Proceed as follows:

GRACIOUS God, and most merci-
ful Father, grant, I beseech thee,
that this adorable sacrifice of the bles-
sed body and blood of thy Son, our
Lord Jesus Christ, may obtain for us
at thy hands, mercy, and the remis-
sion of all our sins. *Amen.*

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When the Priest blesses the People.

+ THE blessing of Almighty God,
Father, Son, and Holy Ghost,
descend upon us, and dwell in our
hearts for ever. *Amen.*

*Here, whilst the Priest concludes with
St. John's Gospel, say,*

O Eternal Word! speak to my
soul, which adores thee in
profound silence. Thou who art the
supreme Creator of all things, abandon not, I beseech thee, thy creature;
be thou my life, my light, and my all.

O light Eternal, enlighten me, as
well in this life, as in the life to
come.

Reign in me, as in thine own inheritance: for as thou, O Lord, hast

thine.

ABSOLVE, we beseech thee, O Lord, the soul of thy servant N. that being dead to the world he (or she) may live to thee; and whatever he (or she) has committed in this life through human frailty, do thou of thy most merciful goodness forgive: thro' our Lord, &c.

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A Prayer for a Bishop or Priest.

O GOD, who amongst the Apostolic Priests hast raised thy servant N. to the dignity of a Bishop, (or a Priest) grant, we beseech thee, that he may also be admitted in heaven to their everlasting fellowship: thro', &c.

For Father and Mother.

O GOD, who hast commanded us to honour our father and mother, have mercy on the souls of my father and mother, and grant that I may see them in the glory of eternity: thro', &c.

For Brethren, Relations, and Benefactors.

O GOD, the giver of pardon, and lover of the salvation of mankind, we beseech thy clemency in behalf of our brethren, kindred and benefactors, who are departed this life, that by the intercession of the blessed Virgin Mary, and of all thy saints, thou wouldst receive them into the joys of thy eternal kingdom: thro', &c.

For all that lie in the Church or Church Yard.

O GOD, by whose mercy the souls of the faithful find rest, grant to

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tal life, they may be admitted to life everlasting : thro' our Lord, &c.

A Prayer after Burial.

O Lord, we commend to thee, and to thy clemency, the soul of thy servant N. lately departed this life. According to thy mercy, pardon, we beseech thee, those sins which he has committed through human frailty ; that he may live with thee in the kingdom of everlasting bliss. *Amen.*

A Prayer for such as are present at either Death or Burial.

MOST wise and merciful Lord, who hast ordained this life as a passage to the future, confining our repentance to the time of our pilgrimage here, and reserving for hereafter the state of punishment or reward, vouchsafe us thy grace, who are yet alive, and still have opportunity of reconciliation with thee, so to watch over all our actions, and correct every the least deviation from the true way to heaven, that we may be neither surprised with our sins uncanceled, nor with our duties imperfect : so that when our bodies go down

into the grave, our souls may ascend and dwell in the mansions of eternal rest : thro', &c. *Amen.*

Thro' our Lord Jesus Christ thy Son,
who, with thee and the same Holy
Ghost, livest, &c. *Amen.*

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A PREPARATION FOR CONFESSION.

A prayer before the Examen of Conscience

O God, have mercy on me a most miserable sinner. Alas ! I have had the misfortune to offend thee, O Lord, eyes, ever attentive to my whole life, behold all my iniquities. Grant, O Lord, that I may know the number and enormity of my sins, in order that I may heartily detest and confess them. Inspire me, I beseech thee, with a lively abhorrence of them : and with a firm purpose never to commit them any more. Soften my obdurate heart : cause the salutary tears of true contrition to flow from my eyes, and unite them with the tears, and the precious blood, shed by my Redeemer thy Son, for my salvation. Enkindle, divine Redeemer, in my heart the fire of thy holy love, for I desire to love thee much. Vouchsafe, O my God, to forgive all my sins.

AN EXAMEN OF CONSCIENCE.

Sins against God, in Matters of Faith,

HAVE you been guilty of heresy, or disbelief of any article of faith, or of voluntarily doubting of any article of faith?—Have you rashly exposed yourself to the danger of infidelity by reading bad books, keeping wicked company, going into places of worship belonging to other communions during the time of their service and joining with them in their worship?—Have you by word or deed denied your faith, or railed at, or despised holy things?—Have you been ignorant of the articles of your faith and the duties of your religion, or have you been negligent in instructing or procuring the necessary instructions for those under your care?—Have you given credit to dreams, taken notice of omens, or made any other superstitious observations?—Have you used charms or spells, or consulted fortune-tellers, or made use of any other superstitious prac-

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tices to find out things to come, recover things lost, &c.—How often, and with what scandal or ill example to others?

Of Hope.

Have you despaired of salvation, or the forgiveness of your sins?—Have you rashly presumed upon God's goodness, continuing to offend him because he is merciful; going on in your sins without any thought of amendment, depending upon a death-bed repentance?—Have you relied upon yourself rather than upon Divine Grace, or neglected for a long time to return to God by repentance, after falling into mortal sin?

Of Charity.

Have you loved any creature as much, or more, than yourself?—Have you murmured against the Providence of God, resisted his inspirations, refused to submit to his divine will, not prevented evil when you could and ought, or committed sin thro' human respect?

Of Religion.

Have you made a sacrilegious confession or communion?—Have you

received the sacrament of Confirmation or Matrimony in the state of mortal sin?—Have you abused the holy scriptures, or prophaned holy places or sacred things?—Have you blasphemed God or his saints?—Have you been negligent in the divine worship, seldom or never adoring or praising God, or giving him thanks for his benefits?—Have you prayed but seldom or with little attention, or omitted to make acts of Faith, Hope, and Charity?—Have you behaved with irreverence in the House of God, or broken any vow or solemn promise made to him?—Have you neglected to hear mass on Sundays or Holy Days of Obligation? or have you heard it with wilful distractions? or not taken care that your children or servants should hear it?—Have you neglected confession or communion at Easter, or omitted the penance enjoined you, or acquitted yourself of these religious duties carelessly?—Have you sworn falsely, or what you did not certainly know, whether it was true or false?—Have

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yet broken your lawful oaths, or sworn to do any thing that was wicked or unlawful?—Have you had a custom of swearing rashly or inconsiderately by the name of God, by your soul, or by way of imprecation upon yourself or others?—Have you sworn by the blood or wounds of God, or any other blasphemous oath, or been accessory to others swearing, cursing, or blaspheming?—Have you spent the Sundays, or Holidays of Obligation, in idleness or sin, or been the occasion of others so spending them?—Have you done any servile work without necessity upon those days?—Have you broke the days of abstinence, or eaten more than one meal on fasting days, or been accessory to others in so doing?—How often, &c.

Sins against our Neighbour.

In Thoughts. BY rash judgment,—contempt,—envy,—hatred—aversion—desires of revenge: which sins vary in their malice, according to the length of time we were thus affected, of the relation we stand in to the different persons in

question : or according to the greater or less importance of the matter under our consideration.

In Words.—By calumniating, or detracting : or by listening to calumny or detraction, when we can prevent such discourse. (N. B. The motive for speaking thus,—the number of persons present, and the subject of this uncharitable language, must be specified, as we are bound to repair the injury to the best of our power.) We also sin by ill-natured reports or insinuations, malicious expressions, whether true or false : by giving bad advice ; by flattering others, or approving of evil ; by giving false testimony ; by discovering the secrets, or the faults of others ; by abusive words, reproaches, bad wishes, or imprecations, &c.

In Actions.—By stealing, cheating, usury, extortions, or any way wronging another in buying, selling, or any other contract. By putting off false money, or using false weights and measures : by buying or receiving stolen goods ; by contracting debts,

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without design of paying them; by wronging our creditors or our own family by prodigal expences; by refusing to pay our just debts, when able, or by culpable extravagance rendering ourselves unable to pay them: by neglecting the work or business for which we were hired and obliged by contract to perform. In fine: by unjustly taking or keeping any thing of value belonging to another, in which case it is impossible to obtain forgiveness, without making restitution to the best of our power. And here it is to be observed, that where two or more jointly injure another, either in goods or reputation, they are jointly and severally obliged to restitution; that is to say, they are bound to contribute their respective proportions towards repairing the injury: and every individual is answerable before God for the whole injury, when either or any of the accomplices refuse to repair their portion thereof.

In Omissions.—By neglecting to restore ill-gotten goods, or repair injured characters. By refusing to be

reconciled to an enemy, or to perform duties of obligation, such as respect and love towards parents, obedience to superiors, &c.

Against ourselves.

By pride. [N] having too great an esteem for ourselves; in despising others; in being too apt to speak of our own affairs, or in our own praise; in aspiring to honours and preferment through vanity; in affecting to be humble, or in deceiving others by hypocrisy.

By Avarice.—In not giving alms according to our ability. In not only refusing alms which we can afford, but in refusing it with bitterness, reproaches, imperious ill-natured language, or with an insulting air. In being too much attached to the goods of this life, where it must ever be remembered, that whatever is *really* superfluous to us, belongs of right to the poor: that where there is much, much should be given; and that where there is only a little, even some of that little should be cheerfully given, for “God loves the cheerful giver.”

By Envy.—In being sorry for the prosperity of others ; in rejoicing at their misfortunes ; in wishing, with jealousy, for what belongs to them.

By Impurity.—In wilfully dwelling upon, or taking pleasure in unchaste thoughts. N. B. The *penitent* must here mention whether these bad thoughts were entertained during a considerable time, and how long ; whether they were accompanied with desires of committing the evil ; whether they caused irregular motions ; whether in a holy place. And finally, whether the object of their sinful desires were single or married, kindred or relations, or persons consecrated to God.

By Words.—In speaking obscenely, or with a double meaning, which is as bad, if not worse ; in listening with pleasure to such vile language. N. B. This sort of discourse is still more criminal when it passes between two persons of a different sex. We also sin grievously this way, by singing unchaste songs, by giving toasts or sentiments contrary to modesty, or by permitting them to be given when we

can prevent them; or, by not retiring on such occasions.

By Looks.—In viewing immodest objects; in reading bad books; in keeping indecent pictures; in frequenting plays and public assemblies, which are but too often the schools of vice, where dangerous objects are held up to view, and where vice is represented, not in its native horrible colours or consequences, but as a mere gaiety. Comedies also are often so full of indecent sentiments and indelicate allusions as cannot but offend a modest ear, and have an immoral tendency. They are not only powerful incentives to this vice, but besides evidently unlawful, for the following reasons, viz. Because we cannot assist at them, without contributing by our purse and our example, to maintain a set of people in a profession or way of life which was always deemed infamous by the Catholic Church. Under this head may likewise be classed, the tempting of others to sin by dissolute glances and gestures, or immodesty in dress or behaviour.

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By Actions.—In abusing and defiling the sanctity of marriage; by such liberties and irregularities as are contrary to the order of nature; in touching ourselves or others immodestly; in permitting indecent liberties to be taken with us, and what their consequences were.—N. B. It is necessary to explain every thing, in order to make known such circumstances as may increase or diminish the guilt, with as much modesty as possible; and also to declare whether we have employed or neglected to employ the necessary means of overcoming this vile passion. We should carefully distinguish what is wilful, from what is not so. An effect of deliberation, from one of mere negligence. Also, the number of those bad actions, or at least the length of time we continued in the habit of committing them: with what sort of persons we have sinned, or desired to sin; but this without mentioning their names. And, as it too often happens with young persons who have miserably fallen into a certain sin of a lonely and abominable nature, either

to conceal this crime, or not faithfully confess how often they have been guilty of it, we therefore earnestly beseech such to reflect seriously upon the fatal evils in which they involve themselves. Let them consider that all those confessions, and the communications which follow them, are only so many sacrileges, removing them still further from God, and provoking his just indignation against them: that the longer they continue in this state of hypocrisy, the more difficult it must be to overcome their bashfulness, and the more anguish they must feel in their own interior. That no practice more destructive of health, beauty, and genius, than this: that it deforms and debilitates the wretched perpetrator, that it must, not only in a moral, but also in a physical sense, degrade him beneath the rank of the brute creation, and render him contemptible to mankind.

By Gluttony.—In eating or drinking to excess; in exciting others to do so; in not observing the days of fasting and abstinence enjoined by the Church,

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By Anger.—In abusing, quarreling, striking, or wishing evil to others; in provoking others to quarrel or fight: which sins are still more heinous, when parents or superiors are the objects thereof.

By Sloth.—In neglecting our religious or moral duties; in performing them carelessly; in passing our time idly or unprofitably, when our state of life calls us to labour. We are also guilty by studying too much our own ease, and by a too great remissness in mortifying our passions or senses.

A Prayer after the Examen.

I Humbly thank thee, O Lord, for having made my sins known to me. Glory, justice, and mercy are thine, whereas I deserve nothing but confusion and punishment, for having offended thy immense bounty, and disobeyed thy holy commands. But, alas! what will it avail me to know my iniquities, if I do not amend them? And how shall I amend them without thy gracious assistance? Vouchsafe, therefore, O Lord, to perfect the work thou hast begun. Convinced of my

own misery and thy goodness, I re-
turn to thee, O my Creator, and most
loving Father, and considering thee in
the person of thy minister, I will pro-
strate myself at thy feet, and say, "Fa-
ther, I have sinned against he- and
before thee, and I am no more worthy
to be called thy Son:" treat me as one
of thy servants, and pardon all my
sins, through the merits of Jesus
Christ thy Son.

After the Examination.

HAVING discovered the different
sorts of sins of which you have
been guilty, together with their num-
ber, enormity, or such aggravating cir-
cumstances as may considerably in-
crease their malice or change their
nature, your next endeavour should
be, to excite in your breast an *heart-felt*
sorrow for having committed them, and
a sincere detestation of them. This be-
ing the most essential, as well as the
most difficult of all the dispositions
requisite to a good confession, with
what humility, fervour, and perse-
verance, should not you importune
HIM, who holds the hearts of men in
his hands, to grant it you.

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In the mean time, seriously meditate on those powerful motives for exciting contrition, which the Church holds forth to her children: and, in order to feel their force the more effectually, endeavour to enlighten your faith, to strengthen your hope, and inflame your charity, by devoutly reciting the acts of these three theological virtues. In the next place, reflect on those virtues which are most capable of alarming, and, at the same time of melting your heart into compunction: such as, the everlasting torments of hell—the eternal loss of God, and of the joys of heaven—the horror of filthiness of sin—the goodness of God in all he has done, in all he still does, and in all he will do for us, if we continue to love and serve him; particularly that astonishing instance of his love and undeserved mercy, in forbearing to cut your slender thread of life, and to precipitate you into eternal torments in the very height of your rebellion against him. This consideration alone must necessarily engage you to cry out, with exta-

tic surprise and astonishment, *How good must God be in himself, who has been so good to me, his faithless and ungrateful child!* He saw nothing in you deserving of his mercy: he saw every thing in you that merited his wrath and indignation.

This last reflection on the infinite goodness of God, if dwelt on with due attention, cannot fail to inflame your heart with an unfeigned love of him for his own sake, *the purest and best of all motives.* Whilst the heart is thus softened by divine love into compunction for your sins, form an unshaken resolution of never more offending him—of doing your utmost to amend your life—of satisfying for your sins, and of repairing any injury you may have done your neighbour, either in his character or property.

If with these sentiments glowing in your breast, you cast yourself at the feet of your confessor, and reveal to him all the sins you can recollect, with tears of compunction and a truly penitential spirit, be assured you shall return with joy from the tribunal of con-

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Confession, carrying back the precious sheaf of God's unbounded mercy.

Qui seminant in lachrymis, in exultatione metent. They who sow in tears, shall reap with joy. *Ps. cxxv.*

A Prayer before Confession.

O Almighty and eternal God, to whom is due all honour and glory, behold I, a miserable and unworthy sinner, who have hitherto lived in rebellion and ingratitude, come to thee, my Creator, my God, my Redeemer, my merciful Judge, and my Saviour, accusing myself, and laying before thee all the abominations whereby I have blasphemed thy sacred name, transgressed thy precepts, despised thy will, and defiled both my soul and body. O God, when I behold my misery, and consider how often I have abused thy gifts, despised thy goodness, neglected thy service, and preferred myself, my passions, and other creatures, to my duty, and to thy commands, I cannot but consider myself as unworthy to lift up my eyes to heaven, or appear in thy presence. But whither shall I flee from thee, O

Lord, where shall I hide myself from thy anger? Is there any one that can make my peace for me? Ah! it is only from thy goodness I can expect this blessing! for art not thou my Father, whose mercies are infinite, and compassion knows no bounds? and I, although unworthy of the name of thy child, acknowledge no other Father but thee, my God, Wherefore I hasten to the throne of thy mercy, and there prostrate beseech thee, by thy almighty power, wisdom, and goodness, to pardon, purify, and acquit me from the guilt of my sins. Receive me, O Lord, again into thy favour, and, by thy grace, confirm me in all good, that my soul being entirely possessed by thee, may be prepared for glory. And that my petition may find acceptance, I appeal to thee, sweet Jesus, son of the living God, who was pleased to become the advocate of sinners with thy eternal Father, humbly beseeching thee, by that infinite charity which brought thee down from heaven to the ignominy of the cross, and through thy precious

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blood shed thereon, that I may now partake of the benefit of thy sufferings, be cleansed from all my offences, and sincerely repent and avoid all sin: that dying to the world, I may live only to thee, and never suffer either passion or pleasure to divide me from thee any more. Grant this my petition, I beseech thee, through the infinite merits of thy most bitter passion and death, and for the sake of thy glorious name **JESUS. Amen.**

Ejaculations before Confession.

JESUS, reduce into my mind the number and the enormity of the sins whereby I have offended thee.

Jesus, grant me the spirit of perfect repentance: that by contrition, confession, and satisfaction, I may recover thy grace, and thoroughly cleanse my conscience.

Jesus, have mercy upon me, the most wretched of sinners, whom thou hast redeemed with thy precious blood.

Jesus, Son of David, have mercy upon me. Enter not into judgement with thy servant, O Lord: for in thy sight no man shall be justified.

FORM OF CONFESSION.

The penitent having duly prepared himself by prayer, by a serious examination of his conscience, and a hearty contrition for his sins, kneels down at the confession-chair on one side of the priest, and making the sign of the cross upon himself, asks the priest's blessing, saying, "pray father, give me your blessing." Then the priest blesses him in the following words: "The Lord be in thy heart, and in thy lips, that thou mayest truly and humbly confess all thy sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen." After which the penitent says the Confiteor, in latin or English, as far as "Mea culpa, &c." and then accuses himself of all his sins, as to their kind, number, and aggravating circumstances, and concludes with this or the like form: "Of these and all other sins of my whole life, I humbly accuse myself, am heartily sorrow for them, and beg pardon of God, and penance and absolution of you, my ghostly father." And having finished the Confiteor,

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saying, "Therefore I beseech thee, &c." he then attends to the instructions given by the priest, and humbly accepts the penance enjoined.

A Prayer after Confession.

O Most loving Father, I return thee all possible thanks for having admitted me to this sacrament; letting thy mercy take place of thy justice, thou hast cast all my sins out of thy sight. Grant me now thy grace, O Lord, that my offences being remitted, by a sincere and perfect contrition like that of David and Peter, I may for ever continue faithful in thy service. But this must be done by thy divine assistance: for without the aid of thy grace my soul will remain barren, hard, and dry, like earth without water. I am truly sensible of my own weakness and inability to perform the least good action that can any ways be acceptable to thee: the only comfort and confidence I have is to look up to my Redeemer, and to offer thee, my God, his tears and sufferings, that thy justice being satisfied by this oblation, thou mayest open

to me the gates of mercy, and receive me again into thy favour. Look on me, O meek and merciful Lord, with the eyes of pity, and have compassion on my miseries: strike my stony heart, that a fountain of healing waters, the waters of true contrition, may issue therefrom, wherewith my soul may be cleansed and purified. Perfect the work thou hast begun in me, for I am thy creature, and grant that my confession may find acceptance in thy sight, and that whatever is wanting thereto thro' my natural weakness, may be supplied by thy goodness and mercy, which I earnestly implore, for the pardon of all my sins, firmly purposing in thy presence to avoid in future all that is displeasing to thee, and diligently apply myself to the practice of virtue. Since thou hast promised, O Lord, never to forsake those that place their trust in thee, permit me no longer to be seized, and blindly carried away by the vanities of this life: permit me no more to experience my own weakness in my wonted relapses, but grant I may now be effectually

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converted from my evil ways, forsake my errors, and amend my failings. Command, O Sovereign Lord, my rebellious heart, and force it to a compliance with thy holy will. Break all my passions, rule my affections, direct my desires, strengthen my good endeavours, and give ear to the prayer of thy unworthy servant. Let not my wickedness make me forget thy goodness: for though my sins call aloud for justice, yet thou hast, my Lord and my God, mercy, by which thou canst once more receive me into thy favour: who livest and reignest for ever. *Amen.*

A Prayer before Communion.

IT is with fear and trembling that I approach thy banquet, O Jesus, having nothing to trust in but thy goodness and mercy, being of myself a sinner, destitute of all virtue; defiled with many crimes; my thought and tongue in disorder, and under no controul. Thus straitened, O merciful God, the fountain of all goodness, I hasten to thee that I may be healed: I fly to thy protection, hoping thou

will be my Saviour, though I dare not stand before thee as my judge. To thee I lay open all my wounds: to thee I discover all my shame. The number and enormity of my sins are great, which makes me fear; but I hope in thy mercies, which are infinite. Look upon me, therefore, with the eyes of compassion, O Lord Jesus Christ, eternal King, God and man, who was crucified for the sins of men. Give ear to me, who place all my trust in thee; have mercy upon me, for I am full of misery and sin, thou fountain of inexhaustible goodness. Hail, saving Victim, which for me and all mankind wast offered on the cross! Hail generous and precious blood, flowing from the wounds of my crucified Lord, and washing away the sins of the world! Remember thy creature, O God, whom thou hast redeemed with thy blood, I am truly sorry for my offences, and desire to repent and amend. Take therefore away all my sins, and blot out all my iniquities, that being purified, I may worthily approach the

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Holy of holies; and grant that thy precious body and blood, which I, though unworthy, now design to receive, may procure for me the forgiveness of my sins; full discharge from the guilt of all my crimes; a victory over my evil thoughts; the beginning of a new life; the seed of good works, and a sure protection of soul and body against all the snares of my enemies, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

O God, be merciful to me a sinner, Jesus, Son of David, have mercy upon me.

Thou who sufferedst for me, have mercy upon me.

Lord I am not worthy thou shouldst enter under my roof; say but the word, and my soul shall be healed.

Prayers after Communion.

I Return thee thanks, O eternal Father, because out of thy pure mercy, without any desert of mine, thou hast been pleased to feed me with the sacred body and blood of thy only Son our Lord Jesus Christ.

Let not this holy communion, I beseech thee, be to my condemnation, but an effectual remission of all my sins. May it strengthen my faith; encourage me in all good; deliver me from my vicious customs; remove all concupiscence; perfect me in charity, patience, humility, obedience, and in all other virtues. May it secure me against all the snares of my enemies, visible and invisible. May it prudently moderate my inclinations, both carnal and spiritual. May it closely unite me to thee, the only true God, and happily settle me in unchangeable bliss. And I now make it my earnest request, that thou wilt one day admit me, though an unworthy sinner, as a guest at thy divine banquet, where thou, with thy Son, and the Holy Ghost, art the true light, eternal fullness, everlasting joy, and perfect happiness of all the saints: thro' the same Jesus Christ our Lord.

I Will love thee, O my Lord, my strength: the Lord is my support, my refuge, and my deliverer.

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How good is the God of Israel, to those that are of an upright heart.

Praise the Lord, because he is good and his mercy endureth for ever.

Praise ye the Lord, all ye nations, praise him all ye people.

Because his mercy is confirmed upon us, and the truth of the Lord remaineth for ever.

Even as the thirsty stag longeth for the fountains of waters, so doth my soul long for thee, O my God.

It is good for me to adhere to the Lord, and to place my hope in the Lord God.

For what is there for me in heaven, and what would I have upon earth besides thee?

My soul magnifieth the Lord, and my spirit rejoiceth in God my Saviour.

Whence am I thus favoured, that my Lord should come to visit me!

name, bless them with the like suc-
cess, that all these poor souls may be
brought to know, love, and serve thee

here in thy Church, and bless thee hereafter for all eternity.

Look down also with an eye of pity and compassion on all those deluded souls who, under the name of Christians, have wandered from the paths of truth and unity, and from the one fold of the one Shepherd, thy only Son Jesus Christ, into the bye-paths of error and schism. O bring them back to thee and to thy Church. Dispel their darkness by thy heavenly light; remove the veil from before their eyes, wherewith the common enemy has blindfolded them, and let them see how they have been misled by misapprehensions and misrepresentations. Remove the prejudices of their education, take away from them the spirit of obstinacy, pride, and self-conceit. Give them an humble and docile heart; inspire them with an ardent desire of finding out the truth, and a strong grace to enable them to embrace it, in spite of all opposition from the world, the flesh and the devil; for why should those creatures

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perish, for whom Christ died, or why should Satan any longer possess these souls, which, by their baptism, were dedicated to be thy eternal temple.

O Father of lights and God of all truth, purge the whole world from all errors, abuses, corruptions, and vices; Beat down the standard of Satan, and erect every where the standard of Christ. Abolish the reign of sin, and establish the kingdom of grace in all hearts. Let humility triumph over pride and ambition; charity over hatred, envy, and malice; purity and temperance over lust and excess; meekness over passion; and disinterestedness and poverty of spirit over covetousness and the love of this perishable world; in a word, let the gospel of Jesus Christ, both in its belief and practice, prevail throughout the whole universe.

Grant us thy peace, O Lord, in the days of our mortality, even that peace which thy Son bequeathed as a legacy to his disciples; a perpetual peace with thee; a perpetual peace with each other; and a perpetual

peace within ourselves. Grant that all Christian princes and states may love, cherish, and maintain an inviolable peace among themselves. Inspire them with a due sense of the dreadful evils that attend on wars, and with an everlasting horror of all that bloodshed, devastation and ruin of so many territories, the innumerable sacrileges, and the eternal loss of so many thousand souls, as are the dismal consequences of war. O turn their hearts to another kind of warfare—teach them to fight for a heavenly kingdom.

Remove, O Lord, thy wrath, which we have reason to apprehend is now actually hanging over our heads for our sins. Deliver all Christian people from the dreadful evil of mortal sin, and make all sinners sensible of their misery. Grant them the grace of a penitential spirit, and sincere conversion, and discharge them from all their bonds. Preserve all Christendom, and in particular *this nation*, from all the evils that threaten impenitent sinners, such as plagues,

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famine, earthquakes, fire, inundations, mortality of cattle, sudden and unprovided death, with thy many other judgments here, and eternal damnation hereafter. Comfort all that are under any affliction, sickness, or violence of pain. Support all that are under temptation. Reconcile all that are at variance. Deliver all that are in slavery or captivity. Defend all that are in danger. Grant relief to all in their respective necessities, and a happy passage to all that are in their agony. Grant thy blessing, O Lord, to our friends, our benefactors, and to all those for whom we are particularly bound to pray; and have mercy on all our enemies. Give eternal rest to the faithful departed, and bring us all to everlasting life: thro', &c. Amen.

Besides the above prayer, we may recite the Litanies, Penitential Psalms, Rosary, &c. or hear one or more Masses, or without any set form of words, pray mentally, taking care to direct our prayers with the intention of gaining the indulgence.

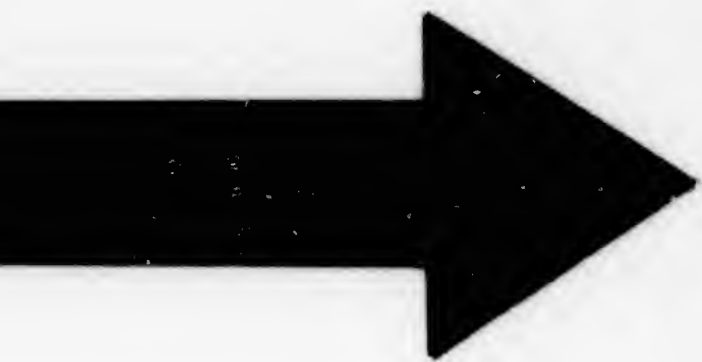

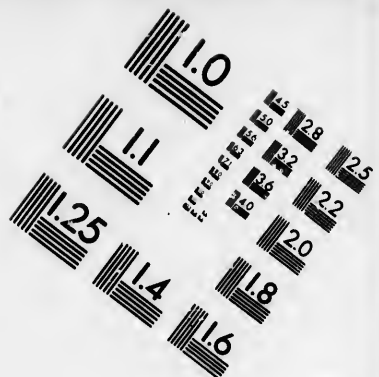
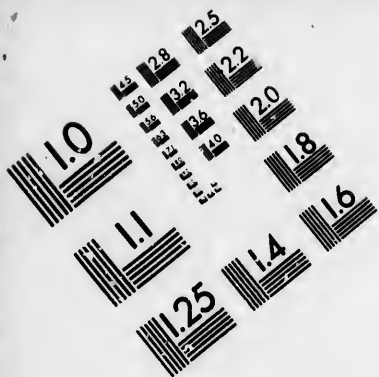

 constancy and fidelity, may firmly
 hope to obtain, by the particular pro-
 tection of the Blessed Virgin, Mother
 of God, such succours of divine grace
 as may raise them to the contemplati-
 on of heavenly things, and enable them
 to lead an uniform truly christian life,
 advancing from virtue to virtue, which
 will ensure to them the enjoyment of
 eternal happiness.

In fine, his Holiness wills that this
 grant be perpetual, without any other
 Brief, notwithstanding any thing to
 the contrary now in force.

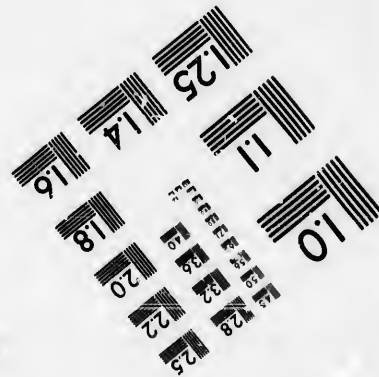
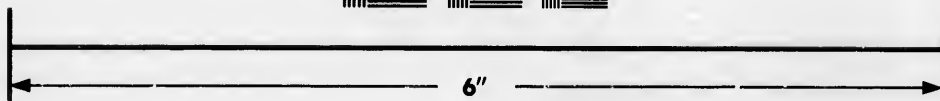
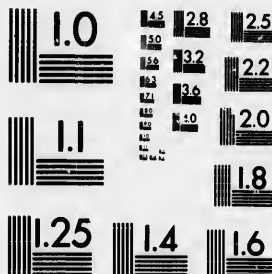

MEDITATIONS

On the Passion of our Saviour.

THE time drawing nigh, when our Lord Jesus would pass out of this life to his Father, having, as a most tender parent, settled his will, and bequeathed to his beloved disciples the most excellent legacy of his most sacred body and blood; having, I say, finished this work, and returned thanks to God the Father, he went out with his disciples to a garden on mount Olivet, wherein he was often used to retire with them to pray. As soon as he entered the garden, he began to fear and be sad, saying, "My soul is sorrowful even unto death."

Behold, O Christians, the unspeakable love of Jesus Christ! the joy of heaven is, for our innumerable sins, overwhelmed with sorrow, even to death. Ah! we have offended by our criminal pleasures, and Jesus vouch-

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saves to expiate them by torments. He took as much affliction and sorrow upon himself, as might balance the sins of the whole world. O my soul, and all you that love God, come, let us contemplate our dear Saviour in his agony. Let us consider how he hath borne our iniquities, and been afflicted for our sins. Let us not then be ungrateful to him, who hath suffered so much in accomplishing the work of our salvation, which, with the foresight of all those other torments he was shortly to suffer, was the cause of his shedding such torrents of blood in this excruciating agony.

Judas betrays Christ with a Kiss.

JESUS, knowing that Judas was approaching with a great multitude to apprehend him, with wonderful meekness goes forward to meet them. And forthwith Judas coming forward to Jesus, said, Hail, Rabbi, and kissed him. Jesus turns not his face away, whilst he demands the kiss of his sacred mouth, but meekly replies, *Friend, wherefore art thou come?* As if he should say, Have I deserved this

of thee, O Judas ! Have I offended thee by washing thy feet ? Friend, for what art thou come ? Such was the kindness of Christ towards the wretch that betrayed him.

After such an instance of boundless clemency, who dare despair of thy mercy, O Jesus ? If to a traitor thou hast been so friendly, what wilt thou be to those who sigh after thee, and desire to love thee with their whole hearts ? Let us learn then, from the example of Christ, not to seek revenge, but to behave ourselves with mildness towards those that injure us.

Christ is bound and led to Annas.

THE crafty high-priest Annas deceitfully questions Jesus concerning his disciples and his doctrine, in order that he might, out of his own words, lay hold of some occasion to condemn him. But the Searcher of Hearts, perceiving his fraudulent intentions, said nothing of his disciples ; but, as to that which concerned his doctrine, he prudently replied, " I have spoken openly to the world : I have always taught in the synagogue,

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where all the Jews do meet. Why dost thou ask me? Ask those who have heard what I have spoken to them. Behold these know what I have said." And when he had said these words, one of the servants, who stood by, gave Jesus a blow on the face, saying: "Dost thou answer the high-priest so?" Jesus received the blow with unexampled mildness, and said, "If I have spoken evil, give testimony of the evil; but if well, why dost thou strike me?"

O lovely Jesus, thou most meek Lamb of God, with what wonderful patience hast thou permitted thy beautiful face, the delight and admiration of angels, to be cruelly beaten by a vile slave? Let us, then, proud and impatient Christians, who are disturbed at every trifling word or contradiction, make our suffering Saviour the pattern of our lives. Let us learn of him, for he is meek and humble of heart. Let us contemplate him throughout his passion, and we shall not discover him once moved with indignation against his enemies.

but, on the contrary, returning their insults with sweetness in every word and action.

Christ is sent to Caiphaz.

ANNAS sent Jesus bound to Caiphaz, who was high-priest for that year, at whose house the chief priests, scribes, and ancients of the Jews, were assembled for the purpose of contriving how to deliver Christ up to death. This wicked high-priest having heard the false witnesses which were suborned against him, yet could find no cause of death in our Lord. Mortified at this disappointment, and being in a great fury, he said unto Jesus, I adjure thee, by the living God, that thou tell us if thou beest Christ the Son of God? Our Saviour hearing the invocation of God's holy name, thro' reverence to his Father, answered, "Thou hast said it: nevertheless I say unto you, hereafter ye shall see the Son of Man sitting on the right-hand of the power of God, and coming in the clouds of heaven." Then the high-priest rent his garments, saying, He hath blasphemed:

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what need we any more witnesses? Then the standers by cried out, He is guilty of death. And falling upon him, they instantly gave vent to all their malice against him. One spit on him: a second buffeted him on the face: this pulled him down; the other dragged him by the hair of his beard and head: verifying what the prophet had said in his person, "I have given my cheeks to those that tear them, I have not turned away my face from those that rebuked and spit upon me."

*Christ is led from Caiphas to Pilate,
who sent him bound to Herod.*

EARLY the next morning the Jews assembled together, and leading Jesus into their council, examined him over again; and putting a malicious construction upon his words, when they had heard him say, He was the Son of God, they exclaimed, We have heard him blaspheme. Then they led him bound to Pilate, that he might be condemned to death. After Pilate had heard the false accusations of the Jews, as soon as he understood that he was a Galilean, he sent him

bound to Herod, who then ruled in Gallilee, and he hearing much of the miracles of Christ, was curious to see him, hoping that he would work one in his presence. But Jesus, seeing that curiosity and vanity were the motives of his desires, thought him unworthy either of a word, or of a miracle. Herod being thus disappointed, in derision cloathed him with a white and motley garment, and with indignation sent him back to Pilate.

Thus has Christ our Lord permitted himself to be dragged from judge to judge : thus does he suffer in all places, and from all persons, affronts and persecutions : thus did he become, as the prophet foretold, the reproach of men, and the outcast of the people. But let us consider for whom does he suffer : for man, lost sinful man. Let us reflect on the object of his sufferings : love ! The love and desire of our eternal salvation obliged him to assume our nature ; and by his sufferings and death make satisfaction for the sins of the whole world.

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Herod sends Christ back again to Pilate. He is scourged at the Pillar, and crowned with Thorns.

THE Jews having brought Christ back to Pilate, renewed their accusations against him, in order to put him to death; but Pilate seeing that envy and malice alone had transported the Jews, and finding no cause of death in Jesus, he tried all means to deliver him out of their hands. For this purpose he took advantage of the custom of setting a prisoner free at the feast of the passover, in hopes of liberating Jesus, but the Jews were rather for liberating Barabbas, a thief and a murderer. In fine, with a view to content them, without putting Jesus to death, he caused him to be scourged, then left him to his soldiers, who put a crown of thorns on his head, covered him with an old purple cloak, and, in derision, put a reed into his hand instead of a sceptre: in this manner they saluted him king, buffeting him, and spitting in his face.

Come now, O Christian souls, and with doleful hearts behold your

spouse Jesus Christ, the glory of heaven, bound to a pillar, and delivered up to whips and scourges, in the hands of his merciless executioners. See with what a barbarous liberty they wound and torture his delicate and tender body with stripes. Consider what excessive torments our dear Redeemer must have suffered when that thorny crown was pressed on his sacred head. Behold, you that love Jesus, how your beloved is afflicted. We have sinned, but Christ has suffered the punishment. We have followed the lusts of the flesh, and Christ hath delivered up his body and blood for the expiation of our sins.

Christ condemned and crucified.

PILATE caused Christ to appear before the Jews in a purple garment, with a crown of thorns on his head, saying: *Behold the man.* But they, far from taking compassion on him, vociferously demanded to have him crucified, threatening Pilate with the emperor's displeasure, if he suffered a man to live who styled himself king. Pilate at length complied with

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their demands ; but, washing his hands, protested he was innocent of his death. The Jews made answer : " Let his blood fall upon us, and upon our children." Jesus, bearing his cross, was then led to a place near Jerusalem, called *Golgotha*, or *Calvary*, and there, having his hands and feet pierced with gross nails, was crucified between two thieves. Gall and vinegar were given him to quench his thirst, as had been foretold by David and Isaiah : and when the prophecies concerning his sufferings were fulfilled, he said, *All is finished*, and gave up the Ghost.

Behold, then, dear Christians, how our Lord hath shewed us, as in a glass or mirror, the form and pattern of Christian perfection. Whoever, therefore, aspires to a truly virtuous life, it is necessary they take up their cross, and, with Christ, die to their vices : die to their passions : die to their lusts : die to self-love, self-will, and to all things but him. Harken to St. Paul : " I am fastened with Christ to the cross. I live now, not

I, but Christ liveth in me. The world is crucified to me, and I to the world."

Let us, therefore, with the same apostle, know nothing but Jesus Christ, and him crucified. But, alas! how little do we imitate his example! How imperfectly do we copy this divine model! How peevish in sickness! How anxious after remedies! How indulgent to our passions! How solicitous in the concerns of this short life! How eager in our pursuits after perishable riches! how vain and proud, in cloathing and decorating our persons! How much concern for what is temporary and transitory, how regardless of our spiritual and eternal good! Approach, then, O Christians, to Christ Jesus, hanging on the cross! Are we sinners? we have here a propitiation for sin. Our nature, before infected by the poison of the serpent, is now healed by the balsam of our Lord's precious blood, and rendered lively and fruitful by the infusion and sanctification of the Holy Ghost. Do our sins oppress us, let us go with con-

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fidence to our crucified Redeemer :
detest our crimes ; repent of our faults ;
bemoan our sins ; and with an humble
and contrite heart implore his mercy,
saying from the bottom of our souls,
O Jesus, be to us a Saviour. Let not
thy precious blood shed with so much
love, be spilt for us in vain. Thine
we are, and to thee we have recourse.
Thou hast purchased us ; thou hast
redeemed us. Hide us within thy
wounds, wash us in the laver of thy
blood, and be merciful to us poor
miserable sinners. By persevering thus
at the foot of the cross we may con-
fidently rely on it, that our graci-
ous Lord is not only willing and
ready to seal our pardon, but over-
joyed when we ask him forgiveness.
Do we desire to become true lovers
of God ? Behold our Saviour, the
fountain of all goodness, nailed to the
cross for the love of us. Behold his
loving arms extended to embrace us ;
see his head inclined to seal our par-
don with the kiss of peace. Attend
how his heart languishes and pants

with love. O what arguments, what demonstrations are these of his boundless love towards us ! What blandishments, what allurements, what irresistible attractions do they afford us of love towards him ! Let us, like industrious bees, go from flower to flower, growing on mount Calvary, from wound to wound, from mystery to mystery, exhibited on the cross, from whence we may plentifully collect the honey of love. Let us henceforth desist from murmurings, complaints, and discouragements, at whatever want or miseries may hereafter befall us : seeing the King of glory, the Son of Justice, he who adorns the skies, and beautifies the heavens, the Lord of lords, the mirror of purity, became poor, naked, forlorn, and lifeless for our instruction. Let us then immediately abandon the pleasures, contemn the honours and fooleries of this short uncertain world, and aspire to that bliss promised by the words and shining in the life of our divine Saviour ; " Blessed are the poor

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in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

A short Prayer in honour of our Saviour's Passion.

O Most sweet Lord! my Redeemer Jesus Christ, who was sent down by thy heavenly Father, and of thy own accord didst suffer the most cruel and bitter pains of the cross, by first carrying it on thy blessed shoulders, and afterwards dying thereon; that thou mightest not only purchase redemption for us, but also leave us a most perfect example of patience: thro' all thy sufferance, and the effusions of thy precious blood, I, a miserable sinner, humbly beseech thy infinite Majesty to deliver me from the dangers of this life, and from everlasting death. *Amen.*

Reflections on Death.

DEATH will quickly overtake us; and therefore it behoves us to be on our guard. To-day a man is living, and to-morrow he disappears; and being once out of sight, he is also quickly out of mind. Our bodies will soon become the food of

worms ; and why then should we pamper them ? The hour will soon come, wherein we must take a long farewell of all things in this life ; why then do we set our affections so much on them ? We must bid adieu to wife, husband, children, friends, plentiful estates, and take our flight into another country, where all we set such a value on here will appear as vanity. Many die suddenly. Let us do our utmost, therefore, now whilst we have time to accumulate together eternal riches in heaven. Let us labour to live in such a manner, that at the hour of death we may rather have cause to rejoice than fear. Let us learn betimes how to die to the world, that we may hereafter live with Christ. Let us endeavour to contemn all earthly things, that our souls may be thought worthy to meet with no obstacle in their flight to our Lord and Saviour after death. Let us examine ourselves betimes, and be very careful in avoiding sin, the only evil which makes death terrible. Let us place death always before our

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eyes, and be as circumpect over all our thoughts, words, and actions, as if we knew them to be the last of our lives. "Remember, man, thou art but dust, and to dust thou must return."

AFTERNOON ENTERTAINMENTS.

Reflections on the Love of God.

WE are indispensably obliged to love God above all things: it is our duty to love him more than friends, company, riches, pleasures, or even our very selves: *What shall separate me from the love of God?* (says the apostle.) *Shall tribulation, distress, or famine? Shall danger, persecution, or the sword? Neither life nor death, nor any thing, shall diminish the love I bear to Jesus Christ.* Rom. viii. Are we of this resolute disposition? Can we say it, since we have known the weakest temptation of the devil, the basest suggestions of the flesh, the vilest pleasures of a vain world, gain upon our hearts, and wholly separate them from the love of God?

Without the love of God, our words are dead. Do we believe in Jesus Christ? Do we cheerfully relieve the poor? Have we courage to deliver our bodies up to the flames? St. Paul assures us all this avails nothing without the love of God. Do we affect regularity in our lives? Do we pray, or undertake voluntary mortifications? We are still nothing without the love of God.

Let us therefore love him with our whole hearts. "Love," says St. Augustine, "and do what thou wilt." Nothing is hard to him that truly loves; the saints found it so by experience; for, though their torments were in themselves cruel, love transformed them into roses; though their hair shirts were mortifying, love dissolved them into pleasures; though their passions were rebellious, love made them the instruments of their future glory.

Examine yourselves, and see if the love of God has the command of your thoughts; see if it directs your daily actions; implore this grace in fervent prayer, saying often, in the lan-

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guage of the Church, "Come, Holy Ghost, replenish our hearts, and enkindle in them the fire of thy love."

On the Marks of the Love of God.

WE often say we love God, and are, alas! as often mistaken: there is scarcely a day passes over our heads, wherein we do not frequently cry out, *O Lord, I love thee*; whilst at the same time our affections to sin, our indulged passions, our cherished imperfections, and almost our daily actions, give the lie to our words.

To love God truly, we must love him above all things: is our love of him such? Do not the things of this world stand in competition with it? Are we prepared to lose all things, rather than his love? The love of God is disinterested: it seeks not itself, but what belongs to God. Such must be our love: we must love him because he is infinitely good in himself. The love of God is active: it not only lies burning in the breast, but breaks forth, and appears in all the

actions of the lover. Does our love do so? Are our thoughts sweetened with love? Do our words breathe forth love? Are our actions embellished with love?

The love of God is undaunted: it regards not what the world can say: no affections to creatures is capable of shaking it: it fears not the malicious suggestions of Satan: it bids defiance to the alluring charms of the flesh: it dreads not the scandalous reproaches of the envious, nor even death itself. Is our love so victorious? The love of God is patient, humble, chaste, resigned: alas! we cannot say ours is such, since the least contradiction puts us in a ferment, since the smallest disappointment renders us so impatient, since we magnify ourselves upon every occasion, and pamper our bodies so delicately in diet and apparel.

Examine yourselves, and resolve to dispel whatever may overcloud your love of God. When you find it accompanied with these marks, you may

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assure yourselves it cannot be counterfeit. Divide not your hearts between God and the world; look upon the saints, there you will see they loved God with their whole heart.
