OTTAWA, May 4 .- (Special. - A day of suspense as to the decision which would be reached by Sir Wilfrid Laurler regarding the parliamentary session while he is in England at the imperial conference and the coronation ended late this evening, when it was announced that the premier had final-ly made up his mind that the house will be adjourned for two months, from Tuesday, May 23, to Tuesday, July 18, Sir Wilfrid will sall for England May

At 10.30 to-night Sir Wilfrid Laurier visited R. L. Borden in his office in the parliament buildings. He remained with the opposition leader for about 20 minutes, and informed him that he had definitely accepted one of the sug gestions which Mr. Borden made in the house last week. The premier will make the announce-ment of the adjournment of the house to a caucus of the Liberal members. which has been called for to-morrow morning. It is learned that this action of the premier will be very unpopular with the rank and file of his party, for the reason that they had hoped for a

prorogation. There is also discontent amongst the cabinet ministers, because of the effect which the decision of the first minister will have upon their re-putations in the country. Indeed, so seriously does this appeal to the min-isters that a cabinet meeting held this morning discussed this phase of the question so keenly that only the fact that parliament was to open at 3 o'clock caused the meeting to break up few minutes before that hour.

# United States About To Follow the "Lure of Gold and Call of Adventure."

WASHINGTON, May 4 .- Mr. Frecht of Pennsylvania, in the course of the debate in the house on the free list bill tc-day, predicted an early invasion of Mexico, saying an army officer had told him that the army was going over the Mexican border "to stay."

"I would not think that the president would object," said Mr. Frecht. "We have been absorbing everything they did nct want in Europe for years and years. We have taken as trade in stock what nobody wanted in the Philippines-another white man's burden. We added a little more down here in the West Indies. Why couldn't we occupy something that is worth something, and where we could be of some great good to somebody?

"I am not a soldier of fortune. I do not expect to be at the head of the army, but I believe this will be a mighty interesting question before the house adjourns."



Important Change Contemplated in Railway Act-Government Could Sell Out the Road if it Became Dilapidated and Put it in Safe. Condition.

OTTAWA, May 4 .- (Special) .- Hon. Mr. Graham, minister of railways, explained to the commons to-day the provisions of his bill to amend the railway act.

The most important and radical hange contemplated is one which provides that when a railway becomes delapidated and unsafe for traffic, the government subsidy given that railway can be regarded as a lien on the road, coming in even before a first mortgage, and the government can sell out the company under this provision and put the read in safe traffic condition. Mr. Graham explained that . this provision might seldom, if ever, be exercised, but it was well to have some provision whereby the government could compel an unsafe road to put its right of way and rolling stock in proper condition. To Mr. Northrup Mr. Graham explained that this provision would be retroactive and include all roads which had received government subsidies in the past, as well as all still to receive subsidies.

On the street railway system of Glasgow a distance of a little over half a mile costs one cent, while for two cents a passenger can travel about two and a third miles. Some time ago an experiment was made in the way of issuing tickets, enabling passengers to travel two-cent stages for one cent and a half. In order to avoid the necessity of conductors carrving farthings passengers paid three cents for the original ticket, which they retained and could present in payment of a second two-cent stage journey on any part of the system. As the fares are based on the twocentestage the experiment was made temporarily in order to ascertain what effect it would have on the returns. The manager, Mr. James Dalrymple,
