and Delaware. Washington, Aug, 16.—Staff.Capt. Blanche Cox of the Salvation Army has entered upon a new style of work to be conducted by the "Woman's Cavalry Brigade." The members of the brigade, seven in all, will make a two months' trip through Mary-land, the Virginias and Delaware in a coach, provided with all the necessary ac-cessories to the Army peculiar to their style of meetings. They will stop first at Washington Grove, where they will meet Mr. and Mrs. Booth-Tucker, the new commander of the Army in the United States, who will conduct the meeting to-morrow and dedicate the coach. A trip of more than 1000 miles has been planned, to core citles and towns where the Army has not been planted.
