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
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WHAT MCKENZIE and MANN WILL GET IF THE YUKON DEAL GOES THROUGH.

LEGISLATING FOR KLONDIKE

British Columbia Will Build a Connecting Link of Railroad,

In Order to Have an All-Canadian Line-

Arrivals at Vancouver From Dawson City-Near Steamer Leave for the Klondike-Keen for Montreal Average Ten Per Day.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 11.—The British Columbia Legislature has opened today in the new Parliament Buildings.

In the speech from the throne the Government pledge themselves to introduce a measure to assist in providing an all-Canadian route to the Yukon and to secure the construction of a railway from Victoria to the mining camps at Kootenay. The House adjourned until Monday.

THE RUSH FROM MONTREAL.

Over Seventy Left Yesterday, Some of Whom Were from Maine.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—The Klondike rush from here is setting in in good shape. Over 70 left today for the West bound for the gold fields.

Although the press in England has sounded a warning as to the dangers of the journey and the possibility of failure for many, it appears that the lure is paid to anything in the shape of a detour, and that in all the large towns the spring is waited for impatiently. A feature of the craze is that men in excellent positions are giving up their chances for the possibilities of the Klondike.

Notes From Dawson City.

Vancouver, Feb. 11.—There are seven arrivals from Dawson. The latest, W. Kenney, left on Jan. 12. Dawson is now deserted, all the miners being at work on their claims.

A report reached Juneau just before the Topeka left that five men were frozen to death on the summit of Chilkoot, but no names are obtainable.

Ed. Fay, the murderer of McGrath and Rowan, is lodged in Sitka Jail for the North-to-night. They were the City of Seattle and the Cleveland. The Seattle had 585 passengers. She had to absolutely decline to take up 240 dogs for the Pierre Hummer party.
