





But such a document would hardly produce much impression in court. Our laws do not permit people to assist others to commit suicide. Neither do they allow one person to murder another on securing the victim's consent.

If Dr. Barney had shot and killed Miss King he would not have found it a good defence to produce a certificate stating that Miss King had consented to be shot. Nor will he find such a document any more effective in the case of murder by tubercle bacilli.

BRITISH PROTECT INDIANS.
