IS NOT ENOUGH FICTION

Investigation Committee of Hamilton Library Finds Charge is Well Founded.

THE POLICE MAKE A CLEAN-UP

Several Arrests Made on "The Bowers"—Grocers' Excursion to Niagara Falls To-Day.

Hamilton, July 15.—A special meeting of the Library Board was held this afternoon to receive the report of Lyman Lee and Rev. Dr. Lytle, who with Mr. J. O'Reilly, now on his way to Europe, were appointed a committee to inquire into complaints made regarding the management of the library.

The committee dealt with only two charges, namely, the staff is inadequate and the supply of fiction is nearly large enough to meet the demand. The former was dismissed and the latter admitted.

The report was adopted, the board deciding to deal with the other complaints later on.

Dr. Wolverson, a new member of the board, expressed himself as against the liberal purchase of novels, and said he was in favor of cutting down the amount spent for fiction.

Rev. Dr. Lytle took occasion to deny a verbal insinuation which he said had been made to him that he used his position on the board to procure costly works on theology. He said he was nominated for the position by the Ministerial Association (now defunct), and he had done his duty faithfully.

In connection with the library matter it is reported that a private lending library, which opened a branch here a few months ago, has doubled its business in the past sixty days.

SOLDIERS HAD A GOOD TIME

Much Pleasure Placed at Disposal of Coronation Contingent.

Offsetting any claims that the Canadian coronation contingent was not royally treated in England, Mr. H. B. Manley, who was in the Old Land with the soldiers, last night, about the World reporter, but of invitations which had been extended to some of the members of the contingent.

After the reception to the colonials at Alexandra Palace, the chairman and vice-chairman of the contingent, earnestly expressing their regret that, owing to the immense crowds present, the visitors were put to great personal inconvenience, if not indignity, and they explain in extenuation that the trustees did not expect any such large gathering.

The apology was cheerfully accepted by the colonials, who were gratified that their presence should have proved such an attraction as to bring out such an enormous crowd of people to welcome them to the Mother Country.

As a further evidence of the respect with which they were received, the soldiers were appreciated, our men in uniform were admitted free to the Aquarium, the British Museum, Crystal Palace, Eton College, Ears Court, the Egyptian Hall, Madame Tussaud's Wax Works, the Royal Mint, the National Gallery, Royal Mews, St. Paul's, Tate Gallery, Tower, Wallace Collection, Westminster Abbey, Zoological Gardens, Woolwich Arsenal, Windsor Castle and numerous other places.

They were also guests at the cricket matches at the Oval and at Lord's, and at the race meeting at Alexandra Park and other places, while they were special rates on railways, trains, boats and vehicles.

In the face of all this, a uniformed visitor should have had a good time.

The statement of the returned soldiers of the coronation contingent that they were treated well is borne out by a letter just received in the city.

Men are served in the palace and are the best meals I have ever had in a camp."

THE CABINET CHANGES.

The selection of a British Premier in days gone by was a matter of little practical concern to the people of Canada. Changes in the cabinet were wont to be discussed in a purely academic way. To-day, however, the personnel of the Imperial Cabinet is a matter in which Canada, as well as the other colonies, has a direct, practical interest. The Canadian press is giving unusual attention to the changes that have just taken place in the British Cabinet, and the air is full of speculation as to what effect these changes will have on Imperialism generally and on the relationship between the Mother Country and the colonies in particular.

At this distance from the scene it is difficult to critically discuss the situation in detail, but certain broad facts very readily present themselves. It is significant that the change occurs just when the representatives of the Mother Country and the colonies are in session, and when matters of great Imperial concern are under discussion. The Lord Salisbury's resignation has, for some time been expected, there are other incidental circumstances which would indicate that the conference of the colonial Premiers precipitating the changes. Lord Salisbury's voluntary resignation is a matter of less significance than Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's forced retirement. It surely is significant of something that so ardent a supporter of free trade as the ex-Chancellor of the Exchequer should be a person not gratified by the establishment of the retirement of Sir Michael Hicks-Beach. The natural sequence of the differences on the trade issue which have been known to exist for some time past in the cabinet. Sir Michael stands out in opposition to all and any tariff concessions in favor of the colonies, and, judging from remarks made by him during the progress of the corn-tax debate, he certainly could not remain in any cabinet which manipulated that tax in a way to give the colonies any special treatment in the British market. As long as he remained in the cabinet we might take it for granted that the abolition of the corn-tax in favor of the colonies was not to be expected. Now that he has retired, we may reasonably conclude that the cabinet has an open mind on the question, if, indeed, it has not definitely accepted the proposal to abolish the tax on colonial corn.

NEW ONTARIO AT THE FAIR.

The Region to Make a Big Exhibit of Cereals and Grasses.

New Ontario will make a special and large exhibit of the products of the region at the forthcoming Exhibition in Toronto. The West Algona Agricultural Society will offer prizes for the best collection of native and home-grown grasses made by any resident of New Ontario. Prizes will also be given for the best bundle of grain, spring wheat, fall wheat, rye, barley or oats. Other prizes will be given for the best collection of bundles of these cereals. The awards will be made in Port Arthur on Aug. 29, and then all the exhibits will be boxed and shipped to Toronto. Both the Canadian Northern and Canadian Pacific Railways have agreed to carry exhibits to Port Arthur free of charge. In the last two years Messrs. Robert and John McKenzie of Oliver, Saskatchewan, exhibited grasses to the number of 150 varieties. In the circular announcing these prizes will be given, Mr. R. A. Burleigh, government agent for New Ontario, Port Arthur, states that "the object sought to be obtained by this exhibition of grain from abroad, that this section of the country is pre-eminently a grass-growing country, and that the exhibits will be given to the raising of stock of all kinds and carrying on the best developed into a dairying and mixed farming section."

The Port Arthur Board of Trade has also passed a resolution favoring the exhibition of a large exhibit of the resources of the region at the approaching Fair in this city.

SIX ARE MISSING.

Robchester, July 15.—Up to noon to-day absolutely nothing had been heard of the two boys, Charles Haas and George Ledwith, who left Summerville Sunday morning in a canoe for a sail on Lake Ontario. Four other disappearances have been reported to-day from Charlotte, Ontario. One, a boy named Fred, aged 15, went out on the lake for a row Friday night and has not been seen since. John Anderson, a colored boy, is also missing.

JUMPED FROM BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

New York, July 15.—James McBride, a laborer, who had been out of employment for some time, jumped from the Brooklyn Bridge to-day. He was rescued from the water by a tugboat, and taken to a hospital, where it was said he would probably recover.

LORD DUNDONALD SAILS.

London, July 15.—Major-General Lord Dundonald, who commanded the ground cavalry brigade at the relief of Ladysmith, Natal, sailed to-day from Liverpool on board the steamer Lake Champlain, in order to take over the command of the Canadian militia.

WIRELESS MESSAGES OVERLAND.

London, July 15.—Marconi, who is on board the Italian flag-ship Carlo Alberto at Constantinople, has cabled to London office that he has received wireless signals from the Cornwall station, about 100 miles distant, party overland. Complete messages were received so far as "Denmark, about 500 miles from Cornwall."

ONE KILLED, FOUR INJURED.

New York, July 15.—One man was killed and four others were seriously injured in a collision between a trolley car and a carriage in which the men were riding at Central Park, N. Y., early to-day. The trolley car, which was carrying a large number of passengers, was struck by a carriage driven by a woman. The injured were taken to a hospital, where it was said they would probably recover.

ANORA ASSAULT CASE.

The case in which Richard Torpey is charged with assaulting James Whyte, bar-tender at the "Anora" hotel at Aurora, will be heard by Magistrate Love at Aurora at 10 o'clock this morning. An information arising out of the same facts had been issued by Magistrate Woodcock at Newmarket, charging Torpey with assault with intent to kill, but this case will probably be dropped in view of the action taken by Magistrate Love.

DEADLY FAMILY FEUD.

Flat River, Mo., July 15.—As a result of the well-known Dooley-Harris feud Frank Harris shot and killed William Dooley last night near Lough, Mo. Dooley was the brother of Harris' brother, on a train at Flat River last Wednesday. Each family has a grievance against the other, and the women have been further roused by the fact that the men have been taking up the fight.

BIG GROCERS' COMBINE.

Chicago, July 15.—A combination of wholesale grocers has been effected by Chicago capitalists. The new company, known as the "Chicago Grocers' Combine," has a capital of \$5,000,000, of which \$3,000,000 has already been subscribed. Harold L. Smith is president of the corporation.
