In looking back on another year, the same lights and shadows that checker all the past are again seen. Our Father has brought forth no strange providences for our portion. The joys and sorrows of which all are partakers have come and gone at His bidding; the darkness as well as the brightness, the burden as well as the strength, the mourning as well as the music; therefore the great question for each of us is:—What use have I made of them? Have they brought me into closer fellowship with Him? Have they led me to lean more absolutely on His strong arm? to follow more unfalteringly the leading of His loving eye?

During the year, 31 Baptisms and 15 Burials have been registered, and after the annual revision there remains 518 names on the Communion Roll. Though the epidemic of smallpox has been raging in the city, we have cause to thank God that our only connection with it, as a congregation, has been in our endeavors to help those who were afflicted—inasmuch as no one belonging to the Church has been stricken by the disease. The heartiness with which you responded to the appeals for help was most gratifying.

Last year I referred to some hopeful signs of a deepening interest in spiritual things, and I urged you to cry to Him who knows all our needs, "Visit this vine." It becomes us, therefore, to record with thankfulness, the answer to our prayers, in the good work of grace that has been done among us, and which is still in progress. Many

Christians have been stirred up to bless God, through the visit of Mr. Moody, and not a few have been gathered in to the gospel feast. Let us pray that the good work may deepen and spread.

The various activities of the Church have been carried on as before, and there is nothing noteworthy to chronicle which is not referred to in the several reports. By perusing the report of our City Missionary you will get a better idea of the work he does, and I trust you will thus be led to have a deeper and more definite interest therein. Those of you who have read the report of the City Missionary employed by the Montreal Presbytery, will see how closely the two correspond. The work is of precisely the same kind, and we hope the day is not far distant when there may be many more labourers in this necessitous field.

Let us pass into the future with chastened and disciplined hearts, looking to God for that grace we need, as the Israelites for the manna—" just for the day."

> Lord for to-morrow and its needs I do not pray; Keep me, my God, from stain of sin— Just for to-day.

Let me both diligently work

And duly pray; Let me be kind in word and deed— Just for to-day.

Let me be slow to do my will, Prompt to obey;

Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1885.

It again becomes the duty of the Deacons' Court, at the beginning of another year, to present to the Congregation a brief statement of its affairs, and in doing so would desire to acknowledge God's continued goodness to us throughout the year that has just closed.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The new scheme of raising by weekly offerings, in envelopes, all the monies required for missionary and

benevolent objects, as well as the preaching of the word among ourselves, came into operation in January last, and the result has been most gratifying. The large number of contributors (375) testifies to the hearty support which it has received at your hands; and the conscientious regularity with which the several amounts promised have been paid, is specially worthy of notice. The hope is here expressed, that the names of every one in the Congregation, old and young, may appear as contributors during the present year.

The sum raised in this way, amounts in all to \$9,872.26, of which \$8,82..31 was received in envelopes, and the balance, \$1,090.95, represents the open plate Collections, making the weekly average \$189.85.

PEW RENTS.

The amount received on account of Pew Rents was \$4,579.18. It was thought that the new scheme might affect their collection, but instead of such being the case, the sum received is \$322.64 in excess of the previous year.

BUILDING FUND.

The payments on account of this Fund amounted during the year to \$4,657.00, which with balance at credit as per last Report, make a total of \$5,118.94. This amount, with the sum of \$1,597.95 from Weekly Offering account, and an amount temporarily available, enabled the Treasurer to reduce the debt by \$8,500. Our present position is as follows:—

With the adoption of the Envelope scheme, the Missionary and Benevolent Society ceased to exist; it therefore comes within the province of the Deacons' Court to allocate add

Supplementary to the above must also be added the sum of \$523.95 being amount contributed at the Pastor's Bible Class on Wednesday evenings, which sum is to be entirely devoted to Foreign Missions.

While contributing to other Missionary and benevolent objects, the needy ones amongst ourselves have not been neglected, \$473.56 having been disbursed in aid of the poor members of the Congregation.

LADIES' VISITING AND AID SOCIETY.

The members of this Society have, as usual, been diligent in good works, and have expended the sum of \$78.43 in assisting with clothing, &c, those connected with us, as well as in rendering aid to the Nazareth Street Mission, and French Evangelization work. In lieu of taking part in the Bazaar in aid of the building fund of the Hervey Institute, they raised by collection the sum of \$38.50, which was paid over to the Treasurer of that Institution.

In addition to the usual work of the Society, they arranged early in October, for the sending regularly every fortnight supplies to the Protestant small-pox hospitals, and testify to the cheerfulness with which all who were asked contributed for this purpose.

PEW REPORT.

The letting of Pews and Sittings is still in the hands of Mr. R. N. McCallum, 1305 St. Catherine Street, where the seat book and plans of the Church are kept, and where application can be made at any time by those desirous of obtaining seat accomodation. ANNUAL REPORT.

Montreal, 15th January, 1886.

As customary at this season the Teachers present to the Congregation a brief report in relation to the affairs of the School, for the past year.

OUR STATISTICS are as follows:

These figures, compared with the previous year, show but little change. Our average attendance has not been so large as it should have been, caused chiefly we believe by the recent epidemic. We take this opportunity of acknowledging God's goodness to us in this connection. Notwithstanding the very many young people who were taken away by this scourge, none of our scholars were even afflicted by it. Our School has considerably increased within the last three months, the average attendance for that period being 174. Within a short time changes have been made in several classes, a number of new Teachers have joined us, and the School is now fully equipped and in a very satisfactory condition.

BIBLE CLASSES.

These classes for young women and young men continue under the care of Mrs. Mackay and Mr. Bain We regret that owing to family affliction Mrs. Mackay has not been able for some time past to be with her class. We trust that she may soon resume her good work.

MISSIONS.

Notwithstanding the decrease in our average attendance we have much cause for thankfulness at the continued interest shown in Missions as manifested by the contributions for the year, which are as follows:

In this connection the "little ones" have again done nobly, having contributed \$94.07 of this amount. The sum now reported will be allocated as usual at this meeting.

LIBRARY.

We have recently made an addition of 50 volumes to the library, and this will be shortly supplemented by as many more. With these additions, all of which have been or will be, carefully examined by a committee of teachers, our school will possess a very complete and attractive library.

PAPERS.

The "British Workman," "Children's Friend," "Child's Own Magazine," and "Infant's Magazine," have been supplied to the scholars during the year.

PIC-NIC.

Our Annual Pic-nic was held on 20th June last at St. Rose. The teachers were much gratified at the interest shown by the friends of the school on that occasion.

REWARDS.

A change has been made in this connection, in the substitution of a written examination on the lessons, chiefly on those of the last quarter, instead of a recital of the Shorter Catechism, as heretofore. About 20 members of the school took part in this exercise, and the results of the examination will be presently announced. The usual prizes for diligence in Missions will also be distributed this evening.

MEETINGS.

Regular business meetings have been held during the year, also the meeting for prayer at the close of each Sabbath's work.

We would bespeak a continued interest in the prayers of the friends of the school that our labors may be blessed, and many of our young people gathered into the fold of the "Good Shepherd."

EXTRACTS FROM THE

Report of the City Missionary.

Our Mission Building is situated in the heart of one of the most densely populated districts of the city. The majority of the families belong to the respectable working class, and a large proportion of them are Roman Catholics Our business is to search out individuals and families and children, not attending any stated place of worship, and to encourage their attendance at the means of grace.

Our work is almost exclusively confined to Protestants; because Roman Catholics are less accessible, and our lapsed Protestants furnish ample scope for our undivided attention. The majority of those we visit are Presbyterian, or at least claim to be so, a few are Episcopal, one or two Methodist, and occasionally individual cases have been met with, lapsed through drink, or so mixed up by intermarriage as to claim no religious connection whatever,

We seldom meet with scepticism or avowed infidelity, liquor, indifference and improvidence are the principal evils with which we have to contend.

In the Nazareth Street School Room, in addition to the Sabbath School we have Singing Meetings, Band of Hope Meetings, and Mothers' Meetings, these latter being conducted by the ladies of our Presbyterian Missionary Society, and a trained nurse and Bible woman, supported by them, for city Mission Work. At these meetings, clothing is provided, goods are cut and shaped and supplied on easy terms at less than cost, books, tracts and other gifts are occasionally provided, hymns are sung, and Scripture read. Mothers are visited at their houses, and in cases of domestic sickness, are attended by the nurse, medical aid being also provided when necessary. Lines to the Hospital are granted, needful cases are recommended to the respective National Societies, and any removed to the Hospital are waited on by your Missionary.

All these services and gifts, and much more which cannot be tabulated or detailed, are quietly and freely offered to our neglected brethren and sisters in our Mission Districts.

One feature of our work deserves to be emphasized, that is visitation, which must be perseveringly prosecuted if our work is to prove successful. Many of those with whom we deal, have never been accustomed to go up to the House of God, much less to rejoice when they are invited. These must be waited on again and again, if they are ever to be brought under the sound of the gospel. We must carry the gospel of love to them in our pockets, hands, hearts, lives, on our lips and in our faces, if we would become successful fishers of men. We must sympathize with them in their sorrows, share in their joys and merit their respect, till they become attached to us and the Saviour whom we seek to commend. Here particularly, we need more help, instead of work for a few, this is a work in which many could engage with profit and delight. True, some may think it hard work, and it does tax time and strength, but the results thus achieved are beyond calculation. Some may think it unsafe, but in thousands of calls in Griffintown district, your missionary has suffered no evil, and scarcely any incivility. Our poorer working people are very hearty if courteously treated, and will gladly welcome any Christian visitor, at any hour.

As regards the appreciation of our work, it may not be out of place to say that voluntary collections at the close of the Sabbath and Thursday evening meetings have been received at the rate of forty dollars per annum. This amount may seem small, but it is contributed with the greatest goodwill.

As regards results, in several families, where drink and carelessness were prominent a year or two ago, an organ or piano has appeared, and the general tone of life has been much elevated. Attendance on a suffering, dying mother brought the other members of the family to our Meetings. Attention to an aged person at her home and in the Hospital, guided her path to the Saviour, and her end was peace, while the goodwill and attendance of several of the neighboring families were secured. Time fails to record similar facts. Good has been, and is being accomplished, and we hope for still greater manifestations of God's blessing.

Besides having a good Library, the scholars are well supplied with religious periodicals and tracts, which are greatly appreciated by them.

Prizes will be distributed at this meeting for the correct recitation of the Shorter Catechism and the Golden Texts for the past year, besides a silver medal and books will be given to those who have been most diligent in bringing in new scholars.

The singing class has met as usual on Tuesday evenings for the practice of hymns, led by Mr. Alex. Hyde, and the Misses Dawson and Norval.

We have increased our collections for Missions this year by \$25.77. The sum collected last year was \$132.75, whereas this year it amounts to \$158.52, and is allocated as follows:

The number of scholars on the roll is 39, with an average attendance of 20; teachers 7, with an average attendance of 5.

Our District was visited in March, April and May with measles, and we had one case of smallpox, from all of which God in his goodness saw fit to restore to health again.

In June last we had our Annual Pic-nic, and as our numbers are small we joined with the Longue Pointe School. We intended sailing down the river to "Leslie's Island," but the boat did not arrive in time, so we adjourned to Mr. Matthew Jeffrey's grove, where a very pleasant and enjoyable day was spent.

On Friday evening, 6th of November, a harvest and thanksgiving service was held. The room was appropriately decorated. The services were conducted by the Rev. A. B. Mackay, assisted by the choir of Crescent Street Church. A very liberal collection was taken up in aid of the Montreal General Hospital.

The Rev. A. B. Mackay also holds a monthly service during the Autumn and Winter months on every moonlight Thursday evening; the meeting commences at 7.30 o'clock.

Since November last we have also been provided with a Sabbath evening service, in connection with the Methodist Home Mission Board. This meeting commences at 7 o'clock.

The Young People of the neighbourhood have also reorganized their Mutual Improvement Society, which we are happy to state was never in a more flourishing condition.

The first meeting for the season 1885-86 was held Monday, October 5th, somewhat earlier than usual, that the aid given to Nazareth Street Mission Sabbath School might be more opportune.

On account of existing arrangements in taking up Church subscriptions, it was unnecessary to appoint collectors. A grant of \$76 was received through Church Treasurer, from the Deacon's Court, to carry on this work. Seven cases connected with the Congregation were attended to, including families and individuals, and \$20 sent to Nazareth Street School.

A donation of ready made clothing, and of material, was given to French Evangelization work, under the care of the Montreal Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society.

The members of the Ladies' Aid were asked to take part in the Harvey Institute Bazaar, which was held last December, in order to reduce the debt on their building fund. It was thought more advisable to take up a collection for this object, and the sum of \$3850 was handed to the Treasurer of that Institution, for which thanks have been received from the Committee, through their Corresponding Secretary.

In addition to the usual work, special arrangements were made early in October for sending supplies regularly to the Protestant Small-Pox Hospital every Saturday fortnight. This work has been carried on vigorously and systematically, and all asked to contribute have done so with cheerfulness. A piece of cotton was also purchased and made into garments by different members of the Congregation, for the poor of this Hospital.

We have to acknowledge a parcel of new clothing from Mrs. Redpath, and a subscription from Mrs. Wyatt, that came in too late for last report.

- THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is dispensed on the second Sabbath of March, first Sabbath of June, third Sabbath of September, and second Sabbath of December.
- THE STATED MONTHLY MEETING OF THE DEACONS' COURT is held on the first Monday of each month, and the monthly meeting of the Session immediately thereafter.
- THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION holds its meetings fortnightly during the winter season.
- THE LADIES' VISITING AND AID SOCIETY meets once a week during the working season. All the Ladies of the Church are members of this Society.
