KELLY STARTED THE FIGHT THAT ENDED IN HIS DEATH

Skull Fractured, But He Had No Medical Aid—Smith Brothers Sent For Trial.

BARRIE, June 30.—(Special.)—While Wm. and James Smith of Floss Township were to-day committed by a magistrate to stand trial for the murder of Michael Kelly, this charge will be reduced to manslaughter. The brothers were locked up in Barrie jail to-night, but they will be released when they provide bail of \$250 each, which they provided. The same amount by three other sureties. Crown Attorney Cotter appeared for the crown and W. J. Boys of Barrie for the defendants. Coroner McLinton of Elmville conducted the inquest, which resulted in a verdict of death "by blow or blows administered by Wm. or James Smith, or both."

Kelly died from a fractured skull, he having been struck across the ear, and the fracture extending around the skull. He had not had medical treatment. His wife had assisted him into the house, when he had fallen to the floor. He had asked if his head was cut and then relapsed into unconsciousness. His wife dressed his wound and put him to bed where he seemed to be sleeping. His sister had come in about 9.30 and had thought, with her, that sleep was the best thing for him. At 2 o'clock he had awakened, but died without speaking. The nearest doctor was seven miles away.

Mrs. Kelly, who gave her evidence with no sign of distress, declared that her husband had been at the back door when the Smiths drove up the road about 5.30 Sunday night. Kelly went to the front carrying a stake, and she heard him say "Do you want me out on the road?" To avoid seeing the trouble, she went to the back of the house, heard scuffling, and saw Wm. Smith hit Kelly, and James

SMITH KICKED KELLY TWICE IN RETURNING TO THE HOUSE

Joe Martin, a neighbor of Kelly, had been lying under a tree about twenty rods from Kelly's house when the Smiths drove along. He thought he heard Kelly say, "Do you want me out on the road?" At this time the buggy was still moving along. Then Kelly, with a club in his hand, stepped towards the horse and either caught it or stopped it by standing in front. He thought he heard James Smith say something, and Kelly angrily replied, "If you want your cow, I put her in the pound." Then James rejoined, "Why did not you tell me the cow was in the pound, and not have me hunting for it?" If Kelly replied, he did not hear it, but he saw Kelly strike a pose at William Smith in the buggy, whereupon the Smiths started to get out. Kelly again struck at William, who made to run away, but in doing so his foot caught in the lines. James then clinched with Kelly, who had dropped his club, and yelled for William to come back and "soak" Kelly with the stick. William picked up the club, which was about four feet long and two inches thick, and slashed Kelly two or three times over the head, and at the same time James kicked him in the ribs.

LEAVE GRANTED TO TAKE CASE TO FOOT OF THRONE

Twelve Judges Against Two So Far Have Decided For Powsassan Lumber Company.

A cable was received in the city yesterday announcing that the privy council had granted special leave to appeal from the judgment of the supreme court of Canada in the case of McClellan v. Powsassan Lumber Co. In this case 12 judges have decided against the plaintiff, and two, Mr. Justice Mabee and the trial judge, in her favor.

The plaintiff and the defendant own water privileges on the South River at the grist mill and the sawmill. The grist mill and the sawmill are situated on the road from the grist mill to the highway and the flume from the dam to the grist mill are on the defendant's land and the sawmill are on the plaintiff's land. The defendant had placed piles of lumber across the road and prevented its use. The title of the land are under the Land Titles Act, and this act was taken from the Imperial Land Transfer Act.

The plaintiff brought action, which was tried at North Bay before Mr. Justice Teasel about two years ago, and the right of the road was established and judgment found against the defendant. The defendant appealed and the case came on before the chancellor, Mr. Justice McLaren, and Mr. Justice Mabee. Counsel for the defendant raised the technical objection that also plaintiff had been entitled to the road, it had been lost because the grist mill and the sawmill at one time were owned by the same person. In his judgment the chancellor said there was on the land a well-defined road from the highway to the grist mill, and it was well defined before the issue of the patent, but this right of way ceased to exist and become extinguished in law because of the unity of ownership of both grist mill and sawmill in the same person.

McLaren, J., agreed with the chancellor.

NEW CHURCH FOR BONAR

Cost of Site, \$5000, Nearly All Pledged by Presbyterians.

At a meeting of the congregation of Bonar Presbyterian Church, the building committee reported that the cost of the new site on St. Clarens-avenue amounting to \$5000, was nearly all provided for. The new church will seat 1000 people.

The salary of the pastor, Rev. Mr. MacGillivray, was increased to \$2000.

Change in Ferry Service.
Owing to the accident to the steamer John Hanlan, the Toronto Ferry Co. is compelled to take the Laella off the Lakeside Home route to-day. This, however, will not interfere much with the convenience of those who wish to visit the children's hospital. At the wharf at Hanlan's Point there will be a launch waiting for those who leave Bay-street on the boats leaving at 1 o'clock, 2, 3, 4, 4.45 and 5.30. All that will be necessary will be to transfer from the larger boat to the launch.

JEWISH WEDDING

Happy Event Celebrated in S.O.E. Hall Last Night.

A pretty wedding was celebrated Tuesday night in the Sons of England Hall, when Miss Sara Griesman, sister of H. Griesman of 72 Chestnut, was united in marriage to N. Caplan, plumber of 81 Agnes-street. The ceremony was performed by Rabbi Halpern and Levi in the presence of 200 guests. After the wedding breakfast, the guests participated in an enjoyable dance, the music being furnished by Zuzans Caplan of New York, brother of the groom and Louis Rottenburg of Toronto.

Saw Meteor Fall.
SHELburne, Ont., June 30.—H. E. Ebel of Listowel states that while driving in the Township of Mulmur yesterday afternoon a large meteor fell within a distance of half a mile. He describes it as a large ball of fire, probably two feet in diameter, with a tail of five or six feet, also of fire.

PELLATT RAMS FERRY HANLAN CUT IN TWAINE

Huge Ironclad Out of Control Making Berth in Bay Street Slip.

The little steamer John Hanlan, owned and operated by the Toronto Ferry Company between the city wharf and Centre Island, was rammed yesterday morning by the steamer H. M. Pellatt of the Ocean & Lakes Navigation Company's fleet at the Bay-street slip, and now lies on her starboard side on the bottom in about 12 feet of water.

The accident happened at 5.30 o'clock while the Hanlan was tied up at the slip. No persons were on board the Hanlan and no personal injuries resulted from the mishap.

Directors of the Ferry Company residing in Buffalo will arrive in the city to-day and a meeting will be held between the two steamship companies concerned and the insurers of the Pellatt with a view to settling the damage.

The John Hanlan was built at Port Dalhousie eighteen years ago and was the most entirely rebuilt last spring. She was said to be worth about \$7500.

DR. POLLARD ON BAIL

Court of Appeal Quashes Conviction by Trial Court.
