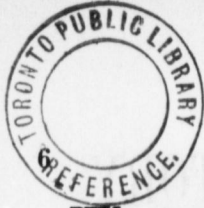

THE INDIAN TRIBES OF CANADA.

THE O-JIB-WA, or OD-JIB-WAY, (plural, ODJIBWAIG,) occupied the shores of Lake Superior, and included the Mis-sis-sa-gas, who occupied the area at the mouth of a river called by their name, lying between Point Tessalon and La Cloche, on the north shore of Lake Huron. The Ojibways and Mississagas are both called, by different writers, Chippeways. Remnants of the Ojibways are now settled at Alnwick, Rice Lake, Sarnia, and Lakes Simcoe and Couchiching.

THE IROQUOIS, or "SIX NATIONS," embraced the following tribes: the Mohawks, Oneidas, Onondagas, Cayugas, Senecas, and Tuscaroras. As a confederacy, they were the faithful allies of the English crown from the earliest colonial times until the close of the American Revolution. The Mohawks, Cayugas and Onondagas removed to Canada in 1784, and settled at Brantford, on the Grand River, where they received a grant from the crown of 160,000 acres along both sides of the river, to its mouth; at Tyendenaga, on the Bay of Quinté, and on the Thames. They originally descended the river Ottawa, were vanquished by the Adirondacks, were compelled to fly, and, entering the Oswego River, scattered themselves in separate bands throughout the present State of New York. These nations afterwards formed a league under the title of Ho-de-no-sau-nee, or "People of the Long House." This House extended from the river Hudson to the great lakes. The Mohawks guarded the eastern end, the Senecas the western. This league suggested the union of the thirteen colonies, afterwards eventuating into the political compact of the United States. The confederacy is supposed to have been formed in 1540, and was successfully maintained for upwards of two hundred years. By the Adirondacks, or Algonquins, (called by the Iroquois, in derision, "bark eaters," their Indian name, O-dis-qua-gume, signifying "People at the end of the Water,") they were known as the Mingoës; by the Ojibways, Nod-a-wa, "Adder Enemy;" by the French, "Iroquois," (from the Indian approbatory term, "Yoe Hugh!") and by the English "The Six Nations."

THE ALGONQUINS, or AD-I-RON-DACKS, occupied the banks of the St. Lawrence at the close of the fifteenth century. They are supposed to have been at the head of a great northern confederacy similar to that of the Six Nations. In later times they were the allies of the

Wyandots, or Hurons, in their wars against the Iroquois. The tribes of the Algonquin group were, the Montagnais, the Saguenay, (Saguenay mountaineers,) the Tétés de boule, (the Bull-heads of the St. Maurice,) the Ottawas, the Ojibwas, or Chippewas, of Lakes Superior and Winnipeg, (Sauteaux of the French,) the Mashkegous, of Nelson River, and the Crees of the Saskatchewan. The Algonquins, in arts and other attainments, excelled the Iroquois.

THE OTTAWAS, OR UT-A-WAS.—The hunting-ground of this tribe was the territory in the neighbourhood of Michillimackinac and Detroit. They are chiefly noted for their union, under their chief, Pontiac, with the Ojibwas, Sacs, Senecas, Pottawattimies, and other tribes, in 1763. The capture of Michillimackinac, by the Ojibwas and Sacs, under a chief of the Ojibwas, named Minavavana, when almost all the garrison was massacred, forms one of the most thrilling episodes in our Indian wars. Remnants of this tribe are now settled on the Manitoulin Islands, in Lake Huron.

THE PETUN, OR TI-ON-NON-TO-TES, occupied the peninsula lying between Georgian Bay and Lake Huron. Routed by the Iroquois, they fled in 1650 to Missouri.

COUNTY OF SIMCOE.

Few counties in Upper Canada possess greater natural advantages with respect to geographical position, means of internal communication, general fertility of soil, and value of productions, salubrity of climate, and beauty of scenery, than that of Simcoe; and, it may be added without presumption, that in industry and enterprise its inhabitants, almost entirely emigrants from various parts of the three kingdoms, will vie with those of any other county in the province. The statistics of crime speak very favourably for the morals of the population. The common schools are flourishing and sufficiently numerous for the wants of the rising generation. There are several grammar schools where the rudiments of all the higher branches are taught. This county has the honor of being the first to grant money for railroad purposes, and was the first to reap the advantages to be derived from the construction of these most useful works. The establishment of the Northern Railroad, running from Toronto to Collingwood, gave a rise to landed property almost beyond conception, and the stimulus to business generally was very great. The effect of this influx of prosperity upon the agriculture of the county was very striking. Freed from the pressure of contracted means the farmer has had more spirit, as well as more leisure, to turn his attention to the science of agriculture.

In fine, throughout every branch of trade and agriculture, industry, intelligence, and enterprise are the characteristic features, and a pleasing tone of hearty British feeling, with a sturdy independence of thought and action, pervades all classes within its boundaries.

GEOGRAPHICAL POSITION.

The County of Simcoe commences about 30 miles directly north of Toronto, and extends from thence in a northerly direction to the

Georgian Bay. Its extreme length being about 60 miles. The Georgian Bay bounds it upon the north; the Muskoka Lake, Lake Couchiching, Lake Simcoe, and the Holland River, on the east; the Counties of York and Peel on the south; and the County of Grey on the West.

It is divided into two Ridings, the North and the South. The latter consists of the townships of West Gwillimbury, Tecumseth, Adjala, Mono, Mulmur, Tossorontio, Essa and Innisfil. The North Riding is composed of the townships of Nottawasaga, Sunnidale, Vespra, Oro, Orillia (North and South), Medonte, Flos, Tiny, Tay, Matchedash, Morrison, and Muskoka.

A short glance at the map will be sufficient to point out the immense natural advantages which are afforded to the county by its geographical position, and a very slight consideration will show the extent to which they may be made available for the development of its own resources, as well as those of the Province at large and of the vast regions of the West.

Lake Simcoe, which for its extent, may in some respects be, without partiality, considered the finest sheet of water in Canada, forms, with its beautiful little outlet, Lake Couchiching and the river Severn, a source of attraction of great benefit to the county. The shores in many places rise to a considerable height, and are entirely free from swamp and beautifully wooded with birch, poplar, and evergreens of various kinds; the silvery bark of the former forming at all seasons a matchless contrast with the deep coloring of the latter. The water is very deep, clear, and transparent, and flowing over a hard bottom of sand and stones, never loses its sparkling brilliancy.

Several islands of various extent render the scenery of the eastern shore extremely picturesque, especially about the Narrows, by which the waters of Lake Simcoe empty into Lake Couchiching, and from thence by the Severn into Lake Huron. Lake Couchiching extends due north from the Narrows for about ten miles. It varies in width from one to four miles, and is studded with numerous well wooded islands of all shapes and sizes, which, with its high sloping shores, render it extremely rich in that quiet though picturesque beauty so peculiar to Canadian waters.

The principal rivers in this county are the Nottawasaga and the Severn: the former rising to the south of the county, and flowing

through the townships of Tecumseth, Essa, Vespra, Flos, and Sunnidale into Nottawasaga Bay. The Severn connects Lake Simcoe with Lake Huron, emptying into the eastern extremity of the great Georgian Bay. It is interrupted by several falls and rapids, all exceedingly beautiful, as well as capable of being easily turned to account for manufacturing purposes. The land through which it passes is very rugged and broken, composed principally of ridges of granite, and is almost entirely uninhabited, being on the eastern shore only partially surveyed. The Nottawasaga, with the exception of two or three rapids, is navigable for a long distance. It has considerable water power, and has abundance of valuable timber on its banks. The Holland River, emptying into Cook's Bay, at the southern extremity of Lake Simcoe, is one of its principal feeders. It is a sluggish stream flowing through an immense tamarack swamp for many miles, and is navigable for large vessels for a considerable distance. There are several other streams of considerable size, all affording more or less water power, but of no importance in other respects.

HISTORY.

To a County so recently settled as this, none of those shining recollections belong which give an undying interest to some few spots in the Province, and there is but little to mention beyond such facts as for statistical purposes may be worth recording. During the war military communication was maintained with the Upper Lakes by a route leading from Toronto, (then York) by Yonge Street, to Lake Simcoe, and across the water to where Barrie now stands. From there a short portage led to the Nottawasaga river, at the mouth of which a small fort was built, the remains of which may be still seen. From this spot a short coasting voyage led to Penetanguishene, a beautiful harbor on the Georgian Bay, where a naval and military station was established. Soon afterwards, to facilitate communication, a road was opened leading directly from the landing on the north shore of Lake Simcoe to Penetanguishene, and subsequently this road was met by one leading round the west side of the Lake from Holland Landing.

The discovery and exploration of this portion of Canada took place in the year 1615. Samuel de Champlain, Governor of Canada, was probably the first white man who ever sailed over the deep waters of the Georgian Bay. Having, between 1603 and 1607, explored the St. Lawrence as far as Three Rivers, and discovered and explored Lake Champlain in 1609, and having already founded Quebec (3rd July, 1608), he bethought him of a great western exploring tour in the above-mentioned year, 1615. He ascended the Ottawa, and reached Lake Nipissing by the portage, and descended the French River to its mouth. His expedition was not altogether a peaceful one. He was in league with the Algonquins, Hurons, Ojibways and Eries, and virtually at war with the Iroquois, and all their English and Indian allies. He had several encounters with the Iroquois. He found the Hurons in possession of the northern and eastern coasts and the Islands of the Lake, having been driven thither with great slaughter by the victorious Iroquois half a century before. We have no trace of the inhabitants on the shores of the Georgian Bay anterior to the Hurons and the Petuns. The latter occupied the Saugeen Peninsula, but were driven out by the "Six Nations" in 1650, and fled to Missouri. The Huron tradition is that they came down from the North, and spread themselves on the shores of the Upper Lakes before the discovery of America, about 1450.

From the time of Champlain, Georgian Bay was little visited except by traders and Indians. Jesuit missionaries early established themselves on its shores. As early as the year of Champlain's first visit, a Recollet Father preached to the Indians at Matchedash Bay. In fact, Champlain brought Jesuit missionaries with him, who could either preach or fight, as occasion seemed to require. More than a century ago, a flourishing mission existed on the largest of the group now known as the Christian Islands. Some small stone ruins of their buildings are still visible. The mission was ruined by the victorious and implacable Iroquois, then in the height of their power, and it is said some of the converts were tortured to death; whence the Hurons, and their friends the Ojibways, have ever since called the group "THE CHRISTIANS' ISLANDS." Shortly before the breaking out of the American Revolution, when Sir William Johnston was virtual Dictator among the Indians of North America, a Grand Council was called; and as all the tribes were then at peace, delegates came from

all quarters. Among others, a deputation came down Georgian Bay from the North Shores, landed at Cape Rich, struck across to Christian Islands, ascended the Severn River, crossed Lake Simcoe, descended probably the Trent, crossed the foot of Lake Ontario, and ascended the Oswego River to the place of meeting, among the lakes of New York. During the war of 1812, a small naval depot was established at Penetanguishene, on the eastern shores of Georgian Bay. In 1817, Lieut. (afterwards Admiral) Bayfield, having already assisted Capt. Owen for two years in the exploration of the lakes, became an Admiralty Surveyor, and was appointed to the survey of Erie and Huron, including Georgian Bay. He spent six years in this work, and the accuracy of his charts is a theme of wonder and congratulation to the present day to all navigators.

As is generally the case, emigrants from the different parts of the three kingdoms settled together in bodies on their first arrival, according to their several nationalities; and as, on their friends and acquaintances coming out, they naturally joined those who had formerly been their neighbours, the various country people are still found living together as they had done in their native land. Thus, in the Townships of West Gwillimbury, Tecumseth, Mono, Essa, and Innisfil, the population is principally composed of Protestants from the North of Ireland. The Township of Adjala is chiefly inhabited by Roman Catholic Irish, large settlements of whom are also to be found in the Townships of Vespra, Flos and Medonte. Natives of the island of Islay form a majority in a large portion of the Township of Oro, in which there is also a large settlement of English. The Township of Nottawasaga is almost entirely settled by Highlanders. Irish form by far the largest portion of the population; the Scotch rank next in numbers, and English last.

In the year 1843 the County of Simcoe was set apart for judicial and municipal purposes, being then styled the District of Simcoe. The usual officers were appointed, and a Gaol and Court-house erected. By the Representation Act of 1853, the County was divided into two Ridings, as already described. Each Riding returns one member to Parliament.

In 1850 Mr. Capreol set on foot a scheme for the construction of a railroad from Toronto to Lake Huron, *via* Lake Simcoe, which, after much opposition and considerable modification, was successfully car-

ried into effect, and the work finally completed in the year 1854. To forward the undertaking, the County of Simcoe took stock to the amount of £50,000.

In 1855 the "Louisiana," the pioneer steamer of the Chicago line, arrived at Collingwood. The line consisted at first of four large side-wheel steamers. Afterwards a line of propellers was established; but for three or four years past the company have ceased to subsidize or employ steamers at a loss, and the communication with Chicago has been mainly kept up by large schooners, which come down with cereals and take back timber.

In the year 1859 an institution was established called the Upper Canada Reformatory, the site of which is a healthy location three miles from the village of Penetanguishene. The building now occupied was originally used as the military barracks, but a new and imposing structure of granite and limestone is now nearly completed, which will embrace all the necessary accommodation suitable for the youth who may be so fortunate or unfortunate as to be confined within its limits. The building, which is in the form of a **L** is of four stories, with a handsome cupola, the whole height 88 feet: the front, when completed, will be 404 feet. The dormitories, which are already in use, are 110 x 50 feet, well ventilated, and containing 120 cells in each. The dining hall and churches are large and airy, and there is ample space for washing and bathing rooms. Mr. Peter Scot, the Superintendent of Works, expects to complete the building this present year. The institution received a grant from government on its first establishment of 200 acres for farming purposes, and a further grant is shortly expected. From the kindness of Wm. M. Kelly, Esq., the Warden of the Reformatory, we have been able to record the following facts. The boys, of whom there are about 150 at present, averaging from ten to twenty years of age, are employed in various occupations: such as shoemaking, carpentering, tailoring, blacksmithing, coopering, and farming, according to their capabilities, each branch of trade having a separate overseer. They rise at half-past five o'clock, muster at six, one hour for school and devotion, breakfast at seven, work till a quarter to twelve, dinner at twelve, recreation until one o'clock; work till four, school till a quarter to six, supper at six, then retire to their separate cells, where they are allowed books and other innocent amusements until bed-time, which is eight o'clock.

They all have the benefit of military drill, and the astonishing perfection to which they have attained is creditable both to themselves and their officers. They are visited daily by both Episcopal and Roman Catholic pastors, according to their respective religions, the reverend gentlemen also acting as teachers. The discipline of the institution is maintained by ten keepers, exclusive of other officials, and it is seldom that corporeal punishment is resorted to. The moral, physical, religious and educational training of the boys is most carefully attended to; and were it not for the confinement, one would almost imagine themselves in a modern boarding-school or college. The food, which includes meat twice a day, is good and plentiful; the boys look well and lively, and it is pleasing to note that there has been but one death since the institution was established.

SOIL.

Although generally fertile, the principal characteristics of the soil of this county is the great irregularity of its composition, especially in the northern riding. The soil most available for cultivation, and which forms the principal part of the land of the county, is a rich loam, considerably varying in the proportions of sand and clay of which it is composed, as well as the depth to which it extends. The subsoil is generally clay, with a substratum of clay and gravel. The land generally is much interspersed with patches of cedar swamps and black ash swales, greatly varying in extent, with a few tamarack swamps.

Beech, maple, and basswood are the most numerous varieties of hardwood; elm, ash, butternut and red oak are also to be found—the latter on light sandy soil, and mixed with scrubby pine; hemlock is very abundant, and is generally found in rich black loam. Cedar abounds in most localities, and grows to a large size. White oak is not generally abundant, but what is found is of the very best quality. Pine of a first-rate quality exists in large quantities in every township; it is generally found scattered over hardwood land, and when it grows in clumps is generally of an inferior kind.

AGRICULTURE.

It would not be out of place to give, under this heading, extracts from the reports of the Agricultural Societies of North and South Simcoe.

EXTRACTS FROM THE REPORT OF NORTH SIMCOE.

In the North Riding of the County of Simcoe every variety of soil may be found, and in some localities every variety in the breadth of half a lot. Indeed, even within the precincts of the Town of Barrie, clay suitable for brick making, or sand fit for building, may be obtained in any quantity; and, singular as it may appear, better land cannot be found in the Province of Canada for farming purposes, or worse, than may be found within the limits of this Town. To take a more extended glance at the soil of this Riding we may refer to Notawasaga, as the extreme west, a township always famed for wheat and other grain, while Matchedash, the opposite extremity of the Riding, is almost useless for farming purposes. Good and bad land will be found in all parts; and, allowing four qualities of soil, the North Riding of the County of Simcoe may be considered to stand in the second class.

The northern position of the Riding may be considered by many as a great disadvantage, and consequently objectionable. Be it so, nevertheless it has its advantages, for while the more southern districts have neither waggoning nor sleighing, the settlers in the north have usually from three to four months good travelling on the snow; and when the rigor of winter is past, the snow disappears as if by magic, and the soil is ready for the hand of the husbandman, without frost; the consequence is, spring work is commenced by the farmer in the north, nearly as soon as those settled in the more southern districts. Very extensive tracts of this Riding are high and dry, and the subsoil is of such a quality that water cannot be obtained by digging; but, notwithstanding this, the land will produce an excellent quality of grain and roots.

With respect to the value of land, it would be difficult to give a report that would be truly reliable from actual sales; for instance, a settler, through misfortune or otherwise, over which perhaps he has

no control, is obliged to sell; and the purchaser knowing this, obtains the property for less than its actual value. On the other hand, a person arrives from some part of the United Kingdom enquiring for land, and has plenty of cash. Soon a person is found willing to sell: the price asked the stranger looks upon as merely an acknowledgement, and a bargain is made at once, and the property in all probability is purchased at more than its actual value. Another consideration should never be lost sight of, that is, locality. A farm situated within a mile or two of a good market is worth much more than a farm from twelve to twenty miles distant.

EXTRACT FROM THE REPORT OF SOUTH SIMCOE.

The district of South Simcoe, taking it altogether, is well adapted and favorably situated for agricultural purposes. The general character of the soil is a strong loamy clay, and well adapted for the growth of all kinds of white and green crops, particularly fall and spring wheat. There are some swamps or marshes to be met with here and there through the county, most of which supply quantities of cedar that is considered almost indispensable for fencing purposes. The face of the South Riding is in general sloping, or what is commonly called rolling.

Dwelling-houses and farm buildings are generally of wood, but in the old townships substantial brick houses and good frame barns and outbuildings are rapidly supplanting the original log edifices. Much improvement may be noticed in the arrangement of the barns and buildings for stock of all kinds. Rails are at present the almost universal material for fences. Board fencing is generally used about gardens and houses.

The establishment of County and Township Agricultural Societies has done much to promote farming interests. The County Society was first established in the year 1837, and its operations have gone on steadily ever since. The following are the officers for the North Riding, together with the various Township Societies:—

MANUFACTURES.

Probably no county in Upper Canada possesses more water privileges than Simcoe ; but we must note the fact that by far the larger portion of it is unemployed. The attention of the manufacturer and the capitalist is requested, in the following pages, to the many openings for profitable enterprise in the various townships and villages of the county.

There are but few iron manufactories and foundries in Simcoe. The establishment carried on by Mr. Butterfield, of Bradford, and Mr. McBean, of Bell Ewart, being the only two worth mentioning. Saw mills are numerous, especially in the townships of West Gwillimbury, Innisfil, and Vespra. Some of these, on the line of the railroad, are very extensive, and an immense amount of lumber, as well as square timber, is annually exported. Grist mills are plentiful, and merchant flour for export is becoming an important branch of manufacture, There are several extensive tanneries in the county, the most important of which are located in Bradford, Mono Mills, and Orangeville. Woollen manufacture is also carried on extensively, and several new mills are being erected for the carrying on of that business, together with fulling and carding.

One of the most important articles of manufacture, we are happy to state, has lately engrossed the attention of the farmer. We refer to flax, which has been sown in larger quantities the last season than in any previous year. A mill is being erected in Bradford by a responsible company for its manufacture, the requisite machinery is already bought, and we have no doubt, that with such a market, the

Passengers from Orillia to Muskoka Lake, with its beautiful and romantic Falls, will take the steamer "*Fairy*," which runs daily during the summer, touching at the Indian village of Rama, McPherson's Landing, and terminating at the Severn, from which place stages are taken to Muskoka Bay, where connection is made with the "*Wenonah*" for the Lake and Falls.

There is also a stage to Beaverton and Muskoka Falls from Orillia, semi-weekly. John Harvie, proprietor.

A stage also runs daily between Orillia and Barre, 26 miles, during the winter. John Harvie, proprietor.

Passengers by the Northern Railway, at Collingwood connect with Stages to Durham, County of Grey. Chas. Cameron, stage proprietor.

There is one Common School in the village, and the religion of the village is represented by the Presbyterian and Methodist denominations. Daily mail. Population about 300.

BALLYCROY—A flourishing post village, situated on lot 1, 6th concession of the Township of Adjala, 40 miles from Barrie, and 22 miles distant from the nearest railway station. It is surrounded by an excellent farming country, and a great portion of the land in the neighborhood is rolling and heavily wooded. This village was first settled about the year 1850 by Samuel Beatty, William Beatty, and others. The post office was established in 1859, Peter Small being the first postmaster. There are good facilities for manufacturing in the neighborhood. There is now in operation a fine wool-carding and cloth-dressing mill, and an extensive saw mill. The school house, section No. 2, is located here. The County Division Court, No. 8, hold their meetings in the village, and the L.O.L., No. 125, meet at their regular times. Population, about 100.

BARRIE.—The county seat of Simcoe is comparatively a new town, and it is not necessary to refer very far back into the past, for the "oldest inhabitant" has not yet by virtue of his residence become very venerable; in fact, a short time previous to the year 1832 a squatter of the name of David Edgar took up his quarters in an old government store house that was situated near the present location of Meeking's Hotel. In 1832 Mr. John Bingham built the first log house, having been induced to settle here by Mr. William Mann, who was then living in a log house at Kempenfeldt. The next settlers were Capt. E. A. Walker, Mr. John McWatt, Mr. Caldwell, and others. Robert Ross laid out the village. The name so called after Commodore Barrie. In 1837 Barrie contained about twenty-eight families. In 1843 the County of Simcoe, until then part of the Home District, was declared a separate district, with Barrie for its district town. Since then it has advanced with slow but steady progress.

It was the original intention of Governor Simcoe to fix upon a point about two miles east of the present town as a site for a settlement, and the village of Kempenfeldt—so called in honor of the Admiral of that name (who was lost when the "Royal George" sunk in Portsmouth Harbor)—was accordingly laid out; but the superior advantages of the present location changed the intention.

As an evidence of its salubrity it may be stated that during the period of the cholera, in 1832-4, Barrie was exempt from its dreadful ravages, and has ever been free from epidemics of any kind. This may be accounted for by its situation on rising ground, and its proximity to the pure waters of the bay, and consequent uncontaminated atmosphere.

The appearance of Barrie is characteristic of its history. Everything about the place has a healthy look, and bears the appearance of solidity and permanence. The buildings are of a more substantial and regular description than those of most towns and villages of similar extent in Upper Canada. It is very pleasantly situated near the south-east corner of the Township of Vespra, at the head of Kempenfeldt Bay, with a southern front facing the bay, the ground rising gently from the waters' edge to the back part of the town, where it attains a considerable elevation above the level of the lake. It has a fine appearance from the opposite side of the bay, the rising ground bringing every part of the town distinctly

into view. Barrie is distant from Toronto 64 miles; from Collingwood, 31; and from Orillia, 27.

The Post Office was established about the year 1836, Mr. John McWatt being appointed first postmaster.

In the early part of 1853 an office of the Grand Trunk Telegraph was established.

In the year 1854 the Northern Railway was completed from Toronto to Collingwood, the nearest station to Barrie being Allendale, a distance of one mile. In 1865, however, a branch track was laid to Barrie, and a handsome and commodious station house built, with freight houses attached.

Barrie has a good number of very respectable buildings, public and private. Among the former may be mentioned the Churches, the Fire Hall, Gaol, and Court House. The Gaol is a beautifully constructed building of stone, but the Court House, a conspicuous red brick edifice of the *nondescript* order of architecture, is supposed to prove more useful than it is ornamental. The two cost the District nearly £9000.

There are several beautiful spots about Barrie, making favourite situations for private residences, several of which have already been taken advantage of. The Bay is about ten miles long and from one to two miles wide, beautifully wooded on the opposite shore, and affording a most picturesque view.

Barrie, during the last three or four years, has made unusual progress, its population numbering at the present time about 3000. In addition to its very important business in the way of transporting heavy timber and lumber to the home and other foreign markets, the country around Barrie is becoming favourably known as a profitable grain growing region, the land in the vicinity being, generally speaking, of an excellent quality, and suited to the production of all kinds of cereals.

The daily communication of Barrie with Collingwood, Toronto, and intermediate stations, and its being the centre of all the main roads in this and adjoining Counties, necessarily makes this an excellent market. The facilities for transshipment cannot be surpassed, and steamboat communication has lately been opened with the far-famed Muskoka Territory, a new boat, the "Ida Burton," having been launched as recently as June 13th, 1866.

Barrie contains six Churches, viz., Episcopal, Canada Presbyterian, Presbyterian, (Old Kirk,) Roman Catholic, Wesleyan, and Primitive Methodists. There is a fine Grammar School, a Common and a Separate School; also, several private Schools, and an excellent Seminary for young ladies, conducted by Mrs. Locke. There is a Lodge of the F. & A. M., viz., Corinthian Lodge, No. 96, which meets at the Hall, Meeking's Hotel, every Thursday on or before the full moon. There are also Lodges of the Loyal Orange and Temperance organizations.

The First Division Court is held here once a month, THOMAS LLOYD, *Clerk.*

The Fire Company have two Engines, and a Hook and Ladder Company; their Hall is a new and elegant building, the upper floor of which is used as the Mechanics' Institute, Reading Room, and Library; a Museum is also being formed in connection with the above.

The Barrie Militia comprises two Companies, viz., Rifles, M. McKenzie, Captain; Wm. O'Brien, Lieutenant; Wm. J. Graham, Ensign; and the Infantry Company, Angus Russell, Captain; Aaron Burnett, Lieutenant; Charles Ross, Ensign.

The facilities for manufacturing purposes are good; but at present, Barrie is more noted as a trading than a manufacturing town. Men of capital and enterprise will find great inducements in Barrie, in fact, it is surprising that with the advantages she possesses, and the easy transshipment of goods so little manufacturing is done here, a good foundry and machine shop, is much needed; the following comprises the chief manufacturing establishments at present.

Mr. Andrew Graham's tannery, was established about the year 1850, this gentleman manufacturing all kinds of kip, sole, and upper leather, turning out about 4000 hides, and 1000 skins per annum; the machinery is worked by a Steam Engine of 10 horse power, and 6 hands are employed. In connection with the above, Mr. Graham, also employs about 20 hands in the manufacture of boots and shoes, producing about \$15000 worth per year.

Mr. James Graham has lately erected a large Mill of 4 stories, besides garret, for the carrying on of a Woollen, Carding and Fulling Mill; it is also intended to use a portion of the building as a flax mill, and another portion as a knitting factory; much attention is now

being paid to the production of flax ; and a mill of this kind will prove a great acquisition to the County. The engine of the establishment is 15 horse power, and at present there are about 10 hands employed.

Dougal's Furniture Factory is situated at the back of the market. Mr. David Dougal manufactures all sorts of furniture, and he has the reputation of using none but the best seasoned timber.

Durham's Saw Mill, situated on the bay, is worked by steam, and is capable of turning out 16,000 feet every twenty-four hours, or upwards of four and one-half millions per year. There is a planing and lath mill attached. The power is sixteen horse in all, consisting of two engines ; and the mill is worked with an average of twenty hands.

Simpson's Brewery. This old established brewery is located on the bay. Mr. Simpson has gained a far-famed reputation for the excellent quality of his ales ; and, in our opinion, has established the falsity of the remark of an Englishman, who, when he first came to this country, thought it "impossible to make good *hale*, as they hadn't got the 'ops."

Anderton Brothers have also a fine Brewery, situated on the lake near the saw mill, and established five years ago. They manufacture a good article, which is proved by the extensive sales they make in this and adjoining counties.

Barrie is fortunate in possessing several excellent hotels, the superiority of which it would be invidious to particularize.

Barrie supports two weekly journals, both of which are ably conducted, the "Examiner," published and edited by W. M. Nicholson, Esq., and the "Northern Advance," by D. Crew., Esq.

The Post Office is situated on Owen Street, in a central location, Alfred Lane, postmaster. There are two mails daily, one south and the other north ; also tri-weekly to Penetanguishene.

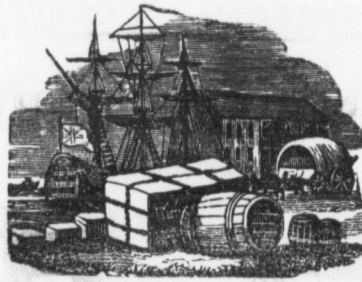

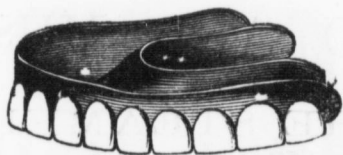

The steamer "Emily May" connects here with the Northern Railway daily, running to Orillia, Beaverton, &c., in connection with steamer "Fairy," to the Muskoka Territory. A steam ferry also runs several times a-day from this village to Roach's Point. One of the largest steam saw mills in Canada West is located here, that of H. W. Sage & Co., capable of manufacturing about fifteen millions of feet per annum, most of which is sold in the Eastern and New York markets. This mill gives employment to about 90 men, besides about 500 lumbermen through the woodlands. Mr. P. E. Drake, a general merchant of Bell Ewart, is also extensively engaged in the manufacture of lumber. There is also a good foundry in the village, the proprietor of which is prepared to manufacture all kinds of light and heavy work. There is a Roman Catholic and Methodist Church, and one School. Daily mail. Population 500.

CLOVER HILL—A pleasant post village, situated on the Townline between the Townships of Essa and Tecumseth, 18 miles from Barrie and 11 miles from Gilford, the nearest station on the Northern Railway, from whence a stage runs twice a-day. This village was first settled by emigrants from the north of Ireland in 1830, and in 1850 the first Post Office was established, the first postmaster appointed being R. Sproule. There is a District School about one mile from the village. The Churches are two in number, viz., Presbyterian and Wesleyan Methodist. A Division Court is held here, and the L. O. L. No. 89 hold meetings here. The village is thriving, and is surrounded by an excellent farming country. Population 80.

COLLINGWOOD—An incorporated town at the terminus of the Northern Railway, in the Township of Nottawasaga, 95 miles from Toronto and 33 from Barrie. This town was first founded in the year 1853, Mr. Joseph H. Lawrence being the first settler. Joel Underwood built the first house and James Smith the first store. Mr. James Connell built a large flouring and saw mill here as early as 1826, which has since been destroyed by fire. Collingwood was incorporated as a town in the year 1858, about which time great expectations of the future greatness of the town were indulged in by men of more than ordinary foresight and sagacity. In fact, for a few years, Collingwood presented all the go-ahead-iveness and mushroom growth of several noted *cities* of the States. Steamboats arrived daily from Chicago loaded with passengers, emigrants, and speculators, and laden with heavy freights of produce for the lower Provinces and New York markets.

The harbor is capacious and unsurpassed by any on the lakes, and beautifully diversified with islands. About a mile to the east is the comparatively old village of Hurontario, at the mouth of Pretty River, and which is not inappropriately named. Grist and saw mills were erected here some years ago, and are still in operation. Collingwood contains four Churches, viz.: Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Free Presbyterian, and Wesleyan Methodist, a Grammar, Common and Select School, and a Masonic Lodge, viz., Manito Lodge, No. 90, meeting on the Wednesday on or after full moon. W. B. Hamilton, postmaster. Population 1500.

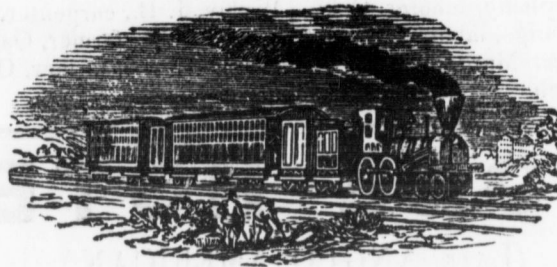

This is probably the largest tannery in Canada, and contains all the necessary machinery for the manufacture of all kinds of leather. There are three Churches in the village, viz., Roman Catholic, Rev. J. Goodwin, priest, Wesleyan Methodist, Rev. S. Blanchard, and Presbyterian, Rev. A. Lewis, pastor; also, an Orange Lodge, No. 260. Daily mail. Population 340.

The village was first settled by John Lattimer, and the post-office was established in 1850, Wm. Chantler being first postmaster. There is a Wesleyan Methodist Church, a Common School, and a Loyal Orange Lodge, No. 209. The facilities for manufacturing purposes are good; an excellent stream passing through the neighborhood. Mr. W. E. Towns established a fine woollen-mill here, in 1843, which is capable of fulling and dressing 7500 yards per year. The carding averages 20,000 lbs. per year; a steam-engine of 12 horse power is employed, and an average of four hands. There is also an excellent carriage and waggon manufactory, one store, and a good hotel. Daily mail. Population about 150.

ORANGEVILLE—Although not exactly connected with the County of Simcoe, is so nearly related that it has been thought as well to give it a place in this work. It belongs to the Township of Garafraxa, County of Wellington. It is the centre of a fine agricultural district, has extensive water power, and is rapidly rising in importance. It is distant 60 miles from Barrie, 40 from Toronto, 36 from Guelph, and 22 from Brampton, to which stages run daily in connection with the Grand Trunk. It is proposed shortly to run a tram railroad to Brampton for the accommodation of the transshipment of grain, large quantities of which are received at this point. This village was incorporated in 1864, and derived its name from Orange Lawrence, one of the first settlers.

The following sketch of Orangeville has been kindly furnished us by John Foley, Esq., editor of the *Sun*: "Orangeville was reclaimed from the "wild wilderness" some twelve or fifteen years ago at the very most, and has gradually risen in importance from 'nothing' to be a smart thriving little town of already some thousand inhabitants, doing quite a brisk stroke of trade in the course of the year,

and now manfully peeping into the future, with every likelihood and reasonable hope of a great enlargement of its borders, if not of an unusually brilliant career. The large and fine agricultural district, every year growing and rising into more and more commercial importance, and its very favorable geographical position, at the convergence of the extremities of the three counties of Wellington, Simcoe and Peel, contribute, doubtlessly, very much to the probable realization of this expectation and desirable result. It is beautifully situated on a handsome slope, on the town lines, running east and west, between the Townships of Amaranth and Mono, on the one hand, and Caledon and Garafraxa on the other—the north-east angle of which latter, very angular but very good township, may be pointed out as its exact situation on the map of Canada; but curiously enough, it also spreads its ambitious wings into a portion of both Mono and Caledon.

Orangeville possesses a number of places of worship, presided over by several able and talented pastors, the enumeration of which is as follows: Episcopal Church, Bethel Chapel (Scotch), United Presbyterian, Baptist, Wesleyan, Episcopal and Primitive Methodist.

A small stream runs through the village, joining the Credit, a little below, having, in a short distance, the wonderful fall of 120 feet, and driving in its leaping and meandering course, a woollen factory, a grist mill, and two saw mills. No less than eight regular mercantile stores carry on the traffic of the village; and the lively appearance of our streets with the throngs of customers from the surrounding country, is sufficient evidence that these marts of business possess large stocks of the good and useful things of this life. There are two tinsmith shops, three blacksmith shops, and two waggon and carriage shops; two saddler shops, a steam foundry, a tannery, four or five boot and shoe shops, several carpenter shops, a watchmaker shop, a bakery, &c.

Orangeville contains an excellent grammar school, C. R. Dickinson, M.A., principal; also a common school, J. Berwick, and Miss M. Bennett, teachers. Population about 1200.

ORILLIA.—This romantic and picturesque village is situated on Lake Couchiching, in the Township of Orillia, in a fine, healthy section of country, alike celebrated for its lovely scenery and its excellent fishing and sporting grounds. The tourist, wishing to extend his route to the far-famed Muskoka Lake, with its wild and

rugged scenery and picturesque falls, will leave the "Emily May" at this point, and take the steamer "Fairy," which runs daily during the summer for the Severn river, touching at the Indian village of Rama and McPherson's Landing. At the Severn, stages are taken to Muskoka Bay, where connection is made with the steamer "Wenonah" (A. P. Cockburn, proprietor,) for the celebrated Muskoka Lake. A stage also runs summer and winter for the falls, twice a week.

Orillia, in 1831, was an Indian Settlement. The British Government during that year made a treaty with the Chippewas for a village site on the same spot, and at once built a Council Room, an Episcopal Church, a School-house, and about sixteen log houses, and a larger and more substantial house of the same material for the chief's private residence. The chief, William Yellowhead, died about a year ago, and is buried in the Episcopal churchyard. The old house is now, after great alterations and improvements, used as the Episcopal Parsonage.

In 1838, a petition was made by the whites for a landing, which was granted, and in 1839 a second petition was forwarded to the Government, requesting the removal of the Indians to Rama, in Ontario County. This was also granted, and a village was built for them, a church, school-house, and other requirements. Thus the whites remained in entire possession of the present site of Orillia.

Gerald Alley, Esq., was the first white settler. In 1835, only six white families resided in the village, viz., Robert Bailey, Andrew Moffatt, Neil Morrison, Michael Bowers, Jacob Gill, and John Rowe, storekeeper. Robert Bailey, Neil Morrison, Andrew Moffatt, and Michael Bowers, are the oldest settlers living here now.

About the year 1835 the Post Office was established, Gerald Alley, Esq., being appointed postmaster, the mail having been carried previously from Barrie, a distance of 28 miles, by one Thomas McCausland.

Orillia contains three Churches. The Episcopal church is a handsome edifice of stone, the interior of which, with its stained windows and arched roof, has quite an imposing effect. Rev. A. Stewart, M.A., Rector.

The Canada Presbyterian Church is built of frame, at a cost of \$2,500, and opened in March, 1852. This is also a neat and commodious building, with a comfortable manse adjoining it, which cost about

\$1,500. The church is under the pastoral care of the Rev. John Gray.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church, the smallest of the three, was built in 1858, of frame. Rev. Thomas Feathers pastor, and Rev. James Woodsworth, assistant.

There is also a Roman Catholic Church a short distance from the village, on the Coldwater Road. The priest, Rev. Mr. Campbell, resides in Mara.

There is a good Common School, with an average attendance of 100 scholars; D. M. Malloch, teacher, and Miss Hunter, assistant. Mrs. King also conducts a select school at her residence.

The Sons of Temperance have a fine hall in the village. Orillia Division, No. 122, meet on every Tuesday evening. The officers are James Jackson, M.P., and J. C. McMullen, R. S. The hall, which is 85 x 24 feet, is also used for various purposes, municipal and otherwise. The Loyal Orange Lodge, No. 296, hold their meetings the first Thursday in every month; A. Kerr, master, R. Jones, secretary.

Orillia is supplied with three excellent hotels, being in accommodation and comfort fully equal to any hotels in Canada West. The "Temperance Hotel," situated on the lake, has lately been enlarged. From the balcony, which is built on the top of the roof, 16 x 30 feet, a beautiful view is obtained of the lake, Orillia, and the surrounding scenery.

The "Stafford House" is a fine new building, also near the lake. This hotel, when completed, will be one of the largest hotels in Canada; and for elegance of design and interior fitting up it is second to none.

In the centre of the village Mr. Ross is conducting a good hotel, called the "Orillia House." The traveller need only give him a call to satisfy himself of the excellence of his house.

There are about 21 stores, some of them fully equal to the retail establishments of much larger towns. Amongst the most prominent may be noticed that of the firm of Mulcahy & Cashman, O'Brien & Co., Cockburn's Montreal store, John World's general store, Thos. Goffatt, agent Hon. Hudson's Bay Company and general men's mercer and millinery establishment, Wesley Bingham also carries on the grocery trade, in connection with his tinsmithing business.

Blacksmithing is extensively carried on in all its branches by Wm. Ramsay and Wm. Tudhope.

Mr. Samuel Wainwright carries on an extensive tannery, turning out from 1,500 to 2,000 sides per year. He uses a steam engine of six horse power, and employs four hands.

The 6th Division Court is held here, Mr. Thomas Dallas, clerk.

There are two steamboats for freight and passengers, the "Emily May" and "Ida Burton," also a tug boat, the "Victoria," on Lake Simcoe. As before mentioned, the small steamer "Fairy" plies between Orillia and the Severn twice a day.

A volunteer company has also been lately organized. The officers are H. M. Darling, Captain; J. W. Slaven, Lieutenant; T. C. Noble, Ensign; John C. McMullen, Color Sergeant; George Tite and John Leitch, Sergeants.

There is a branch of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum in this village, It was originally built for a hotel, and was purchased by Government before finished as such, consequently it necessarily has many errors in its construction for a Lunatic Asylum. The superintendent, and Mr. Kivas Tully, the Architect, deserve considerable credit for altering and adapting it to the purpose. The building, which is built of brick and heated by steam, is three stories high, with attics, and presents a centre and two projecting wings front 118 feet. The wings of the building project 15 feet, leaving a space in the centre of 68 feet; between the projections are verandahs 10 feet wide, divided so as to separate male and female patients, who number about 140, the fronts being railed in with iron rods. In summer these verandahs add greatly to the tranquil pleasure of the patients, the view being extensive and varied, taking in the village, lake, and islands.

The general effect of the building is dignified and imposing; it is situated on Lake Couchiching. The officers are John Ardagh, M.D., M.R.C.S., superintendent; F. Fraser, clerk; George Badger, Steward; Miss Jane Douglas, matron; besides seven or eight keepers male, and ten female.

The rise and progress of Orillia has hitherto been necessarily slow, from the fact of (until recently) there being an immense amount of country to the north unsurveyed and unimproved. The opening up of roads for nearly 100 miles north has given the village a wonderful impetus. The enterprising firm of Cockburn & Co., have

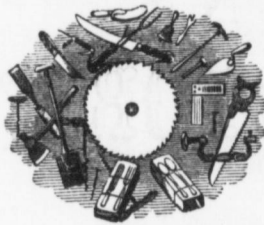
built the steamer "Wenonah" on Muskoka Lake, and otherwise contributed materially to the advancement of the northern section of country, which assists to make Orillia a flourishing village. The citizens expect their village to be selected as the site for the new county town, and are also in anticipation of having telegraph communication with Barrie and Toronto. Quite a number of pretty villas are situated in and about this village. Population 1000.

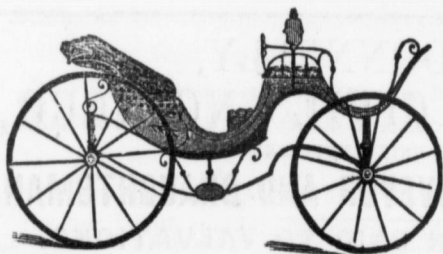

**ORO**—A post office of the township of Oro. (See Richardson's corners.)

**PENETANGUISHENE**—(Ojibway, "*Banks of rolling sand*")—Is situated on the bay of the same name, in the townships of Tiny and Tay, about 34 miles from Barrie. This village has long been a place of some note, a military fort having been established here during the late war with the United States, and kept up since that time until within a few years ago, when the garrison was withdrawn. This circumstance attracted a good many settlers to the locality, and the place came to be a rather populous village. A considerable trade was kept up with the Indians in furs and skins, which, with the business occasioned by the military and naval establishments, made this rather a stirring little town; a considerable trade is still done in furs. The population consists in a great measure of Lower Canadians and half breeds. There are also a great number of retired pensioners, who have neat habitations and garden lands on the road to the Reformatory, which is about three miles east of the village.

The bay forms a good harbor, and is a beautiful sheet of water, which with its richly wooded shores on the opposite side forms a magnificent picture.

The post office was established in 1830, James H. Hamilton being the first postmaster. There are two common schools, an Episcopal Church, built of frame in 1838, Rev. George Hallen, pastor; a Roman Catholic Church, a handsome building rebuilt of frame in 1861, Rev. J. P. Kennedy, pastor; and a Wesleyan Methodist, a small frame chapel. The Ninth Division Court is held here, Robert J. Catley, Clerk. The Reformatory is an object of considerable interest to strangers visiting the village. (See page 22.)

The business of Penetanguishene is generally good, and consists of three or four capacious and well stocked stores, two hotels, both of which are well conducted; a tinsmith, carriage maker, blacksmith, &c.; and although the village is almost adjoining the *Ultima Thule*, it is not to be supposed that it has lost any of the elements of civilization so apparent in our more intimately connected towns and villages. Evidence of wealth and taste being conspicuous in the handsome residences which overlook the bay.

There are several fine streams in the neighborhood, which would afford excellent manufacturing facilities. Tri-weekly mail by stage to Barrie. Population about 900.

**SINGHAMPTON.**—A rising village on the county line, between Simcoe and Grey, partly in Nottawasaga and partly in Osprey, 35 miles from Barrie. Water power is furnished by the Mad River, a tributary of the Nottawasaga. There are said to be no water privileges on the Mad River above Singhampton, but any number immediately below. Richard Richmond first settled here about 1840, in which year he erected a saw mill. The village was laid out in 1856 by Messrs. C. R. and J. R. Sing, who owned the property. For some years after its first establishment, the Post Office was called Mad River Mills P. O. The mills, which consist of a grist mill of two run of stones, and a saw mill, were built about 11 years ago, and are about a quarter of a mile east of the principal street in Nottawasaga. The Post Office, Store, and Common School are also on the Simcoe side. The Post Office was established in 1852. There is a Canada Presbyterian and a Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The School House is a comfortable stone building, with a large attendance of pupils. There are also a Lodge of the Loyal Orange institution, No. 586, and a Lodge of the British American Good Templars, No. 371. Mails daily to and from Durham, Collingwood, and intermediate places. **STAYNER**—A very flourishing Post Village and Station, on the Northern Railway, situated in the township of Nottawasaga, about 24 miles from Barrie. It was first settled about the year 1854, by Donald Bain, George Bell and Gideon Phillips, Thomas Cundle, and Andrew Coleman, coming next. The Post Office was established in 1855, Donald Bain, becoming the first Postmaster. The village is rapidly increasing in importance; it enjoys excellent facilities for manufacturing; and there are already established a large saw mill, a woollen and carding mill, and a fine tannery, with a boot and shoe manufactory attached. The surrounding country is unsurpassed for agricultural purposes; and there are good roads, leading into the county of Grey; a large amount of business being transacted with that section of the country. The lumber business is also carried on here extensively. There is a good Common



School, John Sing, teacher ; and three Churches, viz : Episcopal Church, Rev. S. Briggs ; Can. Presbyterian, Rev. Jas. Greenfield ; and Wesleyan Methodist, Rev. D. Hunt. An Orange Lodge, No. 942, hold their meetings here. Daily mail. Population 400.

## ESSA.

Bounded north by Vespra and Sunnidale ; west by Tossorontio ; east by Innisfil, and south by Tecumseth. The greater portion of this township is excellent land, but towards the north-east it is hilly and broken. There is also a part of it swampy.

The Nottawasaga runs through the centre of the township from north to south, receiving several minor streams, and affording an abundant supply of water. There are several saw mills, many of steam power, in the township. The Northern Railway passes through the township near the northern boundary.



From the general excellence of the land, and its proximity to several capital markets, Essa takes the rank of one of the best, if not the best, of the townships of Simcoe. Essa was surveyed in 1820 by Messrs. S. M. Benson and H. Black. The earliest settlers were George Dinwoodie, Thomas Duff, Robert Whitesides, and Robert Ruthven. Population, 1861, 2904.

## FLOS.

Flos, Tiny and Tay have the rather doubtful honor of perpetuating the memory and names of three favorite lap-dogs belonging to Lady Peregrine Maitland. Flos was surveyed in 1823, by Messrs. J. G. Chewett and J. Goessman. The first settlers were John Rowat, Edward Archer, and Gavin Turner.

Flos is bounded north by Tiny, east by Medonte, west by Sunnidale, and south by Vespra. The Nottawasaga river runs through the south-west corner; and the north-west corner is bounded by the Nottawasaga bay. There are two beautiful lakes in this township, each covering about five hundred acres. There are also several small streams, affording first-class manufacturing privileges. The land bordering on the Penetanguishene road is light and sandy, but a little distance back it is of very good quality. The upper portion of the township is undulating, the lower and centre level. Population (1861), 953.

## MEDONTE.

This township is bounded north by Tay; west by Flos; east by Orillia, and south by Oro. It was surveyed, 1820, by Messrs. Chewett and Goessman. The first settlers were Thomas and John Craig, Robert Miller, Joseph Yates, and Edward Moon.

Medonte is well watered by the Coldwater, Wye, and Sturgeon rivers. The Penetanguishene and Orillia and Sturgeon roads are good thoroughfares, connecting lake Simcoe with Gloucester bay. There is a deal of excellent land in this township; but a large portion of it is hilly, swampy, and broken. Near the centre there is very high land, affording a magnificent view, including parts of lakes Huron and Simcoe. Population (1861), 1638.

## MONO

This Township, though its natural advantages are not equal to those adjacent, has made rapid progress within the past few years. There is a good deal of sandy soil, and a considerable portion of the township is rough and hilly. The swamps are numerous, extending into the neighbouring Townships of Luther, Proton, Melancthon, and Amaranth, and from which the water flows into the Saugeen, Thames, Credit, and Nottawasaga. The main branches of the Credit, Humber and Nottawasaga have their sources in this township.

On the townline between Mono and Adjala there are good limestone quarries, which in time will probably prove a source of prosperity, but at present they are not worked to any great extent. From Orangeville and Mono Mills there are tolerable roads through the township, connecting with the Toronto and Sydenham roads to Owen Sound. Brampton, on the Grand Trunk Railway, is the most convenient station.

Mono is bounded north by Mulmur, west by Amaranth, Co. Wellington, south by Garafraxa and Caledon, and east by Adjala. Surveyed in 1821 by Messrs. Black and Benson. The first settlers were Robert Henry, George McManus, and Alex. Irwin. Population (1861) 3626.

## MULMUR.

Mulmur, a rapidly improving township, is bounded north by Nottawasaga; west by Melancthon; south by Mono, and east by Tossorontio.

From the centre to the northern boundary there is a tract of excellent

high table land, unsurpassed as a wheat producing section. Mulmur is on the summit level of Western Canada, being, with Mono, Adjala, Tossorontio, and the south-west part of Nottawasaga, on the heights between the lakes. From these townships there is a descent to the bed of the Nottawasaga, between Kempenfeldt and Nottawasaga bays, the river here being almost on a level with lake Huron.

In the year 1828, Captain John Little, clerk of the 7th Division Court and postmaster, located lot 1, 7th concession, his present residence, the township then being a mere wilderness; his next neighbour was distant six miles, the nearest travelled roads, to Mono Mills, being fourteen from his home. The experience of Mr. Little was that of all the hardy pioneers who transformed the howling wilderness into peaceful and happy homesteads. The hardships and vicissitudes of "Life in the Bush" have often been published, and our space will not permit us to enter into details. Aided by his wife, Mr. Little cleared a plot of land, made several blunders, such as sowing wheat too thickly, and reaping a splendid crop of *straw*. His adventures with bears, savages and Yankee clock peddlers are very amusing; and no doubt the old gentleman, who is yet hale and hearty, will be happy to entertain his visitors by communicating them. Population (1861) 1814.

NOTTAWASAGA.

Nottawasaga (Iroquois, "*River, or Mouths of the Ojibways,*") was settled about 1833, Capt. Edward A. Walker obtaining his patent in that year, but its remoteness offered so little encouragement to settlers



that little progress was made for several years. The lots bordering the lake were first sold, but in 1842 the population was only 420.

About the year 1837, by the assistance of Government, two small settlements were commenced. The "Yankee Settlement," on Hurontario street, about three miles from the southern boundary of the township, under the direction of Mr. Bowerman. The land was judiciously chosen, being generally of excellent quality.

The "Scotch Settlement," on the same road, and about six miles further north, was entirely composed of Scotch Highlanders. A thrifty race, economical, and hard working, in a few years they purchased the lots they first settled, and adjoining ones also, many of them emerging from the obscurity of poverty to the possession of lairdships, which in some instances rival in territorial extent a German principality. The original village, composed exclusively of shanties, has disappeared, but the "Scotch Corners," or Bowermore, seven miles from Collingwood, occupies the site.

Nottawasaga contains a great deal of excellent land, and, like all the other townships, some of a very indifferent quality. It originally consisted of two townships, called Java and Merlin, but was surveyed as one, with the present name. It contains one hundred thousand acres, equivalent to about one hundred and fifty-six square miles, or a square of thirteen miles in length. A spur of the Blue Mountains enters the township, and forms a precipitous cliff of several hundred feet in height, from which can be seen Sunnidale, Flos, Vespra, Tiny, and the Georgian Bay.

Nottawasaga is bounded north by Nottawasaga Bay, east by Sunnidale, west by the townships of Collingwood and Osprey, Co. Grey, and south by Mulmur. Population (1861) 3890.

## ORILLIA AND MATCHEDASH.

Orillia takes its name from a wild plant growing there. Orillia North and South are united with Matchedash for municipal purposes. South Orillia is beautifully situated on Lakes Simcoe and Couchiching. The soil is principally light and stony. The land is high, and the lake can be seen from all parts of the township. North Orillia is not so thickly populated, and the land is of a rather inferior quality. The North and Severn rivers pass through it.

Matchedash (Ojibway, "*Mudgedush*," *Marshy Land*.) offers no irresistible inducements to settlers. The name expresses its general character. In 1845 there was only one settler in it, but in 1850 the population had increased to seven. In 1854 the assessed land consisted of one hundred acres, valued at one hundred and forty-four pounds, and the unassessed land, one thousand acres, was valued at two hundred and forty-nine pounds.

## ORO.

Oro ("Gold, or Golden Land,") is bounded north by Medonte, west by Vespra, east by South Orillia, and South by Lake Simcoe and Kempenfeldt Bay. This is one of the best townships in the county, the soil being generally a loamy clay. Near the lake shore it is stony, but as it recedes it improves. The centre is high land. A branch of the Nottawasaga passes through the township, and several small streams empty into Lake Simcoe and Sturgeon Bay.

Oro was surveyed in 1820 by J. G. Chewett. The first settlers were Thomas and Richard Drury, W. B. McVity, J. Locke, Capt. E. L. Davis, and James Adams. Population (1861) 3036.

## SUNNIDALE.

This township cannot be regarded as one of the best. The soil is generally sandy, hilly, and broken; it also contains a good deal of swamp; there are, however, several tracts of good land, and its railway advantages, the Northern line passing through it, tend to increase its value.

Sunnidale is well known for its timber, a number of saw mills on and near the line of railway being employed in manufacturing lumber.

This township possesses excellent water power. The Nottawasaga intersects it, entering the township from Flos, and is here navigable for large boats.

Sunnidale is bounded north by Nottawasaga Bay, east by Flos and Vespra, west by Nottawasaga, and south by Tossorontio and Essa.

It was first settled about the year 1834. The first settlers were Joseph Crowe, James Ritchie, and George Cathay. Population (1861) 985.

## TOSSORONTIO.

This township, so called from a celebrated Mohawk chief, is bounded north by Sunnidale, east by Essa, west by Mulmur, and south by Adjala. The southern portion of this township is good land, diversified by a small proportion of cedar swamp. The north is hilly and broken, the timber being principally hemlock and pine. On the border of Sunnidale it is of excellent quality. It is well watered by branches of the Nottawasaga, affording good facilities for manufacturing purposes. While speaking on this subject, we may remark that no county in Canada surpasses Simcoe in this respect. For example, on the Mad River and its tributaries, the water-power available, and of which no advantage is taken, is unequalled, and nothing would tend more to the prosperity of the county than the establishment of factories, mills and foundries, which are not only required, but would assuredly, in a mercantile sense, "pay well." A little of the go-ahead-iveness which characterises our southern neighbours would prove of incalculable benefit, not only to this county, but the country at large. We recommend the subject to the consideration of our political economists.

At the base of the township there is a leading road connecting with the Toronto and Sydenham road

## VESPRA.

Vespra is bounded north by Flos, west by Sunnidale, east by Oro, and south by Essa, Innisfil and Kempenfeldt Bay. The Nottawasaga runs through the north-west corner, one of its branches, Willow Creek, flowing through the centre. The interior of the township contains good land, but in the neighbourhood of the bay it is of only tolerable character. A leading road runs from Kempenfeldt Bay between Vespra, Flos and Tiny on the west, and Oro, Medonte and Tay on the east, to Penetanguishene. This road was opened for military purposes in 1812.

Vespra was surveyed in 1820-21 by Messrs. J. G. Chewett and J. Goessman. The first settlers were James Bruce, Thomas and John Meirs, and John Lawrence. Population (1861) 1096.

## WEST GWILLIMBURY.

The townships of West, East, and North Gwillimbury are named after the residence of Governor Simcoe, in Wales.

West Gwillimbury is bounded north by Innisfil, east by East Gwillimbury, west by Tecumseth, and south by King. The north-east corner borders on Cook's Bay.

West Gwillimbury is the oldest settled township in the county, and was surveyed in 1820 by George Lount. On the south-east it is bounded by the west branch of the Holland River, which separates it from East Gwillimbury and King. Both sides of this river are bordered by a marsh, varying in breadth from a quarter of a mile to a mile. The soil varies a good deal, some parts being excellent. In the north-east it is light, but of tolerable good quality. A good deal of attention is being paid to the cultivation of flax, and a com-

pany has been formed in Bradford. There are already two hundred acres under cultivation, and the stock capital is about six thousand dollars. The County Council made a grant of \$333 in aid of the enterprise. The managers and directors of the company are: Geo. D. Morton, M.D., *President*; Thomas Driffill, *Treasurer*; John Murphy, *Secretary*; Messrs, George Murphy, Richard Thorne, Samuel Driffill, Edward Jeffs, Joseph Deacon, William J. McMaster, William Turner, W. Stoddart. (See page 80.)

The Ontario and Georgian Bay Ship Canal, if the proposed route meets with the approbation of the Board, will enter the county at the south-west corner of West Gwillimbury, passing diagonally to the north-east, meeting Cook's Bay and Kempenfeldt Bay, following the townline between Vespra and Essa, joining the Nottawasaga at Angus; thence through the south-east of Vespra, Sunnidale and Flos, and follow the course of the Nottawasaga to its entrance into Nottawasaga Bay.

Among the first settlers of West Gwillimbury were Lewis Algeo, Robert Armstrong, John Armson, James Saunders, John Davis, and James Moore. Population (1861) 3603.

**MOUNT ST. LOUIS**—A small post village on lot 11, concession 5 of the township of Medonte, 20 miles from Barrie; was first settled in 1832, by a colony of Irish Catholics. The post office was established in 1857, John P. Hussey being first postmaster. There is a good School, and a Catholic Church. Population about 100.

**MUSKOKA FALLS SETTLEMENT.**

After leaving Orillia in a northerly direction, the thriving village of "Washago Mills," or Severn Landing, is the first of the numerous settlements springing up in this extensive and recently surveyed territory. Twelve miles distant there is the nucleus of another village, containing two excellent hotels, the Freemason's Arms, James McCabe, postmaster, and the Muskoka Bay Hotel. E. Connell, proprietor. There is a line of stages from the latter. Here is an extensive wharf, about three hundred feet in length, stretching into the Muskoka Lake. The "Wenonah" touches here, running daily to Bracebridge, or the North Falls of the Muskoka, Lake Rosseau and intermediate points. The Montreal Store is an extensive establishment.

About nine miles distant is another small village "post office," Mrs. Hannah, postmistress, and a tavern and store, James Foxley, proprietor. Mr. Foxley has always canoes, fishing tackle, and necessary materials for the convenience of tourists. Here is a magnificent fall, surpassed only by Niagara and Montmorency.

Three miles from this village is Bracebridge, Co. Victoria, which possesses an unsurpassed facility for manufacturing purposes, the water power being equal to that of any other in the county. There are two churches, three stores, and three taverns in this village.

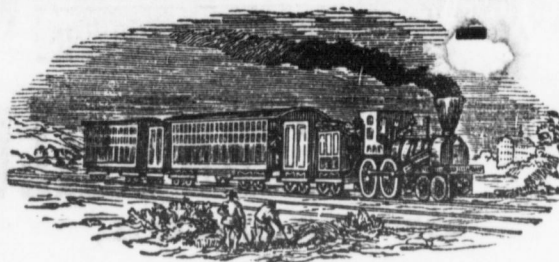
