

Suggestion That Many Returned Soldiers Could Engage in This Manufacture

Canadian-made toys for Canadian children was the text of an address given by Miss Elizabeth Evans of Quebec before the Women's Committee of the Montreal Handicrafts Guild recently.

She said: "We all know that for years Germany and Austria have gradually gained a monopoly of the toy-making trade. In this great country of ours, full of unlimited natural resources why should we have unemployed while our children and countless foreign villages swarm like bee-hives with thriving work people doing work so easy that women and children and even cripples can do it all day, just the right kind of labor for some of our poor wounded soldiers who will need all the interesting and care to relieve the blank, uninteresting years they must face through loss of strength and health.

Let us set to work then and try and revive the hand-made wooden toys of old Britanny well known in the early days of Canada when our market places were full of them, wheel barrows, wooden boxes, carts, sleighs, chairs, dolls' cradles, all good and strong and beloved by our children. Let us also make a pact as the Australian people have done, and buy no more German toys. This is Canada's great opportunity. The door is now shut to German wars, but after the war it will open again, so now is the time to act.

(Ottawa Free Press)

Recruiting efforts, says N. W. Rowell, should be led by the federal government.

"What is most needed is a clear-cut, positive appeal from the government of Canada, setting forth the present requirements and the urgency of meeting them. . . . Until recently Lord Kitchener devoted a great part of his time to securing men, and now the enlistment is in the official hands of Lord Derby. ### PERIL OF WORLD IN GERMAN VICTORY

Robert Herrick, professor in the University of Chicago, and a writer of eminence, in an article in the Chicago Tribune, suggested reflections on a homeward trip from battle-torn Europe, puts the danger to the world and to the United States in a German victory, whole or partial, in passages which arrest the attention and compel consideration. He writes:

"The German peril did not lie. I thought, in her big guns, her ships, her Kaiser and his Prussianized machine. It lay in herself, her ideals. If she could win a victory with that monstrous creed of materialism stimulated by countless crimes, with its defiance of contracts; its law of 'indispensable severities'; its military reasons—why, that must then become the law of the world, the savage's law. Germany would make the public morality of the world. And all of us Christian peoples would fall in behind the band wagon. Even proud Americans cannot resist the fascination of success. German methods of government, German methods of suppressing the individual, German methods of morality—these for you and me as lone individuals and another lawless one when we get together as a state—would be imitated more than German methods of civil and military organization. We should all become strong armed supermen under the hypnotism of German success. Perish the thought! And Americans would be the very first to run after these new old gods, the religion of that queer 'old German god' who apparently encouraged rape, murder, arson and tyranny. For in mighty America, with every blood and every social tradition on earth in its seething blood, there is already an insidious tendency to worship at his shrine. American big business can understand the Kaiser's philosophy, can reverence his 'old German god' more than anybody other than a real German. For it, too, believes in 'putting things over.'"

"When the old fourteen knot steamship finally rounded Sandy Hook and dropped anchor off quarantine, and the reporters came on board with the dust of America on their shoes, the roar of America in their ears, I was surer than ever that this greatest of world wars means a vast deal more to us than trade or charity, or politics, which is what we are making of it. It means the form which our national character is to take. The German peril is already in our midst, not so much at work blowing up ammunition plants as insidiously at work in our hearts. 'Well, a great many Americans seem to be saying, 'if the Germans put it over,' what of it? It can't hurt us much! Perhaps it shows that they have the real goods, are the Lord's chosen people for this little world of ours after all. As for broken treaties, atrocities, submarines, Edith Cavell, rough work over, and all that—well, it's all war and the man who does things is usually criticized by the other fellow who can't do them. The public will forget the German crimes all right, once Germany has put herself on top. Nothing succeeds like success,' which shows that already we are well Germanized."

BONFIRES AFTER THE WAR IS OVER

Worn-out Political Clothes Will Add To Fuel. "WE FIDDED, THEY PREPARED". Strong Address by C. A. Magrath Before Toronto Canadian Club on Conditions Which Will Follow.

(Toronto Mail and Empire). "There will be bonfires after this war is over. The fuel for some of the largest in Europe, in my opinion, will consist of old worn-out political clothes. We have loved the bonfire. With our delight we have listened to the verbal abortions of his prep. Oh! we have been expert fiddlers and now we are struggling to quench the fire."

These words were spoken by C. A. Magrath, chairman of the Canadian Waterways Commission at a Canadian Club luncheon. They followed the remarks of a venture to predict that after this war certain political methods common wherever the party system exists, will receive a rude shock.

Mr. Magrath began his address with an appeal for unity "not for the purpose of maintaining other races, but to give force to ideals that stand for the betterment of mankind. We have faults, our greater, I fear, has been overconfidence in ourselves." While other nations had prepared to "smash everything in sight" we kept on making money, playing politics and talking peace. Suddenly we found ourselves in the vortex of a great world war. Since then the Empire has gone forward with much courage and on the whole, has done nobly considering our unpreparedness.

What does that mean, gentlemen? It means that political parties must be positively and absolutely suppressed. Both of our parties have reached an understanding in this respect, but I regret to say that we can still see occasional glimpses of its ugly countenance here and there throughout the country.

Thrift Essential. "Party shibboleths and political safety firsts," must go to the country. "It might be said that the self-imposed load of thrift, national, provincial, public, private, individual, is a heavy one. It is a great deal to be asked of a man, but it is a duty which he is obliged to go abroad to protect his home unless he was willing might be sound when it took a week to get into the next township, but it was absolutely sound today. We have a great deal about the voluntary system as part of our British institutions. As an historical speaker I believe that to be wrong."

Not Millenium Yet. "Surely we should have known that the moment the British Empire became involved in a life and death struggle with two great world powers, these so organized themselves to bring into play all their resources. It is a great deal to be asked of a man, but it is a duty which he is obliged to go abroad to protect his home unless he was willing might be sound when it took a week to get into the next township, but it was absolutely sound today. We have a great deal about the voluntary system as part of our British institutions. As an historical speaker I believe that to be wrong."

People were too apt to confound this world with the millenium—where there would be no need of fighting. "While I hold that nothing should stand in the way when the country's back is to the wall, I appreciate the fact that there are reasons why Canada must draw her supplies through volunteering, and especially so in view of Great Britain's apparent determination not to depart from the system."

Debts Piling Up. Being Germany's trade was cut off the entire energy of the nation was divided into two classes: Men to fight, and men and women to supply them with requisites. Great Britain's war expenditure was now about a million dollars an hour. Canada's war expenditure by the end of December 31st, 1916, would be probably \$892,000,000.

Canada's Part. Mr. Magrath complimented the minister of finance on his banking arrangements; but he pointed out that this country's part in paying for the war was not to be measured by the population, for Great Britain was a creditor nation and Canada a debtor with interest to pay. He warned his hearers that they were prepared for a tightening of the screw of taxation. To bear it Canada must be united. "When man's soul and blood goes into the fight, friends, political and otherwise, do not count. This is no time for politics."

The Newspapers. The speaker was not satisfied that newspapers should not merely be not a hindrance. "To be worthy of our best national self, they should help. I think they have done very well. Their tone

has been resolute. They are doing their utmost on the matter of recruiting. They have been prudent in regard to our relations with neutral nations.

"They have been really self-sacrificing in the matter of news; trained for generations to print almost everything which could be described as news, they have denied themselves the publication of thousands of facts, often at considerable monetary cost. They have co-operated with the authorities on the whole not get sound and courageous management, unless the government had been behind it the whole force of parliament."

Another message to the press was that it should suppress party recriminations and words of electioneering, devoting its energy resolutely to war. "On the whole they do represent our better self; let us recognize this and applaud and support them for it."

"We are either in this war and mean business, or we are not and don't. We all say the strain on Great Britain in men and money is as much, if not more, than she can stand. We say we have no desire to see her robbed of her power and prestige, and become a second Holland. We say that on humanitarian grounds alone we should stand up like free men and fight."





We of the Federal League have been very busy the past few weeks getting things in shape to start work on the New York park, and as this was more essential at the time than the abolition of ten cent baseball, we decided to hold that over until the next meeting of the league. When this will be I am unable to state just now.

### THERE'S NO FEELING OF DEPRESSION; NO TALK OF PEACE IN LONDON

Letter to Rev. Dr. Raymond—A Talk With Dr. Parkin—English in the War Whole-Heartedly

The following is an extract from a letter from R. M. Raymond, of El Oro, Mexico, who has just returned from London, Eng., addressed to Rev. Dr. Raymond of this city—

U. S. M. S., St. Louis, Dec. 1, 1915.

I am just returning from a two week visit in London, and have been much impressed with what I have seen. Soldiers are in evidence everywhere; firemen, not the little Tommys that we have looked upon as the young snappers from East London—the best of the people are in the ranks today. I walked down Piccadilly, the Strand, Trafalgar Square, Whitehall. The streets were thronged with soldiers, and as I went around with them and in among them it seemed as if the spirit of the whole nation was aroused to a man—I might say to a woman, too. One mother was sympathizing with another on the loss of a son. "But you, too, are in mourning," said the bereaved one to her friend. "Yes, I have given four sons; all have been killed, and my remaining boy is preparing to go."

Many cases like this are heard of. In one family a son, a fourth, after hearing of the death of all his brothers, wrote home to his father that he considered in such a case that he ought not to go. The father, for really some time, white feather and the lad enlisted.

In the streets of London splendid fellows from all parts of the country; Englishmen, Scots and Irish trotted along together mingled with the bright lads from Canada and sturdy huskies from Australia. It was a grand sight. These men were in from the camps outside of London.

The English people are going at this thing whole heartedly, and are bound to see it through regardless of time and cost. Business people pay up their taxes unflinchingly. Little men club together and buy war bonds for investments. The women are helping to fill the places of those at the front, working at the railways, in factories, in offices. Some of those of the educated classes take their turn in the munition factories to give the other girls a rest at their work.

Joffre says "not ready yet," but they are getting ready for it. Already instructions are to fling back two bombs or two shells to the Germans' one. They expect to have many more soon. I was down at where Vickers have had an ammunition factory for a long time. Their works have been increased by two more just built. By the end of June enough factories will be in operation to give them all they need. There are now 1,100 factories working on munitions, all under government control.

There isn't any feeling of depression around London that I could find, nor any talk of peace. British spirit has bucked up in an amazing manner and all are working together. Read John Redmond's speech. I saw Geo. H. Parkin in London and had a chat over old New Brunswick days. His only son and one of his sons-in-law are in it. Parkin told me that out of Colebrookdale, 1000 men had joined the colors.

While there is a little undertone of feeling that the British were slow in starting in this war, they are now taking their part in a business like manner. There seems no needless excitement, no worry. But the way transportation across to France is being managed for a million men sent to the front. The trouble about ordering eggs for breakfast. My opinion is that this struggle will do the Empire a lot of good notwithstanding the awful sacrifice and cost.

### HE LIVED UNDER SIX BRITISH SOVEREIGNS

Nathaniel Laskey, of St. George, Charlotte county, N. B., died at Lubec, Me., on December 7, aged 100 years. Mr. Laskey had lived, therefore, in the reign of George III, George IV., William IV., Victoria, Edward VII., and George V., which is certainly a rare record of British citizenship.

Mr. Laskey was born at St. George where he later carried on the business of farming and fishing and he lived there until last year when he removed to Lubec to reside with his son.

His funeral took place at St. George yesterday and the large attendance testified to the respect in which he was held by the community. He leaves one son, three daughters and eleven grandchildren.

Conferring of Fourth Degree Followed by Excellent Banquet at Bond's

For the first time in the maritime provinces, the fourth degree of the Knights of Columbus was conferred in St. John last night upon well up to 175 members. It was an epoch making occasion in the history of the order in eastern Canada and was marked by a gathering of knights from the three provinces. Sydney, Antigonish, Halifax, Charlottetown, Moncton, Chatham and Quebec councils, in addition to St. John, were represented by prominent men. Among clergymen at the conferring of the degree, in addition to those to be mentioned later, were His Lordship, Bishop LeBlanc, Rev. J. J. Ryan of Woodstock and Rev. E. Savage of Moncton.

The degree was exemplified by the fourth degree corps—W. J. Mahoney, master of the fourth degree; Charles A. Owens, Dr. R. E. Quigley, Leonard A. Conlon, Rev. Wm. Duke and Dr. D. J. Mullin. The master's aides were P. J. Fitzpatrick, Henry McCullough, John Crowley, James B. Daley, Timothy Collins, Dr. S. H. McDonald, Frederick J. McDonald and Christopher A. Kane.

The musical programme "both for the ceremonial and a banquet which followed" was most interesting. It was presided over by Joseph L. Mullaly and Dr. Wm. P. Broderick.

The exemplification was completed about 10:30 and the new members of the fourth degree were guests at a pleasant function as one could wish to attend. Mr. Mahoney presided and made a very happy toastmaster when Mr. Bond's excellent fare had been done full justice and that interesting portion of the evening was entered upon.

The King was first toasted and the national anthem was heartily sung. Then came a round of speeches by Rev. Father McAdam of Sydney, John C. O'Mullin of Halifax, Rev. Dr. McMillan of P. E. Island, Rev. E. P. Wallace of Campbellton, Father O'Keefe of Chatham, District Deputy Hamilton of Moncton, G. G. Holman, M.P. of Grandby, Que., Father Barry of Antigonish and Hon. F. J. Sweeney of Moncton, with songs by Dr. P. A. Hogan, P. P. Quinn of Halifax and Frank I. McCafferty. It was 2 a.m. when the singing of the national anthem ended the delightful function. It had been marked by good fellowship and the expression of high ideals and by a deeply patriotic tone in both the speeches and the music. The visitors were very hearty in their praise of St. John hospitality and congratulatory because of the very excellent way in which they had been entertained. During the evening a telegram from M. J. Gorman, K.C., Ottawa, vice supreme master, Champlain, was read. He congratulated the eastern councils on the conferring of the great patriotic fourth degree.
