Secrets of King and Cabinet Revealed In Memoirs; Writer Criticized For Indiscretions Mgr. Doherty Tours

LONDON, Aug. 28—Sir Almeric
FitzRoy, Secretary of the Privy Council for 25 years, has caused something of a sensation here by the publication of a book of memoirs in which he reveals the closest secrets of the King and cabinet, and is being criticized widely for his gross indiscretions to dayo. He states on one occasion Winston Churchill wanted a battle-ship named Oliver Cromwell and that the King flatly refused the request although Churchill argued with him at great length to win his point.
