The defendant was not asked to plead and Magistrate Henderson announced that they would proceed with the preliminary hearing. William M. Ryan appeared for the plaintiff and Dr. J. B. M. The plaintiff Leon Chechik was the first witness summoned for the prosecution. He told that the defendant with others had been in Winnipeg on June 6 and had entered into an agreement, which was produced and read. He then narrated his activities until his arrival in this city about August 1. He then went on to tell about an agreement reached in Montreal for a shipment of liquor, which was then in the New Brunswick Cold Storage in this city. HER CHRISTMAS SHIP IS BACK

Little Old Chicago Woman Keeps Faith With Her Skipper Husband

Chicago, Dec. 11—Mrs. Hermann Schuenemann has kept faith with her gallant skipper-husband.

After an absence of four years Chicago's "Christmas Ship" is back.

An odor of evergreen and balsam almost entirely foreign to the river-front, permeated the smoke-laden air as the "Christmas Ship," battered and aged beyond its years by the storms of many winters on Lake Michigan, was moored to the dock. Her decks were piled high with 10,000 Christmas trees. Lost in Storm Years Ago.

At a simple meal in the dingy cabin sat Mrs. H. Schuenemann, gray-haired and tanned by toil in all kinds of weather, but radiantly happy because it had been willed that she should keep

the faith.

All Chicago knew the Schuenemanns. Year after year Herman sailed in the sturdy Rouse Simmons for the north woods of Michigan late in September. Early December always found him back with a shipload of Christmas trees to make happy the Yuletide of thousands of the city's children.

Discriminating people bought the Schuenemann evergreens; they were the best, each selected personally by the yeteran skipper.

Then, just 11 years ago, as the "Christmas Ship" was bound for Chicago with a record cargo, a storm, such as few could remember, swept the lake. During the night the Rouse Simmons went down. Schuenemann and the small crew were lost, but even as late as 1928, storms sometimes wash an evergren up on the lake shore and the children are informed that it was cast up from the wreck of the "Christmas Ship."

Takes Up His Task, Makes Good.

His task of supplying evergreens for Chicago homes was the old skipper's life work, in which he took great pride. So the year after the tragedy, Mrs. Schuenemann chartered a new boat, went into the forests of north Michiwent into the forests of north Michi-

gan and again Chicago bought Schuenemann trees for the Yuletide. Each year she continued until poor health, acompanying her declining years, and financial setbacks prevented her from "carrying on."

It was a great effort this year, but finally the little old woman secured the battered old schooner Fearless that again she might keep faith. Death only, she hopes, will stop her work.

"Oh, the difference," she says, "when I first went to the forests with my husband years ago. You couldn't see for the trees. Now you have to hunt for good ones, there are just a few of the big ones left."



U. S. SPENT \$847,804,654 ON AMUSEMENTS IN YEAR 1922

New York City Alone Took Ten Per Cent. of This Amount.

Americans are prodigious spenders when it comes to the theatre, movies and sports, as the official figures issued by the Internal Revenue office at Washington disclose that \$846,804,654.92 was expended in the past year. More than 10 per cent. dropped into the coffers of movies, theatres and sports promoters in New York city, which accounts for \$93,592,807.

The State of Massachusetts contributed \$46,561,834. Of this amount \$4,562,975 was spent in various lines of sports. It is fair to presume that at least 60 per cent. of this money was spent right here in Boston.

The figures show beyond any question that New York is the great sporting centre of the world, for admissions and tax amounted to \$10,552,334. The Chicago sports spent close to \$7,000,000 and California dropped \$6,500,000 into the coffers of the sporting magnates. Approximately \$78,000,000 was spent on sporting events in the United States. If the great college football and baseball games were taxable, this would bring it up to \$100,000,000.
