

SELLING ESTATES TO ESCAPE TAXES

Earl of Portsmouth's Seat in Devonshire Sold For \$425,000. London, Oct. 22—The great landlords continue to show every symptom of being willing to get rid of their estates because of the alleged burdens of taxation. Among others sold last week was the Earl of Portsmouth's seat at Eggesford, in Devonshire, 8,277 acres. This was sold for \$425,000. It is one of the most beautiful properties in the south of England, and includes the Elizabethan Eggesford House in the Village of Eggesford, salmon and trout fishing, and some of the best farms in the county. Another estate sold last week was Letton Hall, near Dersbach, on the Lord Cranworth's properties, which includes three fine farms.

THINKS IT NOT WELL THAT MEN BE SENT TO PRISON

Bill Dealing With Penal Reform to Be Introduced in British Commons. London, Eng., Oct. 22—Mr. McKenna, in a speech at Pontnewynydd, promised a bill dealing with penal reform for next session. One of its main objects will be to avoid as far as possible sending any one to prison in default of paying a fine. Mr. McKenna said: "The total number of persons received into prison last year for every kind of offence throughout the country was just under 151,000. This is a startling total, the only satisfactory feature about which is that it is a far smaller proportion of the population than in any preceding year. Ten years ago, out of every 100,000 of the population 668 went to prison. Last year the corresponding figure was 418. Of the total of 151,000 persons received into prison, about 80,000, or more than one-half, were committed in default of paying a fine. That is a large number. There is room here for reform on a large scale. Every one will agree that where the

TYPHOID PATIENT LEAPED TO DEATH FROM WINDOW OF NEW GLASGOW HOSPITAL

Leo T. Joy, aged 25, belonging to Sydney, met an untimely end at Aberdeen Hospital, New Glasgow, on Sunday evening. 

NINE BERTHS IN THREE YEARS

This is Borden Programme For
 Halifax Harbor

OVER \$20,000,000 INVOLVED

Huge Union Station, Passenger
 Landing Quay and Other Faci-
 lities to Be Provided at Deep
 Water - Everything Will Be
 Modern

A staff correspondent of the St. John
 Standard is in Halifax writing up the
 winter port situation and quoting the
 soothing advice of Halifax men to St.
 John at this time. Incidentally he tells
 what the Borden government is doing
 for Halifax. He writes:-

"In addition to building a new pier
 now nearing completion at deep water,
 the government has already made a
 start on the work of developing at
 Point Pleasant a system of docks and
 terminal facilities on a very extensive
 and elaborate scale.

"The engineers' plans provide for the
 construction of a great passenger land-
 ing quay, 2,000 feet in length, and five
 great piers, each 1,200 feet in length and
 840 feet wide, with a breakwater at the
 southern end 1,400 feet in length. When
 this mammoth project is completed it
 will give Halifax 27
 berths capable of accommodating 27
 ships 600 feet in length. It will in-
 volve the building of over 20,000 feet
 or nearly four statute miles of quay
 walls. Everything will be modern in
 construction and equipment; and at
 every berth there will be a depth of 45
 feet at low water. The quay walls will
 be built of reinforced concrete, with
 granite facing above low water level
 and there will be a solid fill in behind
 the quay walls. Immigration buildings
 and great cargo warehouses will be
 constructed of concrete reinforced with
 steel.

A Huge Depot

"Near the long passenger landing
 quay and the immigration buildings a
 huge union station will be erected, also
 up-to-date in every respect in con-
 struction and appointments. Only the gov-
 ernment and their engineers know what
 the estimate is for the completed termi-
 nals at Pleasant Point, but it is believed
 the cost will exceed \$20,000,000.

"The government has already let a
 contract for preparing the plans and
 making a railway cut from
 the I. C. R. line at Fairway skirting the
 North West Arm to Point Pleasant,
 which will mean an expenditure of
 \$1,500,000; and this week tenders will
 close for the construction of the great
 passenger landing quay and one pier.
 According to the plans and speci-
 fications the contractors will be required
 to complete the passenger bulkhead quay
 by May 1, 1916, and the pier by May
 1, 1917. That means, if the contrac-
 tors are able to fulfil the terms of their
 contract, Halifax in three years will
 have nine new berths for 600 feet ships.
 Expect Early Completion

"Many people remembering that gov-
 ernment contracts are not usually car-
 ried out with any startling rapidity,
 do not believe that the first contract
 unit in the terminal plans here will be
 completed within three years. But Mr.
 McGregor and his corps of engineers,
 who have a collective experience in har-
 bor and railway building, which assures
 great efficiency in the conduct of the
 work, are satisfied that the present plan
 of construction, nine berths in three
 years, can be adhered to without much
 trouble."

SACRIFICES FORTUNE

Jesuit Priest, in Accordance With Vows
 to Order, Yields \$150,000 After In-
 heritance

Denver, Colo., Oct. 22—True to the
 Jesuit Order, which does not allow one
 of its priests to own any personal prop-
 erty or money, Fr. A. J. Bruno, former
 pastor of the Sacred Heart Church in
 Denver, before leaving for El Paso, Tex.,
 to assume charge of a church there,
 turned over to the order \$150,000 which
 he had just inherited through the death
 of a relative.

This fortune, which Fr. Bruno re-
 linqushed to the order of which he is a
 member, will be used under the direc-
 tion of the order for educational pur-
 poses. The transfer of the fortune was
 made as soon as it came into the full
 possession of Fr. Bruno.

AT QUEBEC BANQUET

Borden, Hazen, Pelletier and
 Rogers There - Note From
 Premier's Speech

Quebec, Oct. 22—Premier Borden and
 his cabinet colleagues had a busy day in
 Quebec from the time of their arrival
 yesterday, visiting the various public
 works under construction for the develop-
 ment of the port, and the Transcon-
 tinental terminal. In the afternoon
 in the presence of an immense crowd,
 the premier laid the corner stone of a
 new wing of the post office. He subse-
 quently held a reception in the Chateau
 Frontenac. At a banquet last night there
 were more than 400 in attendance.

Mayor Drouin presided with Premier
 Borden guest, William Price, chairman
 of the harbor commission; Hon. J. D.
 Hazen, and Sir Rodolphe Forget at his
 right and Hon. L. Pelletier, Hon.
 Robert Rogers and Mr. Picard, vice-
 president of the board of trade at his
 left.

Mr. Borden expressed his grateful ap-
 preciation of the hospitality of the citi-
 zens of Quebec. "Whether we worship
 at the same altar, whether we are affil-
 iated with one political party or the other,"
 he said, "we are all united by a
 proud confidence in the resources of our
 country, in the possibilities of their de-

Many Men Back From Europe

New York, Oct. 23.—Charles M. Schwab, who returned from Europe, said to the Wall Street Journal:—"There is no truth whatever in a published statement that my mission to Europe was to raise money to build a fleet of ships, or that I was going to float a loan. I found industrial depression which is under way here prevalent in Europe also, and I arrived at the conclusion that I could make better contracts later, as I believe prices will be lower. I understand the U. S. Steel Corporation is operating about 83 per cent of pig iron capacity, and while there is as yet no heavy decline in production, the scarcity of orders indicates that there will be a heavy falling off in the near future.

RETAIL BEEF PRICES DROP BECAUSE OF TARIFF

The retail prices of beef have dropped from two to two cents a pound on different grades in Detroit, since the new tariff law went into effect. When the Senate became operative the beginning of the month, several carloads of cattle were imported from Canada, but few have come since. Detroit retail butchers, which has had the effect of raising prices in the Canadian cities along the border. The tariff on stock raised in a wheat famine in Windsor, but now large numbers of Canadian cattle are coming in from the interior of the province, making the supply almost unlimited, but having no apparent effect on prices. Retailers do not expect there will be any reduction, because Detroit can absorb all the surplus stock raised in the western part of Ontario. Buffalo and the New England cities are expected to take all that Canada has for export in the east.

MANITOBA'S CROP

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 23.—From seventy-six points in Manitoba come reports of average crop as to yield, and decidedly more than an average crop as to quality. Threshing is complete, a very large amount of grain has been moved, the weather has been good throughout, and there has been no car shortage and no delay.

The coarse grains are not so satisfactory as wheat. There are yields of from twenty-five to thirty bushels to the acre, nearly all in the north, where the averages in wheat are not so large as in the south and centre. In the south are found thirteen, fourteen, fifteen and sixteen bushel averages.

So far as Manitoba is concerned, her grain crop is safe, being all thrashed, and the weather conditions are such as to insure a profitable harvest. It is estimated that the crop of 1913 is safe, and that the crop of 1914 is safe, and that the crop of 1915 is safe.

WHAT ABOUT RATES WHEN G. T. P. TRAINS GET INTO MONCTON?

A Question Put Up to Mr. Gutelius at His Conference With Board of Trade Members

Mr. Gutelius was asked at the conference with the board of trade yesterday what would be likely to happen when the Grand Trunk Pacific would be ready to deliver freight at Moncton. Would it come to St. John or go to Halifax? Mr. Gutelius replied that St. John would have the advantage of the short haul. He was promptly asked what advantage the short haul would be to St. John if the intercolonial made such terms with the Grand Trunk Pacific as it made with the Canadian Pacific. If the intercolonial Railway makes it profitable for the C. P. R. to haul freight all the way from St. John to Halifax, would it not make it still more profitable for the Grand Trunk Pacific to haul freight from Moncton to Halifax?

This query does not appear to have been satisfactorily answered. It appears to be probable that making arrangements for running rights the greater distance to Halifax from Moncton will be diverged. In other words, St. John will suffer that Halifax may flourish.

BIG RANCH PROJECT

Meat From South Africa Week Shorter Time Than From Argentina

London, Oct. 23.—It is announced that the Chartered Company of Rhodesia contemplate going into ranching on a large scale. The company will construct branch lines from the Cape-to-Cairo Railroad, which will enable it to supply Europe with meat by a route which will be a week shorter in the time of transportation than from Argentina to Beef.

It is not known how far the Beef Trust is interested in the development of the scheme, but ranch directors of Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming, the Dakotas and Nebraska are said to be enthusiastic over the possibility of ranching in Rhodesia. Some Colorado ranchmen are about to sail for South Africa to confer with Right Hon. Sir Leander Starr Jameson, better known as Dr. Jameson, who is now on his way there from London.

Royal Liners' Work Come Here

The Mail has definite information to the effect that the Royal line of steamships will make their winter sailings from St. John, instead of Halifax, as they have done in the past. The report to this effect was positively denied by D. D. Hanna, third vice-president and general manager of the Royal line, who stated that the Royal line, for instance, speaking of the proposal to divert the Royal liners from Halifax, their adopted port, and a port which they want to continue to use, to St. John, a port which they do not want to go to, following the lead of the Herald, said yesterday:

W. E. STAVERT MAY HEAD PAPER COMBINE

It is announced that W. E. Stavert was elected president of the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Ltd., on Oct. 9. Mr. Stavert is a director of the Lake Superior Paper Co., which is now a part of the Spanish River combine. This would make the third presidential change within a few weeks.

C. H. Mead, who is to be included in the new Spanish board, was vice-president and general manager of the Lake Superior Co. He is also president of the Mead Pulp and Paper Co., with plants near Dayton, Ohio.

The annual statement of the Lake Superior Co. for the period ending June 30, 1913, which has just been issued, shows net earnings from operations of \$184,878. The four paper machines in use by the company have a daily capacity of 200 tons of news print, but only a portion of this plant was in operation during the greater period of last year.

After deducting interest charges for the period on first mortgage bonds amounting to \$149,986, and interest on bank advances, a surplus of \$4,767 is shown. The assets of the company are put down at \$14,809,411.

The Kiev Trial

Kiev, Russia, Oct. 23.—When the trial of Mendel Beiliss for the murder of a Christian boy, Yushinsky, in March, 1911, reopened this morning, the prisoner's counsel called the attention of the presiding judge to the fact that, although the court sat yesterday, from early in the morning, until midnight, the prisoner's name had not been mentioned even once. Counsel asked the president to put this on record, and he consented to do so.

RECIPROcity MORE BENEFIT

(Continued from page 1.) The Captain contended that the island is not yet feeling the effects of reciprocity, for several reasons. Maine has an immense crop, more than it can house and sell. The farmers there, anticipating a Canadian influx of potatoes, had commandeered all railway cars obtainable and rushed forward train loads upon train loads into the distribution market. On one day last week 400 loaded cars stood on the Boston tracks at the depot, and the markets slumped.

The completion of tariff revision synchronized with potato growing in the New England States. This helped the farmers there; moreover the old duties will have to be paid till the new indexes are prepared and put in the hands of the collectors. This will take more than a week. Of course the duties will be readjusted by liquidators later, but it makes shipping hesitate, and freight tariffs also have to be readjusted, and many other arrangements such as train connections, etc., must be made.

Although we import large quantities of potatoes and vegetables from the United States, they are imported only when we have none of our own. In Canada there is an interval between the old and new crops of vegetables, potatoes, etc., when we are entirely dependent on the states for our supplies. In the States there is no interregnum such as we have, because there the early new stock from the south meets the end of the late crop of the north about the middle of June, and it is the early new crop of potatoes and vegetables which we import so largely. They do not come into competition with our farmers' products at all.

A lowering of tariffs also means a great increase in the trade in oats of which the island is a large producer. Already twenty million bushels of Canadian oats are sold to go across the border even in the face of a 6 cent a bushel duty. The captain strongly emphasizes the fact that the reciprocity agreement would have been far more advantageous to us than the lowering of the United States tariff, although the latter step is quite an improvement over former conditions. Under the present tariff there is a duty of \$2 on hay, Reciprocity made hay free. This year under reciprocity the island farmers would get fully the whole \$2 more for their hay, because the crop in the states is ten million tons short. Argentina under the new tariff will export alfalfa in immense quantities to the states.

Colon Has Earthquake

Colon, Oct. 23.—An earthquake shock lasting about fifteen seconds occurred here at eight minutes past nine o'clock this morning. Houses were rocked and clocks stopped but no damage was reported in this city. The tremor has been exceeded in intensity by only one other shock since Oct 10.



SOMETHING LIKE "DOWNING STREET"

(Halifax Recorder)

The Tory press of Canada laughs at the idea that it is at all necessary to keep an eye on Canada's autonomy, and declares that "Downing Street" is a mere figment of Liberal imagination, a ghost that haunts and disturbs the dreams of Liberal politicians. Even Mr. Samuel, the brilliant British postmaster general, declares that "Downing Street no longer exists."

The argument, however, does not satisfy C. H. Cahon, who is about the Toryist Tory in Canada. He thinks that, judging by the attitude of British statesmen, there is little chance of Canadians ever being represented in the imperial parliament, or sharing in the direction of Britain's foreign policy. In a recent letter appearing in the columns of the Montreal Gazette, he comments at length upon a remark of prominent Peterson that "there is no want of good-will on the other side of the water towards the aspiration of Canadians to attain within the empire a recognized equality of political status."

He evidently is of opinion that, if this is true, the British authorities have a peculiar method of expressing their willingness to admit Canadians into direct partnership in foreign affairs. Mr. Cahon sums up his contentions as follows:

(1) That any form of imperial federation involving representation from Canada in the British or so-called imperial parliament is "a dead issue"; and

(2) That "the conduct of foreign policy, the conclusion of treaties, the declaration of war," and, in fact, all foreign relations, "must remain the sole prerogative of the cabinet," which, so far as Canada is concerned, is utterly irresponsible. The high political duties and responsibilities of the British executive cannot be shared with the government or people of Canada, directly or indirectly.

Nevertheless, Mr. Asquith tersely suggests that there are responsibilities to which we Canadians are entitled, and which it is our duty to assume!

Canadians may, according to Mr. Asquith, enjoy a "growing participation in the burdens of the empire." Mr. Samuel, though more tactfully, recently pressed home the same issue.

Canada may make naval contributions. Great Britain will cheerfully extend them.

Canada may build Dreadnoughts. Great Britain shall control and manage them.

Canada may suffer the devastation and ruin of war. Great Britain alone shall declare war.

Canada may desire the blessings of peace. Great Britain alone shall determine its duration.

Canadians may aspire to enjoy the civil and political liberty guaranteed to their fathers under the British constitution, but the statesmen of Great Britain insist that we must be kept in a state of perpetual tutelage.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 20—"I've fought my last battle unless the public thinks I am good enough to come back," remarked Battling Nelson, the durable Dane, as he walked down the aisle of the big rink after his terrible round battle with Ad Wolgast, the Michigan bearcat, and the man who won the title from Nelson three years ago in a remarkable contest of forty rounds.

There was just a gleam of sadness in Batt's eyes as he made his exit from the ring, for in his heart he realized that he was no longer the durable Dane that had been able to stand all light-weights back up when he went after them. The former stamina was gone, but the gameness was there as strong as ever, and the willingness to fight as long as he had a leg to stand on was also evident.

Canadians desire to enjoy the full rights of responsible government. British statesmen reply that our request is "obviously reasonable," and then suggest that we should be satisfied with a representative on the committee of defence, knowledge of the policy and proceedings of the imperial government.

Possibly the passing years may at some period see all difficulties removed and see all the countries of the empire bound up in a constitutional union, sending their representatives to London and receiving laws therefrom. By that time probably Canada and Australia each will have a greater population than the mother country, a larger representation, a greater influence, will the mother country ever be likely to submit to such a condition of things? Some sort of a federal union with an imperial advisory council is more likely to be the ultimate form which the empire will take. Meaning, according to C. H. Cahon, it is not effort ill-spent to keep half an eye on Downing Street. When we remember that it was British Liberalism which gave the colonies self-government, and that it is British Liberalism which is so generous or complaisant towards dominion aspirations than are Mr. Asquith and his followers, Canada must march forward on Canadian feet for ever, and yet; and in the meantime would it not be the wisest policy for her to proceed to develop her sea defence by organizing a navy owned and manned by herself without indefinitely waiting for the full imperial partnership about which so much is talked without any clear conception of what it involves?

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THE MEXICAN ELECTION

(Bangor Commercial)

The date set for the presidential election in Mexico is Oct. 26, and it is doubtful if any nation has ever approached an election in a more unsettled state. There have been no parades, no rallies, and few attempts at arousing enthusiasm. A few placards have been posted announcing candidates and that is about all. Although the date of election is less than a week away no one knows how many candidates there will be in the field. Thus far there have been actual announcements of three candidates, those of Federico Gamboa, General Felix Diaz and Manuel Calero. Gamboa is the nominee of the Catholic party, and has had a wide experience as a diplomat, having filled various diplomatic positions in European countries before he was recalled to Mexico to occupy the post of assistant secretary of Foreign Affairs. He is a man of high culture and has written several books on international affairs as well as a number of volumes of fiction.

The Liberal party is offering two candidates, Diaz and Calero, each being politically affiliated with the Liberals. The former is the nephew of Porfirio Diaz, so long president of Mexico, a graduate of the Chapultepec Military academy and a man of refinement and culture. Calero is a lawyer and a politician, was secretary of state and ambassador to Washington, under Madero, but resigned the latter post, because not in sympathy with the Madero policies.

These are the candidates, but there may be others in the field at any hour. Huerta may conclude to enter the lists and so may General Blanquet, secretary of war. The outcome of the election is problematical, but the result will probably be satisfactory to Huerta. His political opponents say the election will amount to nothing, and Carranza states that it will not be participated in or its results recognized by the Constitutionalists. Americans in Mexico have written to Washington their belief that the election under the existing circumstances will be but a mere farce and such certainly seems to be the indications.

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A CHRISTIAN WORK

To the Editor of The Halifax Echo:

Sir—I read with the greatest interest, your account of the luncheon of Halifax business men, at which the plan was developed of establishing a home for wayward Protestant girls. It has been for years a disgrace to Protestantism in Nova Scotia that there has been no such home. Many years ago our Catholic friends realized the need of such an institution for their girls, and provided it in the Monastery of the Good Shepherd, which competent authority tells me is doing a work, the equal for good of that done by any of the numerous charities for which Halifax is famed.

Eleven years ago the government of Nova Scotia made an offer to the Protestants of partial support for such a home—an offer still open, but not yet taken advantage of. Now that the matter has been actively taken up by the various Protestant bodies, as Dr. Macmillan has explained, I hope that it will not be long till the disgrace under which we now rest will be removed. The need is very urgent.

Two years ago, I corresponded with all my brethren of the county court, inquiring how many Protestant girls of suitable age to be sent to a home were before them as delinquents in one form or another during the course of a year. I found that year by year from twelve to fifteen girls for want of a home to

send them to were either to herd with common criminals in the county jail—think God that was seldom done—or, an alternative little better, allowed to go free and return to the wretched environment that in nearly all cases had made them what they were. But in addition to those who actually come before the courts there are at least an equal number, who should be brought there, and would, but for the fact that it has now become pretty generally known that nothing reformatory can be done; and few there are who want these youthful females generally more sinned against than sinning sent to jail.

I believe I am within the mark in saying that each year there is a roll of twenty-five Protestant girls lost to the church and society, to whom such a home, as is proposed would give just the chance they are not having—the chance of escape from the way whose end is death to a straight and honorable life.

I don't know that if anything I can write will have any influence with the charitably disposed among the wealthy Protestants of Nova Scotia; but I do most earnestly plead with them to remove, and that quickly, the disgrace that in this matter attaches to us. Surely they could engage in no more Christian, Christ-like work.



SOME THINGS

MR. GUTELIUS MIGHT EXPLAIN

Local Rates and the Special C. P. R. Gift—Mr. Hazen and The Royal Liners

"The people of St. John," said a citizen to the Times this morning, "will have ample time during the coming winter, if the Gutelius agreement is ratified, to meditate upon the ways of politicians. They will be able to do it as they wait at the Mill street crossing, while C. P. R. trains are being shunted back and forth for the traffic to and from Halifax, causing with the local traffic a far greater congestion than has ever been experienced at Mill street crossing in the past. 'I can't quite understand,'" continued this citizen, "if it is true, as Mr. Gutelius says, that a very profitable bargain has been made for C. P. R. through traffic between St. John and Halifax, why it should be necessary to jump up the rates on local patrons of the road, and add that extra one-third to the fare at Thanksgiving Day and other public holidays. But no one asked him to explain this matter, for we have his own word for it that he does not come to St. John to be pestered with questions."

"Nobody connected with the board of trade appears to have asked Mr. Gutelius whether he regards present rates of freight from Montreal to Halifax, compared with the rates from Montreal to St. John, as discriminatory. As an able railway man he should be able to answer that question. Was he asked? 'But run along,' said the citizen, 'for I get going on the iniquity of the deal that is being handed out to the city of St. John, for the benefit of the Canadian Pacific and the port of Halifax, your paper will not hold the half of what I would like to say.'"

"But say," he called out, as the Times man moved away, "did you observe that in Halifax our Mr. Hazen is jumping with trying to get a few sailings of the Royal line away from them, as a sop for St. John, to soothe us after the loss of the big Empress and Allan lines? And they are ready to fight for those Royal steamships at the drop of the hat. They want to hog it all," as the mayor would say. "Don't we wish we had a few real fighters in St. John just now?"

ACROBATS THESE MEN ON STRUCTURAL WORK OF NEW POST OFFICE

Performances of Some of Them in Carrying Out Duties Make Spectators Stand in Amazement

Passers by in Prince William street who paused for a few minutes to watch the bustling scene on the site of the new post office, stand longer than they realize, particularly held interested by the men erecting the iron frame of the new building.

Yesterday afternoon four uprights were in place, reaching to what will be the third story. Several cross pieces were being swung into position and it was amazing to see the activity and fearlessness with which these men carried on their hazardous work. Especially gripping and attention was the facility with which they scaled the heights with grip of strong hands and knee pressure on the iron columns. One or two went up as readily as an ordinary individual would climb a flight of stairs.

One who appeared to be directing the operations was conspicuous for his coolness and apparent fearlessness that a fall would mean serious injury. He stood on the narrow cross girder, issued his orders and watched the work. Then he wanted to know so he took out a tobacco, cut enough, filled the pipe and walked to one side where he lit it behind the screen of the upright.

Then came a request from the men on the girder above for some bolts. A workman on the ground tossed them to the foreman and he balanced himself and caught them without trouble. In throwing them to the man higher up on the work there was a miss on two tries and the foreman calmly put on his gauntlets and with hand and knees ascended one of the columns with the bolts in the pocket of his overalls.

Clinging with legs around the column and one hand grip, he used the other hand to deliver the bolts. One came readily but the other became caught in the pocket and after trying to free it and finding it still stuck he used both hands and clung solely by pressure while spectators looked on in amazement. He completed his message he quickly let himself slide down the column.

The men appeared to pay no heed to the interested watchers but went about their dangerous work as mechanically as if they were on the solid ground.

DOUGLAS AVENUE TO HAVE FULL WATER SUPPLY THIS AFTERNOON

Water will be turned on in the new mains at the western end of Douglas avenue this afternoon. The last connecting link between the new mains and the previously existing system was completed today, and before the afternoon is over the city water supply will be carried the whole length of Douglas avenue to the bridges.
