In conformity with the rule which provides means to aid in the support of the children of our Ministers, the proportion of the Children's Fund to be contributed by each member in full connexion, is 33 cents:

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

That after exercising the greatest care in the investigation of the several returns, they have great pleasure in reporting an evident improvement, and are satisfied that by rigid adherence to the rules laid down by the Conference, the entire operations of the fund another year will be perfectly satisfactory. In the inauguration of the Fund, a great deal of trouble and perplexity has been experienced; and your Committee beg to urge that the laws of the Conference affecting the Fund be insisted upon with unwavering fidelity, convinced that by such a course alone will your Committee ke saved from inconvenience, and the contributors and participants enjoy equal advantages.

Your Committee regret that in one or two instances the returns of the names and ages of children as claimants, have not been made or recorded in the District Journals, and they express a hope that a similar omission will not again occur.

The number of children provided for by the fund have been as follows; viz., in 1857, '58, 383; in 1858, '59, 442; giving an increase of 59. In 1859, '60, 486; showing an excess of 43; the number for the present year is found to be 520, giving an increase on the former year of 38, representing the sum of \$1050.

In the first of the y ars mentioned, viz., 1857, '58, after paying for 383 children there was a balance against the fund of \$469; in 1858, '59, after providing for the balance and for 442 children, there was a balance on the same side of \$431; in 1859, '60, provision was made for the extinction of this balance; but claims not estimated, and amounting to \$315, and which are justly allowed, have disappointed the expectations of your Committee.

Nevertheless, having no accurate data to guide them, your Committee are happy to say. that notwithstanding the large c-1 increase in the number of claimants, and the arrears to be provided for, the increase in the number of members this year will enable your Committee to meet all the claims next year, without imposing an additional rate, the amount of 33c per member being just sufficient.

1. Resolved That on account of the variable dates of holding District Meetings, the rule fixing the time when children shall commence and cease to be claimants, shall be so altered as to make the 15th May the date of commencing and terminating all such claims.

2. Resolved That no claims shall be allowed—without special appeal to the Conference—when the names of children and date of birth, as well as numbers, shall not be reported at the May District Meetings, or not inserted in the duplicate Minutes of the same.

3 Resolved That each Financial Secretary shall make the returns of members, names, ages, and dates of birth of all claimants on the Children's Fund to the General Treasurer on the first day of Conference, taking such returns from the Minutes of the May District Meeting.

4. Resolved That the Constitution be so amended that the Financial Secretaries shall be the Board of the Children's Fund.

5. Resolved That the Rev. G. R. Sanderson and Murray Anderson, Esq., be the General Treasurers, and that Rev. S. D. Rice be General Secretary.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Sabbath School Committee beg leave to report. That having examined and compiled all the returns made by the

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several districts, and after having bestowed as much attention to the whole subject as lay in their power, rejoice to be able to congratulate the Conference on the satisfactory and encouraging success which has attended the culture of this field of labour, as is to be seen in the increase of the number of Schools, Teachers, and Scholars. They have been also furnished with satisfactory evidence of increased efficiency in the conducting of them and their general management. Numerous instances of conversion have been reported. Some hundreds of the pupils meet in Class, but the exact number could not be ascertained owing to defective returns; in many cases the absence of all returns. Bible and select classes are reported from many of the districts, though not from all.

Reference was made in former Reports to what are called Union Schools, and which still exist in many of our Circuits, and are more or less patronized by our people; but your Committee are perguaded that so far as the interests of our Church are concerned, in adding to its numbers and in disseminating its doctrines and principles, the inverse of gain and advantage is the result; and would earnestly recommend the formation of Wesleyan Schools, where at all practicable, however small and feeble they may be in their incipient state, as they believe that on the whole they would be found productive of the most benefit.

They would also respectfully urge the necessity of a careful selection of books for Libraries, as we are convinced that though in apparent cheapness of price, we cannot compete with Societies organized for the purpose of issuing such publications, and which are supported by voluntary donations, yet we are satisfied, that after all, our own books are greatly in regard to the matter contained in them; and that, on the whole, they are cheaper and better than what issues from cheap presses, much of which being novels of the smallest-

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grade, and containing little mental nutrition for a child, much less for an adult.

We regret that our own catechisms are not more generally used in our schools and families, the merits of which are second to none; perhaps such a compilation and compression of religious truth is to be found in no other Church. We therefore sincerely hope that our brethren will not be deterred from strongly and persistently urging their use throughout our whole Church by the ery of Sectarianism, by whomsoever or wheresover it may be uttered.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Having carefully examined all the duplicate minutes from the several Districts, they find that there are six Districts from which we have no return of 'other preaching places.' Of the twenty-one Districts, only fourteen have made any return of Parsonages : from several Districts we have no return of Burial Places. Only two Districts have made returns of the number of attendants at our churches and other places of worship, and only one that has made a return of the valuation of church property.

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For the want of uniform and correct returns from all the Districts, your Committee are unable to make any general reliable report, and therefore recommend to the Conference that suitable schedules be printed for each District, setting forth the particulars to be contained in the Report on church property in each District, that uniformity throughout our whole connection may be observed in future in the returns made.

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COMMITTEE OF COMMUTATION .- 1859-60.

The following brethren were appointed by the Conference a Committee of Finance to estimate the amount of compensation payable into the Connexional Funds, in order to entitle Ministers, coming to us from other churches, to the usual claims upon the said funds:

Revs. E. Wood, D.D.; J. Douse, A Green, D.D.; S D. Rice-S. Rose, R. Jones, G. R. Sanderson, A. Hurlburt, H. Wilkinson, and J. C. Slater.

At the Conference of 1859 the brethren met, according to appointment, and the following resolutions were adopted :

1. Resolved,---That the following rule be accepted for estimating the commutation claims upon the Children's Fund :

Multiply the number of years the minister has travelled by the number of years the children respectively will be claimants on the fund, and divide the product by *three*, and the quotient will be the amount required (in dollars.) 2. Resolved.—That the following rule be accepted for estimating the commutation for claims upon the Superannuated Preachers' Fund :

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Multiply the number of years the minister has travelled by itself, and the product will be the amount in dollars of the compensation required.

3 The sums received in compensation for claims upon our funds, shall be payable to the Treasurer of the said funds, and invested for their benefit.

4. The payment of these sums is to be made to the Treasurers of the Funds, on entrance into our connexion; but in cases where it may be deemed necessary, the Treasurer is authorized to grant an extension of time for a balance of not more than four-fifths of the whole amount, and for a term not exceeding four years, in the case of the Superannuated Fund—and for a term not exceeding two years, in the case of the Children's Fund. WESLEYAN PROPRIETARY FEMALE COLLEGE

The Committee appointed by the Conference to consider the memorial of certain members of the Church in Hamilton, beg to report.

That they conceive that the opportunity afforded of purchasing the Buildings in Hamilton, known as the Anglo American Hotel is one which should be embraced, and that it will furnish accommodation such as is not to be found in any branch of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and one in every way an honour to our Church in Canda.

Having heard from the deputation, £. Jackson, and J. Lister, Esqs., their views on the subject of the memorial, they recommend to the Conference the following, as general principles on which they may usefully and safely act.

First. That the Institution be Proprietary,--the entire financial responsibility to rest on the proprietors.

Second. That the religious and Methodistic character may be secured by having a directory to be composed of one-third ministers and two-thirds laymen. Of the laymen at least eight out of ten shall be proprietors and members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada. The one-third ministers to be appointed by the Conference, and may or may not be proprietors.

That the directory so appointed have the educational and religious as well as financial direction, subject, however, to the following rule: That the Principal or Governor be a member of this Conference, the nomination to be in the directory, but the appointment in the Conference. If, however, the Conference cannot at any time suit the wishes of the directory, they may fill the appointment for the time, but not otherwise than by a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada.

The Committee would further suggest that if the Conference accede to the wishes of the memorialists on these principles, they appoint a small Committee to meet the provisional directors elected by the proprietors to form an act of incorporation, and facilitate the opening of the institution as soon as practicable.

The Report was adopted, and the following resolution :

Resolved, that a Committee of five members of this Conference be nominated by the President, and appointed to aid in carrying out the project of establishing a Proprietary Female College at Hamilton.

The following constitute the Committee, viz., The President of the Conference, the Rev. Dr. Wood, the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Rev. R. Jones, Rev. S. D. Rice, and the Rev. George Douglas.

RESOLUTIONS ON THE UNIVERSITY QUESTION AND VICTORIA COLLEGE.

Whereas the Conference at its last session in the City of Hamilton, expressed its views deliberately and explicitly on the subject of A cademical education, by means of denominational colleges, as well as a non-denominational college; and the expenditure of the University Endowment for the equal aid of all colleges according to their works, therefore,

1. Resolved, That the Conference now assembled, after the calm deliberations and discussions of the past year, most solemnly and unanimously re-affirms the opinions and principles formerly expressed, and determines to use all lawful means to carry them into effect.

2. Resolved, That this Conference hereby expresses its entire approval of the course pursued by the President of the Conference, and those members of the Special Committee, to whom was assigned the duty of expounding and defending 'the views of the Conference, and for an elaborate series of articles which as approved by the Committee first appeared in the columns of the *Christian Guardian*, and were afterwards printed in pamphlet form previously to the meeting of the last session of Parliament.

3. Resolved, That this Conference, after a careful review of the proceedings of a Parliamentary Committee, appointed on the petition of this Conference, to investigate the complaints made against the expenditures, and reduction of the University Endowment and Income, and the system of University College, takes this opportunity of gratefully acknowledging its obligations to the President of the Conference, the President of Victoria College, the Rev. Dr. Green, and the Rev. W. H. Poole, for the able manner in which they conducted the exposition and defence of the views and claims of this body, and more especially to the Rev. Dr. Ryerson for the conclusive a mittee the at Colleg

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view of nted on uplainis Univeriversity ledging Presihe Rev. cted the s body, conclusive and powerful address which he delivered before the Committee, in defence of the rights of our people, and in reply to the attacks and misrepresentations of the partizens of Toronto College monopoly.

4. Resolved, That this Conference rejoices in the fact that, notwithstanding the opposition of interested parties, the information communicated by various means; in Quarterly Meetings and District Conventions, has induced our beloved people, throughout the country generously to co-operate with and sustain the action of the Conference at its last session; the laity during the discussions of the past year have rallied round the common standard of Christian education, justice and patriotism, and by petitions to Parliament, have strengthened the hearts and hands of those who were necessitated to conduct the controversy, and we do hereby cordially acknowledge the assistance thereby rendered in the maintenance of the great principles of justice and righteousness.

5. Resolved, That we feel it a solemn duty to the youth of our congregations, and the future welfare of our country to continue in connexion with our brethren and friends throughout the land, the discussion of the great question of Christian collegiate education, and to use all proper means to give effect to the prayer of the Memorials which have been adopted by this Conference, by sixteen District Conventions, and two hundred and fifty Quarterly Meetings of the Ministers and laity of our Church.

6. Resolved, That disavowing all connection with, or spirit of, political party, yet as a just, sound, Christian, and national system of Academical education can be established only by the Legislature, we affectionately urge our people not to forego the exercise of their undoubted rights as citizens, but by all peaceable and lawful means to secure the ends of justice; and hereby reiterate the sentiments of the seventh resolution passed at the last Conference, that 'we affectionately entreat the members of our Church to use their influence to elect, as far as possible, public men who are favourable to the views expressed in the foregoing resolutions, and do equal justice to those who wish to give a superior religious education to the youth of the country, as well as those who desire for their sons a non-denominational education alone.'

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7. Resolved, That the cordial thanks of this Conference be tendered to the Honourable Malcolm Cameron, M.P.P., for presenting the Memorial of this Conference to the Legislative Assembly, and for procuring the investigation into the matters of which we and our people have complained; also to David Roblin, Esq., M.P.P., for his active and efficient cooperation and aid during the investigation of the University question by the Special Committee of the Legislative Assembly.

8. Resolved, That the cordial thanks of this Conference be recorded, in respect to those Members of the Legislature who have supported our junctuations on the University question, and the grants of aid to Victoria College.

9. Resolved, That the respectful and cordial thanks of this Conference be presented to the Honourable Attorney General and other members of the Government for Upper Canada, for the increased aid mecommended by them to Parliament in behalf of Victoria College, pending the settlement of the University question.

RESOLUTIONS RELATING TO VICTORIA COLLEGE.

1. That this Conference is deeply impressed with the neces sity and importance of general and systematic effort to sustain the University of Victoria College, embracing, as it does, not only an undergraduate course of University studies, but also

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e neces sustain oes, not but also an English and preparatory Grammar School, imparting a thorough English and Grammar School Education to those youth who do not pursue the higher studies of the University.

2. That each Minister or Preacher pledge himself, independent of former subscriptions, to contribute at least ten cents to the support of Victoria College during the present Conference year, and use his utmost exertions to induce the members of our congregations under his charge to do the same, since every member of our Congregations has as much personal and natural interest in our College as his Minister.

3. That we affectionately entreat the members of our congregations to co-operate with us in this general and systematic effort to sustain with increased efficiency one of the most important institutions of our church and country.

4. That a copy of these resolutions be published in the Minutes and the *Guardian*; and that each Financial District Meeting be instructed to devise the best means to carry them into effect within the Circuits of its own jurisdiction.

5. That the Chairman of each District be directed to bring the foregoing resolutions before the Financial District Meeting over which he presides; and that each Superintendent of a Circuit be directed to bring them before the Quarterly Meeting of his Circuit.

6. That the several sums raised in accordance with the foregoing resolutions, be transmitted to the Treasurer of Victoria College as soon after the first day of next January as possible.

THE CONFERENCE OF 1861.

Resolved, That the number of Ministers allowed to attend the Conference for the year 1861, shall be 200, and the young men to be received into full connection.

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2. That the Secretary of Conference shall ascertain according to the Resolution of 1859, the number of members of Conference, and publish in the Minutes the proportion to be appointed by each District Meeting

I. RELATING TO THE BOOK-ROOM.

Resolved, That every Minister and Preacher is henceforthy peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the Meeting of Conference.

Resolved, That in case of any Brother who is indebted to the amount of \$100 to the Book-Room, the Book-Steward shall be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of any connexional funds on which that Brother may have a claim, to the amount of not more than 25 per cent of his claim annually, until his debt is paid; and that a like proportion prevail when the indebtedness is larger than the sum named.

Resolved, That Brethren indebted to the Book-Room, they not being claimants on the connexional funds, be required to settle all overdue accounts and pay the same within two years.

II. THE CO-DELEGATES

Resolved, That the same individual we if not be nominated Co-Delegate oftener than once in four years.

Resolved. That the subject of the division of this Conference into two or more Annual Conferences, be referred to the Conference Special Committee, to prepare a plan and report to this body at its next session.

IV. CHAIRMEN AND DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Resolved, That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the General Superintendent of Missions, the amounts recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as far as practicable, after the close of each meeting.

RESOLUTION OF 1859.

Resolved, That the Financial District Meetings shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of the Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

V. CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

Resolved, That the Conference be recommended to require, as an invariable pre-requisite to obtain aid from the Churh Relief Fund, that every Board of Trustees applying for aid shall pay at least \$7.00 assuming the existence of seven Trustees on each Board.

VI. YOUNG MEN AT COLLEGE.

Resolved,—That the Rule of the Constitution of the Education Fund requiring that no young man shall be sent to Victoria College by the Conference who has not travelled at least one year, does not apply to those undergraduates, who, according to the practice of the past few years, have been, or may be recommended by the District Meeting two years previous to their graduations, to be received on trial.

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VII. CONCERNING THE GOWN.

Resolved, That the practice of wearing the gown by our Ministers, being contrary to the generally established usages of our Church in Canada, repugnant to the feelings of a great majority of our ministers and people, and calculated to foster unnecessary jealousies and divisions in our Church, this Conference strongly disapproves of the introduction of such practice into any of our Churches.

Resolved, That this Resolution is not designed to apply to those churches in Canada East in which the use of the gown has previously obtained.

VIII. DELEGATES OF THE EASTERN BRITISH AMERICAN CONFERENCE.

Resolved, That this Conference has experienced unmingled pleasure at the visit of the Rev. Dr. Pickard and the Rev. James R. Narraway, M. A., Representatives of the Eastern British American Conference, and with the interesting and valuable communications which they have made, and we express to them our cordial thanks for the services they have rendered during their intercourse with us; and we offer our earnest prayers for their safe return to their families and brethren of our common family of Methodism in the neighbouring British American Provinces.

IX. REPRESENTATIVES TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE.

Resolved, That the Rev. Dr. Hoole and the Rev. James Spencer be appointed Representatives of this Conference to the next session of the British Conference.

X. THANKS TO THE EX-SECRETARY.

Resolved, That the cordial thanks of this Conference be given to the Rev. E. B. Harper, M. A., for the faithful and efficient manner in which he discharged the duties of the Secretary of the Conference during the past year,

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

We give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ for the exceeding riches of his grace in bringing us together again in our annual assembly, for mutual counsel upon the interests of the Church over which the Holy Ghost has set us the chief pastors and teachers. Amidst the perils of another year we have been graciously preserved, and meet with our number undiminished by death. For these mercies we offer our grateful acknowledgn.ents to Him who has thus 'crowred the year with his goodness,' who suffers not a hair to fall from the head of his saints without his notice, and who confers immortality upon his faithful servants until their appointed work is performed, and a meetness for the promised reward attained. With the blessing of life has also been conferred that measure of grace which has kept us from being overcome by the evils, which we, in common with the whole Church/of the saints on earth, are beset; and though much of humiliation is associated with a review of the past, yet we devoutly thank the 'God of all grace,' who has shielded us in our conflicts, and caused us to triumph in the salvation of his Son. And we trust that as the ministers of the Church, and the servants of the Lord's people,

we enter upon the duty of our accustomed salutations and counsels under an increasingly vivid sense that we should be the 'living epistles' of the truth we proclaim to others, and that neither mental endowments nor literary and scientific attainments avail anything to the professed minister of Christ, in the absence of that knowledge which 'makes us wise unto salvation,' and skillful and attractive in winning sculs. With these sentiments and emotions, we trust inspired by the Lord the Spirit, we give you 'the word of exhortation, in order that we may be t'e helpers of your joy, so that when called to render up our trust, we may rejoice with you as 'heirs together of the grace of life,' i that we have not run in vain, neither laboured in vain.'

We rejoice, that by the blessing of God upon our instrumentality, the labours of the past year resulted in an increase of 2,470 to the membership of the Church. Nearly six thousand more are cn trial. But what are there amidst the masses of our population yet in spiritual death Their peril, while out of Christ, calls for our earnest and be_ lieving prayer to God that they may be saved; and the tokens of Divine approbation during the past year should enkindle our zeal, and excite us to renewed effort to secure the speedy subjection of the world to Christ.

Permit us, then, dear brethren, in offering these our pastoral councels and admonitions, to remind you of the primary importance to you of the same blessing we endeavour to attain for ourselves—a clear sense of acceptance with God by faith in his Son, a diligent cultivation of personal religion, and the maintenance of circumspection and consistency in all your Christian walk and conversation in all the associations of life. We feel that we cannot too strongly urge upon you to rest not short of a renewed nature as the basis

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of Christian character, the starting point for the attainment of entire sanctification, and the only ground of a scriptural hope that a blessed immortality will finally be reached. Church membership without the grace which unites you to the living Head of the Church, and makes you living members of his body, will avail nothing but to augment the misery of the soul that comes short in the hour of final and deciding scrutiny. Neither the church of Paul, or Apollos, or Cephas, or Luther, or Knox, or Wesley, will be the instrument of your salvation, unless you receive through Christ a measure of that grace, which made Paul what he was,--which inspired the eloquence of Apollos,-which made I'eter firm as a rock in the midst of an untoward generation,which enabled Luther to triumph in his assaults upon the man of sin,-which emboldened Knox to rebuke wickedness in high places,-and which rendered a Wesley successful in arousing a nation slumbering in sin. And 'God is able to make this grace to abound towards you in all riches unto the full assurance of faith, to qualify you each in his sphere to work the work of him who hath called you into his kingdom, and sent you as labourers into his vineyard.

As parents, you need his grace to qualify you to take the Christian oversight of your households, and to make your habitations the dwellings of Jacob, from which your welltrained children shall come up to crowd the gates of Zion. And never did you need more of the wisdom and power of Divine grace than at the present, to qualify you to labour 'to frame and fashion yourselves and your families according to the doctrines of Christ; so as to make yourselves and them as much as in you lieth, 'wholesome examples and patterns' of a Christian family and household. 'The last of the eye, and the pride of life,' the whirlpool of fashion, and the se-D-1

ductions of respectable ungodliness,—the ball room, the theatrical lyceum,' and other forms of demoralizing amusements, meet them at every turn. Against these perils, the best and only safeguard is the religious training, which implants early, deep in the heart, a godly fear of coming near to the entrance of the way which leads down to the chambers of death.

Need we remind you, dear brethren, that whilst you should 'seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness,' you are not to overlook the important relations you sustain to the world. Your Christian citizenship does not render you less a citizen of the country of your nativity or adoption, and your subjection to Christ in no wise weakens the bond of your allegiance to the State. All your relations are sanctified by the reception of the truth as it is in Jesus, and the influence of your Christian profession should contribute directly to purify every institution of civil society. Far be it from us to exhort you to join in the strife of political partizanship. Whatever part you may be called to act in the exercise of your civil rights, you should ever remember that you are the servants of Christ as well as citizens of the State; and that you are set as 'the lights of the world, and the salt of the earth.' Let the potsherds strive with the potsherds of the earth; but let your aim be higher than that of a contest in which place and power are the coveted rewards of victory.

While you cherish unwavering loyalty to 'the powers that be,' be careful that the rights of your citizenship are always so exercised, as far as your influence extends, to make those powers such as 'are ordained of God, that you may lead quiet and peaceable lives in all godliness and honesty.' Give, your countenance and support to the professions of no man

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without a reasonable guarantee that he 'fears God and hates covetousness,' and if invested with power will be 'a minister of God to you for good, a terror to evil doers, and a praise to them that do well?' We venture on these admonitions and counsels from the deep conviction that the signs of the times indicate the necessity of vigilance and prayerful consideration. You cannot guard too diligently against the first departure from that 'righteousness which exalteth a nation,' since the laws of nature show how fearfully rapid is the accelerating speed of a descent towards the prevalence of those sins 'which are a disgrace to any people.' How much of Sabbath-breaking is in our land! How fearfully prevalent are the legalized and protected sources of misery and crime and death, sending out perpetually their bitter and burning streams which spread devastation in their course! Let your voices ever be heard uttering the stern rebuke against all unrighteousness and ungodliness of men, and by a christian denial of fleshly and worldly lusts, give the power of your testimony and example in favor of whatsoever things are pure and patriotic and humane.

We rejoice that, with us you are impressed with the importance of the cause of Obristian education, and have cordially united in the efforts to secure for the youth of our country the right and blessing of intellectual culture, under that kind of oversight which accords with their religious preferences. The outery of sectarianism comes too late to be heeded by those who have allowed the history of the past to teach them the admonitory truth, that a community educated, whether in the academy, or college, spart from the conservative power of a recognition of Divine truth and the sanctifying influence of its precepts, will be a nation wise only to do evil and prepared by their training for a more

pernicious use of their intellectual powers. We hope you will not be 'weary in well doing.' In every good work, opposing influences must be subdued, and obstacles removed by persevering determined labor, and those who serve their generation by the will of God shall reap the reward in due time if they fain not.

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We commend to your prayerful consideration and liberal support, all the institutions of the Church. Remember those who serve you in the ministry of the word. 'If they minister unto you in spiritual things,' it is not a matter of charity but of debt that you minister unto them in temporal things, nor can you withhold from them this ministration according to the ability that God giveth you, without incurring the cordemnation of Him who hears the cry of the laborer deprived of his hire.

Our Missionary enterprise claims your benevolence, and the wants of the needy who cannot supply themselves with the Word of life, must be met by the liberality of the Church, baptized with a Missionary spirit.

Avail yourselves of, and supply your families with our periodical and other literature, that you and yours may be nurtured in our doctrines, and be imbued with the spirit of enterprise, which a knowledge of our various departments of labor, and our success will not fail to inspire.

We earnestly exhort you to be Methodists, in your clear and joyous religious experience, in the spirituality of your closet devotions, in the punctuality of your attendance at the class-meeting, and all the other helps to a growth in grace. Thus living and laboring, God, even our God will bless you, and make his face to shine upon you, and cause his way through you to be made known upon the earth, and his saving health amongst ell people. you opd by nerne if

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clear your at the grace. s you, s way saving Now, he that ministereth seed to the sower, both minister bread for your food, and multiply the seed sown, and increase the fruits of your righteousness; being enricked in everything to all bountifulness, which causeth through us thanksgiving to God. For the administration of this service not only supplieth the wants of the saints, but is aburdant also by many thanksgivings unto God; whilst by the experiment of this ministration, they glorify God for your professed subjection unto the gospel of Christ, and for your liberal distribution unto them, and unto all men; and by their prayer for you, which long after you, for the exceeding grace of God in you. Thanks be unto God for his unspeakable gift.

BRITISH CONFERENCE

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE

IN CANADA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

If you are ours, we also are yours in the faith and service of Christ, and we cordially reciprocate the sentiments of affection and esteem which we have just received from your last Conference. We need hardly assure you, that it was not for want of affectionate interest in your affairs that the contemplated visit of our beloved brother, the Rev. Francis A. West, to Canada, was not accomplished. Circumstances which we were unable to control prevented the carrying out of this arrangement.

We greatly rejoice to learn that notwithstanding the financial trials to which your wisdom and patience have been subjected, you enjoy in all departments of your work such manifest tokens of the Divine favour and blessing. The prosperity of your Domestic and Foreign Missions in particular awakens in our minds very lively feelings of gratitude to God on your behalf, and of hope for your future enlargement and well-

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being. The auspicious commencement of your noble missions in British Columbia we regard as the Lord's seal set upon. the enterprise, and as a sure guarantee of its growing and triumphant success; and we doubt not that much good fruit will be found in its season, as the result of the praiseworthy efforts which you are making, in the face of many discouragements, to spread the knowledge of Christ among the French population of Lower Canada. Japan is geographically your own; and we trust the providence of God will soon open a great and effectual door into that interesting empire.

You will hear, with devout thanksgiving to the Great Head of the Church, that the state of British Methodism was never more healthy and promising than it is at present. The night and its sorrow are overpast, and we are gladdened with more than the joy of morning. Our finances are steadily improving. Our educational Establishments are in full and efficient action. The prospects of our work in the Army, and in the newly enclosed fields of our Home Missionary operations are highly encouraging. Our Societies, both in Great Britain and abroad, have rest, and are multiplied. God has been with us by evident signs during the sittings and religious services of the Conference. The cloud of blessing that has sent down its waters so plentifully upon the United States of America and the North of Ireland is beginning to spread over our sky, and to drop its fatness upon us. On every side our hearts are cheered by the fruits of harvest, and by the promise of better things to come.

It has afforded us unfeigned satisfaction to receive your warm expressions of attachment to the Methodist doctrine and discipline, as they have been handed down to us from our fathers. We are satisfied that the world never needed Methodism more than it now does; and Methodism, we believe, was never better prepared to fulfil its exangelical calling. Let Methodists everywhere be faithful to Ckrist, and

to the trust which he has committed to their hands; and we may assure ourselves that he will do for us, and for mankind at large, by our instrumentality, exceeding abundantly above all that we have hitherto asked or thought.

We heartily accede to your wishes in reference to the appointment of Dr. Stinson as President of your next Conference; of the Rev. Richard Jones as co-Delegate; and of the Rev. Enoch Wood as General Superintendent of your Missions. And we trust that both they and the whole body of your Ministers, together with all those who comesunder collective pastoral charge, may continue to enjoy the richest blessings of the common salvation. May God, even our own God, cause his face to shine upon you, and make you a thousand fold as many more as you are this day!

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA,

IN CONNEXION WITH THE BRITISH CONFERENCE,

TO THE

CONFERENCE IN ENGLAND.

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

The business of our Conference being nearly completed. we avail ourselves of the opportunity of again presenting to you our fraternal salutations, in the name of our Lord Jesus, whose we are and whom we serve. No information from you could be more cheering to our hearts, than that which relates . to the unity-peace and prosperity of the Church of God. In all your trials of late years we have sincerely sympathized. We believed that our God, the God of love and peace would prevent any permanently evil results following the extraordinary afflictions you have endured, and that all would be sanctified to the great end for which the Church is organized -the establishment of believers and the salvation of sinners. Now therefore we rejoice with you that "the state of British Methodism was never more healthy and promising than it is at present ;" that " the night of its sorrow is overpast, and you are gladdened with more than the joy of morning." Your references to religious and financial prosperity in your various departments of Christian enterprise are truly en-· couraging and gratifying.

In the widely extended territory embraced in the general operations of the Canada Conference, we have enjoyed the promised presence and blessing of the Saviour, whose Gospel we preach. In some parts of the country there have been remarkable outpourings of the Holy Spirit. Our increase this year has been two thousand four hundred and seventy. And we now number in full membership 47,765, and there are returned on trial five thousand eight hundred and sity-nine.

The beginning of the present year was a period of extraordinary unity in prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the whole world. The recommendation for united prayer-meetings throughout all Evangelical Christendom, emanating from the brethren of the Lodiana Mission, was very generally concurred in by all Christians in Canada, and by none more heartily than by the Ministers and members of our own Church. Meetings for prayer were never more numerously attended, and there was a general awakening of desire for the world's conversion. We need scarcely say, that the immediate result was a quickening of personal faith, accompanied with renewed exertions for the salvation of those by whom we are surrounded. It was felt that the time to favour Zion, "yea, the set time was come," to which the prophet refers, when he says, " Many people shall go and say come ye and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob, and he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths ; for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem."

The past year has not been without its peculiar trials, relating to a question of great national importance. It has been attempted for some years past to establish in Canada a Collegiate system of education, devoid of religious oversight and responsibility, and to employ the funds designed for all, for the endowment of this one secular institution, to the exclusion of those Colleges which are under denominational con-

trol. Against this injurious and unjust system this Conference at its last Session entered its solemn protest, and recommended a course of proceeding, which by Memorial of the Conference, and by petitions from all parts of the country, brought the views of this body before the Parliament of Canada. Our intentions and aims were grossly misrepresented, and leading members of this Conference were subjected to great obloquy and reproach. They were, however, graciously sustained and aided in the conflict, and our united efforts to secure the just rights of the Christian people of this country are likely to be crowned with success. At the same time there is cause for thankfulness that our own valuable institution of learning, Victoria College, was never in a more prosperous condition than at the present time. We need only more extended accommodation and more ample endowments to make it the most useful institution of the kind in Canada. Believing it to be essential to the progress and mermanency of Methodism in this country, we shall not fail to protect its rights to a proper share of public support, and to guard with sacred jealousy, its Christian and Wesleyan character. In our efforts to obtain justice in reference to the University Endowment, we have received the cordial aid of the Chief Superintendent of Education for Upper Canada, the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, whose vigorous mind, enlarged experrience, and enlightened convictions in relation to denominational Colleges have been brought to bear on the question now agitated ; and you will rejoice to learn, that our beloved people have rallied to the standard of our common Christianity, as the only satisfactory basis of general and Collegiate education.

In our recent educational efforts and in all others relating to the welfare and progress of Methodism in Capada, we have again to acknowledge our obligations to the Rev. Dr. Stinson, 'our beloved and esteemed President. We are so

deeply convinced of the importance and value of his services, and of the necessity that exists for their continuance, that we again respectfully desire his re-appointment to the office. of President of this Conference. We have again also decided that it will best promote the Missionary, Educational and general interests of the work in Canada, that our highly esteemed and laborious President be left without pastoral charge, and devote his whole time and eminent abilities to the entire connexion.

The Conference respectfully requests the appointment of the Rev Henry Wilkinson to the office of Co-delegate. Our highly gifted brother, whom we thus commend to your notice, has been in labours more abundant, and by his ardent piety, warm-hearted zeal, and brotherly kindness, has endeared himself to all his brethren in the Ministry.

The Conference has unanimously resolved, that in view of the beneficial influence exerted on this Connexion in its general affairs, by the wisdom and talent of the Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., and the very satisfactory manner in which he conducts the business of his own special department; that therefore we respectfully request you to re-appoint him to the office of General Superintendent of Missions.

Our Conference has been one of great Christian harmony and peace. Our discussions have been conducted with firmness and kindness. The religious services have been spiritually profitable. We shall shortly depart from this Annual Assembly to our various Circuits and Missions. During the past year not one of our number have fallen by the hand of death. For this we praise God, proceeding to our glorious enterprise of saving souls. We go in the name of Jesus Christ, looking for the assistance of the Holy Spirit. If God should spare us and grant us health, we trust to realize the fulfilment of that promise, so encouraging to the Christian worker in arduous fields of toil and sacrifice, "The wilderhes desc abu of l and exc S

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE UPPER CANADA ACADEMY UNDER THE NAME AND STYLE OF "VICTORIA COLLEGE."

[27th August, 1841.]

WHEREAS His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, was graciously pleased to issue his Letters Patent bearing date the twelfth day ^{Preamble}. of October, in the seventh year of His Reign, in the words following :

"UPPER CANADA.

"William the Fourth by the Grace of God, Charter of "of the United Kingdom of Great Britain "per Can-"ada Kang, Defender of the "ada kan-"Adama" retied. "Faith. &c., &c., &c.

"To all to whom these Presents shall come.

GREETING :

"WHEREAS divers of our Loving Subjects of "the Wesleyan Methodist Church, in our Proview of Upper Canada, represented to Us Members "that with the aid of private and voluntary contribution, they have erected certain Buildings Church." in the vicinity of the Town of Cobourg, in the Newcastle District of our said Province of "Upper Canada, adapted for the purposes of an "Academy of Learning with the intention of "founding there an Academy for the general "education of Youth, in the various branches of " Literature and Science on Christian principles. Interpretation clause. V. And be it enacted, that the words "Canada West" in this Act, shall be understood to mean all that part of the Province which formerly constituted the Province of Upper Canada.

XIV

AN ACT TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF VICTORIA COLLEGE.

[Assented to 24th July, 1858.]

WHEREAS it has been represented by the Preamble. Board of Victoria College, in a Memorial addressed to the Provincial Legislature, that it is desirable on several grounds to increase the number of the members of that Board from fourteen to twenty-four, to consist of an equal number of Clergymen or Ministers and Laymen : Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows :
