# OUR CHILDREN FOR CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH.

THE CIRCULAR LETTER OF THE NOVA SCOTIA EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES OF WHICH IT IS COMPOSED. mi sestadirila emit i e il mente editarente.

It is with feelings of devout gratitude to our Heavenly Father that we address you on the present occasion. Notwithstanding the imperfections of our services, we have been spared another year to

assemble at our Associational Meeting.

Relying upon your candour and good will, we offer a word of exhortation touching the training of the rising generation, in the anticipation that, by the blessing of God, they may become members of our churches. With some of us it seems but a short time since, with child-like curiosity, we heard our parents and their friends discussing the affairs of the church with which they were connected. Now, by the grace of God, we ourselves have been called to enjoy the privilege of church membership; but time will soon transfer us to the church triumphant, and our places here on earth will be occupied by the children of the present day. It is the devout wish of every christian parent to remain this side the river of death until he has welcomed every member of his family to the fellowship of the church; and we all most earnestly pray that when we rest from our labours we may leave behind us those who will walk more closely to Jesus, and bring more honour to his name than we have

It has often been said that "the Sabbath School is a nursery to the church," and teachers cannot too earnestly ponder the truth contained in the illustration. Many zealous christians owe much of their power of usefulness to the training of the Sunday School; but the advantages of the christian parent far transcend those of the Sabbath School teacher. This will appear if we consider the adaptation of domestic discipline to serve the interests of the

Church of God.

As Baptists we cannot believe that the circumstance of a child's birth into a christian family at all entitles him to church membership; but we may hope that, by a proper use of the means of instruction which God has placed in our hands, in dependence upon the work of the Holy Spirit, our children, even in early life, may become in the true sense of the words members of Christ, children of God, and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven. It will, therefore, be our wisdom to train them so that they may become honourable and useful christians, as well as valuable members of society.

The early buds of the infant mind, under the influence of the smiles of the parent, soon unfold into the sweet blossom of love. Love in every child, if it were not blighted by evil influences, would lead to a fruitful life; and, by the generating power of the Spirit of God, enable him to enjoy companionship with Christ in the service and interests of His church. Let us bear in mind that the Divine Spirit works by instrumentality. While pious parents are developing the affection of their children, and directing it to proper objects of esteem, they may be training those young hearts for the exercise of that love which is so indispensable in the christian character. Love is the sum of the divine attributes, for "God is love," and perfect love lifts man into companionship with his Maker. Love is the substance of the joys of heaven; and all the heaven experienced here on earth may be expressed in this one word, love; but, when love is absent, there can be nothing but unhappiness, especially among professors of religion. It is to be feared that our churches are more deficient in this matter than in any other. The adversary has not altogether quenched the sparks; and in some hearts the sacred flame burns purely; but, after all, there is a sad lack of the disposition to love one another fervently and constantly. A happier state of things will hereafter be enjoyed if those who have the care of the rising generation, in dependence upon the Holy Spirit, do all they can to cultivate a disposition of heart necessary to exert this heavenly influence If you would have your children useful and happy. O think much of the power that throbs in their young hearts. Help them to control it and direct it, first to every member of the family, then, expanding according to its nature, let their love embrace your relatives, your country, and mankind of every clime. In dependence upon the promises of God's Word, the help of His Spirit, and His converting grace, bring up your children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Sow the seeds of Divine Truth in their hearts, then train their minds in the love of the Bible, the Sabbath, the sanctuary, God's servants, and all his people.

Many other of the qualifications of christian fellowship may be impressed upon the minds of children. We have given more

prominence to love, because it actuates all the rest.

When Jesus gave the invitation to sinners to come to him for rest he said, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me." This implies that christianity consists very much in subjection to Christ. The prophet Jeremiah began his religious career when very young, and, after a long life of hard service amid much suffering, he leaves us the testimony that it "is good for a man that he bear the yoke in his youth." Christian parents have great power to bring their children under subjection; and this work is as necessary as it is difficult. Ever since Adam broke loose from the easy restraint of the first command, man has inherited the disposition to do as he likes at all consequences, and in spite of every law, human or divine. This disposition, growing up with an individual, will disturb the

peace of all by whom he is surrounded; and it will be most destructive to his own happiness and comfort, inasmuch as there are a thousand influences at work, many of which will crush the spirit which has not learned submission. All parents are responsible for the exercise of the power which God has given them to control their children; and while they are faithfully discharging this obligation in the fear of God, and in hope of His mercy, they may be forming an inclination of mind which will render it delightful to submit to the ordinances and requirements of the church of Christ. Submission to proper authority may go hand in hand with true manliness, in the family, in the church, and in the world at large.

Here we come to another essential of the christian character, manliness; reminding us of the admonition of the great Apostle, "Stand fast in the faith; quit ye like men, be strong." We are all acquainted with the interest the parent takes in the infant, when, for the first time, it is able to stand alone. There is a far more important period than this. It is when the young man can stand alone in his own moral strength, through the training he has received and the grace of God. We can conceive no higher ambition in a parent than to send young men and women into the world who can thus stand alone. The future prosperity of our Baptist churches will depend instrumentally upon our having men and women who can stand firmly in the faith and order of our common cause. Where all alike have a voice and a vote in all matters of decision we must have men who can do right and fear not, and who value their conscience above rubies. Where so much depends on individual effort we need men who can labour, though none applaud, and proceed in their christian course, though all the world oppose. Thank God, we have many such in our churches to-day; and by their example and efforts to train the young to exercise the same noble qualities our churches will grow stronger

The limits of this letter will permit us to direct attention only to one other matter in connection with our subject. Let this be christian service. We cannot begin too soon to impress upon the minds of the young that it is their duty to do something for God. Under the direction of the christian parent a child soon catches the idea that he can do something, he soon finds something to do, and takes great pleasure in doing it. It is true that this activity has sometimes disappointed the highest expectation; but, frequently, as in the case of Samuel, it has led to a useful life. In the various engagements and enterprises of religion there will be found much to be done suiting the capacity of children. Both their activity and their benevolence may be kept in exercise until the Holy Spirit supplies the motive and the power of a useful christian life.

In conclusion, we do not lose sight of the fact that our children must be converted by Divine grace before they can serve God aright, or become members of our churches. On the other hand we must be careful that we do not abuse this truth by neglecting our

duty as though God wrought without instrumentality. Habits may be formed, principles may be implanted, and seeds of truth sown in the minds of children before they experience a change of heart. We cannot tell how soon God may own and bless our efforts by the work of conversion; but, if the change does not take place until adult age, the convert who has received a christian training becomes a tower of strength to the church with which he becomes connected. Regarding the principles which underlie our system we cannot but think that the denomination to which we belong should exert an immense influence against error, infidelity, and all the evil which surrounds us on every side. Doubtless our power is great, but let us not be satisfied. There is a loud call for renewed and strenuous efforts on the part of every one of us to do all we can for the present and future welfare of our churches, that like an army compact and well disciplined, and moving at the command of the Captain of our Salvation, we may become mighty through God to the pulling down the strongholds of sin. # REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee regard with much pleasure the present hopeful condition of our *Home Missionary* affairs. The pleasing announcement is made by the Secretary of the Board that the burdensome debt which retarded the work of our Union is now entirely liquidated. Whilst this cheering fact should greatly encourage our brethren in sustaining the interests of Home Missions, it should not be regarded as furnishing any reason for diminishing our contributions for the future. The work accomplished during the past year has been very satisfactory. Eighteen missionaries have been under engagement; upwards of one hundred baptisms have been recorded; and more than \$5000 have been expended through this agency.

The Home Mission Board has, in the opinion of your Committee, given deserved attention and made satisfactory expenditures in connection with the missionary fields embraced within the precincts of the Eastern Association. This must be obvious from the fact that during the past four years more than \$2000 have been expended on these fields in excess of the amount contributed by

our churches within the same period.

The French Mission still demands our hearty sympathy and liberal assistance. The mission is one of difficulty, but many trophies of grace have already been secured on this field. Bro. Normonday reports upwards of seventy conversions since his entrance upon the work of that mission. These successes in the past encourage us to hope for still more glorious results in the future.

Your Committee regard the work of missions to the heathen as one of immeasurable importance and greatness. It is evident, both from His commands and predictions, that the Lord Jesus Christ intended His church to be aggressive in the highest degree, by

promulgating His saving truth throughout the whole inhabited earth. He will not be satisfied with a portion of the world, nor will He share the allegiance and worship of men with false gods. Christianity, the only true religion, the only one which can bless and save the ruined race, is to be triumphant, universal, and final. Here, then, we have a powerful incentive to permanent and everincreasing zeal in the propagation of the gospel among the heathen.

With regard to our own mission, the latest reports represent matters in a satisfactory and hopeful condition. There are some circumstances which are of a specially gratifying and encouraging nature, the first of which is the restoration of Bro. Churchill's health. He was compelled by a dangerous disease to leave the country for a time, but, through the mercy of God, he has been able to return, and is now reported as fully restored. All the rest of the missionaries are in good health, and are diligently prosecuting the work for which they were sent forth.

Another fact of no ordinary importance is the baptism of several converts and the founding of a christian church in the territory of Jeypore, a remote but populous region whose pagan darkness was unbroken until recently, when one of the natives, baptized at Vizianagram in 1875, began there to preach the gospel of Christ. Thus a light has been kindled in that dark place, which we trust will increase in brightness until multitudes are guided by it into the way of life. This is the third church organized by our brethren. WARREN W. H.

# REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to submit their report

as follows :-

We recognize in the evil of drunkenness a prolific source of domestic and social unhappiness, of sorrow and of crime, and a very great hindrance to the successful prosecution of gospel work and the salvation of souls. We believe that the appetite for strong drink is a stumbling-block whereby some of our weaker brothers have erred and fallen, and thereby brought reproach on the church of God.

We would, therefore, commend the temperance movement of to-day, and the societies which have for their object the suppression of the liquor traffic to the sympathy and support of our churches and church members generally. While we believe that the church itself is a proper place for the cultivation of every christian grace, and every movement which tends to the extension of our Redeemer's kingdom; we thankfully recognize the fact that much good has been done, and may yet be done, by temperance organizations.

We would also recommend to our churches that, whenever it may be at all practicable, the use of the fermented wines of commerce at the communion table be discontinued, and the pure juice of the vine substituted therefor, as more strictly in accordance with the teachings of Scripture and the spirit which dictated the command to shun the very appearance of evil.

In view of the wide-spread evil of intemperance, this Association hereby expresses its opinion that the passage by our Dominion Legislature of an Act prohibiting the importation and sale of intoxicating liquors in this country, would be just to the people over whose interests they are called upon to watch, and righteous

in its efforts to promote the common good.

Having known something of the Dominion Alliance, which has for its ultimate object the enactment of such a law, we would recommend it to the sympathy and co-operation of christian people and temperance workers.

# R. S. Custern Zuptist Association.

ARTICLE 1st.—This body shall be called the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and shall consist of Delegates representing the Churches of which it is composed, each of whom shall be a member of one of those churches, together with Delegates from Corresponding Associations, not exceeding five from any one Association; and such others as may, by the Association, be invited to sit in Council; none but delegates being entitled to vote, and such only as represent churches being elligible to office, or to vote for officers.

ART 2nd.—Each church connected with the body may send five Delegates besides its Pastor.

ART 3rd.—The object of this Association being the cultivation of Christian Union, the promotion of individual godliness, and by mutual consultation, to seek, in the use of Scriptural measures, the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom—it disclaims all authority over churches, and shall in no case interfere with their internal concerns, or their entire scriptural independency. Yet it may dissolve its connection with any church that, upon sufficient examination, shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from Scripture principles or Baptist faith and practice.

ART. 4th.—This Association shall meet at such time and place as it may appoint, and the meetings shall be opened with devotional exercises.

ART. 5th.—The Officers of the Association shall be—a Moderator, who shall preside at all the meetings, nominate all the Committees not otherwise provided for, and perform all the duties naturally connected with such office; a Clerk who shall keep a record of all the business transacted, prepare the Minutes for the press, and attend to their distribution; and a Treasurer, who shall receive all the moneys contributed for the purposes of the Association, and dispose of them according to its direction. All the officers shall remain in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. 6th.—The religious sentiments of this body are those expressed in the "Articles of the Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova Scotia."

ART. 7th.—The Association may receive any Church which, by letter, shall apply for admission, and shall give satisfactory evidence of its faith and order, in agreement with the religious sentiments of this body; and each Church belonging to this body shall send annually a letter, containing an account of its history for the year preceding, particularly of its additions and diminutions, with its number then in fellowship,—also, money to assist in publishing the Minutes. Any Church that for three successive years omits sending any Letter, Delegates, or money, shall be considered withdrawn from the Association, and shall be discontinued from the Minutes, unless sufficient reason may appear to account for the omission, or provided it may appear desirable to make some inquiry, by committee or otherwise, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ART. 8th.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members at any annual meeting of the Association.

### RULES OF ORDER.

Rule 1st.—At each annual meeting the Letters from the Churches shall be handed to the clerk, who shall retire and make out a list of the delegates—the Moderator meanwhile shall conduct devotional exercises.

2nd.—From the list so prepared the Moderator shall be chosen by ballot—no brother shall be chosen two years in succession.

3rd.—The first letter read shall be from the Church with which the Association is assembled.

4th.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded, and no person shall speak on any subject more than twice unless by consent of the Association.

5th — When any Church is received, the Moderator shall give to one of its delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th.—At the commencement of each sitting the Minutes of the preceding one shall be read and approved, and of the last before the final adjournment.

7th.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes except so ordered by the Association.

8th .- All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

# FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY UNION.

In presenting their fifth Annual Report the Executive Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union desire to make grateful mention of the manifold blessings which an indulgent Father has been pleased to bestow upon our efforts during the past year. It has been a year of comparative prosperity. Difficulties have been overcome, burdens have been removed and an amount of work performed altogether beyond our anticipation. Having entered upon the duties of the year with a heavy debt resting upon our exchequer, we have had occasion for increasing gratitude in witnessing from month to month the gradual diminution of our liabilities, whilst at the same time a fair degree of progress has been made in our missionary operations.

### THE LINE OF POLICY PURSUED.

It was deemed expedient by your Board, in enterring upon the responsibilities of the year, not only to adopt the most economical methods of carrying on the work in which we were engaged, but also to pursue the policy of retrenchment so for at least as to ensure the liquidation of all our debts before the close of the year. We are happy to state that this purpose has been well-nigh effected. In pursuing this line of policy however we have necessarily restricted our efforts in evangelization to such a degree that the work performed and the consequent results are small when compared with those of former years. It is by no means a difficult matter so to manage the business of our Board as to be able to report a satisfactory balance in hand. That can be done simply by neglecting helpless fields, turning a deaf ear to the urgent appeals for aid which come to us almost every week, and permitting immortal souls to perish without making any other attempt to secure their salvation. But we are not ambitious for the fame of those societies which boast of solvent treasuries and have nothing else to report.

### GENERAL AGENCY.

In following out the course suggested by their own convictions and in agreement with your recommendation of last year, your Board endeavoured to secure at the earliest possible date the services of an efficient General Agent. The task was a difficult one; and for several months our efforts were ineffectual. We were pleased to learn in the early part of last December that Rev. J. H. Robbins was willing to undertake this important work.

His circumstances were such, however, that he could not enter upon the duties of the agency until about the beginning of February. This left a very short time in which to visit the churches and perform the vast amount of work which was necessary to be done before the close of the fiscal year. We are nevertheless well assured that during the three months of labor spent by Bro. Robbins in the service of the Board a valuable work was done for Home Missions, the results of which must conduce greatly to the future prosperity of our Union. The financial receipts have not hitherto been large; yet they have much exceeded the expense of the agency whilst the labors of our Agent, considered simply in their missionary character, have been vastly greater and more fruitful in good results than those of almost any other missionary connected with our Board. methods adopted and the work accomplished by Bro. Robbins will be most intelligently understood by a careful perusal of his own Report:

I enterred upon the work on Jan. 29, and continued until April 23, when I returned to make arrangements for the removal of my family to Yarmouth. I was at home one day on business of my own. The period of my services has thus been about twelve weeks.

During that time I visited 43 churches, delivered 42 lectures on Home Missions, preached 56 sermons, attended 117 meetings and addressed in all 9393 persons. I travelled 1325 miles, baptized 11

converts, and collected \$314,47.

I started subscriptions or circulated cards to gather funds for the Associations in a number of churches, and urged others to press forward as energetically and promptly as possible. From several churches I did not receive returns where some money had actually been collected.

I have as carefully as possible inquired into the circumstances of every church visited by me in relation to Home Missions, in order to ascertain their disposition and ability to contribute, or the need in which they stood of assistance. I also sought to ascertain at what season of the year it would be best to visit each place either to gather funds or to do evangelistic work.

It has been my aim to encourage and help pastors in their work, to increase their interest in Home Missions, and to induce them to

visit occasionally destitute fields within their reach.

My constant purpose has been to present the claims of our great work not merely as an appeal from the Board or from man, but as a demand from the Lord to aid in carrying out the lost command, and as an imperative duty resting upon every Christian. Each church is accustomed to say, "We are poor;" but I ask every member of each church to give something, and I endeavour to persuade them to give on principle and intelligently. There is reason to hope that some converts have been gained.

Among other things I have suggested improved systems of raising funds and have introduced these systems in several churches. A good general method is to name an amount such as might reasonably be expected to be raised by a given church, and then show with what ease the money can be obtained on the principle of each member contributing a small sum weekly or monthly.

My strong conviction after three months experience is that an energetic man should be kept constantly employed as a missionary explorer, inspector and reporter, going to the destitute fields and thence to the stronger churches to stir them up with facts such as only a missionary can full understand and describe. I see opportunities for doing much in the way of securing and arranging voluntary missionary work on the part of pastors, and I have already

several such projects in view."

It is thus seen that the labors of our Agent are not to be measured, in estimating their utility, by the immediate pecuniary results that have been secured. He has done valuable work as a missionary. He has, after careful personal inspection, given judicious advice to our Board in reference to the allocation of fields, and the appointment of missionaries; and he has been by no means unsuccessful in raising funds. We strongly advise the Board who shall succeed us to continue his services.

## MISSIONARY WORK UNDERTAKEN.

As already intimated, your Board have made comparatively few Earnest and urgent missionary appointments during the year. appeals for assistance came to us from many destitute places. large number of applications for appointments were made by worthy missionaries, both young and old. Every legitimate effort was made to introduce unemployed ministers to unoccupied fields; simply by recommendation, but beyond this it was deemed inexpedient to venture until our treasury should assume a more hopeful appearance. It was thought advisable to disburse the limited funds at our disposal in the form of small subsidies to such missionary churches and stations as we have had reason to fear might be abandoned unless aided by our treasury. Towards the close of the year, however, when our financial prospects seemed to brighten in some degree, we felt constrained to yield to the pressing appeal of several neglected stations, and to send missionaries to labor therein for a few months. Ignoring sectional distinctions, your Board have endeavoured to secure missionary laborers for such fields as appeared to be most in need of assistance. Although aware of the general tendency to dissatisfaction in cases where some missionaries are assisted and others refused, we have had no alternative but simply to exercise our best judgement in sending our funds where they seemed to be most imperatively demanded or where the interests of our cause might be best subserved.

Your Board have been particularly careful to secure the permanent occupancy of our fields in Annapolis, Shelburne and New Glasgow, believing as we do that these places are rapidly becoming important and efficient centres of Baptist influence. A comparatively small subsidy was granted to each of these places; but it is expected that in the early future they will cease depending upon our Board for aid, and will in their turn become liberal contributors to our funds. At New Glasgow a noble work has been done through the zealous efforts of Rev. David Freeman. A neat and comfortable house of worship has been erected and nearly paid for; and the interests of our denomination have been greatly promoted during the past year.

On the island of Cape Breton Rev. W. C. Rideout has been laboring successfully at Mira, Homeville and Glace Bay. His efforts have been much appreciated, and some encouraging results have already appeared. Rev. E. T. Carbonel has received aid from our treasury whilst laboring at River John and subsequently at Mabou

On Prince Edward Island a fair amount of missionary work has been done. Rev. F. A. Kidson has labored during the year at Dundas, Lower Grand River and St. Peters Bay. A number have been added to the churches in those places through his instrumentality. Rev. D. H. Simpson has been aided by your Board in his pastoral services in connection with the church at Montague. Rev. W. McGregor spent three months at Alberton, Cape Wolfe and vicinity. The opening fields on this important Island have received the most careful attention of your Board; and it has been an occasion of regret that notwithstanding all our efforts to secure permanent missionary labor in the western section, little has been actually performed during the year owing to the unwillingness or inabilty of missionaries to comply with our appointments. Bro. E. H. Sweet, of Acadia College, is at present laboring in that field. We trust his ministrations will be greatly blessed.

### THE FRENCH MISSION.

The work of Bro. Normonday differs materially from that of missionaries who labor in other communities, and cannot, therefore, be justly measured by the same standard. The difficulties to be overcome are much more formidable than those of Protestant fields, and the results following are consequently fewer and less apparent. Our missionary has continued laboring, and we have reason to believe that some good has been done. Eight conversions are reported as either directly or indirectly resulting from this mission during the past year. Your Board are not yet fully satisfied, however, with the present state of this mission. Enlargement and improvement in our operations are demanded.

Last autumn it was thought advisable to authorize Bro. Normonday to make some personal effort in the way of collecting funds from our churches. We did not suggest the sending out of circulars appealing for aid; but perhaps that plan has secured as large

returns as could have been obtained in any other way.

### THE BOOK DEPARTMENT.

In the opinion of your Board there is as much need of Baptist literature in our Sunday-Schools as there is of Baptist preaching in our churches. There would be as much propriety in securing for our pulpits ministers who systematically avoid any reference to our distinctive doctrines, as there is in obtaining books the teachings of which are guided by that principle. The introduction of such books into our Sunday Schools is a concession to other denominations

that is operating disastrously against our own interests. During the past year your Board have distributed upwards of 1540 volumes of such literature as we could heartily recommend. About 13,800 pages of religious and temperance tracts were also gratuitously circulated. The cost of these books and tracts did not exceed \$600.00; whilst the receipts arising from volumes sold amounted to \$630.00. The balance of books on hand may be estimated at about \$200.00 in value. It gives us much satisfaction to state that during the past four years more than \$3,600.00 worth of wholesome Baptist literature has been spread abroad throughout our land by means of our Book Department. In order to lessen the expense of this department it was thought desirable to dispense with the services of colporteurs. Dr. Day has, without any remuneration, and at the cost of much labor, received the books into his own house, unpacked them, re-packed and forwarded them according to order. This has materiallly lessened our expenditures; and, as a result, the Book Department is not only wholly selfsustained, but it is of some financial advantage to the Home Mission treasury.

Your Board earnestly recommend the immediate establishment of a Book Room for the benefit of the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces. It will be for the wisdom of our denomination to decide upon the location of such a Room, and upon the most practicable method of conducting and superintending its business arrangements.

FINANCES.

The present condition of our treasury is very satisfactory. The heavy debt of \$3457.44 which encumbered your Board at the beginning of the year has been gradually paid off; and at this date there are funds in hand not only to entirely liquidate that debt, but also to meet all our liabilities up to the present moment, leaving a considerable balance in our favor. This balance will be largely increased by the contributions from the Eastern and P. E. Island Associations. Your Board is thus in a position to commit to the care of their successors the important interests connected with this enterprise, free from all encumbrances and embarrassments.

The total amount of receipts may, at first sight, seem to compare very unfavorably with that of the preceding year. When it is borne in mind, however, that most of our missionaries have received subsidies during the past year, and that under such circumstances the donations received by them on their respective fields do not enter into our accounts, it will be at once apparent that the actual work and receipts of the year just closed compare favorably in many respects with those of former years.

### SUMMARY.

It will be seen from the foregoing table that 18 missionaries and agents have been in commission during the year. They have travelled, in all, 18,098 miles; preached 1,665 sermons; attended 1,078 other meetings; made 4,678 family visits; distributed 13,800 pages of tracts; baptized 101 persons; and performed 5531 weeks of labor.

In addition to their regular missionary appointments your Board have, in many instances, introduced pastors to vacant churches,

with much satisfaction to all concerned.

In conclusion, it is the sincere prayer of your Board that the blessing of Almighty God may rest upon the efforts of our Union in the future as it has done in the past. The outlook is indeed hopeful. Our chief difficulties have already been over-It requires only a little energy, wisdom, and liberality in our denomination, with the blessing of Heaven, to secure glorious results in our evangelistic efforts during the current year. Let us labor in a manner worthy of our exalted vocation and privileges, remembering that our Master is Jesus Christ, and our hire immortal souls. "And let us not be weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

# N. S. Baptist Home Missionary Union.

1. The consolidation of our Home Missionary organizations, both English and French' would in the estimation of this Convention, tend to the more rapid advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom in this Province;—the French Mission to considered a separate Department, and all gifts bequests, &c., made to the French Mission to go to that Department.

2. This Convention shall be called the Nova Scotia Baptist Home

Missionary Union.

3. The object of this Union shall be to promote the spread of the gospel throughout the Provines of Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, and the Island of Newfoundland, the fostering of feeble Churches, the planting of new ones, and the dissemination of denominational lite-

4. This Union shall be composed of ordained Baptist ministers in rature. good standing with their respective churches in the Province, and delegates appointed by the Churches, each Church in good standing with its respective Association sending not more than three delegates; together with the President of Acadia College, the Principal of the Theological Institute, and the Principal of Horton Academy, the same being members of Baptist Churches in good standing.

5. The officers of the Union shall be a President, who shall be elected annually by ballot; four Vice-Presidents, one from each Association, two Secretaries, and an Auditor, all of whom shall be

appointed by open vote.

6. The Union shall annually appoint and locate an Executive Board of thirteen suitable men, seven of whom shall orm a quorum; and every Baptist Pastor in the Province shall have the privilege of meeting with the Board, and taking part in its deliberations; but not voting; the officers of the Society named above to be ex-officio members of the Board.

7. The duty of this Board shall be to conduct the Missionary work of the Union, and report yearly to the same, or oftener if required.

8. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Union held in each of the Nova Scotia Baptist Associations, in turn, to assemble the day previous to the meeting of the Association with which it is held, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

9. This Union shall appoint annually a Board of Directors to consist of eight from each Association composing the Union, whose duty it shall be to give advice to the Executive Board in cases of emergency, and by the written requisition of eight or more of whom, the President shall call a special meeting of the Union.

10. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made unless by a two-third affirmative vote of the members present at an annual meeting.
