HE DID NOT CONFESS

Sugar Trust Went To Prison Rather Than Implicate Dead Man In Weighing Frauds.

New York, May 25.—Oliver Spitzer, now pardoned but until recently the convicted former superintendent of the docks of the American Sugar Refining Company in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, explained today why he did not confess during the trial which ended last February with his being sentenced to two years at Atlanta. He did not confess, he said, on the stand today because confession would "have carried him to a cemetery." In other words he would have implicated a dead man—Henry O. Havemeier late head of the sugar trust. Spitzer made this statement today under cross examination by the defence at the trial of Charles R. Heike, secretary-treasurer of the American Sugar Refining Company, who with five subordinates is charged with conspiracy to defraud the government by under-weighing sugar. He gave his direct testimony for the prosecution on Monday and after reiterating today that he stoof by his story, he was turned over to the defence.

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

Mr. Jack, accompanied by D. Mulin, K. C., as his legal representative, appeared before the commission and stated that the company had increased his 'phone rates and he thought the matter should be investigated.

The particular case which formed the basis of Mr. Jack's complaint had to do with the telephone in his summer cottage at Duck Cove. He claim ed that last year he paid \$10 for the services whereas this year he was charged \$16 for the same service. The period of time in both cases was three months. Mr. Jack thought the increase was out of all proportion and tonsequently made his objection.
