Otawa, Jan. 21, via leased wire.—The prohibition question is coming before parliament in two different phases.

Constantine Says Athens Government Ridden Over Roughshod and all Allies' Actions

London, Jan. 22.—An interview with King Constantine of Greece appears in the Daily Mail fedux. When the correspondent asked King Constantine whether he would not admit justification for the recent actions of the Entente Allies, the king is quoted as having replied:

"Yes, and no. I fall to see any reason for the occupation of Corfu and Castelorizo. If you want to reform the Serbian army there surely are other places you could choose, rather than violate the neutrality to which you yourselves subscribed.

NO LATE WORD FROM MONTENEGRINS

Although it has been reported that the Austro-Hungarians and Montenegrins again are at grips, no details have yet come through as to the progress of the fighting.

It is presumed, however, that the Austrians will continue to press the Mentenegrins toward the Albanian front and try to capture Montenegro's principal seaport, Antivari. A Rome despatch says that Albanian troops under Essad Pasha, provisional president of Albania, have arrived at Scutari to join the Montenegrin troops, who are retiring on that Albanian city.

The 'commissioners considered a number of complaints that soldiers in uniform have been seen in salcons frequently. The feeling of the commissioners is that the presence of militiamen in uniform in saloons, even if they do not go there to patronize them should be discouraged by the proprietors and wine cferks.

Why the Business Girl Should Possess a Banking Account.

Do you know how to save? Probably not, if you are a young woman, for few girls realize the importance of possessing a bank account, and fewer still are willing to sacrifice some little luxury in order to put the money by for use on a rainy day. And yet a bank account, no matter how small, is necessary to the welfare of every woman, whether she be of the self-supporting order or of that comfortable class whose livings are looked after by indulgent parents.

The girl who works for her own living is especially in need of a bank account and at the same time it is especially difficult for her to become tha happy possessor of this necessity. For it is a necessity to her, even more serfthan to her more fortunate sister of leisure, for unless she has money put aside the working girl will find herself sooner or later in a serious predicament.

No matter how healthy she may be,

No matter how healthy she may be, there is always the possibility of serious sickness or accident, and either is an expensive luxury which will require a good bank account to meet. There is no use in brooding over the possibility of sickness, but the fact remains that few working women go year in and year out without being forced to take a week or two off from their labors, because grippe, tonsilities, a heavy cold or some other minor but distressing aliment makes work impossible for a certain period of time, says the Daily Argus. 

London, Dec. 31—After a week of pluster and general rampaglousness, the Berlin, newspapers are beginning to admit that Germany is not yet in a position to dictate terms of peace.

Nobody, even in Germany, where the tubsidised Press has been doing its best for a year and a half wholly to mislead the people, ever believed that she was. The bluff, as usual, was intended for the neutral nations, who by this time, however, have learned to appreciate German utterances at their true value, and to assess Germany's "victories" as they are already assessing the German mark—at a very heavy discount of its face value.

We have raised millions of warriors, and of these hundreds of thousands have fallen. If it were not for our hope that this terrible struggle will be followed by a long period of peace we should certainly have ample ground for discouragement.

We are not in a position to dictate the terms of peace. The Chancellor's appeal to the enemy Powers has remained without effect. We are, however, the victors everywhere, hence we cannot consent to any loss of territory, but on the whole, the situation is most serious; we are not yet halfway through the wood.




