ANDREW CARNEGIE SUDDENLY PASSES OUT AT LENOX, MASS.

Bronchial Pneumonia and Was Quite Unsuspected by His Family.

BENEFACTIONS TOTAL OVER \$350,000,000

Pittsburg, the City Where Carnegie Laid the Foundation for His Immense Wealth. Paid Tribute to the Dead

Lenox, Mass., Aug. 11.—Andrew Carnegie, the steel magnate and philantropist, died at his Lenox summer home, "Shadow Brock," at 7.10 this morning, after an liness of less than three days with bronc. sal pneumonia. So sudden was his ceach that his desughter, Mrs. Roswell Miller, was unable to get to her father's bedshie before he died. His wife and private secretary were with him at the end.

Mr. Carnegie had spent most of the sumher in Lenox, coming here late in May and, up to a few weeks ago, enjoyed himself in almost daily fishing trips on Lake Mahkosnac, which borders his big estate, and in riding about his grounds.

He was taken ill Friday and grew steadily werse. His advanced age and lessened powers of resistance hastened the end.

Mr. Carnegie came to Lenox to make his home in May, 1917, and had spent the past three cammens there. Feintended to spend his declining days there and when he bought it from Spenger R. Shotter, it was announced that Mr. Carnegie —ould spend aid of the spring and summer months there.

Mr. Carnegie leaves his wife and his deaughter, Margaret, who married last April Ensign Rosswell Miller, or New York.

PLENTY OF SUGAR The U.S. Diplomat Admits to TO SUPPLY ALL

Prices Advance Heavily IN Canada While in New York, Clearing House for Sugar, There is No Advance

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 11.—"Sugar supplies in Canada are being artificially restricted, and sugar prices are being unwarrantably advanced by combines and conspiracies which are absolutely pernicious and unlawful," is the statement of Dr. R. J. McFadl, Cost of Living Commissioner. "Now that the season is here when the housewife should be preserving and canning fruit, the people in control of our sugar have sefued upon the opportunity to deal another blow to household canning and make the consumer still more dependent upon the big canning combine. For several weeks the dealer has been experiencing difficulties in setting sugar to supply his retail customers. There have been a few strikes at the refineries which have helped to cause a stringency, and on top of these other refiners have seized upon the same time to close down their piant for repairs. The attempt has been made to blame the shortage of refined sugar on excessive exports, but this is absolutely untrue as show my the facts. The latest available customs record shows the excess of our imports over our exports is very much greater than usual; the sugar coming into Canada is sufficient to supply decidedly more, not less, than our customary requirements. 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MONTREAL MARKETS

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MARKET CLOSED WITH MIXED GAINS AND LOSSES

Reasons for the Setbacks Were Based on the Stronger Tone of the Money Market and Unsatisfactory Labor Conditions.

New York, N. Y., Aug. 11.-Sto were strong at the opening of today's sessions, indications pointing to a continuance of the rally which accom-

sessions, indications pointing to a continuance of the raily which accombinated the trading of the final days of last week, but the market soon reversed its course and closed with mixed gains and losses.

Reasons for the setback were based in part on the stronger tome of the money market and further unsatisfactory labor conditions.

Call loans opened at six to six and a half per cent. higher rates, which prevalled virtually throughout the day, probably being caused in part by last Saturday's bath statement, which disclosed a moderately heavy loss in the cash reserves.

The check to the important western and southwestern sections was attributed less to the high cost crusade than to further strike developments, which more seriously affected the shipment to market of raw materials. Heaviness of United States Steel, which field 21-4 points from its slight initial advance, was ascribed, for want of a more convincing reason, to the death of Andrew Carnegle, but that theory found few supporters in the financial district. Minimum quotations were made into the drive of the mid-session, but the strength of equipments, especially American Car and Pressed Steel Car, effected railies of one to admost three points from lowest levels at the end, United States Steel, however, making only fractional recovery.

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
