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DEMUURER ALLOWED WITH COSTS IN PUGSLEY VS. N. B. COAL AND RY. CO. Decision of Chief Justice Means That it Now Remains for Attorney General, if He Desires, to Ask for Accounting Which Dr. Pugsley Worked for So Hard, and Which is Not Allowed on Point of Law.

Wednesday, Sept. 21. In the chancery division of the supreme court yesterday afternoon, Chief Justice Barker delivered judgment in the case of Dr. Pugsley vs. The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company. His honor allowed the demurrer, which means that the case is thrown out of court. He granted the case at some length, making special reference to the investigation into the affairs of which Mr. Justice Landry was the chairman and which contended that more than \$150,000 could not be accounted for.
