THE GREATEST FOR HALF A CENTURY. The late storm was, probably, the heaviest known in this vicinity for half a century. An old pilot told me to-day that some old pine logs that had hin, to his own knowledge, for over 40 years above high water mark, near his house, had been carried thirty feet higher or Sunday night.

The storm commenced on Saturday and a heavy gale raged all Sunday. End of a Remarkable Trial. A remarkable murder trial has just been concluded in the north of Ireland, and has resulted in the conviction of the murderer and a full confession of his guilt. The victim was a bank clerk, named Glass, who was found dead in a banking office one afternoon, he having been left there alone by his employer. A large amount of money was missing from the bank, but no clue could be obtained of the murderer until nearly a month after, when a woman living opposite the banking office came forward and testified that she saw Sub. Inspector Montgomery, an officer of the police, go Montgomery, an officer of the police, go into the bank and come out again about

into the bank and come out again about the time the murder must have been committed. Montgomery was arrested, but he stoutly denied any knowledge of the affair. He was imprisoned on the verdict of a coroner's jury, but the feeling against him in the district was so strong that his trial was postponed till the Auturn Assizes of last year, and wen then all persons living within five miles of Newton Stewart were excluded from the jury box. The trial lasted several days, and the jury were unable to agree. At the Spring Assizes, in March last, the whole process was repeated; eighty witnesses the Spring Assizes, in March last, the whole process was repeated; eighty witnesses were examined, and after one of the longest trials in the criminal records of Ireland, the jury again failed to agree, and were discharged. At the present Summer Assizes, the whole investigation has been gone through again, and has ended in a conviction, and Montgomery, thus found guilty, has confessed the crime. In his address to the Court, he declared that he was insane, his financial embarrassments having driven him to despair. He called having driven him to despair. He called attention to the fact that the crime had been called terrible murder by the prose-cution, and he wished the Court to believe that no man possessed of any feeling could perpetrate it in his right sen-

A Priest Sues his Bishop. A novel and interesting lawsuit is now before the Chigago courts, in which a deposed priest has ignored the traditions of the church and has appealed to the civic courts for the restitution of what he considers his rights. It appears that Mr. John M. Ryan, who for the past six years has been performing the duties pertainhas been performing the duties pertaining to his sacred offices, embracing those of a priest, viear and clergyman in the diocese of Chicago, was some time since deposed from his office by Bishop Duggan, who had appointed him. The priest claims that he has acquitted himself well of the trust confided to him, and that by being removed from office he has been deprived of his living and support with-

self. The annual income from the office which he held, of a parochial, clerical, and ministerial character, amounted to about five thousand dollars annually, the office being for life, unless the incumbent is regularly deposed, and he claims that by reason of having been cut off from his benefices, salary and perquisites within out the usual formalities and regulations of the church, a wrong and injury has been done him to the extent of \$25,000, walch he now sues to recover in the form of damages. of damages. The nhabitants bravely determined to resist the invading army, and gathered all their resources for defending their homes and firesides. At noon, as soon as the Carl-1sts were descried in the distance, the church bells sounded the alarm, and all the sick, aged, women and children were ordered into the churches. The inhabitation of the churches were described to the churches. whelming odds, and fled for protection in the church. They were closely pursued, and when they refused to come out and deliver themselves up, the Carlists broke down the doors of the church by firing cannon halls, into them, pouring in deliver themselves up, the Carlists bloke down the doors of the church by firing cannon-balls into them, pouring in streams of sulphured petroleum through the breeches, setting fire to the liquid as it flowed. The occupants of the edifice, blinded and suffocated, rushed out into the open air, only to meet the bayonets of their persecutors. On the arrival of Don Alphonso and his staff, finding no corporation with which to confer, they immediately set about the formation of one from among the wealthlest citizens, and then demanded a contribution of 2,000,000 reals, of which 200,000 reals were collected for him, he carrying off eighty prisoners as hostages for the remainder of the amount. Don Alphonso left the doomed town the, next morning at daybreak, but not until after all the inhabitants had surrendered, and then half the doomed town the spot, they habitants had surrendered, and then half their number were shot on the spot, they having been compelled to sing their own De Frofundis before their death.
