When the four Provinces bordering the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence were first formed into a Confederacy, there was some anxiety experienced by the friends of Confederation in regard to the proper adjustment of the tariff which each Province had separately; but so secret was the policy of the Macdonald Government in attending to the more important interests of the country, that very little dissatisfaction was created when the first Ministry Finance for the Dominion his first Budget. Montreal and Toronto invariably got their goods in early, and now have their spring stocks singly stored away in their warehouses, while the importation of goods here has just begun. The Ministry rushed their tariff resolutions in at the earliest possible moment, seemingly eager to head off as many of the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia importers as possible. Now the Montreal wholesale dealers can come down here and undersell our importers, the Government having kindly arranged matters in their interests.

The Free School Ticket.

In a former issue we recommended some special organization among the friends of free education, in connection with the choice of Candidates to contest the County in the coming election. It would be well if the idea of a Convention could be carried out, so that the whole County might have a voice in the selection of fit and proper persons to represent us in the Local Legislature. We should like to see unity of sentiment and concerted action characterizing every effort put forth, in order that the slightest approach to sectional jealousy may be avoided. The Mayoralty of St. John.

The result of the late election for the Mayoralty in St. John was announced in our columns last week. The vote stood—Culpan Smith, Esq., 1,020; A. Rowan, Esq., 641; D. Alward, 626. The election accorded to Dr. Alward (who is one of the loyal opposition) hinged upon the school question. The Dr. thus accounted for his defeat. This was the last time he would probably appear before them as a public man. He felt satisfied, after the result of the contest, that he no longer represented the interests of the electors. Anything he would therefore say would be said in his capacity as a private citizen. What was the result of affairs in St. John at present? No matter what election came off—no matter how petty the interests at stake were—the school question was trotted out on every occasion as a bug-bear to frighten the electors. When the school question was trotted out on this occasion, he was satisfied that he would be defeated—just as satisfied as after the votes had been counted.

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Serious Fire.

Our representatives must learn that they are not mere tools to carry out Ultramontane doctrines, and as three of our old ones refused to recognize this fact, we must replace them by men, who will in fact, as well as in appearance, represent us. But to do this, to send men to the House to support and complete our present school system, to uphold the principle of free non-sectarian education, the friends of the system must organize and work for our opponents though numerically inferior to us, possess all the cunning of the serpent, and have the advantage of having a high controlling power to keep them in traces, and up to the mark.
