THE CAMPAIGN.

As the time for the election of members to serve in the General Assembly, is rapidly approaching, and as the great all-absorbing question to be submitted at this time for the people's decision is, "Shall we have a present free non-sectarian system of education continue, or shall we be added with an expensive, cumbersome one of Separate Schools?" It behooves the friends of the present system that gives equal privileges to all, to be up and doing that they may not by their indifference or apathy allow their opponents to steal a march upon them. The majority of the people of this County are undoubtedly in favor of our present noble School Law, and it would be a suicidal act to return our three present representatives, opposed to it, to allow ourselves to be again misrepresented by these three obstructionists, to permit them again to lead the rest of the Province to believe that Northumberland desires to take a retrograde step, and fly into the face of all history by foisting upon the country a system of education that has proved its own inefficiency, as well in Quebec and Ontario as in every State where it has had a trial. Our representatives must learn that they are not mere tools to carry out the whims and fancies, and as three of our old ones refused to recognize this fact, we must replace them by men, who will in fact, as well as in appearance, represent us.

Now as to the means for successfully carrying on this contest we must adopt the plan already used with so much success in other places, that is, hold a convention thoroughly representing all classes and sections of the County. Let that convention nominate four popular men of the proper stamp, and get their consent to be put in nomination to run for the County, and then let all who do not desire to subordinate and religiously acquiesce to treat all alike in educational matters, cumulate their votes on the four gentlemen who may compose the school ticket; let no stray votes go to anti school men, for it is by such votes only that they can be elected, but let all vote the straight ticket and our victory is complete. Now this convention should be held at once, as no time is to be lost, and let the prominent men of the school party look to it that the proper steps towards this end be taken immediately. And this Convention, in order to fully represent all sections of the County, should of right be composed of delegates from every School District in it, and to prevent the smaller outlying ones having too large a representation the larger central ones might have two delegates, which would equalize it. This plan would ensure a large and free influential meeting, and make it general rather than sectional. Now I claim that such a Convention would be the best expression of the people's wishes, and the one which would more readily accept a ticket nominated by such a one. But if it is thought too cumbersome or unwieldy, or likely to occupy too much time, then let the delegates be sent not from the School Districts but from the different parishes. This plan, while it might not have such an effect as the former, would be more feasible, but whatever plan is to be adopted must be done at once, that the parties may have time to organize associations to carry out the designs of the central Convention. This is the work for us to do, and we must buckle to it. Let there be no half measures, no compromise, but let all friends of education be true to their principles, and help on this work to a successful completion.
