## TO STAND TRIAL ON SERIOUS CHARGE

### Three Young Men are Arraign- ed on Charge of Attempted Train Wrecking

Newcastle, N. B., Oct. 21.—Joseph and James Collins and Walter Preston were arraigned Saturday before Justice Malby on information of In-ecolonial Detective Thomas Tremholm, charging them with throwing upon the railway, October 7th and 8th instant, a sleeper that nearly caused a wreck at Jones' Crossing on the latter date.

Joseph Collins was tried first. R. A. Lawlor for the prosecution and L. J. Tweedie for the defence. Conductor John Stevenson, Moncton, whose special train struck the sleeper, sworn, said that on the morning of the eighth, his train left Chatham Junction about 1:20, after crossing an east-bound special there. At Jones' Crossing he felt the airbrakes applied suddenly. When the train stopped he went forward and found the air line that applied the brakes to the train was broken, disabling the whole airbrake system. He found part of a railway sleeper about two feet long under the train. About the twelfth car back the drawbar was started in another car. The sleeper was partly cut by the wheel and then broken. The accident happened about 1:30 a.m. He had orders to Newcastle and protected his train on the rear. He noticed no strangers round the place of the accident.

Driver David Thompson, Moncton, sworn, said that when about three miles past Chatham Junction, and three miles from Newcastle, he had noticed a sleeper on top of both rails about thirty yards ahead. He stopped his train, but not soon enough to avoid striking the obstruction. He found half a sleeper wedged under the pilot on top of the rails against the pony truck engine. He found the air line broken on the first car next the engine, and a weakened drawbar further back. He had left Chatham Junction right after crossing the other train, and had struck the sleeper six or seven minutes later at the foot of the grade approaching Newcastle, at thirty to thirty five miles an hour. The accident delayed them about an hour. They had to take the rest of their train to Newcastle, and go back for the remainder. The accident occurred about 1:30. The train he crossed at Chatham Junction had come from Newcastle. He did not hear of any obstruction reported by that train. The latter must have passed the point where his train met the obstruction about 1 o'clock. The night was a little foggy. His train carried no sleepers.

Wm. Young, Newcastle, trackman, sworn, said that from October 2 for nine days he had been watching Derby Junction temporarily crossing at nights while the overhead bridge was undergoing repairs. He first heard of the accident the night of the eighth. He did not know the Collins boys, and could not identify them in court. He knew Preston. On the same evening during his nine nights' watching, he could not remember which, but it was before the eighth, he saw Preston at the end of Derby Junction bridge with two other young men unknown to witness. The three came to a fire he had in the open, some time after midnight the maritime express going west, due about three minutes to twelve, had passed. They stood by the fire and talked with him about twenty minutes. They were not drunk, but appeared to have been drinking. They went across the southwest bridge. He had warned them against meeting the train. This train must have been No. 39, due about 3 o'clock.

Resuming after dinner, witness said he had seen the three together only once. There was a pile of sleepers at Jones' Crossing about 100 feet from the highway, and forty from the railway. Witness had known Preston eight or nine years. He could not say he had seen the three boys after the accident. He could not remember what night he had seen them. He could not swear it was not the 6th instant. When the boys went on the southwest bridge they were going in an opposite direction from Jones' Crossing. A train had followed the express by about an hour. He could not tell whether the boys were with him between twelve and one or after one. They were quiet and orderly when with him.

The hearing was adjourned till Tuesday.

Carr in the Lonsbury building, beginning at 8 p.m. This adjournment was made at the express request of a number who have pledged themselves to be present, and it is hoped that a full meeting will be held and enable the society to start off in good shape.

## AN EPIDEMIC OF BURGLARIES HERE

### Jewelry Store of M. A. Roy is Broken Into on Tuesday Evening

Burglars entered the store of Mr. M. A. Roy on Gerrard Street on Tuesday evening or early on Wednesday morning, by smashing a small glass window and making off with \$250 worth of loot. The goods stolen comprise watches, pins, chains, brooches and pendants, and were all kept in the first show-case nearest the window. No trace so far of the thieves has been found, although the police are naturally reticent regarding the matter which they have in hand.

The evening previous (Monday) the barber shop and cigar store of Aurele Lacasse on Water Street was entered and about \$25 worth of goods removed, including razors, clippers and taloacs. The thieves entered by the front door which was only secured by an ordinary lock.

It is only about ten days ago since the store of H. C. Montgomery & Co. was entered on the Subway and a large number of watches and other jewellery taken away, and it seems safe to assume that the burglaries are the work of one gang, although what they are doing with the stolen goods is hard to understand. The police meantime are busy on the cases, but will make no statement for publication.

## ADOPT C. P. R. SYSTEM ON I. C. R.

### Official Now at Truro In- structing Staff in Use of New Forms

Truro, N. S., Oct. 21.—Millions of copies of blank bills to be used on the Peoples' Railway, costing many thousands of dollars, will be forwarded to the substitution of an almost entirely new set of forms, similar to those in use by the C. P. R.

In order to use the new forms, instructions have been borrowed from the C. P. R., and are now travelling from point to point, showing agents and clerks how to use them.

## SIX MONTHS REVENUE

### The consolidated revenue for the six months of the fiscal year was \$30,577,716 an increase of five millions, while the six months expenditure on that account was \$48,697,094, and increase of approximately three millions. Capital outlays in the same period were \$24,137,858. This is double the corresponding period and accounted for by the payment of railway subsidies.

### BRAMWELL BOOTH COMING TO CANADA

Canadian Officials Will Gather To Meet Their Chief.

The Salvation Army in Canada will shortly celebrate an event of historical importance to that organization in the welcome to the Dominion for the first time of their new general, W. Bramwell Booth, eldest son and successor of the late General William Booth, founder of this world wide movement.

Toronto and Winnipeg are the only centres to be visited by General Booth, and extensive arrangements for public and private gatherings are being made.

The General leaves Southampton on Oct. 23rd, and proceeds direct to Toronto, arriving on Saturday, November 1st, where his engagements will keep him until November 6th, after which he will go on to Winnipeg remaining there until November 11th.

Commissioner David C. Lamb, International Secretary and head of the Emigration Department, Commissioner John Lawley, and Colonel Theodore Kitching will accompany General Booth from England.

All the officers of the Army and delegates in the territory extending from Port Arthur to Halifax, also from Newfoundland will meet their leader at Toronto, and those from Fort William to the Pacific Coast, at Winnipeg.

### ATTEMPT TO MOB KING AND QUEEN

Militant Suffragettes Make Dash for Royal Carriage Outside London Theatre

London, Oct. 11.—King George and Queen Mary, who attended a command performance at a London music hall, tonight, had a narrow escape from being mobbed by suffragettes. The women, who had gathered in considerable numbers, made a dash for the royal carriage, on its arrival at the theatre, shouting "women are being tortured in prison."

They had almost reached the carriage when the police closed around, and, with defiant shouts of votes for women, were hurled back. The suffragettes were treated roughly by the crowd, but managed to escape arrest.

Jewish suffragettes, following for the first time the example set by those of the Christian faith, to day interrupted the service at the West End Synagogue, Bayswater, by reciting "May God Forgive Herbert Samuel and Sir Rufus Isaacs for denying freedom to women. May God forgive Herbert Samuel and Sir Rufus Isaacs for consenting to the torture of women." The disturbers were escorted from the synagogue, after their names had been taken by the synagogue authorities. It is understood that Mr Samuel, who is the postmaster-general, is a regular worshipper at the synagogue.

### CANADA'S FOREST PRODUCTS LABORATORY

"The Forest Products Laboratory now being established at McGill has for its object the utilization of the by-products or waste incidental to lumbering operations. At present over seventy-five per cent of a tree is wasted either in the form of stumps, cull logs and tops, or as slabs edgings and sawdust. The work to be accomplished by the Laboratory will be conservation in its broadest and most practical aspect," writes Mr. A. G. McIntyre Superintendent of the Dominion Forest products Laboratory in this week's issue of the Journal of Commerce, Montreal.

What they hope to do is well expressed by the following—Instead of a sawmill only, there will be a group of plants in which wood will be converted not only into lumber, but into alcohol, paper and other staples of commerce. From it in some cases would also be secured turpentine, rosin and other valuable oils and gums."

**ONTARIO ELECTIONS.**

It will occasion no surprise that the Conservatives carried the constituency of East Middlesex, Ont., on Tuesday. It was generally expected they would do so, and it is doubtful if the Liberals hoped to win, although they put a candidate in the field and made a vigorous effort to elect him. The Conservatives were so confident at the beginning that they felt sure of a walkover, basing their belief on the fact that at the general election their candidate had a majority of six hundred and sixty one. Nevertheless, they took no chances, organizing thoroughly, and there was a keen contest at the poll, following the ordinary oratorical contests. The vote occasions some surprise, for the Conservative majority was reduced nearly three hundred, in a reduced total vote. It has been urged that the result would show the feeling of Ontario in regard to the navy policy. This was the first opportunity for an Ontario constituency to give its verdict, and both sides hoped it would be such a verdict as would help in the two other by-elections soon to be held in the same province. Both will now lay claims in that respect, for the Conservatives

have held the seat, while the Liberals have reduced the majority. Comparison with the returns in 1911 show that the Conservative vote shows a falling off of 424, and the Liberal vote a falling of 131. Attention will now be turned to South Bruce, where a very hard fight is in progress. This is a close seat, which has been won sometimes by Conservatives and sometimes by Liberals. The last member was a conservative. In the local legislature it is represented by Liberals, so that there is far more uncertainty than prevailed in East Middlesex.—Globe.

**THE ARMAMENT CRAZE.**

There will be world-wide regret that Germany does not take kindly to Mr. Winston Churchill's suggestion of a year's holiday in the building of warships. No doubt, Mr. Churchill was speaking as the representative of his government. Germany has not yet been heard from officially, but from Berlin despatches, it is readily conjectured that the reasonable offer of Great Britain to stop the mad race in navy building will not meet with the favor of those in control of power. If the people were consulted, their response would probably be favorable, for they are oppressed by the continual growth of war taxes in time of peace. The Socialist party—now a powerful party in the German empire—has strongly but without effect opposed the war measures of the Court. It looks as if Great Britain will be compelled to follow the German lead.—Globe.






