#### CURIOSITY.

Sensation-mongering is something that should be discouraged in childhood. This does not mean that imagination should be checked in the child. Imagination is a highly desirable quality and its development is undoubtedly an asset to any child in after life, no matter what vocation he may choose. It must be remembered, however, that the child mind is constantly open to suggestions, both good and evil. The adult, with the desire and the necessary will-power, may close his mind to many of these undesirable suggestions; but not so the child. Curiosity dominates his waking hours, pushing all prudence into the background and supplying the impetus for his eternal quest for sensation and excitement whether of a wholesome or unwholesome nature.

In this respect many of us are quite childish. Many people merely regard curiosity as the impetus which makes a neighbor anxious to find out where you spend your evenings, whether your cellar is wet or dry and whether the lady you escorted to the races was your own wife or someone else's. This they call "natural curiosity." Perhaps it is. Apparently it is "Natural" enough to some people. Nevertheless, it is merely vulgar, unbridled inquisitiveness. In other words, curiosity running wild. Its owners are still in the pinnacled stage as far as real education is concerned. They have not yet learned to mind their own business.

But curiosity in the first place is a God-given instinct. What it requires is to be directed into the proper path, for it is an instinct which may be productive of either intellectual growth or mental degeneracy, according to the direction it is allowed to take. Therefore it is important that the curiosity of the innocent child mind should be directed towards useful and worthy things. Moreover, children should be carefully taught to discriminate between good and evil suggestions and between healthy and unwholesome aids to the interest and excitement they desire. By striving to direct the curiosity of boys and girls under their care, into useful and worth-while channels, parents and teachers will be doing much to combat the mischievous and sensation-mongering tendency which appears in every normal child of both sexes.

Many parents never give this matter a thought. Why? Mostly because they have never realized its importance. Nevertheless, if more attention was given to this part of the child's training, meddling gossipers and backbiting scandal-mongers would not be so numerous twenty years hence. For the above-mentioned crop of "talkers" is merely a harvest from curiosity sown without discrimination. Through proper education at the proper time, the instinct of curiosity and the love of excitement and sensation, inherent in all human beings, may be diverted from contact with the vulgar or harmful and directed to a worthy and useful goal.

#### BORROWED MONEY.

There was a time when our governments and city corporations could borrow money for amount half what the costs of interest now amount to. That cheapness of money was unfortunately too freely taken advantage of, with the result that a very much larger proportion of public revenue than is proper is now eaten up in interest charges. The St. John (N. B.) Globe wisely remarks that: "The St. John city financial reports presented to citizens this week, like the provincial reports given to the Legislature a few days earlier, disclose that each government is compelled to set aside approximately one-third of its revenue to pay interest charges. Not too strongly not too frequently can this fact be impressed. The demand in each case is heavier than sound business prudence justifies. Neither the City of St. John nor the Province of New Brunswick can afford to let this interest account consume a larger portion of the available revenue. In fact the credit of the two governments depends that the lightest kind of checks be put on interest-bearing expenditures, or the day will come when the sale of securities will be influenced. The matter is one of interest to every citizen and of par-

cular interest to those who have large financial stakes in the country and therefore stand to bear the heaviest share of the taxation levies which are the only means of paying such debts. It is high time that men of position in the city and province took stock of prevailing conditions and organized themselves to help resist the pressure which comes from many sources to influence capital expenditures. Boards of Trade and all the forces standing for sound business in public affairs should without thought of politics give both civic and provincial rules to understand that these debt burdens are already too heavy. A healthy public opinion is the demand of the moment."
