

The discovery of this important fact was made about thirty years ago by the late Mr. T. Rose, of Dorking, England. who, in a petition presented to the House of Commons, in March. 1856, stated that be successfully tested the efficiency of the remedy in more than three thouof the remedy in more than three thou-sand cases of small pox. With this simple remedial adjunct, and a refriger and mode of treatment, Mr. Rose achieved such a triumph over this hitherto fatal disease as to reduce the death-rate to a single exceptional case.




