The Budget Presented in the House of Commons-New Stamp Duties and Increased Tax on Wine Proposed -Suspension of the Sinking Fund.

London, April 14.-The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, presented the budget in the House of Commons yesterday. The house was crowded when he rose to make his speech.

He said the trying episodes of last year's Spanish-American war and the difficulties on the Niger and the Nile, had no prejudicial effect upon the country's revenue, the result for the year being a small surplus. Continuing, he confessed to being disappointed with the tobacco receipts, but said that if they were able to leave tobacco alone he felt confident the anticipations of an increase of revenue from the increased consumption would be more than realized during the coming year.

CHINA IS BRITAIN'S MARKET.

Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, Conservative M.P., speaking at Bradford, remarked that foreign competition had driven Britain out of many markets which she formerly monopolized, and that China now alone was open. NEW SYSTEM NOT NEEDED

To Drain Storm Water Except in a Small Section of the City.

Consulting Engineer Chipman's Opinion on the Subject.

Board of Works Would Abandon the Rectory Street Car Line,

And Extend the Line on the Hamilton Road-"Deputation" Night With No. 2 Committee-A Busy Session.

The board of works last night decided in favor of the extension of the Hamilton road car line to Pine street, and of the abandonment of the Rectory street line. A variey of important matters came before the board, and several deputations were present. Much interesting information regarding stormwater sewers was received from Consulting Engineer Chipman. He exploded the idea, prevalent in some quarters, that a separate storm water system would be needed throughout the city. Such was never the intention of the promoters of the new sewer system. Storm-water sewers will be required only in certain sections, and a plan of them should be prepared; also a bylaw for the financing of them should be passed by the council.

The question of storm-water drains came up in connection with the oft-discussed petition of North Waterloo street residents for a sewer. The petitioners asked for a sewer, and objected when they found they had to have a storm-water drain as well. Others benefiting by the drain would not pay for it, they said. The frontage tax was fair so far as sanitary sewers were concerned, but they argued that all ratepayers in the district benefited by the stormwater drain should pay for its con-

Mr. John Christie explained the views of the ratepayers. They had petitioned last fall for a sewer, and were told they would have to pay for a storm-water drain as well. They didn't want the latter, and again called upon the committee to give them what they

Mr. Hanna said the petitioners considered it a great hardship that they should be called upon to pay for something to benefit the residents on Wolfe, Hyman and other streets.

Mr. Sutherland was surprised the city had put a macadam road there without first putting down a sewer. He would never have built there if he had not thought there was a sewer on the street. He had taken much trouble to get the petition sufficiently signed, and after the city officials had approved of the petition it was changed. As a result the matter was laid over. The

speaker had to build a cesspool, which overofiwed during the winter, and did \$500 damage to his house. He was willing to pay for all he got. Storm-water sewers should be paid for by the district benefited.

To the mayor, Mr. Chipman said some streets did not need storm-water sewers. No addition to the present system was needed in the central part of the city, nor with any of the sewers tributary, directly or indirectly, with the King, Ridout and Wellington street sewers. By these sewers the storm water was carried as it has been before the new system-into the river. But north of the north main intercepting sewer, a separate plan for storm-water drainage had to be followed, providing one pipe for sewage and another for storm water. On some sandy streets it would be advisable and cheaper to drain the surface water by gutters, for one, two, or three blocks. Mr. Chipman suggested that a plan of these sewers needed be taken up by the department, so that it would be known just where they had to be laid. Such a plan of the sanitary sewers was prepared by the engineer

To Ald. Parnell, Mr. Chipman said it was never in his mind for a moment that a separate storm-water system would be needed throughout the city. Speaking again of sanitary sewers, Mr. Chipman said a nine-inch pipe was sufficient for a population of 6,000.

Assistant Engineer Ironside said the law provided that the storm-water sewer must be added in the case under discussion. It seemed unjust to the petitioners in this case, but there was no legislation to get over the difficulty.

Ald. Parnell urged a week's delay in the matter, so that it could be looked into carefully. It seemed to him that a great injustice would be done to the petitioners if they had to pay \$300 (the price of the tender obtained) for a storm-water sewer that they did not need. He moved that the mayor, the chairman, Ald. McPhillips, himself and Consulting Engineer Chipman look into the matter, to report next week. Car-





The first of these projects is satisfactory for more than one reason. American enterprise has left only a fraction of the carrying trade of the great lakes to Canadian bottoms. Last year nearly 90 per cent of Canadian wheat for export reached the seaboard through American carriers. Even the Parry Sound Railway, which handled a great deal of American wheat, was obliged to secure United States freighters to carry cargoes between Duluth and Parry Sound, because there were no Canadian boats large enough to handle the traffic profitably. The smaller boats have been almost driven out of the lake business by the new type of huge freighters, which can carry at cheaper rates on account of their greater capacity. In fact, it was becoming a serious question whether these big American boats should not be allowed to carry cargoes between Canadian ports, in order to divert the grain traffic of Manitoba and the Northwest to Canadian channels. At present the Manitoba and Northwest grain for export goes largely to Duluth for lake shipment, reaching New York via Buffalo. The steamers to be built by the Canadian Inland Transportation Company will be of sufficient capacity to enable them to compete with the American leviathans, and by reason of the allwater route to Montreal, it is claimed that grain can be carried from Port Arthur to Montreal cheaper than from Duluth to New York. By the New York route ship cargoes must break bulk at requested to specially note and report tedious navigation, having almost failen millions in building and deepening canals, but she has very few ships to use them. This season will show the possibilities of a 14-foot waterway from Lake Superior to Montreal, and if it fulfills expectations it means a new era for the Canadian inland marine, which is now insignificant in comparison with the enormous American shipping on the

great lakes. We are not fully acquainted with the details of the scheme which Cleveland and Buffalo capitalists are promoting. We understand their protosal to build elevators in Montreal was not approved by the harbor commissioners of that city, but the Government will doubtless give their project every consideration. It may be that these capitalists believe the St. Lawrence is to become the great outlet for the grain exports of the Canadian and American Northwest, and that they are after a share of the carrying trade in good time.

The proposed erection of a blast fur nace at Toronto is another token of the emarkable growth of the smelting instry in Ontario. In addition to the sent smelting works at Hamilton, e blast furnaces are being built at and and Deseronto. The Hamilton ter has treated Canadian ores only mall quantities, but the firm that Ontario iron is growing in

with manufacturers. The new nto company express confidence that they will be able to use Ontario ore altogether. It is said they have assurances from the Dominion Government that the bounty of \$3 per ton will be retained. The Ontario Government also gives a bonus of \$2 a ton, graduated so as to encourage the use of Ontario ore and charcoal. The bounty system is open to serious objections, and can be defended in this case only as a temporary expedient. It is intended merely to give the iron mining and smelting industries a start. As the cost of mining and smelting decreases, the bounty should be diminish-

ed in proportion, until it can be withdrawn altogether. It is like a business for a considerable period before it becomes profitable.

The fourth item in the news budget, referring to the large emigration from the United States to Canada is a restatement of a fact constantly brought twelve months or so. The movement began in earnest last year, and is full of promise for the future of the Northwest. The American settlers are exed to Canada by the better prospects for their children in a country where

land is cheap and plentiful.

Opinions That Differ.

The Ontario educational department has issued in pamphlet form the report of Mrs. Hoodless on Domestic Science. including information gained by the writer during a recent visit to the schools of Philadelphia and Washington. We take from it the following interesting extract:

"The royal commission of England on elementary education, in its report for 1887, laid down the principle 'that the true object of education is to give such instruction to the scholars as will best fit them to fulfill the ordinary duties of the life to which they are most likely to be called.' This led to much discussion, and as it was generally conceded ple were coming to think only of that the duty most likely to devolve upon the great majority of girls at-tending the schools would be in some form of domestic life, it was decided to introduce domestic science into the regular elementary and secondary school courses. So much for England. In 1898 the royal commission appointed by the national board of education in Ireland, submitted an exhaustive report on practical and manual instruction in primary schools. This commission, consisting of fourteen educational authorities, held 93 meetings, took the evidence of 186 persons who were qualified to give information, and visited 119 schools in Great Britain, Belgium, Germany France, Sweden and the United States. Their verdict was entirely favorable to Domestic Science, which now forms part of the general education for girls in nearly all the leading cities and towns in Europe and the United States. The commission thus reported: "The evidence we have had in reference to cookery shows the attractiveness of the subject to the pupils, and its usefulness in securing greater regularity of attendance, and in encouraging the pupils to stay on longer at school. We are of opinion that this useful subject should be encouraged in the schools."





Interesting Statement Regarding the Famous "Dossier"

And How the Enterprising Paris Paper Got Hold of the Document.

New York, April 14.-The Tribune's Paris correspondent says: The Figaro's unexpected and successful audacity in securing and publishing the record, or "dossier" of the investigation of the criminal chamber of the court of cassation, to determine whether or not there is legal ground for a new trial of Dreyfus, has fairly taken away the breath of the oldest order of French newspaper men. Ferdinand de Rodays, managing editor of the Figaro, says: "The person who gave me the proceedings before the criminal chamber of the court of cassation asked for no pecuniary or other compensation for it, nor did I offer any. I am, moreover, authorized to declare that the person in question is, if necessary, quite pre-pared to reveal his or her identity, and this would be done, for instance, if one of the judges or any person connected with the case should be unjustly accused of divulging the famous judicial

The Grand River Makes Things Uncomfortable at Elora.

Fergus, Ont., April 14.-At 6:45 p.m. yesterday the heavy ice jam on Glen Lammond dam, nine miles above this place, gave way, carrying with it the dam at Glen Lammond sawmill, the flume at one of Wilson's mills, and the flume and water wheel at Beatty Bros. & Bissel's foundry, besides doing considerable damage to J. FORFEITED HIS SEAT

A Vacant Senatorship - Hon. John Sutherland Fails to Attend.

For the fourth time in the history of the senate a member of the upper house has lost his seat through contravention of the constitution of the senate, providing that any senator absent for two consecutive sessions shall forfeit his membership. Sir Edward Kenny, of Nova Scotia was the first who lost his seat under the circumstances provided for. In 1884 Senator Dickson and 1894 Senator Alexander, both of whom had absented themselves for two consecutive sessions, lost their seats. In the Upper House this afternoon Mr. Speaker Pelletier presented the report of the committee on the orders and customs of the senate with reference to the absence for two consecutive sessions of Hon. John Sutherland, one of the senators from Mani-toba, whose residence is at Winnipeg. The report recommended that under provisions of section 32 of the British North America act the senate should declare the seat vacant. On motion of Hon. David Mills the report was adopted. Senator Scott and others spoke in high terms of Senator Sutherland.


