The Grand Trunk traffic returns for the week ending March 7 show that the passenger train earnings were \$104,842. as against \$99,546 during the corresponding week of last year. The freight earnings were \$219,699, and during the corresponding week of 1890 they were 266,189. The total earnings for the week were \$324,541, as against \$365,735 for the first week of March, 1890, a decrease of \$41,194. It will be noticed that there is an increase in the passenger earnings, and that the decrease is wholly in the freight department.

The return of traffic earnings of the C. P. R. for the week ending March 7 shows a business of \$317,000—an increase of \$60,000 over the corresponding week last year.

ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

TORONTO, March 12.

The bill respecting loan companies now before the House, on motion of the Attorney-General, is a consolidation of the Attorney-General, is a consolidation of the law respecting these institutions, including some clauses which have been uniformly made part of the charters hitherto granted, but have not been hitherto incorporated in the general statute. Among these is the power to receive money on deposit, and to loan money, not only on real estate and Provincial and Dominion scenrities, but upon the debentures of municipal and school corporations. corporations.

IMPRISONMENT FOR BRIBERY.

Mr. Whitney intends to relutroduce his Mr. Whitney intends to reintroduce his bill of last session increasing the penalties for bribery at elections. In addition to the punishment of a \$200 fine he proposes to add a penalty of not more than three months in jail, at the discretion of the judge. He also wants to make it obligatory on the county crown attorney to attend all election trials for the purpose of instituting proceedings for bribery.



his method of teaching his subject on the black-board. He gave a few minutes to form mental pictures and then reproduce them on slips of paper. These were exhibited, and won the admiration of the teachers. Goldsmith's "Deserted Village," and "Jacques Cartier," were worthily represented, "pictorially," by the London West pupils, and was certainly the most original effort before the association. In closing the speaker said he regretted that he had not more time to enlarge on the subject, but hoped that the teachers would take the plan home and experiment with it. He believed there should be pictures throughout the entire series of public school readers. The pupils must form perceptions then conceptions, and then reproduce them. The plan, however, gave them certain definite vivid impressions. (Applause.)

Miss Davidson then took up the discussion of "Phonics and primary lessons in reading." She announced in opening that she did not approve of the alphabet method. On taking up almost any book she found she could teach 150 out of 200 words phonetically. The look and say method appealed to the eye, the phonic to the ear. They should therefore be taught together. Correct articulation could be taught effectively by phonics. When a child first comes to a school he is taught the word forms first. In pursuance of her method she would proceed to break up the words into separate sounds; this was easier for the pupil than combining the sounds to produce the word. By the latter method the child's attention was drawn to the symbols, representing the sounds which made up the word. In
