It is understood that these letters are the cutcome of the reports which have reached the Pope concerning the alleged opposition in New York to Mgr. Satolli. New Battleships.

LONDON, Sept. 4.-It is expected when upply is reached that the Government will make provision in the naval estimates for two first-class battleships, to be called the Majestic and the Magnificent, to be built at Portsmouth and Chatham. The principal dimensions of the vessels are: Length, 300 feet; breadth, extreme, 75 feet; mean draught, 27½ feet; displacement, 14,900 tons. There will also be five torpedo discharges for 18-inch torpedoes, four of these being submerged. The new ships will possess greater coal endurance, and be capable of keeping the sex for longer periods than the Royal Sovereign class.



Ass.—If there is a difference between the trustees and ratepayers the matter can be referred to arbitration under section 65, of the Public Schools Act, 1891, and the award is binding for five years. The action of the ratepayers present at a special meeting is not final unless confirmed by such an award, and there is no legal objection to calling a special meeting at any time for the purpose. It is usual, however, not to do so twice in the same year, because obviously useless.

They Scarcely Speak. and evening this week. Not that anyone particularly cares what the Lords may say about the Home Rule Bill, but because of the unprecedented chance to see the originals of the characters, both great and small, in Burke's Peerage, which Oscar Wilde says is the best thing the English have done in fiction. The Conservatives are mustering the Lords for an overwhelming majority. The poor Lords who wish to fish and shoot and play about generally are coming, cursing the Liberal party and the Irish at each step Londonward.

The Vote. The Liberals will get about 40 votes. The Conservatives expect to muster over 400. As there are only about 560 peers, one can see how nearly complete the bench show promises to be. Indeed, the Marquis of Salisbury plans to make the decisive division on the Home Rule Bill in the House of Lords the occasion of a great Tory rally. Not content with the normal majority of the Lords against the Govern ment, he will insist that every Tory peer that can be reached by the whip shall be present to record his opposition to the Gladstonian policy. At his instance the Tory whips have sent exceptionally urgent notices to all members of their party in the

Upper House. The prospect is that, despite the unfavor ableness of the season, almost the full strength of the Oppositition will be brought out for the vote. Most of the peers who usually bolt all Parliamentary duties at this time of year are showing obedience to the party whips which they paring to leave the race-courses, the moor and the summer resorts of the continent to

join in the demonstration against home rule.

More than 400 Lords have already prom-More than 400 Lords nave already promised to support the Marquis of Salisbury in throwing out the bill. The Earl of Kimberly, leader of the Government's forlorn hope in the House of Lords, can muster at most 42 votes. For every peer supporting the bill, therefore, there will be ten oppos-

There will be little debate on the bill There will be little debate on the bill among the Lords. For three nights they will devote most of their time to dividing sgainst it. The peers have not shown any appreciation of fine oratory in recent years. They would not tolerate speeches of the class delivered by Mr. Chamberlain, Mr. Balfour and Mr. Morley in the House of Commons in the last two days. They do not care for any new view of home rule, and, in fact, there are among them but two or three who are able to clucidate further any subject already debated in the lower House.

Earl Spencer, First Lord of the Admiralty, will move the second reading on Tuesday. The Duke of Devonshire will respond with a motion for the rejection of the bill. Both are dull, penderous speakers, and little general interest is felt in what they may say. The Duke of Argyll, anti-Home Rule; Lord Herscheil, Gladstonian, and Lord Halsbury, Conservative, who will speak to the motions, are fairly effective, but incapable of adding vivid interest to the discussion. Whatever freshness and vigor may be shown in treating the well-worn theme will come from the Marquis of Salisbury and the Earl of Rosebery, Secretary of State for Foreign A fairs. It is said that 50 inexperienced "Unionist" pears have intimated their desire to make brief speeches against the bill, but, in deference to the wish of the great "Unionist" majority, have agreed to hold their peace. The "Unionist" whips feared that these gentlemen would expose themselves and their party to ridicule by their unaccustomed efforts to express in public their ideas on a great question. Coming Great Measures. Now that the Home Rule Bill is virtually lisposed of the Liberal Government is fac ing a situation somewhat simplified, but still difficult. It must be admitted that still difficult. It must be admitted that the present moment marks the lowest obb in popularity of the Liberal party. The reason is that the long struggle, though in the highest possible degree successful, has only a moral victory for reward. No tangible reform to apply to the interests of Great Britain has yet been gained. Therefore the patience of the masses would not bear the strain of a test at the polls. The real question now is whether the splendid loyalty and discipline of Gladstone's majority can be maintained for the passage of the other bills, which are of much greater vote-making importance in England, Scotland and Wales. The Opposition fully realizes the situation, and will probably take advantage of it by bringing to bear the same tactics against the other measures. Gladstone's strength with the people, however, is sure to grow with every day spent on the other bills, especially the Labor legislation. The Irish members recognize their great debt to the Prime Minister and their duty ts coperate as heartily in the support of the Employers' Liability, the Registration, the Parish Councils and other bills as on the Home Rule Bill. This will put upon them heavy burdens of personal inconvenience and pecuniary loss. Failure in their allegiance now would be as fatal to the Home Rule campaign as desertion would have been during the struggle which ended Saturday morning.

Bill. Chamberlain, who spoke first, committed himself absolutely to make no opposition to closure on principle, but Balfour,
who spoke late in the debate, contented
himself with a non-committal line. He saw the advantage of leaving his own hands free to imitate Gladstone's measures when he comes into office, whereas Chamberlain must turn another somersault to enable him to support any such measure.

Chamberlain Accuses Balfour. Chamberlain complained to the Tory whips that Balfour had played him false, but Balfour replied that as Chamberlain did not consult him about the line he was going to

consult him about the line he was going to take he did not consult Chamberlain about his line. It is not unlikely that Balfour closed Chamberlain's eye completely.

The Tories are getting restive at Chamberlain assuming the lead of their party as well as his own. They are delighted at the samb administered to him. As Chamberlain is so much swayed by personal feelings, and as he has never been known to let an account stand with the balance against him, everyone is waiting to see just how he will get even.

Curiosities of Suicide.

Cooler weather has brought no abatement of the suicide mania which for three weeks occupied a large share of public attention.
The victims continue to be chiefly men in active life. Two cases yesterday are of great significance. Of one of these, a case great significance. Of one of these, a case of attempted suicide, the merest mention was made by the newspapers. He was an able-bodied laborer, and he jumped from a bridge into the Thames. He was rescued, and when he recovered he explained that he had no reason for solf-destruction. He had no trouble, material or sentimental, and didn't know why he tried to end his life. The other case was one in which the suicide was, in the opinion of many, an life. The other case was one in which the suicide was, in the opinion of many, an act of the highest heroism and self-sacrifice. It was that of a father who gave up the life which he still loved, to save his family from want. This new motive of self-destruction is created by the modern form of incontestable life insurance policies. John Nunneley was his name. He blew out his brains for reasons which are best set forth in the words which left, addressed to the coroner. He was

which are best set forth in the words which he left, addressed to the coroner. He was a wholesale grocer, whose business had failed. He wrote:

"I am about to end my life because I believe that in the cruel circumstances in which I am placed it is the best thing I can do, not only for myself, but for others. In fact, I am in honor bound to do it. I have no money left and without it I can carry on no business; and I know that at my time of life it is almost impossible to get employ. no business; and I know that at my time of life it is almost impossible to get employment of any kind. If I succeeded in doing so, it would be at such a small salary that I could not possibly keep up my life policies. The premiums on these are due shortly, and I cannot pay them. The policies have been in existence many years, and I dare not let them lapse. If I did, there wanid be nothing at all, in case of my death, for my wife and family.

"I dare say it will be said by some who have never known what it is to be in such a desperate dilemma, and to whom life is easy and pleasant, that it is a cowardly act which I have done. Alerhaps so, I dare not live and know that my last chance

lare not live and know that my last char of leaving anything whatever for my wife

"At the same time it will, I think, re "At the same time it will, I think, require some courage and resolution to do the deed which will separate me from the best of wives and from the children whor I love, and which will cut me off forever from a life which, in spite of my anxieties, I have much enjoyed."

I have much enjoyed."

Some people here think that no more unselfish words than these were ever penned, and the testimony at the inquest showed that they were characteristic of the man. The jury, while appreciating the "no-bility of this supreme act of self-sacrifice," declared it the deed of a man of unsound mind.



WORLD'S FAIR DAIRY EXHIBIT.

The test of dairy breeds is going on from day to day. Only three breeds are represented, and the cows are kept in their respective barns with big placards by the doors reading "No Admittance." As object lessons they are failures to the public, for the public cannot see them. All is private, and the officials in charge only know what is done. Farmers come there to see the types of dairy cows and the door is slammed in their faces. At a big expense this dairy test is conducted in private and only three breeds in it a

that.

The dairy exhibit is a failure. Some one blundered. Some one high in po-sition, but low down in dairy sense. Red tape can't put sense into an empty head, especially when heaping full with self importance. The cold storage facilities are a failure. We learn that the contract was let to one party to put in the cold storage plant for all exhibits and that no state was permitted to furnish its own cold storage. The titled chief who handled the red tape blundered in this and sacrificed the dairy display. The cold storage provided is a failure. It does not preserve the butter. We hear that some of the butter became tainted with ammonia and that the only alternative lay between a display of injured butter and no display, and as it is mani-festly unjust to the makers of the butter to let it spoil and then exhibit as a sample of their product the butter was quietly withdrawn and sold.

The result is that the exhibit of dair products is humiliating. In place of a grand exhibit in keeping with the mag nitude of the business—one that would fitly illustrate the marvelous achievements of modern dairying—we have a humiliating spectacle, a flat failure in its educational feature and an insult to the worthy dairymen who in good faith fur-nished samples of their work. It is a disgrace, all the more dismal because needless.

The third feature—the dairy school—is a total blank. The building stands there, but it is not used. No provision seems to have been made to provide an instructive display.—Creamery Journal.

The defenders and apologists of oleomargarine are very fond of saying, "The people demand this substitute because it is just as wholesome as butter and a great deal cheaper." This is a false state-ment and one put forward by the oleo makers to deceive the conscience and judgment of the public. The fact is the stuff depends almost entirely for its consumption upon fraud and deception of the grossest character, and those who uphold and defend it will some day be ashamed of their words. A fact pertinent to this view of the case is cited from the late report of the Connecticut dairy and food commission by the Hart-ford Times. It says:
"Connecticut, according to the last

census, with a population of 746,258 had no oleomargarine factories, but two wholesale dealers and 69 retail dealers The peddling by wagons has been the most difficult to follow up. However, when such dealers were compelled to place outside their wagons a sign bearing 'Oleomargarine Sold Here,' they gave up the business entirely, as people then knew what the peddler was han-dling, and they looked to some other dealer for their butter."

The legislature of Connecticut has lately enacted a law similar to that in force in Massachusetts, which forbids under severe penalties the selling of eleomargarine or any other substitute in the color, form or name of natural yellow butter. That color feature of the law is a deathblow to the business, and the dealers in Massachusetts have been defeated in all the courts in their efforts to overturn the law. The nat ural color of eleomargarine is not that of butter, and it is right and wise that it should be forbidden "to steal the ves tal garments of the bride in order to add to the seductive allurements of the harlot."--Chicago Inter Ocean.


The Separator.

The great value of the separator lies in two important points—first, it im-proves the quality of the product, and, second, it increases the quantity. The Wisconsin experiment station reports that by centrifuge they can make as much butter from 23 cows as by 35 from other setting, and this after a long and exhaustive test. Several hand machines have been introduced into Franklin county, Mass., and Windham county, Vt., and every one who has them says that there has been an increase in cash returns from the increase in quantity and also from the increase in price returned for the butter of at least 10 per cent. The milk is separated while warm direct from the cow, so there can be no sweeter cream made than this. The skimmilk has all its natural warmth to be fed to the calves. It saves all pans and creamers, also the storing of a large quantity of ice, as all that is needed i for keeping cream and butter .- H. C. Haskell in Farm and Home.

Salting Butter.

Salt is wanted in butter by most people on account of taste. In some places fresh unsalted butter is preferred, but the general market yet demands it salted. There is a tendency, however, toward a taste for a lighter salting just as there is a tendency toward a taste for milder acid on butter. Salt has been used to some extent to hide early rancidity and other faults in butter, and the better the other faiths in butter, and the octer the butter is made the less salt is required for that purpose. While formerly an ounce to the pound was often used, only one-half to three-quarters of an ounce is now used for a pound of butter by the best makers.—Dairy Messenger.

CATHOLICS IN CONGRESS.

Great Gathering in Chicago-Every Diccese in the States Represented.

Diocese in the States Represented.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sopt. 4.—Solemn high mass at St. Mary's Church marked the formal opening of the Columbian Catholic Congress of the United States this morning. A large number of delegates were in attendance. At the conclusion of the service those in attendance repaired to the Art Institute, where, during the entire week, the largest and most comprehensive gathering to ever held under the anspices of any single denomination will be held. Every diocese and vicariate in the United States was represented. There were fully 5,000 persons in the audience. Archbishop Feehan, of Chicago, welcomed the visitors to the fair and the Catholic Congress. The World's Columbian Exposition was represented by Hon. Thomase P. Bryan, who referred to the congresses as the most enduring part of the fair. The opening address was delivered by his Eminence Cardinal Gibbons, archbishop of Baltimore. He was received with great enthusiasm, and was obliged to wait several minutes before he could be heard.
