



In the case, as referred to the court by the Dominion Government in February, 1894, a series of 17 questions was framed, of which the essential one is the first, and is in substance, as

Did the beds of all lakes, rivers, public harbors, and other waters situate within the territorial limits of the several provinces, and not granted before Confederation, become, under the B. N. A. Act, the property of the Dominion, or of the province in which they are situate? and is there any distinction between the various classes of waters, salt or fresh, navigable or non-navigable, or between the great lakes and other lakes, or between the great rivers and other rivers, or between waters directly connected with the sea coast and other waters, or be-:ween waters separating two or more provinces of the Dominion from one enother and other waters, or between waters separating the Dominion from the territory of a foreign nation and other waters?

These questions were argued on the oth and 10th of October, 1895, and a full year elapsed before the judgments were delivered.

Chief Justice Strong stated in his judgment that as at the time of Confederation the beds of all lakes, rivers, public harbors and other waters within the territorial limits of the several provinces, which had not been granted by the crown, were vested in the crown as representing the provinces respectively, and as there was no distinction in this respect between any of the waters specifically mentioned in the question, all ungranted beds of such waters are lands be-

laws conferring on the lessees or liensees of the Dominion a right of fishing in any waters, whether navigable or non-navigable, the beds and banks of which are assigned to the provinces respectively, under the British North America Act." The crown in right of the provinces can grant the beds of all waters and streams, and unless the right of fishing is expressly reserved, the exclusive right of fishing passes to the grantee as an incident of ownership; but "neither the provinces nor the Dominion can grant exclusive rights of fishing in tidal waters, such grants being restrained by

Magna Charta." Justice Taschereau was bound by the decision in Holman vs. Queen to say that as regards public harbors the beds belong to the Dominion; but if the question had not been conclnuded by that case, he would say that the beds of public harbors belong to the provinces. The Returning Officer Failed to Sen Them to Ottawa.

An Ottawa dispatch says: "The Secretary of State was astonished to learn that Mr. Franklin Wright, who was returning officer in the last Dominion election in this city, had not made to the department the usual detailed report of expenses incurred. All the other returning officers in the neighborhood of London reported months ago, and the deputy returning officers, poll clerks, constables, owners of booths, etc., were paid. 

Peas barely fulfilled the expectations In our present advices of August. references to the "bug" are more fre quent, and considerable mildew, which resulted in some of the pods not fully maturing, is also reported. Despite these drawbacks the crop is fully an average one. Reports regarding corn vary with local conditions. In different parts of the Province a portion of the crop was caught by frost, and consequently some of that grown for fodder will be injured. Frost did little damage to the ears, but in many instances these are hardly as plump or as fully matured as usual. The large acreage and the good yield. however, insure an abundance of fodder both as stover and silage. Rain at the time of planting hurt beans on low lands, and wet weather at harvesting also did injury. Some sections, how-ever, report good yields, and the return per acre is about an average.

BUCKWHEAT. What little was grown appears to have done fairly, except where the frost appeared while the grain wafilling. A Glengarry correspondent ports that grasshoppers damaged t'

Good fields of clover for seed have been the exception. The poor catch of last year and the trying winter have combined to thin the stand, and while there has been a generous growth of stalk, owing to frequent rains since the first cutting, the heads as a rule did not fill out well. The midge has been active, especially in the western part of the Province. Alsike has done etter than red clover. THE ROOT CROP. In many quarters the crop of pota-

toes was affected by drouth at the time of planting, but a large number of correspondents say that potatoes have yielded well and are of good quality. Rot was common on lowlying lands, more particularly in some of the Lake Eric counties. In the Georgian Bay group the potato crop s spoken of as an excellent one. Dry weather at the time of sowing prevented much of the turnip seed from germinating, and the attacks of the grasshopper thinned the plants on many fields. While some correspondents speak of a good yield, the majority of the reports are not so fa-vorable. Correspondents who grow mangels speak well of the crop, and none of the other field roots have done as well. Had they come up evenly the one, but the drought in seeding told against a successful catch. Carrot seed did not spring up fully on account of dry weather. Many cor-respondents speak of the crop as a good one, while others claim that it is poor. Like mangels, this crop has been almost free from insect pests.

FARM OPERATIONS. In many sections fall plowing has been completed, but, taking the Pro-vince over, work in this respect is hardly as far advanced as at the same time in previous years. The immense apple crop and the larger area of corn have kept farmers busier than usual this fall, and in the Lake Erie counties especially a good deal of fall plow-ing had yet to be done as reports came

in. With the prospects of open weather before them, correspondents were of opinion that more land than usual would be turned under this fall.

FARM IMPROVEMENTS. Underdraining with tile is being carried on as extensively this fall as usual. In some townships a very large amount is being put in, Essex and Kent as usual taking the lead. There is no scarcity of tile. The work is done principally by the farmers them-selves, with here and there the help of an "expert." Draining machines are not heard of. In the west the zigzag fence is still being replaced by various kinds of wire fence. Consider-ing the many complaints of the state of affairs there appears to be more building going on than would be ex-pected, but the most frequent remark is, "raising barns and putting stone foundations under the basement."

There appears to have been plenty of male help, and the tendency of wages has been downward. The farmdo their work within their own families. Increase of labor-saving ma chinery has helped them. The plaint as to scarcity of domestic help was quite common; those desirous of that class of work seeking the towns and cities. Wages for this class of work has been somewhat upward.

THE GREAT FRUIT CROP. The remarks in the August bulletin regarding the great yields of apples are verified by the reports just re-ceived. The yield was enormous, the market is glutted, and in many counties, more especially in Western Ontario, thousands of barrels of good apples are going to waste. The average price per barrel paid farmers is from 40 to 60 cents; extra choice bring slightly higher figures, and poorer sorts go lower. For these prices the grower is usually expected to pick the fruit board the processor of the second states of the seco fruit, board the packers, bring in the empty barrels, and carry the filled ones to the station. Some aver that it pays better to feed the fruit to live stock. The codling worm and the canker worm have been reported by a few correspondents, but the bulk of the statements regarding the quality of apples claim that the truit is remarkably free from worms or other injury. Ice storms last winter and the heavy bearing of this season have caused a good many limbs to break, but fruit trees generally are in good condition. Grape vines made a vigorous growth, LIVE STOCK.

As the drought of last summer was very irregular in its distribution the reports as to pasture are varied. In a few townships of the west the grass was short even after the fall rains; in other townships, the reports are that fall pasture was never better. In the east it has been good to excellent. On the whole there has been plenty of good pasture. Stock are in good condition. There appears to be plenty of fodder for winter feeding, an inprovement on a year ago. The reports indicate that market supplies will be fairly abundant, but the universal complaint of low prices is again met with here. The lowest record is 1 1-2 cents per pound for cattle, live weight county). Apples have been Millet and rape have turned out most apparent; farmers are growing their corn in drills in place of broadcast, and are growing the varieties recommended by the officers of the Ontario Experimental Farm and others, who are making special study of corn growing. The varieties are numerous: Mammoth Southern Sweet, Red Cob Ensilage, Compton's Early, Longfellow, etc., are frequently mentioned. Some stock it in the field for winter use: others dry and stand it on end in the barn, and many others store it in the silo. In some sections the silo is increasing in number, in others it is being discarded-opinions differ as to its being more profitable than dry curing. The acreage of corn is certainly increasing more rapidly than the construction of silos.

Dairying began in the spring of the present year under rather depressin conditions; prices were low. In addition many western districts suffered from short pastures, and the prices and reduced output of cheese factories, caused by a "blue ruin" feeling among many who had hitherto felt that dairying must always boom. Butter production suffered less than The eastern producers appear to have been, on the whole, more generally satisfied with results. How-

ever, dairy prices, especially in cheese, took an upward move in the fall, and tone at time of reporting was much more confident. Owing to increased prices, over 10 cents a pound, many factories were kept open longer than usual. Reports as to the success of butter-making vary with different townships, much depending upon the local market. Some speak of better prices in 1896 than in 1895; others of lower. On the whole there appears to have been an improvement in the quality of butter. As usual, corre spondents differ as to the best dairy cows. "The good old Canadian cow," Durham grades and Ayrshire grades appear to be the favorites. many have strong recommendations for both Jerseys and Holsteins. 

RECALLS THE PAST.

Interesting Old Papers Found in St. Thomas - John Talbot's Exciting Career.

St. Thomas Times: Mrs. Smith, the well-known author, has been in the city for several days, looking up information for a book which she is engaged in writing on the rebellion of '37. In searching for information on this subject Judge Hughes discovered JOHNSTON BROS., Wellington Street a copy of the file of the old St. Thomas Liberal, from September, 1832, to October of 1833. This was volume 1 of the paper, and the editor at that time was A. B. Lewis. The file is in the possession of W. R. Jackson, a grandson of the first editor of the paper. The possession of the paper was disposed of by Mr. Lewis, and at the time of the rebellion came into the hands of John Talbot, whose treasonable writings caused a warrant to be issued for his arrest, and he was compelled to leave the country. He left this place and reached the home of the late Hooper King, where he secured a horse and rode west till he reached Clear Creek. He left his horse there, and continued on his way westward, and finally, with the assist ance of sympathetic farmers, he reached Malden, in Essex county, where he managed to cross the river to Detroit, and became an impoverished refugee. He succeeded in getting in the hands of a number of sympathizers, and remained in the States until the time of his death. Before he became editor of the Liberal, he was a school teacher in London, and was a son of Richard Talbot, an Irish gentleman, who had a large grant of land in the township of London, and settled several immi-grants from Tipperary, Ireland. Their descendants are now some of the foremost farmers and residents of London Biddulph townships, among them being the families of Hodgins, Hask-etts, Shoebottoms, Gambles, Stanleys, Howards, O'Neils, Hughes and Smiths.

Finding of the Jury at the Henry Boyce Inquest.

No One Saw Him Fall or Heard Him Cry.

Verdict Exenerating the Company and Recommending More Protection to Pedestrians.

The evidence taken last night at the inquiry into the circumstances sur--Large stock of envelopes of all rounding the death of Henry Boyce, sizes at The Advertiser Job Depart- who was killed at the Clarence street crossing of the G. T. R., on Monday evening, threw little light upon the way in which the unfortunate man came to be struck by the engine of the Sarnia mixed. No one saw him fall, nor heard him cry. At the time he was being rolled to a horrible death pedestrians stood not more than 30 feet away, but no one saw him.

George Boyce, son of the deceased, was the first witness called. He said his father had not been at work that day. His father's eyesight was good, but his hearing at times was slightly defective, but not very much so. He had last seen his father alive on Sunday night. His father was a temperate man, of a cheerful disposition, and not at all likely to commit suicide. He

was 68 years old. George Talbot was coming up town on Clarence street at the time. He had helped to take the body to the baggage room, but had not seen the man previously.

George Hull, the night watchman. said he had gone to work at 5:55 that night. He had gone into the signal house to put his lunch away, and when he came out train No. 76 (Sarnia mixed) was coming in. Joseph Allen, his mate, was at the gates. He noticed the train, the trucks of which were just across the sidewalk on the east of the train, and had not heard of the side of the street. He noticed the crowd that gathered, and, getting his marks for six or seven feet west of nothing of the accident until a boy where the body was found. There told him.
