GERMAN JOURNALS BEING REPRESSED

Doubtful Whether Liberty Will Come Without a Series of Catastrophes.

London, Oct. 23.—"The Troubles of a German Editor, by One of Them," is the subject of an article appearing in the London Daily Mail. In part it is as follows:

Political progress within the United German Empire was undoubtedly checked by the historic events of 1870-

Today, as the result of the home policy of a Government which was strengthened by the glory of war, we find that political sluggishness and hypocrisy are permeating German citizenship; domineering ideas and laxity of principles prevail in the bureaucracy; concealed bitter feeling exists in the higher, and open bitterness in the lower, strata of the nation-all symptoms of a nascent era of street tumults. But the Government meets these ominous symptoms, as on previous occasions, by trying to stem the democratic stream instead of regulat-

The spectacle of a Government adopting the methods of a birch-loving dominie is nowhere more plainly reflected than in the condition of the German press today. In connection with such events as the present colonial scandals, the Conservative press now and again lets drop a sharp word or two, but without in any way allowing itself to waver in its loyalty to the Conservative Government.

The press of South Germany, the organs of the democratic bourgeoisie, and, above all, the press of the social democracy, are unanimous in their independent stand against government by violence. And it is this section of the press that keeps the law courts

Just now the number of actions for libel in Germany is legion; and, as is usually the case under a reactionary Government, the law is administered in an arbitrary manner. As a result of the Bismarck system, fair-minded judges, or those entertaining democratic ideas, have been eliminated, and consequently justice in connection with criminal libel is administered to please Government ideas. The expression of righteous indignation is regarded by a German judge as insulting language, and the German political champion who shows temper goes to jail. MODERN MEN OF THE PAST FOUND

Island Have Never Seen Face of White Man.

St. Johns. Nfld., Oct. 22.—On a lonely Island in Hudson Bay a lost tribe of Eskimos has been found who have been without intercourse with any other representatives of the human species for centuries and never saw a white man until a few months ago. The home of this strange tribe is on Southampton Island, a mass of Maine, and situated on the northern part of Hudson Bay. Apparently these

aborigines have dwelt there since pre-Columbian times, and today live and subsist in exactly the same way as they

The houses of these peculiar people are

built by putting together the great bones of whales and covering them with sealskins sewn together. In the middle of these primitive dwellings is an elevated place, on which stands a stone lamp, employed for lighting, heating, cooking, melting snow and drying clothes. They use the whalebone in a variety of suprising ways, making even their cups and buckets of it by bending it into round shapes and sewing on the buttons. The whole tribe comprising but 58 individuals, about equally divided among the sexes, and its members speak a dialect peculiar to themselves and quite unlike that employed by any other Eskimos. A strait some 30 miles broad separates Southon which stands a stone lamp, emvery long while, when this strait freezes over, a few of the most daring cross

On Southampton Island there is no Boapstone, which among the Eskimos elsewhere is the favorite material for pots and kettles. The fact that they are without soapstone is the best proof of their prolonged isolation, since all the mainland Eskimo tribes without soapstone get it from more fortunte neighbors. The story of this isolated tribe of Eskimos parallels the traditions of the famous lost colony of Norsemen, which, as recorded in the sagas and folklore, was cut off in Greenland six centuries ago and utterly disappeared. 



Toronto, Oct. 23.—The run at the city cattle market today was 105 loads, with 1,800 head of cattle, 2,446 sheep and lambs 900 hogs and 150 calves.

With a very heavy run of over 100 cars today at the city cattle market, on top of a large run at the Junction yards yesterday, trade was slow for a large proportion of the light rough cattle that offered too plentifully this week. For good quality cattle the market holds steady to fair. It was said, in fact, that the choicest butcher cattle were higher today than the same quality of cattle last week. For the commoner stuff, however, there was a decidedly draggy tone to the market. The bulk of the trading today was for the best feeders, for which there is still a very active demand. A large is still a very active demand. A large proportion of the feeding cattle offering, proportion of the feeding cattle offering, however, in very poor condition, do not fetch the prices quoted as the top prices for cattle of fair to good quality. The market for choice butcher cattle is steady at \$4 to \$425, and for anything extra choice as high as \$440 to \$450. Choice export cattle are quoted at \$475, the top, but there were no \$475 cattle in the market today, though as high as \$5 was paid for a small lot of choice exporters yesterday.
