

LONDON, MONDAY, NOV. 4. THE REAPPEARANCE OF SIR HIBBERT.

The selection of Sir Charles Hibber Tupper as the Conservative nominee for the Commons in Pictou, N. S., means that in his anxiety to re-enter Parliament he fears to trust his fortunes to any constituency in British Columbia. Some years ago he announced his intention of making his permanent home in the latter province, but considers it safer to again attempt the journey by the Nova Scotia route. Time was when the Tuppers were a power in the province down by the sea, but, as was shown by the last general election, when the Liberals made almost a clean sweep, and drove the senior Tupper into private life, that time has passed. Evidently Sir Hibbert believes the family name still has prestige in his old province; else he surely would not go 400 miles to secure a constituency. However, the coming of Sir Hibbert need create no alarm among the Liberals of Pictou. As the Halifax Chronicle observes, they have fought him when he was a much stronger man than he is today," and they are ready to stand by their own brilliant representative, Mr. E. M. Mc-Donald, of whom the constituency has good reason to be proud. Pictou, in common with the rest of the Dominion, is reaping the benefits of Liberal rule, and its people are not likely to make a change, even to help one of the Tupper family secure what he sees no chance of obtaining in the province in which he now resides. His reappearance, therefore, may be expected to serve simply as a spur to the electors in their determination to remain true to the Government of Sir Wilfrid

Behind the nomination of Sir Hibbert Tupper by the Pictou Conservatives is revealed a little plot that is truly Tupperesque, and in a way resode. Mr. A. C. Bell, ex-M. P., has sought the nomination, and in all fairness was entitled to it. He has fought the party battle in the constituency on more than on occasion, and once was successful. Moreover, he is a man of exceptional ability. The party, therefore, owed it to Mr. Bell that he should have the refusal of the candidature. But no; it was wanted for a Tupper, a Tupper must have it, and a Tupper got it, though it meant discarding a man who had borne the brunt of fighting in dark days and the taking up of one who deserted his leader and his constituency seven years ago. WANTS RADICALS

Demands New Members for the House of Lords.

PITT HELD UP AS AN EXAMPLE

Fears Entertained That Liberals So Promoted Would Become Government Foes.

London, Nov. 3 .- Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman is being urged by a number of influential followers to confine his crusade against the House of Lords to a reform of the gilded chamber by creating a large number of radical peers, but the premier knows ful well from long experience that whenever a Liberal gets into the upper chamber he almost invariably bemes a Tory or a Liberal-Unionist.

It is well known that a number of wealthy Liberals who are always ready to pour their shekeis into the party coffers for electioneering purposes are AT THE BOARDING-HOUSE TABLE anxious mainly for the sake of their wives and daughters to become members of the House of Lords.

The premier is being urged to follow the example of Pitt and put some brains into the upper chamber, and to confer the peerage with a view of creating a house of hereditary ability, but Fitt gave this reward only to secure the services of faithful, though usually obscure, sometimes respectable, sometimes ignoble persons, and now and then to get rid of importunity. If the Premier does this, the question arises, What sort of intellectual qualities

are the majority of the peers likely to hand down to their descendants? The dectrine of heredity appeals to dullness and feeblesness quite as much as to force and ability, and it is not as representing the heredity of political genius that the ouse of Lords can defend its existence. The gilded chamber has maintained itself hitherto because it represents an imnense variety of social forces penetrating the community and occupying nearly every field of national life. Many of those who consider that the House of Lords has shown its inability to understand and to adapt itself to political conditions do not challenge hereditry, the principle in itself.

It is less as a hereditary chamber than as a partisan chamber, but as an element of conflict and as impairing authority of executive government that objections are taken to it by a fairly large section of the Liberal party. They say they regard it as a jarring and irreconcilable element in the onstitution, enabling a defeated party to keep possession of one of the branches of the legislature.

He believes that the moment it is realized the predominant power in the state, the House of Commons, is to be the will of the people, the notion that the House of Lords lack of confidence backed on known was or could be a co-ordinate chamber with equal authority, becomes not only a paradox, but an anachronism.

He says the veto of the House of Lords must go where the veto of the crown has gone already, and that every change which has been made in enlarging the franchise and in widening the redistribution of the electoral power has shown the absurdity of sult in the maximum of flexibility with claims for recognizing a co-equal power in a non-representative chamber.

The principal features of the car are that separate entrances are provided for the passengers boarding and leaving the car, and that the fare is paid to the conductor on entering the car, thus doing away with the inconvenience caused when a car is crowded by the conductor pushing his way through the car to collect fares.

If the experiment with the Montreal car should prove a success the company intends to equip all the surface lines with this type. 

No one is allowed to enter the car through the exit door.

Passengers who are boarding the car give the conductor their fare and pass on into the car. The platform will hold more than twenty people and as soon as all the passengers have stepped upon it the conductor gives the signal to the motorman and the car proceeds. All those who are standing on the platform when the car starts will enter the car while it is traversing the next block.
