The Springbank dam, equipped to furnish power for the waterworks pumps at Springbank, ha > been practically out of service for many months. General Manager Glaubitz maintains that the pumps are not fit for service without many improvements. On the other hand, Mr. William Yeates, who installed the pumps, says the repairs required are only ordinary, and that for a small outlay the pumps would develop several hundred horsepower, with a saving of thousands of dollars to the city.



A FISCAL COMPARISON.

The latest tariff policy of the Union-1st party-import duties on manufactured articles, but not on foodstuffshas invited an instructive fiscal com parison with Germany. The comparison is a sound one, because the two countries are economically alike, both being highly industrialized and heavy importers of foodstuffs. Germany collects an average of £33,257,000 annually in import duties, of which only £6,-581,000 is levied on manufactured articles, or an average duty of 8.4 per cent. Of this latter sum £3,739,006 again! was collected on petroleum, leaving £2,842,000 collected on £43,446,000 of dutiable imported manufactures exclusive of petroleum, a duty of not more than 6.5 per cent. ad valorem in a country which is reputed to be highly protectionist. Yet the Unionists propose a tariff of 10 per cent. on manufactured imports, or 31/2 per cent, higher than the German level. French Pancakes.

Two fresh eggs, two tablespoonfuls of milk, one tablespoonful of self-raising flour, and one tablespoonful of sugar. Put the flour in a basin, add the sugar and mix it well in. Make a hole in the flour, add the eggs, previously lightly beaten, and beat it all together. Have ready two buttered saucers, put half the mixture in each. Bake in a moderate oven for 15 minutes till a light golden brown, and then spread with any kind of jam. Turn each other like a half moon, and serve very hot.







Neon and helium, two gases, had been found, and their presence was accounted for either by the transmutation of hydrogen into them-that is to say, by the transmutation of one element into another -or by their creation de novo by the electrons.

Found New Gas.

Sir Joseph Thomson had suggested said the lecturer, that the neon and helium might have come from particles of less than one-seventeenth thousandth of the weight of an atom of hydrogen thrown off from the materials of which the tubes were made, but that was still sub judice. Sir Joseph Thomson, in the course of his observations, had discovered a new gas and had shown how atoms might be connected. Sir Joseph had said that all his electrical experiments tended o confirm his conception that every atom consisted of an inner core in which resided its unchanging individuality, and an outer shell which brought about the variations that the elementary atom went through when chemically combined with other atoms.





LONDON MAY TRY CEMENT PAVEMENTS

Is Used in Other Places With Success and Cheaper Than Brick or Asphalt.

The advisability of constructing several cement pavements in London, similar to those on a number of streets in Windsor, those on a number of streets in Windsor, Sarnia and Detroit, will be brought up at the next meeting of the board of works. Using cement for pavements, instead of vitrified brick and asphalt, has already passed the experimental stage, and in cities where they have been tried they are giving, satisfaction. The cost of the cement pavement is considerably less than that of other kinds; in fact, they are cheaper than macadam roadways, which are about the cheapest that have been tried in this city.

There are a number of streets in South London which are in a bad condition, being full of pitchholes, and almost impossible for traffic during wet weather. It is understood that Engineer Brazier will recommend at the next meeting of the board that as soon as the weather permits several cement pavements be constructed on the streets which are in such bad condition, in Scuth London. structed on the streets which are in such bad condition in South London.
