GROUND THICK WITH GERMANS ON FESTUBERT-GIVENCHY LINE

British Machine Gunners Wor ked Weapons Until the Enemy Was Within 50 Yards, Whe re Missing Was Impossible.

With the British Army in France, April 19.—By the Associated Press.—Along the northern battlefront, at noon today the Germans were still resting on their arms after the bitter defeat which they suffered yesterday in their great drive. Up to that hour they had not recovered sufficiently to make any further threats in this line, and they were rushing the reorganization of their badly shattered forces.

Each successive report gives further bonfirmation of the terrific losses sustained by the assaulting infantry during yesterday's sanguinary struggle.

BRITISH CASUALTIES FOR THIS WEEK TOTAL 12,368

London, April 20.—British casualties reported during the week endng today totalled 12,368, divided as follows: Killed or Died of Wounds-Officers, 575; men, 1,639. Wounded or Missing-Officers, 2,173; men, 7,981.

The casualties reported for this week are approximately half as large again as those reported in the preceding week. Although heavy fighting has not been in progress a month, however, the lists have not begun to approach in size those of last year in the months of active perations, when the British were on the offensive. There is no means of determining how far the casualties now being reported represent osses in the fighting since the German offensive was started. In the several weeks preceding last week, however, when 8,129 names were listed, the totals had been running no higher than between 3,000 and

SIR DONALD DENIES HOLDING INTEREST IN LONDON ELECTRIC

Declares Sir Adam Beck Has Misrepresented Power Ownership, Mackenzie & Mann Having No Interest in Niagara Falls or Other Concerns.

My attention has been called to the press report of proceedings before the power controller, April 18th, in which Sir Adam Beck refers to "The London Electric Company, a Mackenzie-Mann concern," to "Toronto Electric Light Company, and other Mackenzie-Mann companies," and again "to the power given the Mackenzie-Mann Company to go on using extra water at Niagara." The use of the name Mackenzie & Mann in this connection, is abso-

lutely without justification. Mackenzie, Mann & Co., have no interest, and have never had an interest in the London Electric Company, in the Toronto Electric Light Company, in any of the companies developing power at Niagara Falls, or in any of their subsidiaries. Personally, I have neither capital holdings nor official position, in any of the Niagara companies or their subsidiaries. One would expect from a man occupying Sir Adam's responsible position something more than reliance upon street gossip; in fact, one would expect a careful adherence to facts, certainly in matters such as this, where the facts are readily obtainable. I have not followed hydro power matters in Ontario closely enough to know the merits of the controversy; but if the rest of the information which Sir Adam has so freely given to the public is no more accurate, then heaven help the public! ABOUT 30,000 NEW MEN EXPECTED TO **BE ADDED TO ARMY**

Result of Canceling Exemptions Among Youths.

Ottawa, April 20.—Approximately 66,-000 men will be affected by the cancellation of exemptions under the order-incouncil approved by both houses of parliament last night. It is proposed in the first place, to call three years of unmarried men and widowers without children—men of 20, men of 21 and men of 22 vers of age. As a basis for comof 22 years of age. As a basis for computation, it is anticipated that the age declared by the man in his claim for exemption will be accepted. Advance Defences at Givenchy and Festubert and Re-Establish Positions Besides Repulsing German Counter-Attacks.

London, April 20.-Nine machine guns, a trench mortar and prisoners were taken by the British in a local operation yesterday south of the Scarpe River, the war office announces. A German counter-attack was repulsed.

On the Flanders battlefront the British ejected the Germans from advanced positions gained by them in Thursday's attack in the region of Givenchy and Festu-

The British gained all their objectives in their counter-attack in Flanders, advancing their defences at Givenchy and Festubert and re-establishing their positions. In sharp fighting southeast of Robecq, the British drove back German attacking parties.

TROUBLE BREWING.

With the British Army in France, April 20-(By the Associated Press).-No further big enemy attacks developed during the night. Trouble still is brewing in the northern zone and south of the River Somme. There are indications in the latter region that another mighty thrust for the British supply base of Amiens is boiling. The Germans are nursing their hurts in the region of La

In a sharp local engagement at Riez-du-Vinage this morning, from the direction of Pacaut Wood, the enemy overran the British outposts, but were being driven back

The Arras region there was more active yesterday than last night. The British advanced their line slightly on a 1,500-yard front east of Beaurains and repulsed a German counter-attack. Later, however, the British withdrew to their original line.

BECOMING MORE CAREFUL.

Southward in the ridge zone about Kemmel, it seems probable that the enemy has paused to organize a more careful scheme of assault than he has employed in the last few days of costly fighting.

For some time the Germans have been pushing one attack after another against Kemmel in order to catch the British before they could get up reinforcements, and the infantry has been sent forward without the usual method ical preparation for a drive.

The German higher command, seeing the futility of this method, has paused to organize greater preliminary operations. Now another bid for Kemmel and the sur rounding region may come at any time.

confidence, the operations as a whole thus: The second phase of the grand offensive is ending with the strategic downfall of the Germans. The divers actions which continue today are the last convulsions of the battle of Armentieres, or rather its reaction. They cannot be of capital import-





The newspapers have gladly acceded to the wishes of the censor, and in many instances have co-operated with him in such a are few Canadian newspapers which will object to regulations preventing the publication of sedijous articles, or insidious appeals, calculated to League. affect the war spirit of the people. No newspaper which is loyal to the cause of the country will do anything but applaud such prohibitions. In fact, the Canadian press has been the first medium to point out the existence of such publications, and to urge the exclusion of foreign publications which for many months carried pro-German propaganda into many parts of the country. No fair regulation looking to the strengthening of the country's arm will be objected to.

But the new order-in-council, far from making certain specific rulings as to the manner in which newspapers shall conduct themselves, develops into a broad and general edict which may be enforced as a protection for the Government rather than for the country. In the name of seeking to prevent publications that "would divert attention from the object of winning the war," the Government will be able to strike at an unfriendly publisher on almost any pretext. 41,000 CANADIAN LIVES HAVE BEEN LAID DOWN IN THE CAUSE OF FREEDOM

OTTAWA, April 19.—In the course of his address on the order-incouncil to amend the military service act, Premier Borden gave figures, compiled up to March 31, 1918, regarding Canada's war effort. He said that up to that date Canada had dispatched overseas 364,760 men of all ranks; of these 348,000 were non-commissioned

Military District No. 1 (London), 25,533; No. 2 (Toronto), 76,597; No. 3 (Kingston), 39,393; No. 4 (Montreal), 32,463; No. 5 (Quebec), 8,389; No. 6 and 7 (Maritime Provinces), 37,205; No. 10 and 12 (Manitoba and Saskatchewan), 75,503; No. 11 (British Columbia), 36,475; No. 13 (Alberta), 33,193. A compilation of those killed in







