PLANS TO PRODUCE RADIUM IN LONDON

Laboratory for Extraction of Mineral by New Process.

London, Dec. 2. - Within the next few months radium will be manufactured in London. Hitherto the world has had to depend upon continental laboratories for its supply of this minute but potent element. The new factory has been constructed according to the requirements of Sir William Ramsay, who has devised a method of radium extraction which will, it is claimed, enormously reduce the time now needed for the elimination of the non-radioactive elements of pitchblende.

NO DEFINITE RULE AS TO HOLDING SEATS

Ottawa, Dec. 2. - Speaker Marcil gave his ruling in the Commons today on the question raised by Mr. Meighen, of Portage La Prairie, as to the NICARAGUA BOUND right of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to continue to sit for two constituencies. Ottawa City and Quebec East.

The speaker read a long ruling, in which the opinion was expressed that the rules of the Canadian Parliament did not expressly provide that a member elected for two seats should resign one within a week of the opening, there being no election protest standing in the way. The practice had been far from uniform, as shown by the records in the case of Hon. Edward Blake, Dalton McCarthy and Hon, Rodolphe Lemieux, who had represented two constituencies, Mr. Blake resigned one in 15 days, Mr. McCarthy seven days, and Mr. Lemieux in 15 months.

The speaker expressed the opinion that it was desirable that a definite rule should be established, and suggested that matter be taken into conideration by the committee on privileges and elections.




