HINDOOS KIDNAP ROYAL CONVERT

Carried Off By Family.

Methodist Misslonary Sends Word of Daring Capture at Madras-Feared She Is Dead.

New York, Aug. 21. - Sooboonagum Ammal, the Hindoo princess who became a convert to Christianity, and who visited America in 1901, was kidnapped near Madras, in South India, July 18.

So far as known here, she has not yet been recovered by her Christian friends, and, as she has been an object of hatred to her Brahmin relatives since her conversion, she may have been done away with.

The news of the capture and detenwas brought to this city in a letter from Bishop William F. Oldham to the Methodist Missionary Society. In this council. letter the bishop says the princess was forcibly dragged out of her bullock the public road, hurried into a closed carriage and driven off. It was said today by Charles Fahs of the editorial staff of the Missionary Society, that there is little doubt that the young woman has been made away with as other converts have been occasionally. The possibility of her recovery apparently is slight, as the bishop says: "We are doing all



Canadian Cattle for Detroit Fair to Enter Without Inspection.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 21. - Unprecethe order received from Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture, granting permission to the Mich igan State Fair commission to import for exhibition purposes without the formality of the tuberculosis tests by the inspector. The order applies to the state fair to be held here Sept. 11 to 16 and is good for no other exhibitions in the country. The cattle must be shipped direct to the fair grounds from Canada. It is permitted to sell the cattle here, but before being shipped to American owners they will be subjected to the tuberculosis test. The ruling applies also to swine and sheep. It is believed that the concession wil result in one of the finest exhibitions of stock ever seen in this country.







A Prophet or a Prophecy.

Mr. Stead, the distinguished British journalist, figures out what is likely to take plece when the British genera election is brought on, and he has had his figures verified, as closely as can be, by a well-known actuary. It is shown that in 57 recent contests for seats in the Imperial House of Commons, the Liberals have not lost a seat while they have captured from their opponents no fewer than sixteen. Mr. Stead makes his calculations all through on vote changes, not on seat changes, and points out that many of the most remarkable results have left the actual representation for the time unchanged. Briefly he anticipates that in the coming struggle-now said to be postponed till next year-the result will be a Conservative decrease of 7 per cent, and a Liberal increase of 30 per cent. In other words, he calculates that there will be a Liberal and Labor majority of 90 over both Conservatives and Nationalists combined or a Liberal and Nationalist majority -a more natural alliance-over the

Conservatives of 256! It is not necessary to bind one's faith to this prophecy, for the majority seems extraordinarily large; but it is claimed for Mr. Stead that in former tests he has foreshadowed results almost as sensational, and has had his faith shown to be exceedingly welifounded. It will indeed be a peaceful revolution, come it early or late, but that it is coming all parties agree.



STAND COLLAPSES WITH 500 ABOARD

Narrow Escape From a Disaster During a Cornerstone Ceremony.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 20. - More than 500 men, women and children were precipitated fifteen feet into a cellar by the collapse of a platform today during exercises incident to the laying of the cornerstone of the Beth David Russian-Hebrew Orthodox Synagogue.

Nearly all were cut and bruised, but none were fatally hurt. Three rabbis were among the number who went down, and, although injured, they concluded the ceremony after the panic had subsided.

The platform had been constructed over the foundation walls for the accommodation of the rabbis, officers of the church and invited guests. Just prior to the cornersone cere-

monies, a brass band, feading 800 Zionists, marched up, playing a lively tune, and when the Zionists were invited to pass over the platform in order to sign their names to the roll to be placed in the stone, a mad rush was made by the thousands of persons who had gathered to secure the same privilege. The policemen were overwhelmed and in a moment the platform was

packed with men, women and children. The frail structure could not withstand the strain, and fully 500 persons were carried down, The panic that followed attracted thousands of persons to the spot, and he police had great difficulty in extricating the screaming and groaning victims from the wreckage. When the cellar had been cleared it was found that scores were hurt, their injuries consisting of bruises and cuts about the head and the body.


